1,369,904 Bushels of Wheat Cut in County

One of the shortest harvests in length of duration on record was completed here this week, after a harvest period of about 11 days. During these hectic 11 days, a total of 1,369,904 bushels of wheat were delivered to the county's three elevators.

This total is truly remarkable since the grain received little or no moisture during the winter, and most forecasters thought that when the spring rains did come, they would be too little, too late. Lots of wheat was extremely short and forced combines to travel at slower-than-normal speeds.

With an estimated 80,000 acres planted to wheat this year, the county averaged about 17 bushels-per-acre.

Although the harvest didn't last long, the elevators were able to handle the trucks without too many long lines developing. An ample supply of combines was on hand, and local fuel dealers were able to keep the operators with plenty of fuel. Most of the out-of-county combine crews have already moved on north.

The Santa Fe Railway Co. provided many boxcars for the elevators, and switch engines were kept busy for a few days as the grain moved out.

Market price of wheat was \$3.24 Monday and one elevator man estimated that about 60 per cent of the wheat has not yet been sold. On June 21 last year, the News reported that wheat was bringing \$2.40 a bushel.

Vicious Hail Hits Crowell Early Tuesday

Vegetable gardens were destroyed, leaves were knocked off trees and shrubs, and roofs were damaged by a severe hail which struck Crowell about 3 a.m. Tuesday. The hail lasted about 15 or 20 minutes, and with most of it about marble size or slightly larger, the ground was covered by the time it ended.

Accompanying the hail were high winds as well as heavy rains. The moisture measured 2.16 inches by the government gauge, and brought the total for the first three days of June up to 3.04 inches.

From reports received from other sections of the county, the hail was more limited to Crowell and did not cover an extensive area. However, the rains were general over the county, and will force many cotton farmers to replant their crop.

Tornado Rakes Rural Area South of Crowell Last Wednesday

A swath through the rural area south and east of Crowell, causing destruction all along its path.

Major damage was reported at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Russell a few miles southeast of town where the twister unroofed part of the home, and moved the structure about three inches off the foundation. A tubular steel barn was destroyed, as well as three smaller buildings. A pickup parked at the house was moved away from where it was parked, and the windshield was completely shattered by flying debris and the front grill looked as if the vehicle had been in a head-on collision.

Big mesquite trees were uprooted, twisted and torn and two fuel storage tanks were overturned. Mr. and Mrs. Russell and Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Rettig were in the house at the time of the storm which was about 6 p. m., and none of them were injured.

At the O'Neal Johnson place between Crowell and Thalia on U. S. 70, a barn was unroofed, as well as some fence destroyed. Jim Hill Erwin reported a small structure at his place south of town was lifted up and moved considerable distance.

Accompanying the storm was a heavy rain, and Russell said he received about 3 inches.

In the area, REA crews were busy Thursday morning repairing lines and replacing poles.

Also damaged was a highway sign on the courthouse lawn, which local highway department personnel repaired Thursday.

Rains Fall in County During Past Week End

General rains have blessed Foard County during the past few days with most sections of

the county receiving at least an inch of badly-needed moisture. The rains came just as wheat harvest in Foard County was winding up and will be of great benefit to cotton farmers as well as feed grains and pasture lands.

Robert Kincaid said Monday that on Saturday night, .31 inch was recorded by the government gauge, with the heaviest rains that night falling in the south and west parts of the county. Up to 1.5 inches fell in the Good Creek and Antelope Flat areas. On Sunday night, .57 inch was recorded here to bring the two-day total to .88 inch.

I. J. Jackson said Monday he received about an inch total during the two nights and J. G. Vaughn said 1.6 fell in the Halsell ranch area southeast of Crowell.

A total of 2.19 inches of rain were recorded by the government gauge here during the month of May.

Briscoe Announces Funding of Two Local EOAC Projects

Economic development is one of the projects financed through two Office of Economic Opportunity grants that Governor Dolph Briscoe announced Friday.

The grants are to Economic

Development Corporation of Cottle, Foard, Hardeman and Wilbarger Counties in Crowell. One of the grants is a \$2,750 grant for General Community Programming and is effective

retroactively from May 1 through June 30, 1974. The other grant is for \$8,502 and includes \$3,044 for administration and \$5,458 for General Community Programming. It is effective beginning June 1, 1974. Both grants are funded under Title II of the Economic Opportunity Act.

Felix Taylor, executive director, says the corporation is assisting in three economic development projects at the present time. They are construction of a nursing home in Foard County, expansion of the Cap Manufacturing Company in Crowell and expansion of the City Park in Crowell.

The corporation is operating a day care program serving approximately 80 children in Vernon Neighborhood Center, and 25 each in Centers in Crowell, Quanah and Paducah.

Approximately 15 families are aided each month through the corporation's housing assistance program, that provides assistance in obtaining loans for re-pairing old homes and building new ones.

Neighborhood centers are operated in Vernon, Crowell, Quanah and Paducah providing high school equivalency instruction, counseling, outreach and referrals to other social agencies. The Vernon Center also provides classes in typing, shorthand and speedwriting in coordination with the Texas State Technical Institute in Amarillo.

Grant processing for the state was performed by the Texas Office of Economic Opportunity, a division of the Texas Department of Community Affairs.

CATTLE FUTURES ARE POOR FORECASTERS

Futures market quotations are poor forecasters of what actual cash livestock market prices will be in the future, warns a livestock marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Futures contracts for June 1974 have sold as high as \$61.75 and as low as \$42.95. Another feeding cattle this past winter who used the price of \$61.75 as a forecast is in "a heap of trouble". Sound forecasts are available that are based on logical analyses of the economic factors that affect prices.

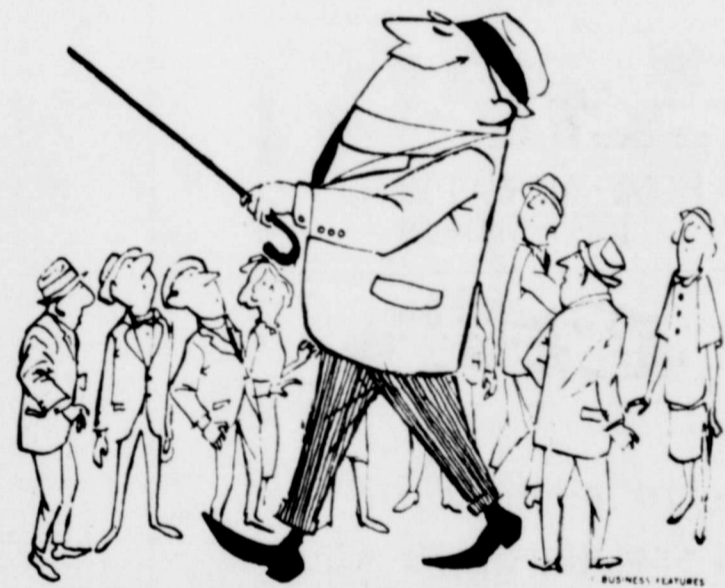

30 Years Ago in The News

News items below were taken from the Thursday, June 8, 1944, issue of the Foard County News:

Harvesting of one of the best wheat crops ever produced in Foard County began on May 29 and the grain elevators of Foard County have been running at full capacity ever since the harvest began. According to an accurate estimate furnished the News by the elevator men, over 500,000 bushels of wheat had been received up to Wednesday afternoon. The quality of the wheat this season is extra good, testing 61 to 64 pounds to the bushel with moisture content low.

American Red Cross has completed arrangements for reduced rates on cable service to prisoners of war and civilian internees held by the Japanese in the Far East. Miss Blanche Hays, chairman of the Foard County Red Cross chapter's prisoner of war committee, has announced.

Superintendent-Elect Grady Graves announces the election of Leo Purvis as high school principal and teacher of aeronautics in high school. The course in aeronautics will replace the vocational agriculture heretofore offered in the Crowell curriculum which was taught by Marvin Myers prior to his entering the U.S. service.

"Invasion is on! Each minute as you read this our American boys are hitting the beachheads giving their all that we may remain free men and women. Our prayers to a merciful God follow each and every one of them. The news of the start of the invasion of Western Europe was given to the people of Crowell at an early hour Tuesday morning by the sounding of the fire siren.

SORGHUM PRICES TO DROP
 A grain marketing specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service says that sorghum prices will likely drop during the next few months as feedgrain supplies increase. He expects the price to be around \$3.50 per hundredweight during the coming season. A record feedgrain crop is in the making and demand factors are still uncertain. Forward contracting is expected to be sluggish through early summer. A bumper crop in the Southern Hemisphere could mean some stiff competition for U.S. sorghum in the export market.

School Board Hires Auxiliary Personnel

The Crowell school board, in a regular monthly meeting Monday night, hired auxiliary personnel for the school year beginning in September. Allen Taylor was employed as shop foreman at \$2.25 per hour and a 52-hour week for a yearly income of \$6789. This is an increase of 15 cents per hour for Mr. Taylor, who also resides in a school-owned house with utilities paid by the school.
 Ray Quintero, custodian and bus driver, received the same 15 cent per hour raise as Taylor with his salary of \$6438 being based on a 50-hour work week. Willie Rodriguez, custodian and bus driver, received a raise to \$2.15 per hour and with a 50-hour week will receive \$6,125 per year.
 Mrs. Ida Pearl Crowell, secretary for the superintendent and bookkeeper for the cafeteria, will have a raise of 35 cents an hour which will raise her to \$2.25 per hour and a 37½-hour work week.
 Mrs. Myrtle Taylor, head of the cafeteria, and Mrs. Gloria Pierce, who is head of the food preparation at the cafeteria, will receive \$2.20 per hour.
 All these salary increases will become effective September 1. Freddy Palacios was hired for summer maintenance work at \$1.90 per hour and a 39-hour work week.
 The University Interscholastic League has recently ruled that typing competition will be done on electric typewriters in the future, and the board decided that the Crowell school will no longer participate in UIL typing since the local school does not have electric typewriters.
 Supt. Larry Jones told board members that average daily attendance at the local school during the past year was 466.95 still enough for 20 classroom teachers. He said ADA in grades 1-4 was 29.52 and from grades 5 through 12 was 41.18.
 He also reported that six local teachers are attending summer school. They are Mrs. Margaret Daniel, Mrs. Dixie Hord, Jerry Don Anderson, Randell Ryan, Carl Brock and Mrs. Carmen Welch.
 The board voted to paint the vocational agriculture building the same brown and cream colors that other buildings on the campus have recently been painted.
 Adopted were two additions to school policy, one of which concerned the possession of drugs or alcoholic beverages on the campus, and the other authorizing the school to pay

teachers \$25 per semester hour for additional college credits they accumulate during the summer months.
 Attending the meeting were board members Jack W. Brown, Joe Coufal, Roy Whitley, Duane Johnson, Floyd Borchardt, Mike Bird and Jeff Bell. A visitor was Bill Klepper.
