Cap Factory Manager Speaker at Meeting

The impact of an industry on the economic condition of a small town such as Crowell was told to members of the Rotary Club of Crowell Wednesday of last week by Joe Ray Setliff, manager of the Crowell Cap Co., Inc. Mr. Setliff said that take-home pay for the factory workers the preceding week was

He said the factory started out with 15 employees and presently has a total of 38-32 sewing, 1 floor supervisor, one cutter, one shipper and 3 in the office. In addition to these full-time workers, the factory is employing 11 high school girls

on a part-time basis. Average production for the plant is 700 dozen caps a week. However, two weeks ago the plant turned out 805 dozen caps. Setliff said that the caps are presently being sold to sporting goods stores across the nation.

In an average week, the plant uses some 800 yards of 60" knit materials, 500 yards of mesh, 17,500 yards of seams, 270 yards of green material for the

FmHA to Guarantee Loans

Financial assistance to livestock and poultry producers under the Emergency Livestock Credit Act will become available next week through a new loan guarantee authority of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), a rural credit service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

J. Lynn Futch, FmHA State Director, said agency will be prepared to implement the recently-enacted law by guaranteeing up to 80 percent of possible loss on loans made by legally organized lenders to livestock and poultry producers.

Under terms of the act, the loan guarantee program will be in effect through July 25, 1975. It may be extended for 6 months beyond that date if the Secretary of Agriculture determines that it is needed to help the livestock industry obtain sufficient credit.

The law calls for loans to be made by banks or other legally organized lenders. Mr. Futch said interested producers are urged to make applications to, and complete loan arrangements with lending institutions. The lender will process the application, close the loan and service it. The maximum loan to any

single borrower that can be assisted by an FmHA guarantee is \$250,000. Loans can be

repayable in one to 3 years, although renewal for 2 years may be authorized. Interest rates are determined between borrower and lender.

Mr. Futch said the agency is authorized to guarantee up to 80 percent loss a lender may incur on loans to bonafide farmers and ranchers who breed, raise. fatten or market beef and dairy cattle, hogs, sheep, goats, chickens and turkeys. A majority of the borrower's income must come from the operation, and a majority

must be devoted to the livestock or poultry production. In the case of a corporation or partnership, assistance can be extended only when the majority partners or stockholders are primarily engaged in the livestock or poultry production.



Lower Pease Soil Conservation District, Hardeman County, has proposed work on two gullies along county roads that are a threat to agriculture land. The City of Chillicothe has proposals for park improvement.
