This year's Texas cotton crop is expected to value about \$933 million, down substantially from the \$1.23 billion crop last year. according to an economist for Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Net income is estimated at only \$280 million, down \$350 million from 1973. Total production is expected to reach about three million bales compared to 4.7 million last year. The crop has been good to excellent in the Rio Grande Valley and along the Coastal Bend but is short in central and western areas.

#### **Absentee Voting Starts** October 16

Secretary of State Mark W. White, Jr. this week announced that all voters wishing to cast an absentee ballot for the November 5th General Election may do so beginning October 16th. According to Secretary White, the proper absentee voting procedure will depend upon each individual voter's situa-

Those persons who expect to be absent from their county of residence only on the day of the election may vote by personal appearnace during regular office hours at the county clerk's office.

Those persons who expect to be absent from their county of residence both during the time for voting by personal appearance and on the election day can make application to their county clerk requesting that an absentee ballot be mailed to them at an address outside the

county. In addition, those persons residing within the county but unable to vote on election day due to sickness, physical disability, religious belief, or incarceration for less than a felony, can also make application to their county clerk requesting an absentee

ballot by mail. White noted that the absentee voting period for the November 5th General Election will continue through Friday, November 1st.

2. Farmers who participate in the 1975 Upland Cotton, Feed Grain and Wheat Programs may protect their allotments with volunteer conserving

3. Any conserving crop on cropland (including approved volunteer cover) will protect allotments if the crop residue is left on the land for erosion protection through the normal growing season. This includes volunteer and seeded small grains pastured out or harvested for other than grain before the crop matures.

4. Cotton deficiency payments cannot be earned unless cotton is planted.


**PROVISIONS** All failed cotton acreage must be appraised. The appraisal must be made before the cotton has been estroyed.

1974 PRICE SUPPORT ELIGIBILITY

The Agricultural and Consumer Protection Act of 1973 does not require that the farm have an allotment established for wheat, corn, grain sorghum or barley in order for these crops be eligible for loan or purchase. In addition, the requirement that producers sign up and certify acreage as a condition of eligibility has been removed.

CONSERVATION PROGRAMS Funds are available for conservation practices that will be completed by December 31. We have added Practice B-5-c, "Installing Pipelines for Livestock Water' to our handbook. If you plan to carry out a conservation practice on your farm, you must file an application before the practice is

started to be eligible for cost




