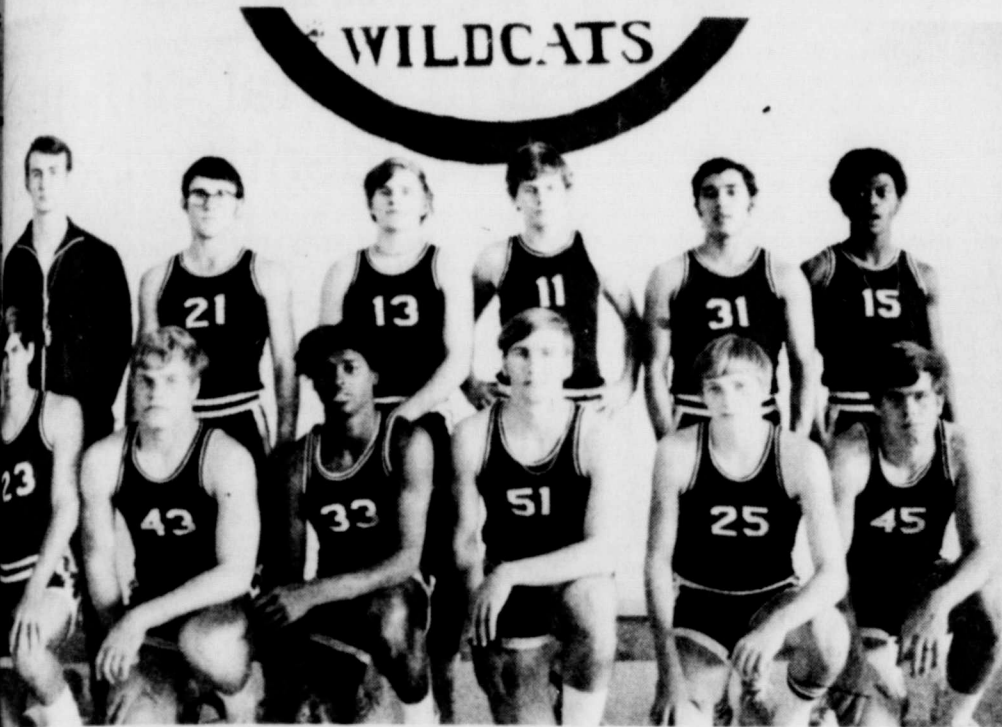

## Grover Cole Died Here Tuesday

Grover L. Cole, 89, who was born near Thalia six years before Foard County was organized, died in the Foard County Hospital Tuesday, December 3, following a lengthy illness.

Funeral services for the pioneer resident were held at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 4, at the First Christian Church conducted by Minister Bill Posey. Interment was in the Crowell Cemetery with Womack Funeral Home in charge.

Mr. Cole was born May 3, 1885, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Cole. Robert Cole was the second county judge of Foard County and at one time in the early days of the county was owner of The Foard County News.

Grover Cole served the City of Crowell as water superintendent for many years. He was member of the First Christian Church and had been a member of the Masonic Lodge for 68 years. He married Ruth McKown Sept. 29, 1919. She died here Feb. 23, 1970.

He is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Joe Couch of Vernon and Lottie Cole of Odessa.

## Dr. Walter Stapp Ties for First in Chess Tournament

Dr. Walter Stapp of Crowell tied for first place in his division over the weekend of November 23-24 in the Midwestern University Amateur Chess Tournament in Wichita Falls.

Scoring three points out of five, Dr. Stapp shared first place in the second division with George Frost of Wichita Falls. Six persons competed in the second division and 18 took part in the tournament.

Dr. Alfred Stewart, a professor at Midwestern University, won the overall first place in the tournament by scoring four wins and a draw. In chess, a win is scored as one point, a draw as one-half point and a loss as zero.

James Rohrbough of Iowa Park, and Robert Mathews of Fort Sill, Ok., tied for overall second in the tournament with four points each.

The tournament was sponsored by the Wichita Falls Chess Club and the Midwestern University Chess Club. All participants were members of the U.S. Chess Federation.

## Fast-Moving Front Brings Snow and Sub-Freezing Temperatures

A fast-moving cold front late last week brought this area the first hard freeze of the season along with the first snow. The

front blew through Thanksgiving afternoon on high north winds and by early Friday the mercury had dropped to the

mid-20's and the ground was covered by snow. The snow began falling about 6 a. m. Friday and stopped shortly after the ground was covered. Early Saturday morning, the mercury dipped to the lower 20's for the coldest weather of the winter season.

Any natural defoliation of cotton leaves that was not accomplished with the frost of early last week was completed as this last front dropped the mercury about 10 degrees below freezing. A brisk north wind made the cold even more penetrating to Foard County residents who had been basking under unusually warm temperatures this fall.

The mercury continued to drop to the low 20's through the early part of this week.

the meeting approved the payment of \$7,956.00 in bills with \$5,055 of this in local maintenance expenses and \$2,556 in cafeteria expenses.

The board heard a report by athletic director Printiss Gidney that the athletic department is some \$9,000 in the red, with the deficit being accumulated over a five-year period. Also, the board members heard a report from band director James Streit in which Mr. Streit said that new uniforms will cost about \$12,400 for the band while replacing of many of the old uniforms will cost \$11,700.

Effective January 1, staff meals at the cafeteria will cost 76 cents, with high school meals costing 55c and from the fifth grade down, the charge is 50 cents. A recent ruling by the state is that staff meals must be at least 21 cents more than student meals. In the first 2 1/2 months of school, cafeteria expenses were \$10,500. The board is expected to review prices charged at the cafeteria, as continuing rising costs of food may necessitate increases in prices.

The board Monday night stated that money raising activities by students should be rigidly controlled and must be directly related to the organization's purpose.

Supt. Larry Jones reported to the board on average daily attendance and stated that it was 471.11 during the past six weeks. Enrollment is now 495 students, which is a drop of 11 students from this time last year.

In opening bids for used vehicles, the board turned down all bids on the 36-passenger bus. The highest bid was \$657.

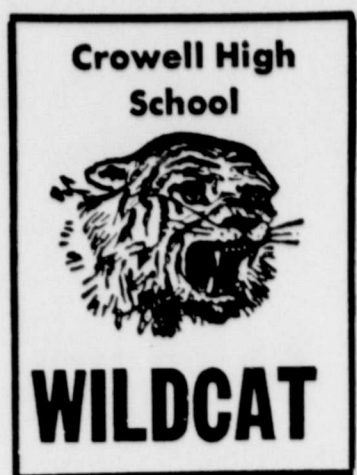

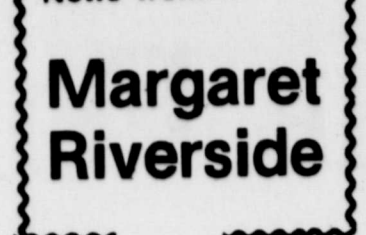

## INSURANCE OF ALL KINDS



### Farm Serial Number Must Identify Cotton

"Cotton production must be identified at the gin with your farm serial number," Mrs. Thelma Borchardt, acting executive director of the Foard ASCS office, told Foard County cotton producers last week. She added, "If you have more than one farm serial number, be sure your production is kept separate. Production will be used for low yield payments and for figuring 1975 cotton yields."  
 She added that cotton that is spot harvested, or acreage that is abandoned will have to be inspected by the local ASCS office before it can be destroyed by grazing, plowing, etc., to be eligible for disaster payments.  
 Mrs. Borchardt said that 1969 through 1973 is the time for proving 1975 wheat. To establish a proven wheat farm, the producer must establish production evidence for this period. December 15 is the deadline for planting wheat and barley. To be eligible for a prevented planted acreage, a producer must file a report with the county within fifteen days after the final December 15 date.

Many expensive toys turn out to be a waste of money because they are seldom played with after the holidays. But a successful toy—one that is enjoyed by a child and played with often over a long period of time—meets certain guidelines. It is right for his age and stage of development. It appeals to his special interests.

The toy gives him something meaningful and fun to do, such as create a product, use his imagination, develop a skill, learn about his world, imitate grown-ups, or socialize with playmates. The toy can be used in different ways. It is durable enough to last. It can be stored in a handy place.

An unsuccessful toy can be cute, colorful, elaborate, labeled educational and so cleverly advertised that a child is sure it is exactly what he wants. A toy is a failure if it has no real play value—it leaves nothing for the child to do. In general, choose durable, safe, sanitary, attractive play material. Also ones that are easy to clean, versatile and simple in construction.

## Special Report Released on Foard County Court Cases

A special interim report of the Texas Civil Judicial Council just released from Austin shows that seventeen new cases were filed in the county court of Foard County during the first six months of 1974.

No civil cases were filed during the first six months of the year, but the new cases filed

during the first six months include eight driving-while-intoxicated, two worthless checks, one marijuana, and six other criminal cases for a total of 17.

Cases pending in county court on January 1, 1974, included five DWI, one marijuana, and four other criminal for a total of 10.

Total dispositions included five DWI, one marijuana, and other criminal for a total of seven. Total convictions were listed as five DWI, one marijuana, one other criminal for a total of 7. Cases pending June 30 were listed as eight DWI, two worthless checks, one marijuana, nine other criminal for a total of 20.

Foard County justice court collected \$3,072 in revenue during the six month period while holding two inquests, three driver license hearings, issuing six search warrants and issuing five magistrate warnings. There were no cases appealed.

The Foard justice court also showed a total of 97 traffic cases filed during the six month period, and 26 non-traffic cases disposed of by plea and 26 non-traffic cases disposed of by plea. One non-traffic case was tried and dismissed.

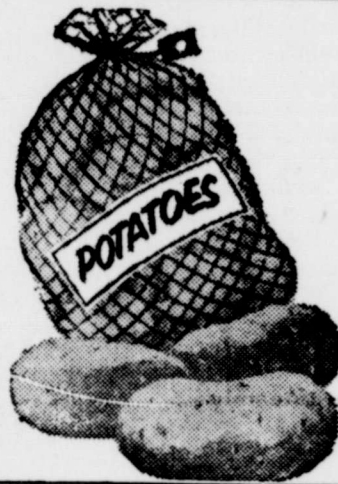

We are sure there are many people who have, at one time or another, been infuriated when sportscasters "switch to New York" and television viewers miss the beauty and precision of a fine half-time performance. 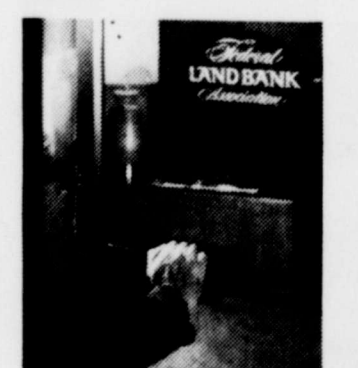
