

## **County Judge** Is Speaker at Rotary Meeting and Mrs. Jack Ferry of

Foard County Judge Seth Halbert was the speaker at the Wednesday, January 29, meeting of the Rotary Club of Crowell, and told club members something about the job of county judge. Mr. Halbert was appointed to the post late last year replacing Leslie Thomas who was appointed district judge.

Judge Halbert pointed out some of the constraints of the office. He cited legal restraints which prohibit the county from doing certain things, financial considerations which constrain the judge and commissioners court in their spending and social considerations. Judge Halbert said these social considerations are whether or not the people of the county are in support of actions taken by the court, and whether the people of the county are dedicated to building and improving the

county in which they live. He cited the fact that at a regular meeting of the commissioners court, 3 is a quorum if the judge is present, all four commissioners must be present to constitute a quorum if the judge is absent, and all five members of the court must be present at a tax levy meeting.

Judge Halbert said the county is about to face a real crisis in financial matters. He estimates that income will be about \$20,000 short of expenditures for county government during 1975. He said extensive study is being given to federal give-away programs for which the county might be eligible.



# Seeding Range Grasses

By Thomas Shinn **Soil Conservation Service** 

Every landuser has his own purpose for seeding range grasses, but usually it comes down to two essential reasons, erosion control and to carry more livestock.

Selecting the right grass seed and mixtures for a range site is very important since there are twelve different ones in Foard County. There may be several different ones on one ranch.

Grasses used in this area are sideoats grama, western wheatgrass, blue grama, K. R. bluestem, little bluestem, Indiangrass, buffalograss, vine mesquite and Klein-

When planting on brush controlled land, seeding should be done as soon as possible after the mechanical work is completed.

When planting cropland dead litter is important to obtain successful stands of dryland drilled grass seedprovides a more favorable climate for the grass seeding. The cover resists both wind and water erosion allowing the grass seedlings to anchor themselves and develop a root system.

#### LICENSE PLATES SALES STARTED LAST MONDAY

Sales of 1975 vehicle license plates got underway in the office of Emmitt E. Howard, county and state tax assessor, on Monday morning, February 3.

The new license plates, made this year of a heavier, non-corrosive steel, will be for a five year period. They will be reflectorized and feature black letters and numerals on a white field.

Next year, instead of buying a new license plate, owners will purchase a 1-by-2-inch adhesive-type validation tag that will be placed in the debossed upper left corner of the plate. In 1977 the tag will be stuck in the upper right corner, and alternated for the two ensuing years following.

This is the first time Texas has used "multi-year" plates since the 1940's when during the war years of 1943 and 1944, small metal tabs were issued to renew the 1942 plates. Then in 1947, when there was a shortage of metal plates, windshield stickers. were issued as evidence of

payment of registration fees. The registration deadline is midnight, April 1.

#### TEC Taking Claims for **Benefits**

The Texas Employment Commission will begin taking claims for extended unemployment benefits February 3, 1975, it was

announced last week. Unemployed persons who have filed initial claims for benefits within one year prior to January 26, 1975, and who have exhausted those benefits, are eligible to file a

Payments will be made at the same rate as for regular unemployment insurance, but the total extended benefits will equal only 50 per cent of regular benefits. However, a new federal program may pay extended

first built some terraces to conserve soil and water and next constructed two farm ponds to improve the distribution of livestock grazing on their rangeland.

Herbert stated that in 1964 he and Henry decided it was time to speed up their conservation work. They discussed this with their neighbors and made application to the Soil Conservation Service for Great Plains Conservation funds to help them get ahead of the gulleys and the invading mesquite

They entered the Great Plains program and began to treat every acre of the farm for elimination of soil loss

from wind and water erosion. Their objective was to conserve all the water that fell on the farm.

The first conservation practice installed was the construction of 16 acres of grassed waterways to carry outside floodwater that came across their farmland, across at non-eroding speeds.

Next, 131/2 miles of parallel terraces and three diversion terraces were built. Ninety-eight acres of land too steep and shallow to farm

was planted back to native Three cross fences and one more farm pond were

constructed to improve distribution of grazing of livestock. Areas of thick mesquite

and no grass were root plowed and established back to native grasses. Brush control was done in a manner to enhance quail and dove population.

Henry stated at the local Lions Club meeting which honored them for being Foard County's most outstanding conservation farmers that his and Herb's objective had been to leave the farm in a better condition for future generations.

# Cattlemen Meet Monday

About 25 cattlemen attended a meeting in the district court room in Crowell Monday night and voted to contact a helicopter operator to gather stray cattle out of the Pease River bottom and breaks north of Crowell. Cattlemen from both

Foard and Hardeman counties attended the meeting. Sheriff Emmitt Howard of Crowell was in charge, and after briefly explaining the purpose of the meeting, asked for suggestions as to the best way to gather the strays from the river. One suggestion which was not adopted was to use an airplane to spot the cattle and then circle the area until the arrival of cowboys. However, following a vote, the group determined that the most successful method of getting strays out of the salt cedars would be for a


helicopter to scare them out. The group agreed that the work must be done within the next 20 days before the wild rve or salt cedars begin greening up and hinder the vision of the helicopter pilot. A committee was appointed to contact helicopter operators in the area for prices, with the cost of the project to be borne by the cattlemen who own cattle which may be strayed and the landowners in the area involved.
