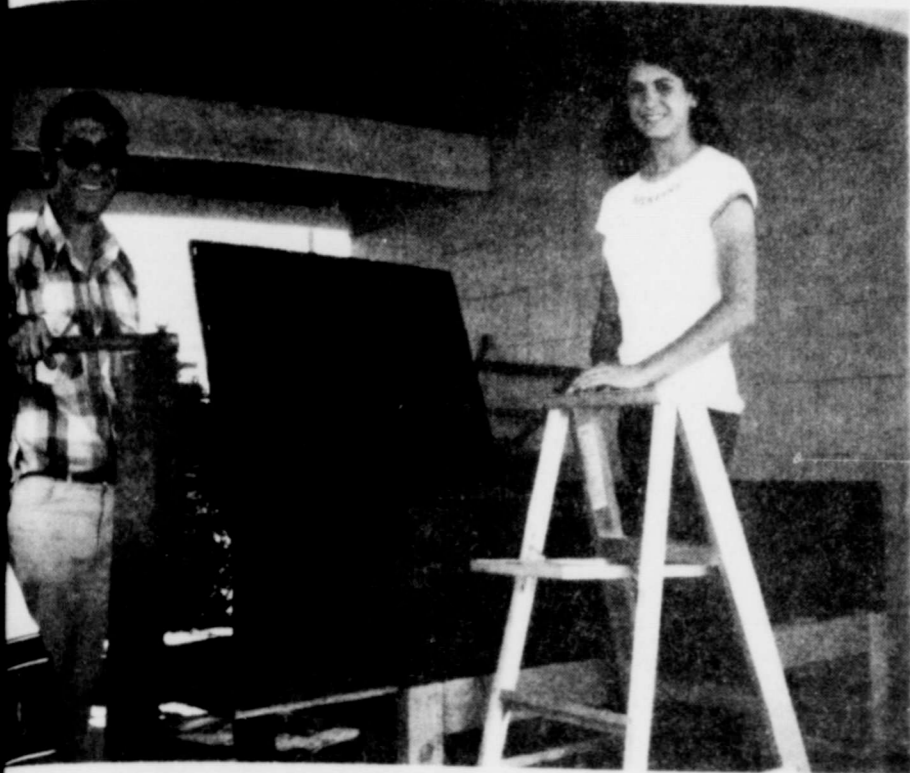

## At Baylor

### David Stapp Named Outstanding Bandsman

David Stapp of Crowell has been named Baylor University's "Outstanding Bandsman of the Year, 1975-76." Elected by popular vote of the 160 members of the Baylor Golden Wave Band and the prestigious Baylor Wind Ensemble, Stapp was presented a large engraved plaque in token of the honor

at the spring concert of the Wind Ensemble on April 23.

He was student director of the Concert Band during the past year, is president of Gamma Iota chapter of the national professional music fraternity Phi Mu Alpha Sinfonia, and has been drum major of the Golden Wave Band both for the past 1975 marching season and also for the coming 1976 season.

He expects to be graduated from Baylor in December 1976.

## Whitley, Glover in Run-Off for Sheriff

In the only contested county-wide race in Saturday's Democratic primary in Foard County, a run-off has developed in the three-candidate race for sheriff, tax assessor-collector.

Roy M. "Ace" Whitley who received 330 votes, will meet Larry Paul Glover who polled 306. The second

primary is to be held June 5.

Jackie Walker, the third man in the race, received 243 votes. Incumbent Sheriff Emmitt E. Howard did not seek re-election.

Incumbent Wilson Myers was re-elected County Commissioner in Precinct 3 by receiving 69 votes to 34

received by his challenger, Billy Ray Dunn.

Billy C. Johnson, who was seeking his first elective term as commissioner of Precinct 1, was unopposed. Johnson was appointed to the post last year by County Judge Seth Halbert to replace Bill Bell, who resigned.

**Former Georgia Governor Jimmy Carter swept to a victory in the presidential preference primary. Delegates pledged to Carter gathered a total of 1,008 votes, compared to 591 for delegates for Sen. Lloyd Bentsen and 214 for George C. Wallace delegates.**

U. S. Rep. Jack Hightower of Vernon and State Rep. Bill Heatly of Paducah were unopposed.

A total of 893 votes were cast out of the 1,385 registered voters in the county.

Precinct convention was held in Precinct No. 2, where Cecil Carroll is chairman. T. L. Tamplen, county Demo chairman, said the county Democratic convention will be held Saturday.

## Heavy Rains Fall in County

After the first quarter of 1976 proved extremely dry, the month of April saw the heaviest rainfall for that month since 1957.

Light showers of .04 and

.23 inch on April 29 and 30, added to the 1.72 inches received Wednesday of last week, brought the total rainfall for April to 4.95 inches.

This is the wettest April for Foard County since 1957 when 8.16 inches was recorded.

The wet weather of the past week has brought extremely cool weather, with the mercury dropping to the 40s Saturday and Sunday nights.

The weather is ideal for the maturing wheat crop.

## Brucellosis Regulations Changed

Texas livestock producers are operating under a new set of regulations aimed at eradicating bovine brucellosis. The regulations were adopted by the Texas Animal Health Commission at a hearing in Austin April 15.

The regulations combine federal guidelines of the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Federal officials were contemplating a quarantine of Texas breeding cattle if the regulations had not been accepted.

A portion of the regulations deal with the vaccination of heifer calves using the Strain-19 brucella abortus vaccine. Vaccination is recommended to increase the immunity of breeding animals in areas where brucellosis has been a problem. Beef heifers should be officially vaccinated between the ages of 90 to 210 days and dairy heifers, 60 to 180 days.

Free vaccine for calldow vaccination is available in limited quantities but is to be used only in herds having problems with brucellosis. Producers wishing to start a vaccination should contact their local veterinarian.

At the recent hearing in Austin, numerous producers stressed the importance of continued research and adequate financing to improve methods for diagnosis and control of brucellosis.

A copy of the new brucellosis eradication regulations will soon be available for reference at the county extension office.

## New Law Threat to Foard Hospital

Editor's Note—A federal law that never should have been passed is threatening the very existence of Foard County Hospital and other community and small county hospitals over the nation.

The law is "Public Law 93-641" which if allowed to continue would make "first aid stations" out of our local hospitals and force doctors and other medical staff members either to move to the regional centers or retire.

The law would have the effect of putting out of business small hospitals of less than 100 beds and the convalescent homes who serve the elderly of the community.

The Foard County News joins the local hospital board and medical staff in urging that you write your Senators and Representatives to insist that the law be repealed.

The Federal Health Planning and Resource Development Act of 1974, Public Law, 93:641 is a fact!

The provisions in the law for establishing "primary care" (meaning simple care only) hospitals will mean the end of rural hospitals as you know them. You, the patient, are going to lose your right to choose your hospital and doctor.

(1) The law proposes an experimental plan creating a two-level system of medical care. The people in rural areas, in order to receive advanced or more sophisticated care, would have to go to the cities as the rural areas would only have "primary care" hospitals.

(2) The law specifically singles out centers for such things as obstetrics (delivery of babies), pediatrics, coronary care, intensive care, etc. The development of these centers for these specialized areas will deprive the rural population of good medical care at the local level.

(3) There are no medical studies showing that this two-level system of medical care will result in better care for people. Russia, according to a recent medical journal, does have a similar system that is not working for people in rural areas.

(4) The proposed law, when it becomes fully operational, will make it very inconvenient for the people of rural areas that wish to go with sick members of their families to a medical center many miles from their home town. This will result in a loss of income to families who have family members who are critically ill.

(5) The people will lose their freedom of choice of hospital and physician.

(6) Our nursing homes in rural areas will be unable to function properly without the nearby medical support of both physicians and hospital.

(7) The proposed moving of patients to centers in the large cities will reduce the income of rural hospitals. Even a 10¢ re-

duction in income will force the rural hospital to lay off many people. This reduction in trained personnel will cause the hospital to discontinue many of the advanced services it now offers.

(8) Good doctors will not stay in the area of "primary care." They will move to where the centers are located in the cities, and the young doctors will not be attracted to the "first aid care only" atmosphere of a rural hospital practice.

(9) The proposed system will not save money, which is supposed to be the purpose of the law. According to the Federal Register the average routine cost for the rural hospital in Texas is \$68.00 per day compared to a large hospital in Texas which has an average routine cost of \$83.00 per day.

(10) The ruins of the health care system which remain for the people in rural areas will probably not even be capable of providing adequate "primary care."

Eli Ginzberg, Ph. D., professor of economics, Columbia University, feels: "The only really effective cost constraint, he believes, is to squeeze the number of hospitals in existence, and he sees the new planning law (PL-93:641) and the new reimbursement procedures under Medicare as the first real beginnings of this squeeze."

The only possible way to escape the effects of this law is to flood our representatives in Congress with our protests and ask for repeal of this law. Write to the Representatives and Senators and express your opinions. Write to your friends in rural areas of other states and ask them to protest to their Congressmen.

If you wish to keep your hospital and medical care, write your United States Representatives and Senators today asking for repeal of PL-93:641.

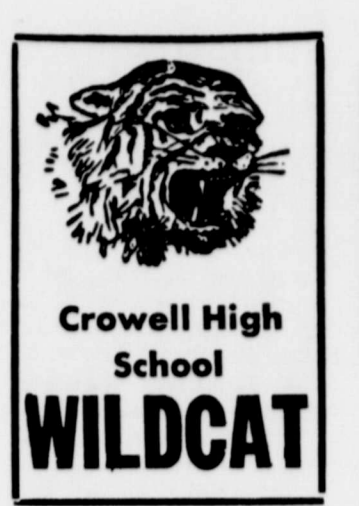

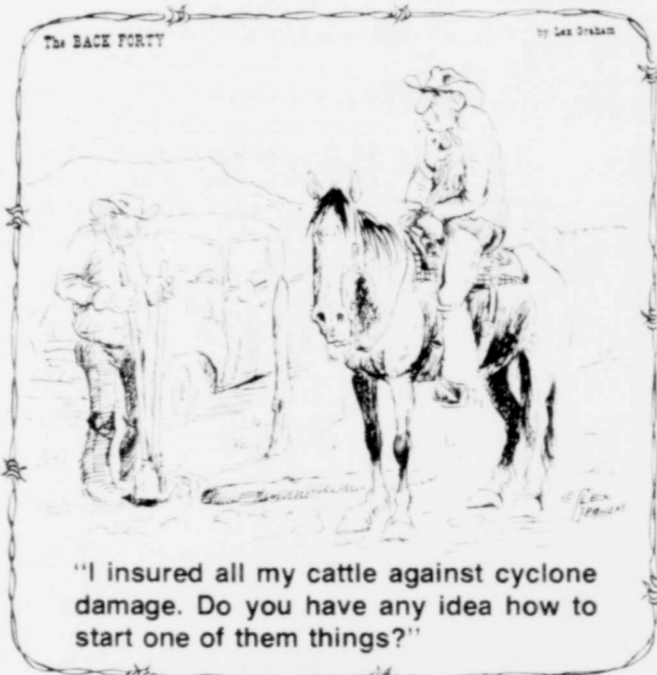

### 30 Years Ago in The News

News items below were taken from the Thursday, May 2, 1946, issue of The Foard County News:  
 Led by Abb Dunn, rodeo publicity chairman, and J. H. Olds, pioneer cattleman of this section, and the Vernon band, the long parade which opened the big two-day rodeo in Crowell last Friday between the hours of 1 and 2 o'clock and the first performance of the rodeo got underway at the football stadium shortly after 2 p. m.

Coy Payne of the Margaret community found a well preserved molar tooth of a fossil elephant in the C. B. Graham gravel pit northeast of Margaret the latter part of March. The tooth was sent to A&M by Marvin Myers and Mr. Myers has received the following letter from the A&M museum curator: "I was very much pleased to receive the box containing the molar tooth of the fossil elephant, 'Parelephas Columbi.' This animal was about the size of the ordinary elephant and lived over the plains area of the United States during the Pliocene time and as you know the Pease River Valley and the base of the Caprock are the grave yards for thousands of Pliocene animals. Due to the fact that much of the western low plains were in the dry area for many centuries, the mammal remains found in your section of the world are beautifully preserved. This museum contains quite a large number of similar teeth, but not one so beautifully preserved. If the specimen is a donation, we thank you very much and will put it on exhibit as a donation from you, however, if it was sent in for identification, let us know, and we will return it to you. Should you, or any of your students, desire to make donations of other fossils, the museum would be glad to pay the express and to place the specimens in the museum as a special gift representative of your part of the state."

**Agricultural Conservation Program**

All producers are reminded to report completion of any conservation practice as soon as possible.

**Mesquite Spraying**

Producers that have approved practices for aerial mesquite spraying under 1976 ACP may start spraying on May 10, 1976. These practices must be completed by June 28, 1976.

**Planting Period**

The Texas State ASCS Committee has set May 10th through June 15th as the planting period for cotton in Foard County.

**Disaster Payment Rates**

The disaster payment rates for 1976 are: wheat, 76c per bu.; grain sorghum, 50c per bu.; cotton, 14.4c per lb.

**Bin Measurement**

If you have wheat from last year stored on your farm, you should request a bin measurement before mixing 1975 and 1976 wheat. This could make a difference in case of a disaster payment.

**Farm Changes**

Any change in farm ownership or farm operators should be reported to this office. All new land broken out must also be reported.

**Dates to remember**

May 10th through June 28th—Aerial mesquite spraying.  
May 20th through June 15th—Cotton planting period.  
May 3rd—Last day to request or release cotton for 1976.  
May 3rd—Last day to report wheat acreage for future proven yields.
