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Wheat Harvest Tops 880,000 Bushels

Harvesting of Foard County's wheat crop is in its latter stages this week with the elevators continuing to receive grain in scattered amounts. A check with the county's three elevators Tuesday showed that 882,600 bushels had been delivered to the elevators up to that time.

Considerably more wheat is in the fields, but that remaining is still green and will be cut within the near future.

If the estimate of some 50,000 acres lost to the big hail two weeks ago is correct, and if there were 50,000 acres left standing in the county, the wheat that remained is averaging over 17.5 bushels per acre.

Market price of wheat Tuesday was \$3.54 per bushel.

Foard County's 1976 wheat crop had an abundance of moisture last fall and up to about the first of the year when it turned off dry. Later the rains came and the county's prospects looked great. However, on the morning of Tuesday, May 25, a savage hail storm levelled literally thousands of acres of wheat and also did untold damage to buildings and homes in Crowell.

One elevator manager said the test weight on the new wheat is good, but some of the grain is being docked on account of being yellow in color instead of red. He said the yellow wheat had been rained on, causing it to bleach out from red to yellow. He added that the foreign nations which have been buying U. S. grain had contracted for red wheat; hence the dock for the discolored grain.

Foard Drops Notch in Program

Thirty-two counties in Iowa, Missouri, New Mexico, South Dakota and Texas either improved their status in the national brucellosis program or slipped a step during the past month, the U. S. Department of Agriculture announced last Thursday.

Foard County was one of fourteen counties which lost modified-certified status to become noncertified areas.

The USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service officials explained that counties lose status in the eradication program when herds fail to meet required testing schedules.

These provide that: —An infected herd must be retested within six months.

—When an infected animal is found through the market cattle identification system, the herd must be tested or quarantined within 30 days. If quarantined, the herd must be tested within six months.

—Dairy herds must be tested within 30 days after a positive brucellosis milk ring test has been reported.

A county does not lose its status for failing to meet testing schedules if the state has initiated legal steps against a delinquent livestock owner. When status is lost, a county may regain status when deficiencies are corrected.

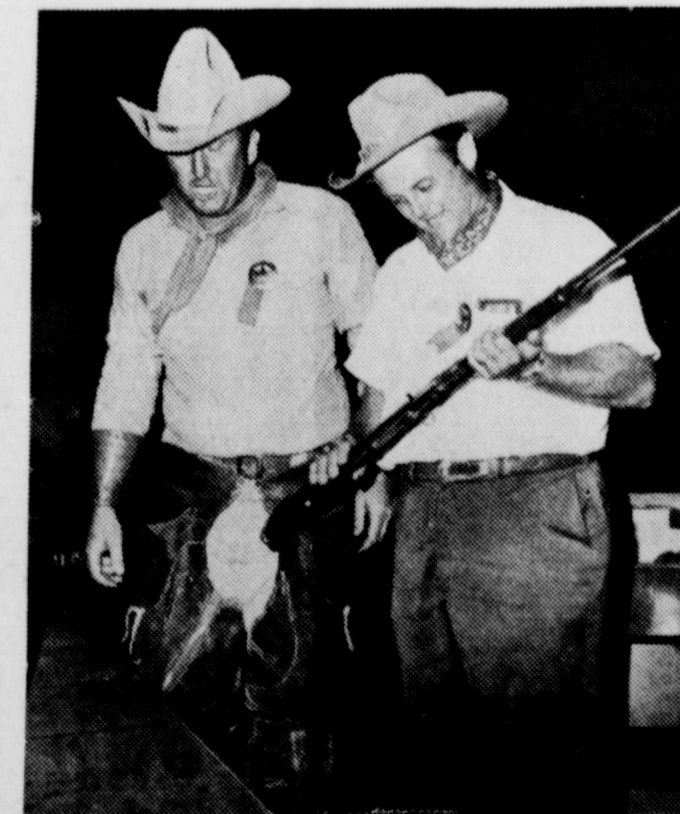
additional books over the years with still more in the making.

Paul Glover Wins Sheriff's Race

Larry Paul Glover proved to be the top vote getter in the second primary held Saturday and will on January 1, 1977, become Foard County's sheriff, tax assessor-collector replacing Emmitt E. Howard, incumbent sheriff who was not a candidate for re-election.

Glover and Roy M. (Ace) Whitley were in the run-off for sheriff after they were the top two in a three-man race in the first primary. In the election Saturday Glover received 453 votes and Whitley 307.

A total of 760 Foard County residents cast ballots in the second primary, which was only 133 votes short of the 893 total votes in the May primary.

In the run-off race for railroad commission, Jon Newton received 357 votes and Jerry Sadler 278. The race for judge, court of criminal appeals, saw Carl Cally receive 286 votes and W. T. Phillips 242.
