





Series Continues on Child Abuse

(This is the third article in a five-part series on child abuse and neglect and is part of a regional campaign sponsored by the Texas Department of Public Welfare. This week's article is on what the Texas law says about child abuse and neglect.)

Day care workers, school teachers, doctors, neighbors-anyone, in fact, who suspects child abuse and neglect and fails to report it may be charged with a misdemeanor and punished by fine or jail sentence under

The law, Chapter 34 of the Texas Family Code on the Report of Child Abuse, was passed by the Texas legislature in 1973 and became effective on Jan. 1. 1974. Section 7 of the code states, "A person commits an offense if the person has cause to believe that a child's physical or mental health or welfare has been or may be further adversely affected by abuse or neglect and knowingly fails to report it in accordance with Section 34.02 of this code.

An offense under Section 34.07 is a Class B misdemeanor and is punishable by a fine of up to \$1,000 or a jail term of 10 days to six months, or both.

The chapter on the reporting of child abuse begins with a paragraph on persons required to report. In Section 1, it says, "Any person having cause to believe that a child's physical or mental health or welfare has been or may be adversely affected by abuse or neglect

In a capsule, Section 1 says that the person who beleives a child (defined by the Act as an individual below age 18) has been abused or neglected reports his suspicions to the local welfare office or to any state or local law enforcement agency.

Barry Fredrickson. regional administrator in Abilene for the Texas Department of Public Welfare, said the reports can also be made to a statewide, toll-free, hotline number at 1-800-292-5400.

According to Section 2, the reports must contain the names of the parents and child, their address, the child's age, and the nature of the abuse. If not all these facts are known, then any information which can direct an investigator to the scene should be reported.

Also in Section 2, it states that all reports received by any local or state law enforcement agency will be referred to the local welfare The section also indicates that an oral report shall be made immediately upon learning of the abuse or neglect and a written report shall follow within five days to the same agency.

Anonymous reports, while not encouraged, will be received and acted upon in the same manner as

adknowledged reports. Section 3 of Chapter 34 is important to persons who fear legal reprisals by the people they report. This section of the law states that

shall report it in accordance "Any person reporting pursuant to this chapter is immune from liability, civil or criminal, that might otherwise be incurred or imposed. Immunity extends to participation in any judicial proceeding resulting from the report. Persons reporting in bad faith or malice are not protected by this section.

In summary, if you report a suspected act in good faith rather than, for example, giving a false report to get even with someone, you are protected by law against civil suits or criminal proceedings the abuser might bring against you for reporting

Most doctors know how to recognize abuse, particularly through bone x-rays. They also know how to question multiple bruises and cuts, unexplained burns, hemorrhages and anemia.

School teachers, day care and nursery school personnel, neighbors and relatives are also in positions to protect children by reporting signs of neglect or abuse which they have observed.

So called sense" may tell you the difference in a parent's right to discipline his child and the cruel battering or neglect of a When in doubt, though, individuals are encouraged to call their local welfare office, or the statewide hotline number.

"We encourage everyone to call their local welfare office or the toll-free statewide hotline number if they know of any cases of possible child abuse or neglect," said Fredrickson. "You may report it at any

hour of the day or night.' The local and statewide numbers are maintained by the Texas DPW, the legally responsible agency for the investigation of suspected child abuse and neglect.

Mrs. Dollie Viola Sivells, 70, life-long resident of Cottle County, died Monday, Nov. 15, in a Quanah hospital.


The former Dollie Fish was born Oct. 16, 1906, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Fish Sr.





Sack a Turkey For Holiday Dinner

serve baked turkey for a special holiday meal, but are afraid the meat will turn out dry and unattractive, don't

The Texas Department of Agriculture home economist suggests the following method of preparing turkey. With no basting and careful watching, the turkey will be tender and golden brown.

Turkey-in-the-Sack

1 tsp. pepper 2 tsp. salt 3 tsp. paprika 4 tsp. hot water 1 cup peanut oil 1 turkey, 14 to 16 lbs.

Combine pepper, salt, paprika and hot water. Let stand at least 10 minutes.

thoroughly. Wash and dry turkey. Rub peanut oil mixture into inside and outside of turkey. Truss as desired. Pour remaining oil and additional oil into large paper sack (type used in grocery stores). Rub oil into inside of sack until every pore in every inch of the sack is sealed. Place turkey in sack, breast up. Fold over end of sack and tie securely. Place on cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees, approximately 10 minutes per pound. Before removing from sack, place in a large pan to catch drippings. Let stand 20 minutes before opening sack. Since the sack is airtight, the turkey is cooked by steam; therefore, be careful when sack is

Texas Farm Prices Continue to Decline

AUSTIN--The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service report for the month ending October 15 showed the continuing decline in farm prices from the

previous month. Of the 26 agricultural commodities surveyed for average prices in Texas, only potatoes rose above the break-even parity level with 41 cents.

Parity prices are not an actual break-even figure, but they do serve as a gauge, Agriculture Commissioner John C. White explained.

"Losses that farmers are sustaining are evident in the gap between the parity price and the market price, such as \$2.19 per bushel of wheat. \$1.07 for corn and \$1.70 for

grain sorghum," White said. Livestock prices were dismal. Beef cattle prices averaged \$30.10; parity was set at \$57. And although calves showed some gain in market prices, they were \$34.90 below parity.

Hogs, which were bringing good prices last year, are now \$20.70 below parity. Sheep were only \$3.50 below, but lambs averaged

\$11.60 under parity. Feed prices remained fairly stable.

Baled hay prices rose \$4 over the September average; in Texas hay sold for \$49.50 a ton, while across the nation, it sold for \$60.10. Grains all decreased in

Protests Are Heard on Book Selection

The State Board of Education heard protests from 10 Texas citizens at its annual textbook hearing Thursday, Nov. 11 in Austin.

Thirty-three books submitted by 13 publishers were protested during the one-day hearing, according to J. Henry Perry, director of the Texas Education Agency textbook division. objections had been voiced earlier in a week-long hearing by Dr. M. L. Brockette, Texas commissioner of education, and the

State Textbook Committee. Brockette removed five dictionaries from the recommended list because they do not meet the textbook proclamation requirements in two key areas. These include provisions against the use of "offensive language" and against material "which would cause embarrassing situations or interference in the learning atmosphere of the class-

Dictionaries removed include American Heritage Dictionary of the English Language, Houghton Miffline Company; The Doubleday Dictionary, Doubleday & Co., Inc., Seventh New Collegiate, American Book Company; The Random House College Dictionary. Random House, Inc., and Webster's New World Dictionary of the American Language, Prentice Hall, Inc.

A geology text, "The Paradox of Earth and Man' by Hounghton Mifflin Company, was deleted because the book "is not objectively developed and is styled in a manner inappropriate to secondary



SOIL TEST FOR FERTILIZER DECISIONS

To take the guesswork out of using fertilizer, soil test, says a soil chemist with the extension service. Each sample should not represent more than 40 acres of cropland. However, the national average last year was 144 acres for each sample while the Texas average was a gigantic 630 acres. Soil samples should be taken every two to four years except under high annual fertilization and intensive production. Fall is a good time for soil sampling since it allows plenty of time to get results and to make plans for obtaining needed fertilizer.

Gasoline Prices Down Since Sept.

Texans taking to the highways during the Thanksgiving week end will find gasoline less expensive than it was during the Labor Day week end, but a significant nuber of service stations will be closed on Thanksgiving Day and the following

A survey of 266 service stations conducted by the American Automobile Association revealed average prices for gasoline of 56.9 cents a gallon for regular, 59.0 for unleaded and 60.7 for premium. Corresponding prices in early September were 57.4 cents for regular, 59.4 for unleaded and 61.1

for premium.

Thirty-two per cent of the service station operators contacted in the survey said they would be closed on Thanksgiving Day, and 24 per cent will be closed on the following Sunday. But motorists should have few problems finding an open station on these days, and almost all the operators said they will be open for business as usual on Friday and Saturday of the holiday week end.

Average prices for regular gasoline in Texas ranged from 53.6 cents a gallon in Waco to 63.9 cents in Ozona. according to the survey. The lowest-priced gas being sold anywhere in the state was in Houston, where one station priced regular at 45.9 cents a gallon. A service station in Ozona had the highest-priced regular, at 65.7 cents a

The AAA survey indicated that motorists who pump their own gas can save an average of 4 cents a gallon off the full-service price of
