### Pioneer Reunion Declared Enjoyable

Although the crowd was possibly smaller than usual this year, the Lynn County Pioneer Reunion held here Saturday was declared by several of the participants to be the most enjoyable ever.

Ernest Smith, retired district judge and a resident of the county since 1907, kept the crowd laughing as he told many humorous stories of earlier years, some of the pioneers and some of those occurring in the court room.

During his talk on a sermon, Smith paid tribute to the pioneer settlers who endured every hardship in developing this new country, revealing to give up and return to the old.

He said he would like to add his own tribute to these pioneers: "Blessed are those who have labored but refused to give up."

Following the talk, Mrs. Wells Edwards, a music teacher here since the early 1800s and her great niece, Mrs. Wells, on dual pianos and a number of numbers chosen by settlers fifty or more years ago.

Tom Walker, who served as master of ceremonies, presented the customary prizes, all plaques this year.

Oldest lady present who had previously received the award turned out to be his mother, Mrs. J. B. Walker, 86, of Lubbock whose husband was Tahoka's second school superintendent in 1905. Nelson Howell, 84, who came to the area in 1902, received the prize for the oldest man present.

There was competition for the person coming the greatest distance, but Jim McManis and his wife, Mrs. J. B. Walker, 86, of Lubbock, were determined to deserve the prize. He came to Lakeview area in 1906, left in 1929, and had worked for T-Bar, L and other area places in the early days. He is a half-brother of John Ful-

ford and a brother of the late Ed McManis.

Farrell Murph of C. R. Anthony Co. received the plaque for best decorated store window, and Jack Jaquess Jr. of the new Haberdasher store received second prize.

In a brief business session, C. W. (Preacher) Roberts was elected president on the suggestion of Lit Moore Jr., current vice-president, who thought some one in town should head the organization.

F. E. Redwine was elected vice-president, and Mrs. Joe Brooks secretary-treasurer. Maurice Hufaker, outgoing president, and Mrs. Lois Greathouse, retiring secretary, did an outstanding job in planning the meeting.

Elmer Sproles and Sheriff Norvell Redwine were in charge of preparing the meal, which included barbecue and "son-of-a-gun" stew and all the trimmings.

Hufaker extended thanks to the many workers who had put in time and labor to make the meeting a success.

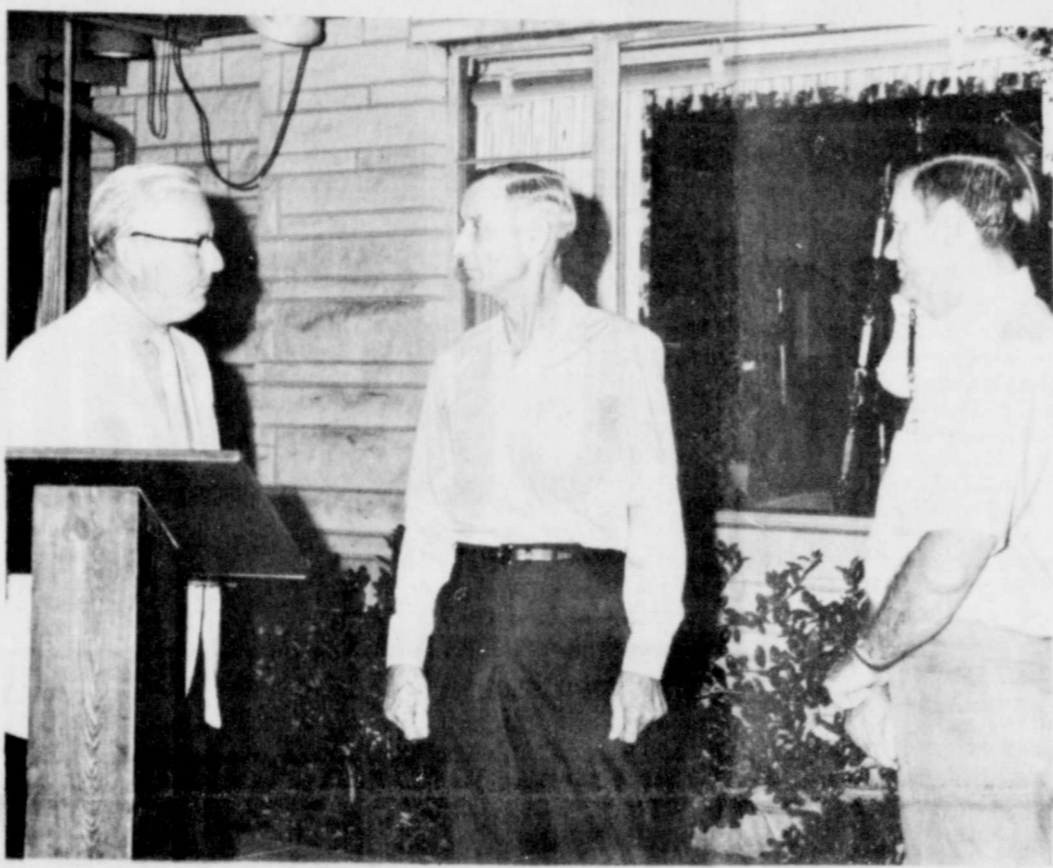

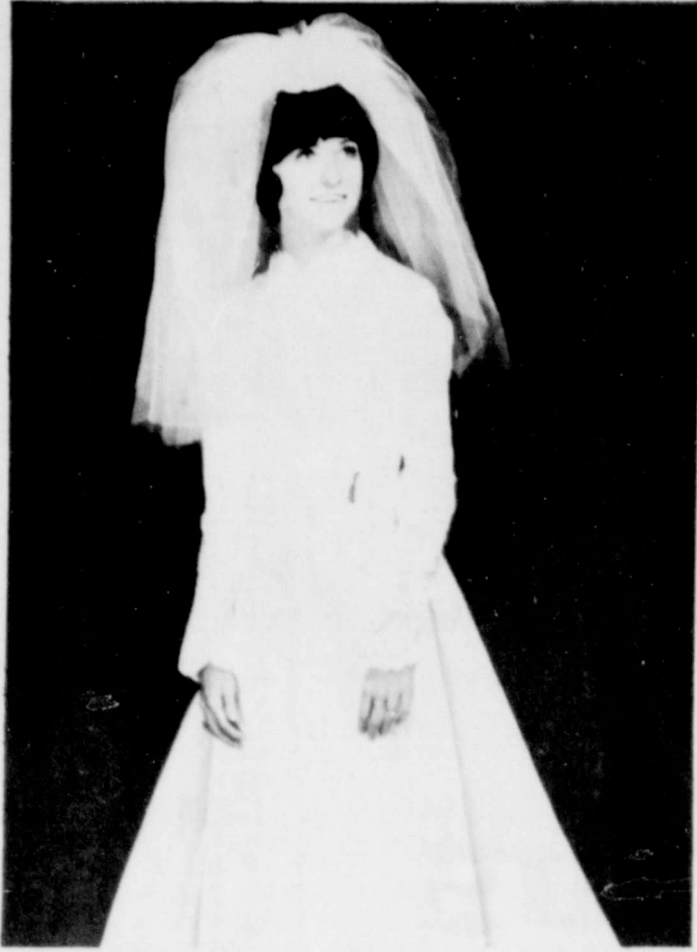

Considering a long vacation soon?  
To lessen worries while away from home, plan and prepare for safeguarding your properties before you leave.  
First, stop routine deliveries. Call or write businesses concerned; a note left on the door is a good way to let prowlers know you're away.

Then, check with the post office about holding or forwarding your mail. Ask a neighbor to remove circulars or notes dropped on the doorstep.  
Notify relatives and neighbors of your itinerary so you can be reached in case of an emergency.  
Make sure fire insurance and other insurance policies on your home are in force and paid. You may also want to place valuable and important papers in safekeeping.  
An unmowed lawn may indicate a vacant house, so arrange to have the lawn mowed if you will be away long. Store outdoor tools, appliances, furniture, ladders, and hoses inside to avoid damage.  
Window shades or venetian blinds should not be completely closed.  
When you're ready to leave, turn off heat and disconnect electrical appliances. Lock all doors, then leave a key with a neighbor so, if necessary, your house can be entered without breaking a window or lock. Never leave keys outside, under a mat or over the door.  
As a final note, have your vacation mentioned in the community newspaper after, not before, your holiday.

**Bill Griffin,

Says.....**

Provide some comfort factors for your hogs this summer and keep the hot summer weather from cutting into the profits and efficiency of your operation.

Proper ventilation in the farrowing house is a must to save pigs. Fans delivering air individually to sows through a four to six inch pipe are used in many confinement farrowing houses.  
Use of adequate ventilation and shade can also "shore up" profits in finishing hogs. Summer gains may be cut in half by inadequate cooling.  
Sprinklers or foggers may be used where the hogs are free to move in and out of the wet area, but when these devices create dampness and wet floors in a farrowing house, the producer is faced with costly troubles.  
Research shows that when the temperature goes above 90 degrees the feed intake drops and growth rate and efficiency decline. Hogs need a temperature ranging from 55 to 70 degrees for maximum growth and efficiency.  
It is good business to keep hogs cool and comfortable even though some expense may be involved.

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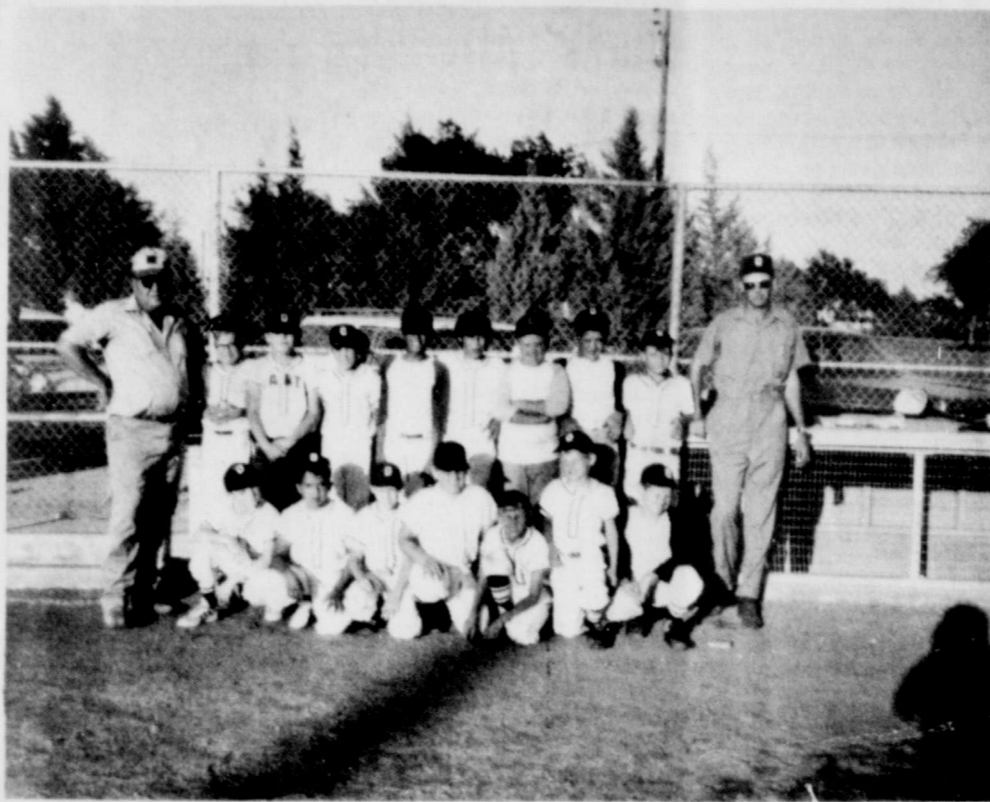

### Girl Scouts Attend Day Camp

Girl Scouts of Lynn County are participating this week in Day Camp, a time for fun and learning in the out of doors. There are approximately 110 girls and 25 adults working together in this camping experience. Girl Scout troops from Tahoka, O'Donnell and Wilson are taking part in the camp.

The camp began on Monday, June 28th and is continuing through Friday, July 2nd. The camp is being held at the park in Tahoka and opens each morning at 9:30 and closes at 2:30 each afternoon. The girls are divided into units according to their ages. In these units the girls learn the basic skills of camping and

participate in nature and conservation activities. They will also learn crafts, act out stories, and play games. The older girls will be working toward earning badges.

Ages of the girls taking part in the camp range from 7 to 14. There are 2 units of Brownies, 4 units of Junior Girl Scouts, and one unit of Cadettes. The Cadettes are Junior High School girls, and they will be helping with the other units as well as working in their own group. There is also one unit of Papposes— younger children of mothers who are helping with the camp.

Some of the special activities planned are 2 cook-outs, a talk on nature and conservation by Mr. Allen Sheppard, Soil Conservationist, and a swimming party. One unit plans to have an overnight session.

Day Camp is held each summer in Lynn County with all Girl Scouts troops coming together to get acquainted with each other and share this camping experience. The towns provide the planning on a rotating basis. Tahoka has been responsible for organizing the camp this summer with unit leaders coming from all three communities. The theme for the camp this year is Nature Heritage. Parents are invited to visit the camp at any time during the week.

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### Burks' Attending A&M Workshop

Two Tahoka teachers are participating this week in an Environmental Education workshop at Texas A&M University.

They are Melvin and Thalia Burks, Box 7, Tahoka. Teachers in the workshop are getting information on ecological environmental problems, studying desirable attitudes toward environmental education and means of implementing teaching at all grade levels.

One of several regional workshops in progress throughout the U. S., the program is supported by the U. S. Office of Education of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The 125 participants, their schools and Texas A&M also are sharing workshop expenses.

Five days of sessions include environmental problems overviews and discussion in specialized areas, such as nuclear power, population, pesticides, moral perspective and air pollution, among others.

Speakers and group discussion leaders are experts in science, social science and education.

Bobby G. Lee of Wilson High School in Wilson, Texas was among some 20 high school vocational agriculture instructors from a wide area of Texas who participated in a special meats industries short course which concluded Friday (June 25) on the campus of Texas Tech University.

The short course, under joint sponsorship of the Texas Education Agency and Tech's Department of Animal Science, was part of a new program recently initiated by TEA to provide vocational agriculture teachers with practical background and methods for conducting pre-laboratory meats training in high schools.

Principal instructor for the short course was Dr. Keith Lind, professor of meat industries at Texas Tech.

Texas Tech is a multi-purpose university with eight academic divisions -- the colleges of Arts and Sciences, Engineering, Business Administration, Home Economics, Agricultural Sciences and Education, the School of Law and the Graduate School. Tech has a student body of more than 20,000.
