# Bulldogs Sneak By Idalou, 7-6

## 4-H Week Oct. 1-7

Governor Preston Smith has proclaimed the week of October 1-7 as 4-H week in Texas.

Theme of this year's observance is "A New Day -- A New Way."

According to the proclamation issued by Smith, "The 1972 theme expresses the thrust of today's 4-H program as it helps prepare young people to become better citizens in our changing world."

The proclamation continues, "Texas 4-H members working with educational learn-by-doing projects apply the latest research and scientific information to their work, habits and giving demonstrations to pass the information to others."

"The leadership and citizenship training which 4-H members receive in this program is a valuable asset to our state and to our democratic way of life."

4-H continues to expand into new program areas and is designed to meet the needs of all youngsters between the ages of 9 and 19.

A total of 394 boys and girls are currently enrolled in 4-H in Lynn County. However many more are eligible to participate. Boys and girls are invited to visit the county Extension office to learn about 4-H club work.

4-H is a part of the educational program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University and is directed at the local level by county Extension agents. Volunteer adult leaders and other local citizens assist with the program.

PCG "can be and will be" a potent factor in writing the provisions of a 1974 cotton program, Johnson said. "We have among the officers, directors and committee members of PCG people who, first are capable of reaching sound, practical conclusions with regard to needed program provisions, and, second, are capable of bringing their logic to bear on other people whose support for those conclusions will be necessary if they are to be enacted."

This committee will report its recommendations to the full PCG Board, which has two elected members from each of 25 counties, and that body will determine the organization's official policy, Johnson stated.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation has named 37,000 Commended students in the United States. These students are among the upper 2 per cent of those who are expected to graduate

from high school in 1973. The Commended students rank high, but below the 15,000 Semifinalists announced in September by NMSC.

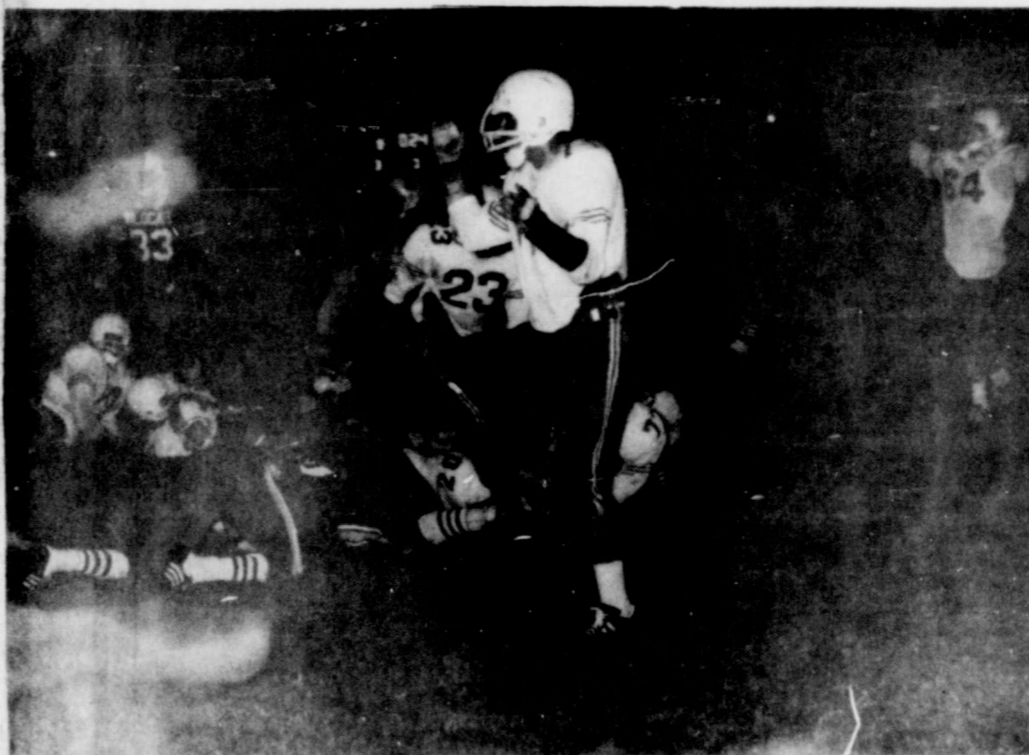

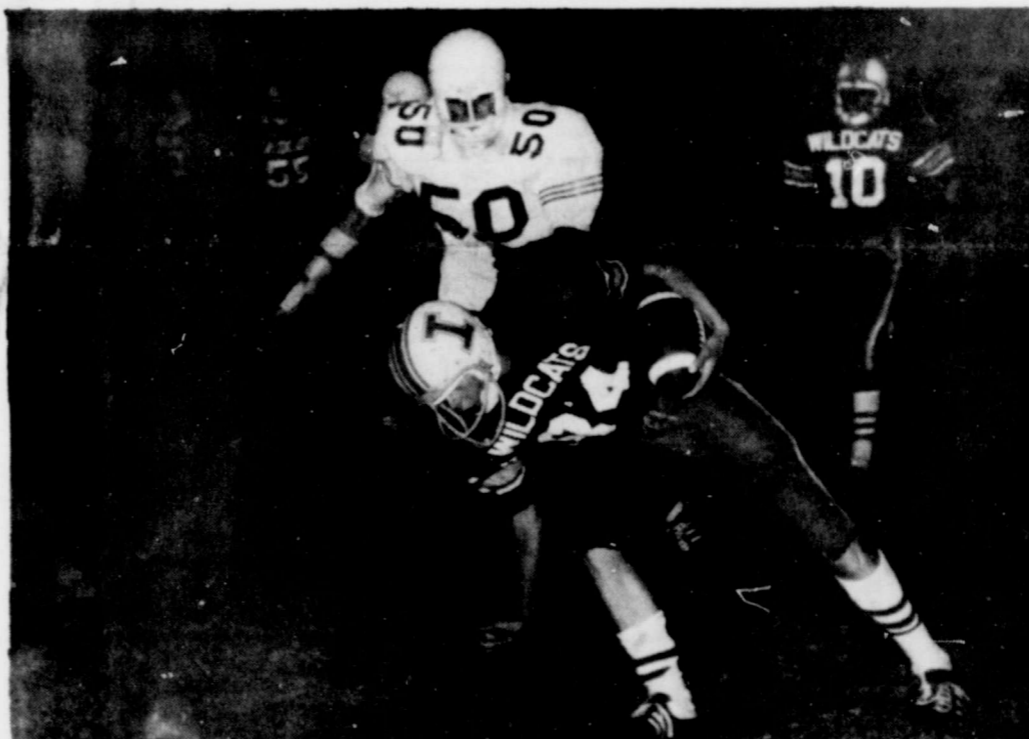

## First Win Of Season

The Tahoka Bulldogs, in their first win of the season, sneaked past Idalou by a score of 7-6 with both teams getting on the scoreboard in the first half. The Bulldogs tightened up their pass defense this week and held the Wildcats to only one completion all night.

Idalou struck first in the ball game on the last play of the first quarter when Wildcat Randy Nettles went around right end and down the sideline for 46 yards to score their only points of the night. The kick for extra point failed.

With just 20 seconds left in the first half Tailback Jimmy Bailey went over right tackle for 3 yards to score and Louis Zedlitz kicked the PAT to give the Bulldogs a 7-6 halftime lead which was good enough to win the game.

The Bulldogs put on a 93 yard march for the score which included two short gains by John Thomas, then McClelland hit Gary McCord on a 36 yard pass play to the 50 yard line, Bailey broke over right guard for 35 yards and Idalou was penalized to the 8 yard for grabbing face mask. McClelland the Bulldog quarterback then made 3 yards around right end, Thomas hit the line for 2 and then Jimmy Bailey scored.

It was all Idalou in the 3rd period and fourth period until Mark Flippin, who played great football all night, intercepted a pass midway in the fourth quarter and for the last 3 1/2 minutes Tahoka moved from their own 27 yard line to the Idalou six as the game ended. The drive included 20 yard pass to Louis Zedlitz and time consuming runs by Thomas, Bailey and McClelland.

The Tahoka Bulldogs are idle this week with an open date and get back into action next week at Homecoming against Levelland at Kelley field. The Bulldogs are looking better each week and start conference play the week after Levelland.

## Four Grants For S P A G

Governor Preston Smith today approved four grants totaling \$105,993 for governmental units in the area served by South Plains Association of Governments, Lubbock. The money will come from the Criminal Justice Council which oversees statewide law enforcement planning and administrators funds from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration for crime control projects in Texas.

Two of the awards, totaling \$57,759, were to SPAG, for design of a law enforcement radio communications system and for law enforcement training.

The radio communications project, funded \$28,500, will require the services of an engineer consultant, who will inventory existing radio equipment, prepare a design consistent with state guidelines coordinate frequency allocation and assist in obtaining FCC licenses and FAA approvals. He also will prepare bid specifications and will supervise implementation of the radio system. Grantee will contribute an \$11,965 in kind match.

The other SPAG award, for \$29,259, will continue CJC support of the regional law enforcement officer training program. Two 240-hour schools will be conducted to train 30 officers in basic police skills. Advanced courses also will be offered. In-kind match of \$53,200, the officers' salaries while in training, plus mileage, is stipulated.

Countries in the South Plains Region are Bailey, Cochran, Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hale, Hockley, King, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Motley,

Terry and Yoakum. Cochran County's application for \$16,836 to employ a probation officer and secretary and purchase office supplies was granted. Local contribution will be \$2,730 in kind and \$4,000 cash. Approved for Lubbock County.

SAYS ...



Make your own kabobs are fun and a time-saving outdoor meal. Gather food and let each family member or guest assemble and grill his own meal-on-a-stick.

Kabobs are made by alternating chunks of food on long metal skewers or hardwood sticks. Don't overcrowd the meat and vegetables - allow some room between each chunk to promote faster and more even cooking.

Before grilling, season the ingredients with salt and pepper and brush with butter or barbecue sauce.

For best results, use food that cook in about the same length of time. To do this, some vegetables should be

partially cooked before hand. Or put each vegetable on a separate skewer and grill until done. To serve, slip the food from the skewer onto a plate or hot roll.

Kabobs offer numerous combinations of meats and vegetables. Some interesting ones include beef cubes, mushrooms, ham cubes and small whole onions; chicken livers or meatballs wrapped in bacon; steak, partially cooked potatoes, green pepper and onion; cheese wrapped in bacon and tomatoes; or sausage and apple wedges.

Consider kabobs for your next cookout - they're fun and offer variety for all.

# Sundown Blanks Wilson, 7-0

The Sundown Roughnecks capitalizing on a strong defense, Wilson fumbles, and key penalties downed the Wilson Mustangs 7-0 in a key 2-B District ballgame.

In District play Sundown now stands 2-0 and Wilson 1-1 with both teams having 7 District games remaining.

The first quarter was a battle of defenses. Sundown had a total offense of 0 yards and Wilson had 48 yards rushing and 30 yards passing. The first quarter was highlighted by a determined goal line stand by Sundown stopping Wilson on the 6 inch line.

As the 2nd quarter opened Wilson had Sundown on its own 6 inch line. Wilson held for 6 yards on two plays but a penalty gave Sundown a first on its own 12 allowing Sundown to get out of a hole.

An exchange of punts and penalties Sundown got the ball on its own 42 yd. line. A 32 yd pass from quarterback Mike Waygood to Johnny Weeks and another key penalty set up Sundown's touchdown by Marlin Waldrop and extra point kick by Gary Douglas making the score at halftime 7-0.

The 3rd quarter was also a battle of defense and Wilson lost two fumbles, one on Sundown's 38 and another on Sundown's 30 yd. line.

The 4th quarter was dominated by Wilson but the Mustangs were unable to score fumbling twice and losing the ball both times, once on their 10 yd line. Another Wilson mistake cost them a T.D. when Chris Coleman ran a punt back 65 yards behind some great blocking but one of these blocks became a clip and no T.D.

A great deal of credit must be given to the Roughneck defense, allowing Wilson's ground forces to only 134 yds and aired attack only 51 yds. However Wilson's defense was even tougher allowing Sundown only 58 yards rushing and 41 passing.

## Farm Bureau News

Texas Farm Bureau President J. T. (Red) Woodson of Fannin County on Sept. 18 asked the federal government to help move cotton into export as a means of alleviating current depressed cotton prices.

"The president of the 130,000 member farm organization said cotton farmers face a severe hardship because of the present price situation. Cotton prices are now 6-10 cents a pound below the level of one year ago.

"Buyers who contracted earlier for limited supplies are now holding off buying during this current harvest season," Woodson said in a telegram to Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz. "This factor, together with lower grades resulting from adverse weather, has ruined our domestic market for cotton.

"We urgently request

that you undertake immediate steps to increase exports of cotton under Title 2 of the Public Law 480 program as a means of alleviating depressed domestic markets.

"We applaud your recent successful efforts to move wheat into new markets, and trust that you will do everything in your power to help cotton growers," the farm leader said.

In the past nearly all cotton shipped under P.L.

480 has been under Title 1 of that law. This is a program in which foreign countries buy U.S. goods in their currencies. The United States then uses the money to pay its bills in those countries - bills associated with common defense efforts, expenses of U.S. embassies, etc.

Under Title 2 of P.L. 480, all commodities are owned by the USDA's Com-

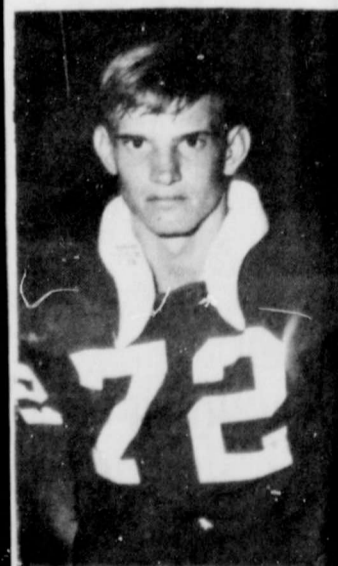

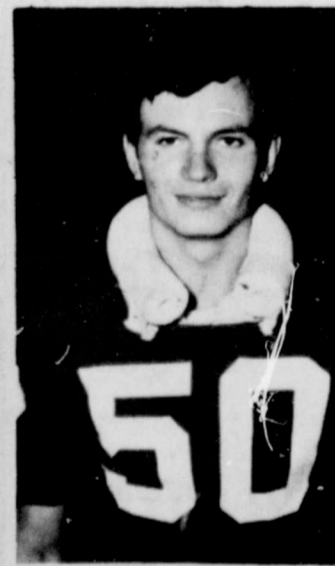
