Cotton Producers Meeting Is Set

An excellent crop can turn trailer loads of headaches for cotton producers do not plan well for cotton harvesting and marketing, says Bill Griffin, county extension agent. Growers might be able to save themselves hundreds or even thousands of dollars by taking advantage of information to be offered at a meeting for producers and area citizens at the Lynn County Electric Cooperative, October 2 at 1:30 p.m. Designated to update producers on facts about harvest - aid chemicals, cotton harvesting and storage, the meeting is sponsored by the South Plains Development Program and the Agricultural Extension Service.

Specialists with the Extension Service based at Lubbock will present facts on the use of harvest - aid chemicals, equipment systems for harvesting, and field storage systems, with specific information on labor, time and cost comparisons. They are Roy Childres, area agricultural engineer - cotton mechanization, and Robert B. Metzger, area agronomist - cotton. Accompanying the specialists will be District Extension Agent Billy C. Gunter. SPD is a volunteer organization composed of citizens interested in the economic and social growth of the South Plains.

State And County Taxes May Be Paid Beginning October 1, 1973

About 4600 tax statements will be mailed to Lynn County Residents the last of September, according to George D. Stracken County Tax Assessor Collector. Many people will take advantage of the discounts that are provided, which is three percent in October, two percent in November and one percent in the

month of December. Total value of tax roll for 1973 is 17,282,270 which is over last years value. State taxes for 1973 will amount to \$31,941.50, County taxes \$164,190.41, High Plains Water Dist. \$2,742.03, Hospital District \$128,562.27. Total amount of taxes to be collected on the 1973 roll will be \$327,436.21. Total collections for 1972 were between 95 to 96 percent of the roll.

The Tahoka Bulldogs, winning their second straight game of the 1973 season, crushed the Idalou Wildcats by a score of 41 - 0 last Friday night at Idalou.

Making the leather pop so you could hear it in the stands on defense and Weldon Warren guiding a precision offense the Bulldogs completely dominated the entire ball game. Coach Viertel's eleven coming from lost of errors in their first outing have come a long way in the last two outings with very few mistakes in their contest with Abernathy to no mistakes against Idalou.

Coach A. J. Viertel praised the entire squad for their efforts against Idalou last week. The Bulldogs while holding the Idalou club scoreless accounted for six touchdowns, two two point conversions and one one point conversion.

Jimmy Bailey was the leading ground gainer for the Bulldogs with 139 yards on 17 carries, Timmy White got 88 yards on 9 carries, Kent Payne had 22 yards on 9 carries and Weldon Warren had 22 yards on 6 carries.

In the scoring department Jimmy Bailey scored three touchdowns, one a 6 yard run, one on a 59 yard punt, and another on a 15 yard blast. Timmy White scored twice, once on a 50 yard play and returned a kick - off 90 yards for a touchdown and Weldon Warren scampered 70 yards for a touchdown after intercepting an Idalou pass.

In the extra point division Terry McCord kicked one extra point, Weldon Warren passed for a two point conversion to Jeff Roberts, and David Glenn passed to Sebastian Pena for a two point conversion bringing the score to a final tally of 41 - 0.

The Bulldogs had a total offense of 459 yards for the night. The Tahoka Bulldogs have an open date this week and will play Levelland next Friday night at Lobo Stadium before beginning District play against Frenship here on October 12. The Frenship game will also be Tahoka's homecoming and a large crowd is expected for that encounter.

The unsung heroes of the game of football as always are the offensive and defensive line along with the linebackers and blocking backs. 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

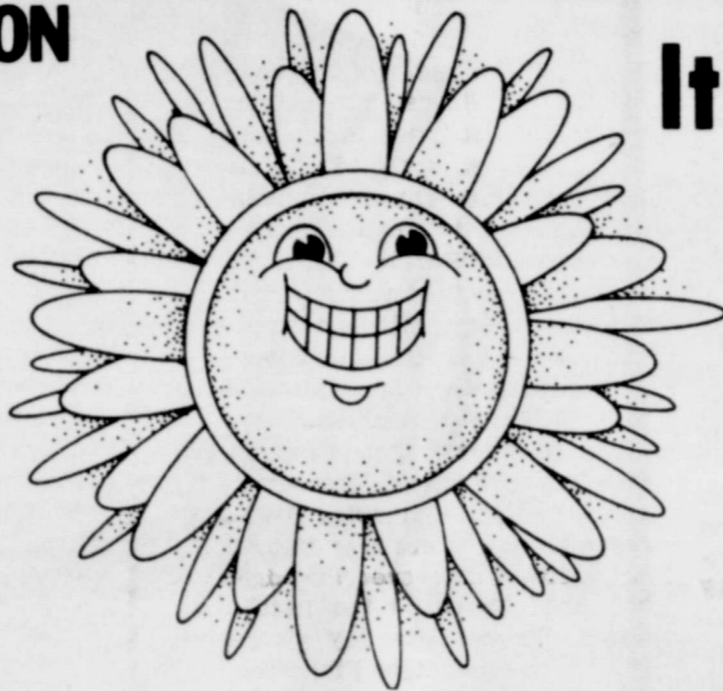

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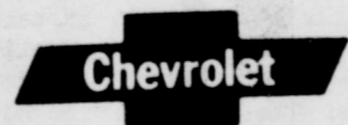
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JR-HIGH-LITES

By the way, if any of you are interested in getting the GROWL when it is published, please contact Mrs. Mary Brecheen or myself.

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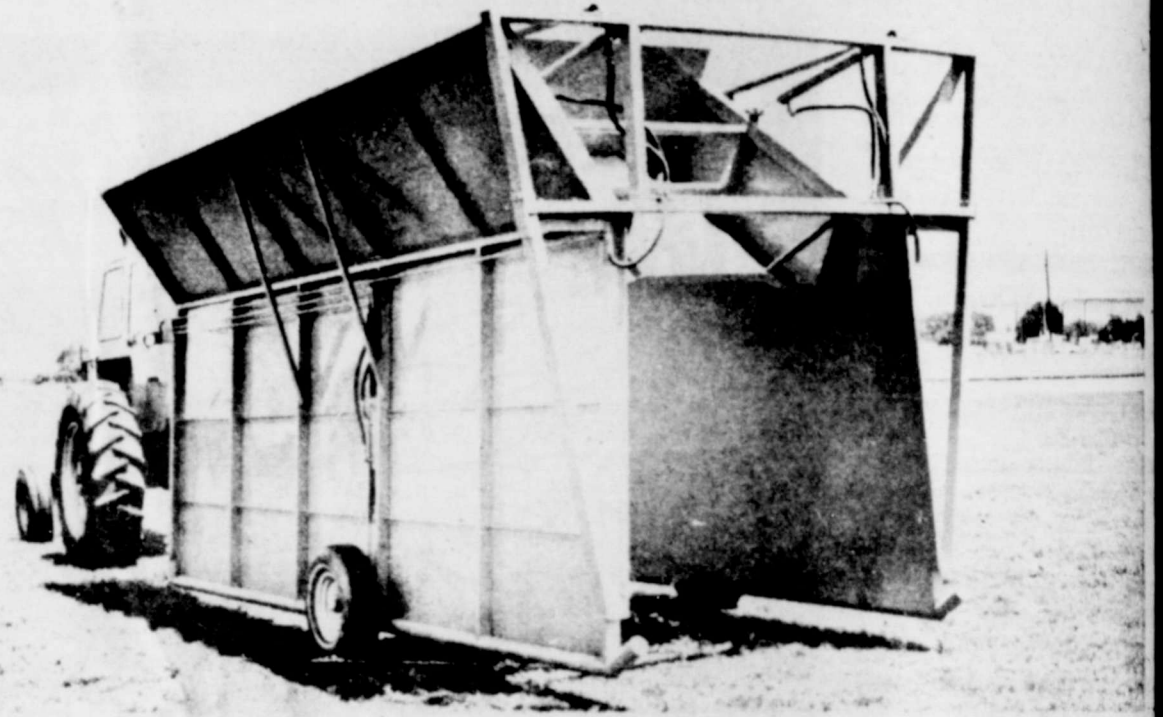

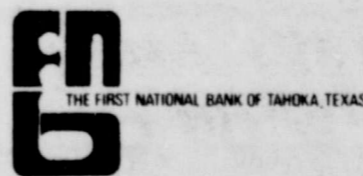

FARM news

BILL GRIFFIN SAYS



Never before have soil tests been as important to Texas farmers as they are today.

With limited supplies of nitrogen and phosphorus, nutrients must be applied where they are

needed to maintain production and profits.

This is especially true for phosphorus, which accumulates in the soil and can be found in a wide range of levels on a

single farm. Recent soil test summary data shows that 58 percent of over 10,000 soil samples from the Blacklands were very low in phosphorus while 10 percent were high. Such differences must be recognized in planning fertilizer purchases for this fall and next year's crops.

A reliable soil test is the best place to start, and fall is the best time to collect samples. Early samplings gives time to make plans and place fertilizer orders early.

To provide a valid guide for fertilization and liming, soil samples must be collected carefully. A slice or core of soil should be taken from 10 to 15 spots in each field to get a good sample. For field crops, the slices or cores should be taken to plow depth, while a depth of 3 to 4 inches has given best results for perennial forages.

Put the soil in a clean plastic bucket, mix it thoroughly and remove a pint box full to send to the laboratory. Information sheets should accompany each sample to show past history and plans for the next crop. These plus mailing cartons for the soil samples are available at the county Extension office.

Act now to insure that your fall and spring fertilization programs are based on a soil test.

Farm Bureau Cotton Meet Held In Waco

Lynn County Farm Bureau was represented at a meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton Division held at Waco Tuesday and Wednesday, Sept. 18 and 19.


Comprised of chairman of county Farm Bureau Cotton Divisions in 59 cotton-producing counties, the state division was formed recently to deal with problems involved in cotton production and marketing. This was its first meeting.

Representing the local county Farm Bureau Cotton Division was L. C. Unfred of New Home.

An in-depth study was made at the conference of five "areas of concern" of cotton producers. They included forward contracting, agricultural chemicals and the environment, cotton seed and its products, production and their availability, and production and marketing. The conference analyzed specific problems, assigned priorities for action, and suggested action that can be taken by the county divisions.

Speakers at the Tuesday afternoon session included TFB President J. T. (Red) Woodson, TFB Executive Director Warren Newberry; Darrell Cobb of Tahoka, chairman of the State Cotton Advisory Committee; and Tommy Klemcke, TFB director of commodity activities. Woodson spoke at a dinner Tuesday evening.

Highlighting the Wednesday morning program was a discussion of the recently enacted federal farm program by Dr. Wedemeyer, TFB director of search and education. He spoke on "Farming the Farm Program, 1974," with special attention to provisions in the program pertaining to cotton. "The success or failure of cotton farming in 1974 will, in a large way, be dependent upon a producer's ability to cooperate with the national program," he declared. "Regardless of what producer may think of the program, the fact is that a program is in operation, and the farmer produces cotton, must be effective in this program." Newberry led a discussion on the program and presented the concluding remarks.

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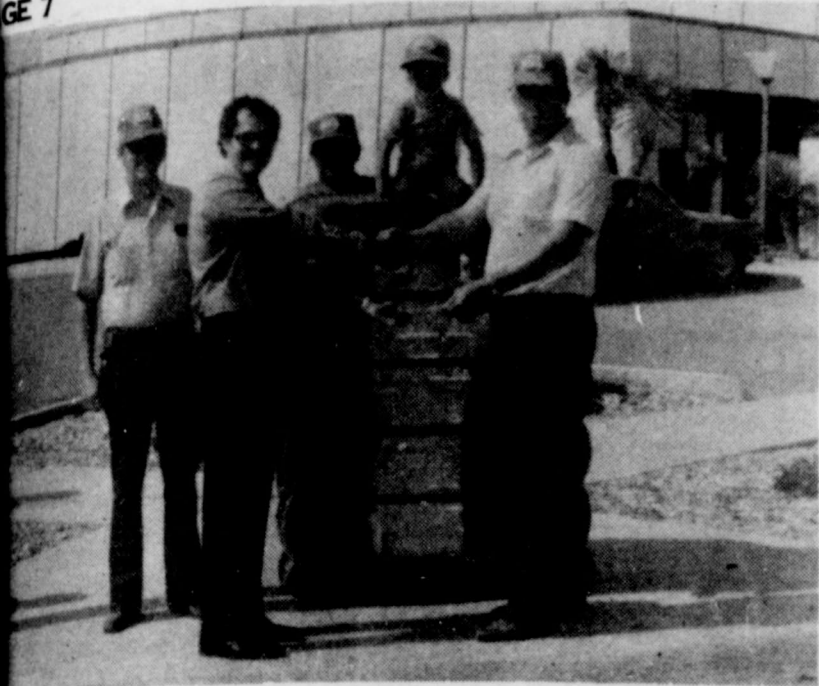

First Bale Of Cotton Ginned In Tahoka

The first bale of cotton was ginned in Tahoka last Thursday by the Tahoka Co-Op Gin. The cotton was brought by Don Spears and Carl and was ginned five miles north of Tahoka on 2 acres of land. The 600 lb. bale of lint cotton was ginned from 2,140 lbs. of seed cotton and was planted on the 10 to the 12 of May. The yield on the cotton was 10 and the grade was low middle staple length 1 and one-

eighth inch. Tahoka co-op paid Spears 75c per lb. and Joyce Pebsworth, Rep. of W. B. Dunavant and Co. paid 70c per lb. for the cotton. J. O. Reed is manager of the Tahoka Co-Op Gin.

One Accident In Lynn County During August

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Lynn County during the month of August according to Sergeant H. E. Pirtle, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

This crash resulted in one person killed and no persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for August, 1973 shows a total of 586 accidents resulting in 24 persons killed and 328 persons injured as compared to August, 1972, with 593 accidents resulting in 28 persons killed and 359 persons injured. This was 7 less accidents, 4 less fatalities, and 31 less injured in 1973 at the same period of time.

The 24 traffic deaths for the month of August, 1973, occurred in the following counties: Montague, four; Armstrong, Castro, Dallam, Swisher, Baylor, Clay, Wise counties, two each; and Deaf Smith, Donley, Parmer, Haskell, Lubbock, and Lynn Counties, one each.

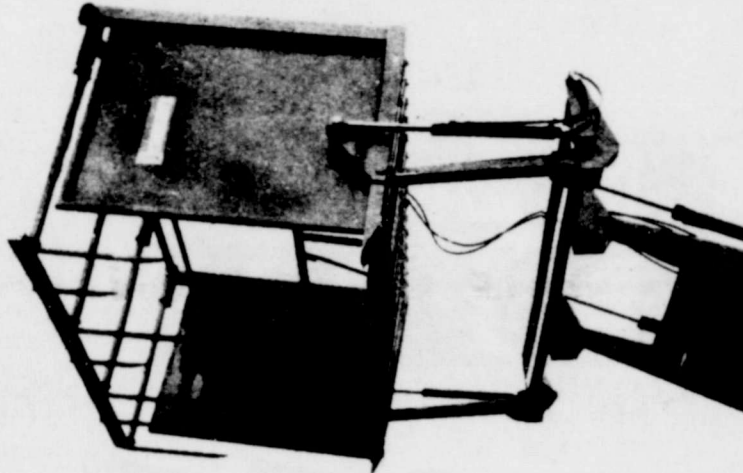

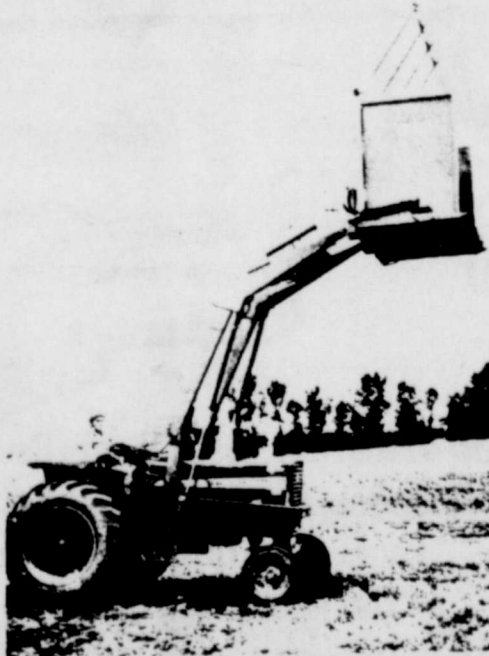

Josephine Thompson has been having quite a few visitors since she came into the home. We are glad she is feeling some better.

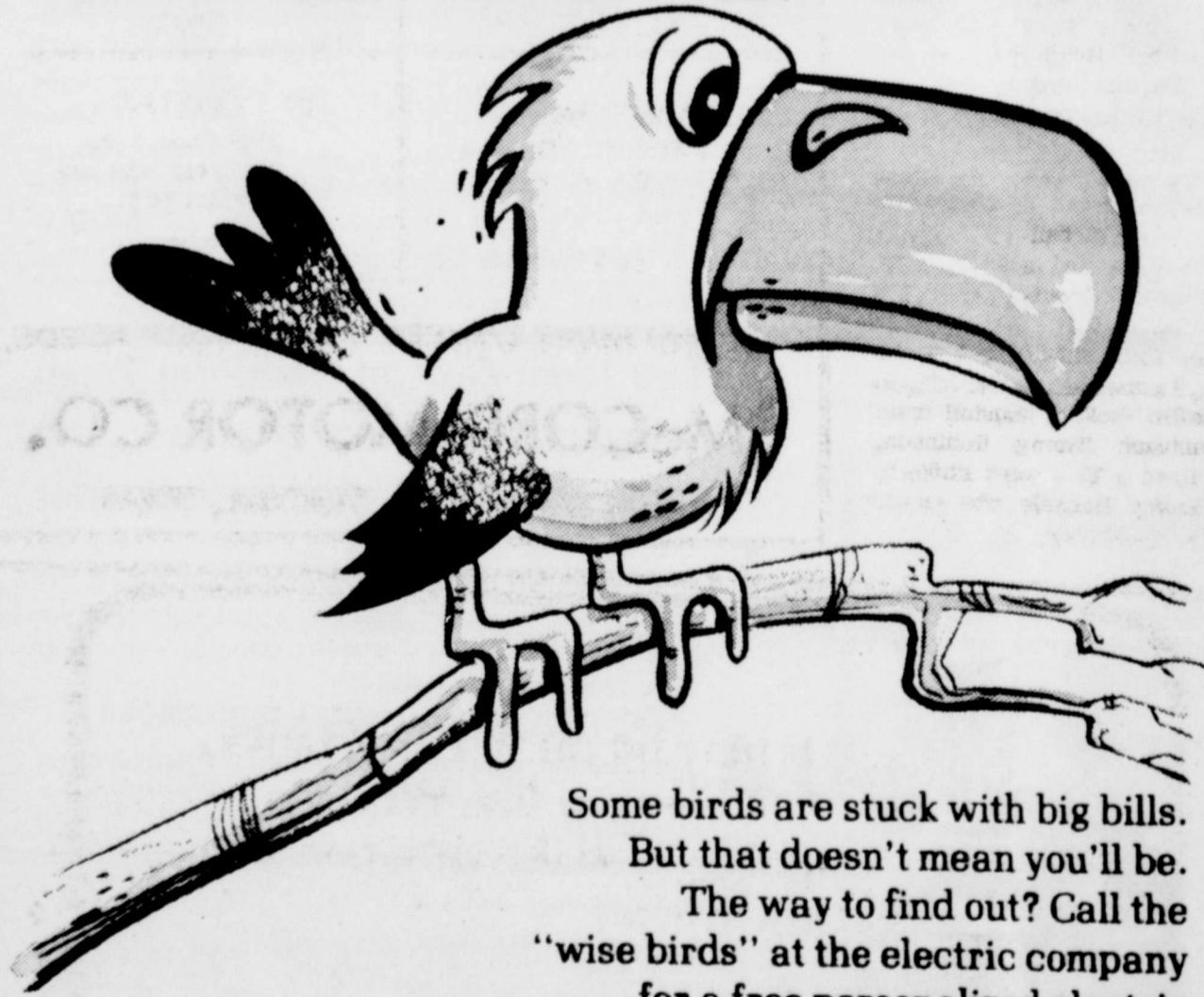

utensils stop the spread and growth of salmonella bacteria.

Here are some important steps you can take to protect yourself and your family from salmonellosis:

Although cooking kills the germs, do not use the same platters and utensils before an after cooking. Ignoring this can result in recontaminating you food with salmonellae in between the raw and cooked food. To safeguard this "cross-contamination", always thoroughly wash your hands, kitchen counter tops, utensils, dishes, and cutting boards with soap and hot water after contact with raw meat, poultry and other raw foods. You might even use separate cutting boards for raw and cooked meat. Never use the board for any food that will not be cooked unless you first wash the board thoroughly in soap and water.

When defrosting meat in the refrigerator, do not put in on top of or in contact with other food.

After cooking, do not allow meat, poultry, and other foods to stand at room temperature for longer than two hours. Bacteria grow well under these conditions and really thrive at temperatures between 45 degrees and 115 degrees F. As a rule of thumb, keep foods below 40 degrees or above 140 degrees F. It is important to remember that foods infected with salmonellae may not have an odor or off-flavor.

Be on guard for pets with symptoms of salmonella infection. Pet feeding dishes, toys, or bedding should not be allowed in the kitchen or near items in contact with the family's food. Wash your hands thoroughly after handling pets and before preparing food. Teach your children to wash their hands, too, before they enter the kitchen -- and insist that they do this "religiously."

Leopards Roll Over Lazbuddie

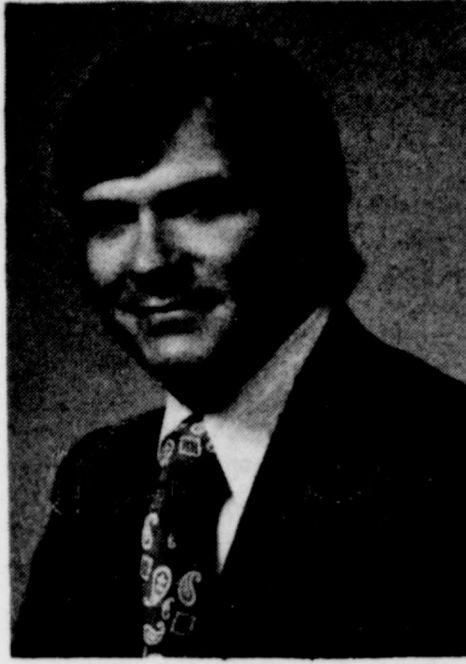
The New Home Leopards rolled over the Lazbuddie Longhorns last Friday night, with the score of 25-8.

It's often mistaken for something else.

Salmonella bacteria can live and grow in the digestive tract of man, once contaminated food is eaten. When this happens, these symptoms may occur in 12 to 36 hours: Severe headache, vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal cramps, and fever. Because of the similarity of symptoms, it may be mistaken for "flu" or other stomach disorders. The condition is rarely fatal except among infants or elderly persons whose resistance is low. The illness usually lasts from two to seven days.

Insects, rodents, and pets -- especially turtles, birds, dogs, and cats -- are the main carriers of salmonella. Humans get salmonellosis mainly through eating contaminated food or through contact with an animal or human carrier.

Yet, while these pesky bacteria can be spread easily, they can be controlled just as easily through proper personal hygiene and care in handling of food.

Heat and cleanliness are the two strongest weapons against salmonellosis:

Heat, because salmonella bacteria in food are destroyed by heating it to a temperature of 155 degrees F.

Cleanliness, because clean hands, clean counters, and clean

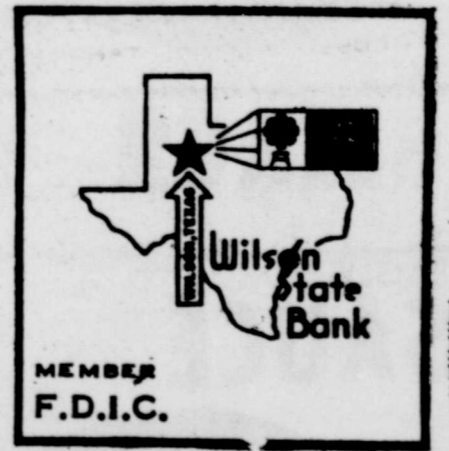

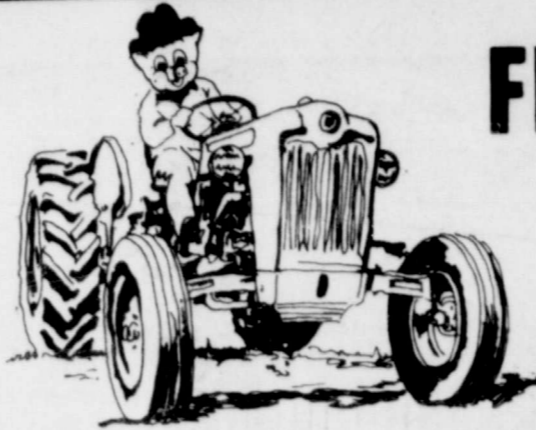

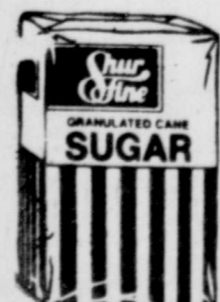
