**Mayor Leslie Endorsed E. L. Short**

State Representative E. L. Short today was endorsed by Tahoka Mayor Meldon Leslie as the most qualified candidate for the District 77 House seat to be voted on at the May 1 primary election. District 77 includes the counties of Gaines, Andrews, Hockley, Lynn, Martin, Terry and Yoakum.

Representative Short's record speaks for itself," Leslie said, "and his service in the Texas Legislature has been key in saving the taxpayers of this state literally millions of dollars in unnecessary government expenditures."

Leslie referred to the important legislative post held by Short as chairman of the powerful House Committee on Intergovernmental Affairs. "The hundreds of bills introduced in the 1975 legislative session, and considered by just this one committee, would, if passed, have cost the taxpayers of Texas more than \$50 million per year," Leslie said, "however, under Chairman Short's leadership, the Intergovernmental committee effectively stopped every one of the irresponsible bills under its jurisdiction."

Leslie cited as one example of such legislation a proposal which would have put the Texas Legislature in the position of dictating pay standards. This legislation by itself, would have cost city taxpayers more than \$15 million per year; supported by unions, it was defeated by the Intergovernmental Committee.

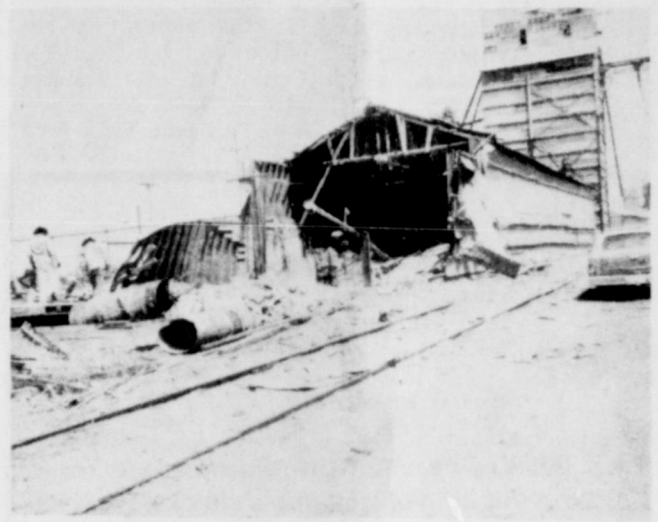
Leslie also pointed to the fact that Short's committee defeated numerous bills to establish state-level controls to regulate the use of land, to require local governments to elect all city council members by single-member districts regardless of the desire of local voters as to how they wish to conduct their elections, and to pave the way for collective bargaining for public employees.

"E.L. Short's experience, legislative record and integrity, combined with his tenure as a solid representative of the people of the 77th District, make it imperative that we send him back to Austin for another term," Leslie said. "I will continue to work for his re-election, and I encourage all voters to go to the polls on May 1 and assure that we continue to benefit from his effective representation in the Texas Legislature."

**Fine Rains Cover County**

Rains Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of last week, followed by local showers on Saturday totaled 1.86 inches in Tahoka and a total of 2.17 for the month. Much of Lynn County received heavier rains, ranging up to three or four inches or more.

These rains may not have ended the widespread drought, but they were heavier in Lynn County than over much of the Plains, and put the soil in excellent condition for planting.

There's one big IF—if high winds do not dry out the topsoil before farmers are ready to plant. Since the rains, there have been three days when high winds caused dust to blow before the soil was dry enough to work.

With good deepsoil moisture, prospects are still good for favorable plintine conditions and irrigated land that had been watered is in great shape.

Most farmers say they may plant some milo, but will wait awhile for the ground to warm up again before trying to plant cotton.

In the meantime, a good general rain is needed over the entire Plains and West Texas country.

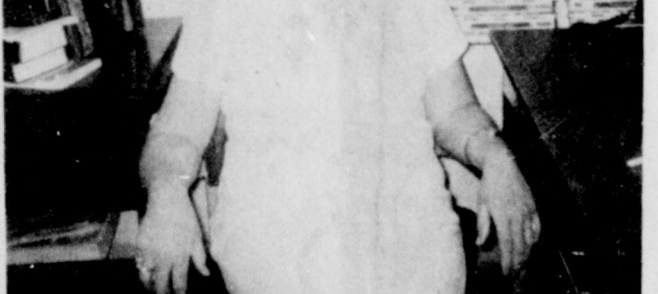
### Transfer Students

### Short Ask Tax Cut

State Rep. E.L. Short of Tahoka has asked House Speaker Bill Clayton to consider a reduction in the ad valorem property tax by letting the State take more responsibility in funding education rather than burdening property owners with more taxes.

Short's suggestion came after Clayton proposed selective tax cuts of up to \$1 billion dollars if current state revenue projections for the 1978-79 biennium hold up. The State Comptroller has said up to \$2.6 billion in surplus funds could be available to the 65th Legislature.

Short told Clayton, "I would like to see the State assume more of the burden and give our land owners, oil property owners and home owners some needed relief."

In his message to the Speaker, Short added, "It has become apparent that under House Bill 1126 some of our rural schools are going to have to increase taxes by as much as 20 per cent. If there are going to be any tax cuts then let's give ad valorem taxation top priority."

Clayton said Short's idea was sound and promised it would be given full consideration when the Legislature convenes in January.

"We are concerned that our people are being taxed off the land and out of their homes. I share Rep. Short's concern and because our economic outlook appears healthy, we may be able to provide some relief," Clayton said.

### Short Report

The recently appointed Interim Committee, charged by Speaker Clayton to determine whether or not it should recommend gas regulations be put under the Utility Commission jurisdiction or left under the Railroad Commission, met Thursday, April 15 and received testimony about this.

Representative Short took a strong position against any change. He said, "the Railroad Commission is a constitutionally established body and are elected whereas the Utility commissioners are appointed and could easily be dominated by the industry they are regulating."

Testimony was given by Lone Star and others that they welcomed close surveillance and regulation but established rate ceilings would further hinder exploration therefore adding to the problem. It was also stated that the Railroad Commission had the expertise and staff to set up a much quicker system than the Utility Commission. Short said, "any time exploration declines, many of our West Texas towns and communities can expect an economic impact because many people who help drill the wells to the finished product will be without employment."

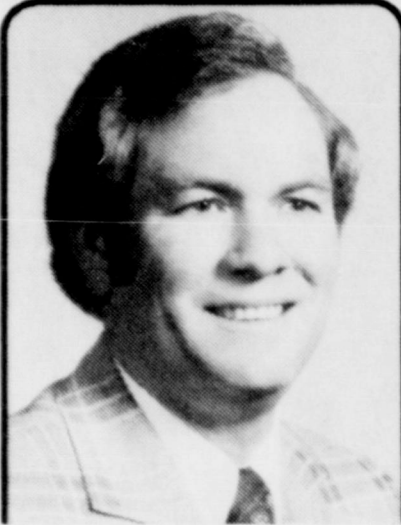

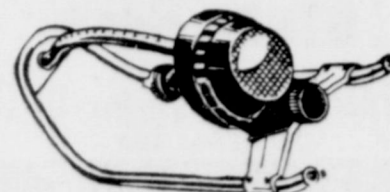

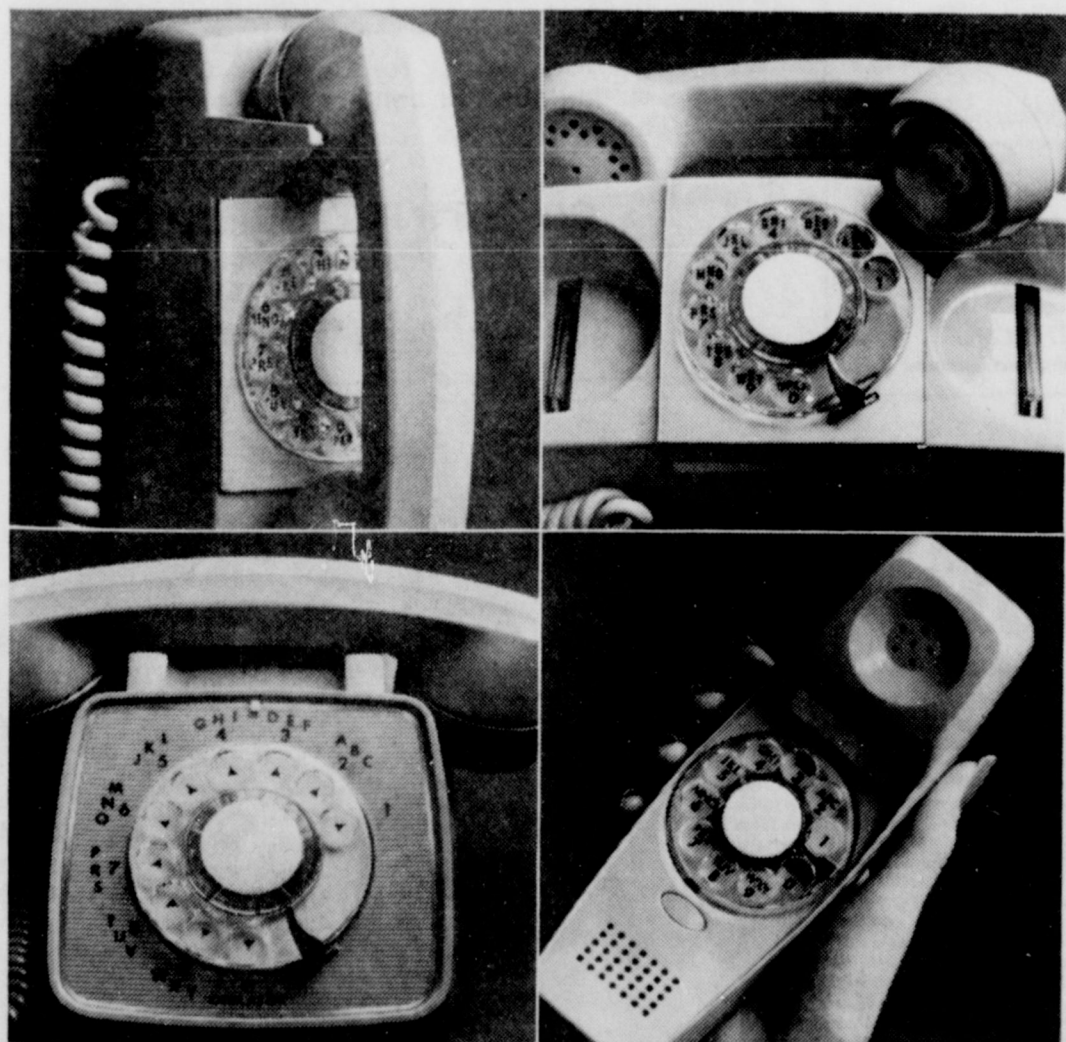

Buying clubs, which promise great savings, may not be the answer to a consumer's prayer. Investigate the club's promises before joining because some members are extremely pleased with services of a buying club while others feel gypped. Not all clubs operate alike. Some require a modest yearly fee and others charge an enormous initial payment. Most buying clubs offer catalogs showing the manufacturer's suggested retail price and 'their' price, trying to impress shoppers with large savings. But shoppers who frequent discount stores or sales may already be saving as much as they could through the buying club. Even though savings are sometimes possible, having to buy from the club's

catalog may present disadvantages. The pictures and descriptions do not always show the merchandise accurately. And some clubs prohibit the return of merchandise unless it is defective. Warranties may present another problem. Even though clubs may claim that warranties are backed by the manufacturers, it is up to the buyer to have the warranty honored if problems occur. When considering joining a buying club, consumers should remember these points: --comparison shop at local stores for items you may be interested in purchasing --read the contract thoroughly and understand all terms --avoid long-term membership since there is no assurance that the group will be in business as long as the membership lasts. --check with the local Better Business Bureau, Retail Merchants Association or the state Attorney General's regional consumer protection offices.

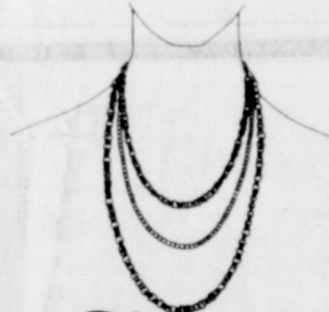

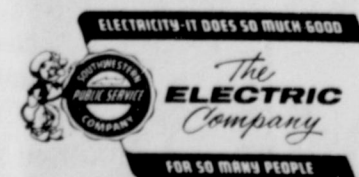

# Infant Home From Hospital

When Vickie Benavides was ready to go home for the first time, she was 75 days old and weighed 5½ pounds. She was ready to become acquainted with her family... her twin sister, Virginia, and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Benavides of Tahoka.

A premature baby with serious birth defects, the tiny girl had overcome tremendous odds for survival. Born in an area hospital, she was transferred to Methodist Hospital's

Intensive Care Nursery when she was a week old. Even with two complicated surgeries and constant nursing care, she still "made it her way" says one of her admiring nurses.

Vickie was the first of the twins and was the larger of the two, weighing almost four pounds. But the tube to her stomach, her esophagus, was blocked in a condition known as a tracheo-esophageal fistula. She could not eat, and liquid

would travel to her lungs. Severe pneumonia developed, her weight dropped to three pounds and frequently she would stop breathing.

The first surgery was performed for the tiny patient when she was 12 days old. The esophagus and trachea were repaired. To permit her to receive nourishment, until her esophagus became functional, a tube was inserted directly into her stomach during a gastrostomy.

Vickie's esophagus had to be dilated from time to time to keep it open. During recuperation, pneumonia recurred.

After a few days, the artificial feeding tube was removed, and the spunky little lady ate by mouth for awhile, but trouble developed and the feeding tube had to be reinserted. A week passed; she progressed, and the tube was removed permanently.

She was placed on a special, very nutritious formula designed for easy digestion. Then she began to enjoy cereal.

She grew, gained weight and began to communicate with her nurses, doctors and her anxious young parents who visited as often as possible.

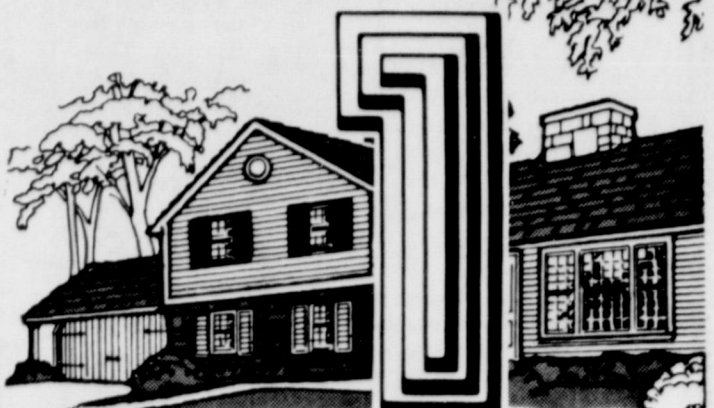
Dismissal from the hospi-

tal was set for the day she reached the goal of 5½ pounds. Her parents came for her, and the nurses gave them careful instructions for care and feeding. Her pediatrician scheduled a check-up date.

Her nurses gave her a "going home" present. They dressed her in a bright pink jump suit, soft pink blanket and fastened the

traditional pink bow in her hair. All agree that Vickie has "come a long way, baby!"

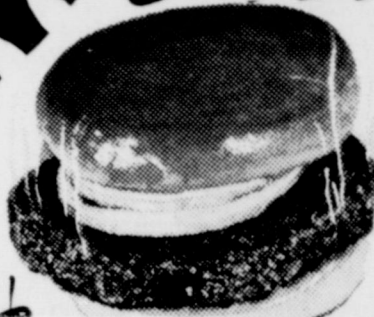

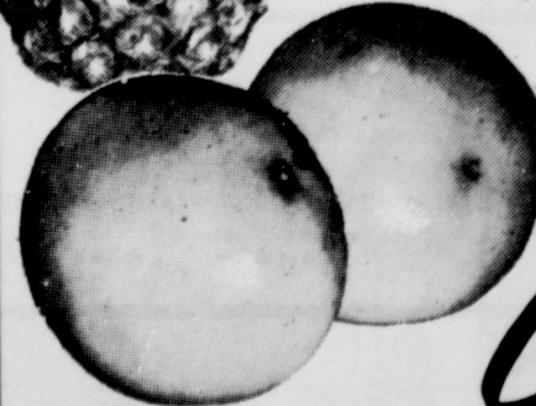

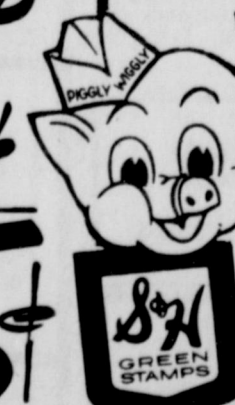
