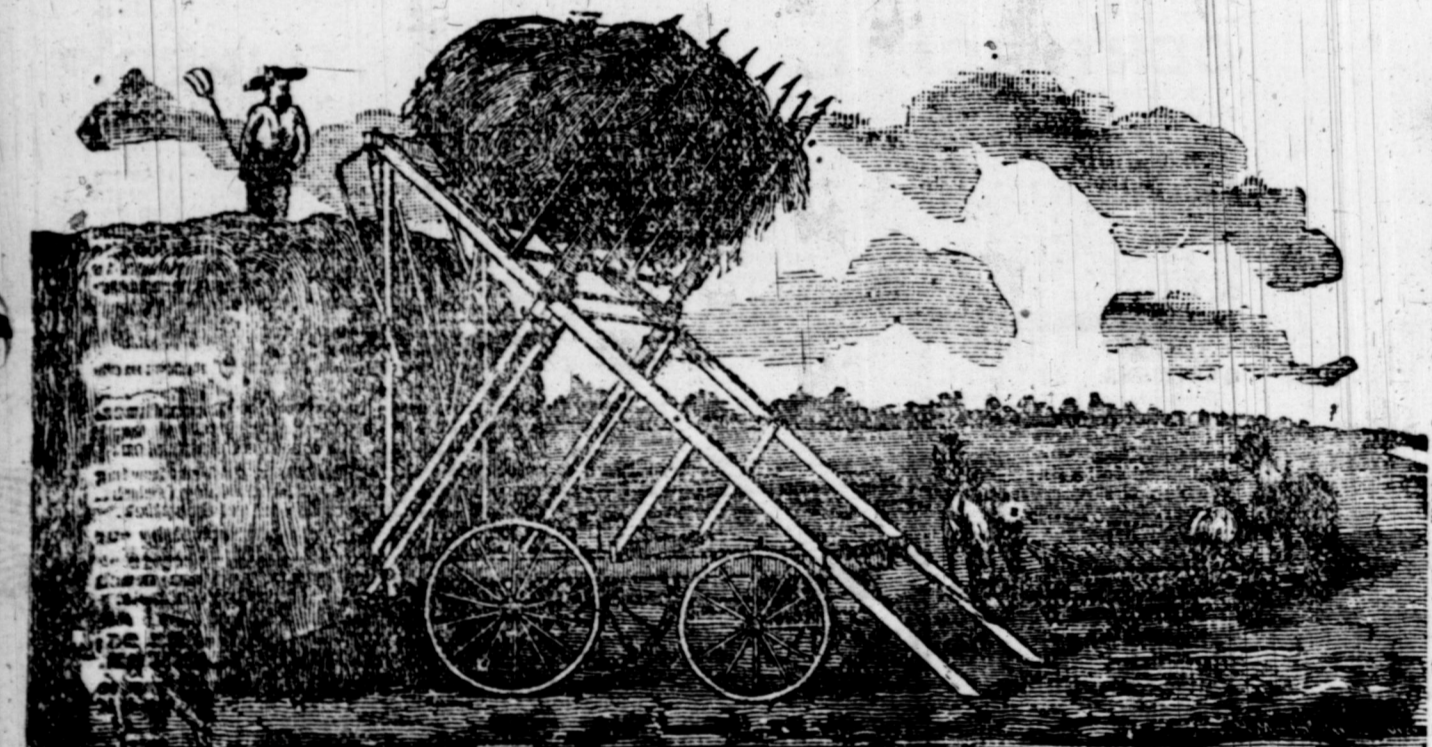

FROM JOHNSON COUNTY.
The Godley Ranch—Shorthorn
Cattle and French Merino
Sheep.

(Regular Correspondence to Texas Live Stock
Journal)
CLEBURNE, TEX., May 3, 1886.

Traveling west from Cleburne we
pass over some fine grass and farm
lands situated between the Cross Tim-
bers and Brazos river.
Here are some fine farms giving
abundant yield in "The hand of the
diligent." Here are some stock enter-
prises, mostly small as to numbers, but
worthy of consideration and encourage-
ment. Here are a few enterprises given
to breeding and raising fine stock of
different branches and breeds. We
may from time to time make mention
of these different enterprises.

For the present we wish to notice the
improved stock ranch of R. B. Godley,
situated 20 miles southwest of Fort
Worth, and 10 miles northwest of Cle-
burne, on the head waters of Noland
river, a tributary of the Brazos from
the east.

The river runs diagonally through
the lands, from northwest to southeast,
the breaks of which give fine protec-
tion to stock.
The waters of the river on this ranch
give fine trout and other varieties of
fish and furnish a resort for aquatic
birds. In fact, the day that we visited
the place we saw a fine flock of ducks
immediately in front of the house,
their reflected shadows, under the
bright noon-day sun, calling to mind
the beautiful lines of Wordsworth:
"The swans on sweet St. Mary's Lake
Float double—swan and shadow."

The course of the river through the
ranch gives three miles of water for
stock, and its tributary branches, com-
ing in from both sides, distributes to
all portions of the ranch, preserving it
from the disadvantage of having the
lands tramped by stock going to and
from water, as is sometimes the case
with lands differently situated. In
truth, it is not too much to say that
there is not anywhere a ranch better
watered.

Mr. R. B. Godley, the proprietor of
this enterprise, is a citizen of Cleburne,
a young man, full of vim and hope.
He has made money with the ease of a
fortune teller, and is not afraid to
invest in Texas stock and stock inter-
ests.

As an evidence of the standing of
Mr. Godley among the stockmen of the
southwest, we might mention here that
he owns an interest in the Shorthorn
Cattle company of Seconco county,
New Mexico, and is the secretary and
treasurer of that enterprise, extensive
in its operations and rich in its re-
sources.

Mr. Godley located his ranch on No-
land river in 1883. It consists of 2,000
acres of fine lands, all of which, ex-
cepting perhaps two or three small
points, is susceptible of productive
cultivation. Only 100 acres of the
lands so far has been put in cultivation,
the rest remaining in the native grasses,
sage and mesquite. It is fenced with
cedar posts and galvanized (Glidden
wire, and except one little offset, is in
a square form.

The house and barns are eligibly
located in the center of the property,
upon an elevation facing the river on
the south. There is a good ranch resi-
dence on the place, and a barn with a
capacity for 50 head of horses and
15,000 bushels of grain, containing also
platform scales for weighing live stock,
grain and hay. There is also 1000 feet
of sheds for sheep. There are corrals
on the ranch, separate for each kind
of stock.

Mr. Godley has not confined his in-
vestment to one branch of stock, but
has invested in all, not omitting goats,
of which he has 25 head, about one-
half of them full blood Angoras from
California, and the other half high-
grade from the same source.

Mr. Godley gives attention to every-
thing in which he has money invested,
and any one wishing to investigate this
branch of stock business, so little un-
derstood, would do well to communi-
cate with him upon this subject.

There are on the ranch 200 head of
high grade Shorthorn cattle, which are
doing well and yielding a good return
to their owner for his investment.
There are also some fine mares on the
place, bred to thoroughbred Kentucky
horses. We only had an opportunity
to see one of the mares, a fine three-
year-old, to bring a colt soon. Mr.
John S. Godley, the ranch manager,
showed us a saddle mare that probably
has not a superior in the state. He
also showed us his fine Norman stall-
ion, Normanda, which is in service the
present season one-half the time in Cle-
burne and one-half on the ranch at
home. Normanda is a beautiful dap-
ple gray, 16 1/2 hands high, weighing
1,600 pounds, fine style and action,
kind disposition and an extra foal get-
ter; sired by Imported Pleasant Valley
Bill, dam by Imported Dock Baker;
grand dam by Imported Louis Napo-
leon; all of Union county, Ohio. This
horse shows superior merit, and persons
contemplating breeding their mares
will find it to their interest to see Nor-
manda.

The business to which Mr. Godley
has thus far given most of his time and
money at Godley ranch is the sheep,
and he has doubtless as fine a flock of
young sheep as there is in the state.
His flock is the result of a cross of
Spanish and French Merinos, and while
he has 5,000, he assured us that not
more 800 of them were four years old
the others one, two and three. He
started his flock with young sheep, and
they are remarkably healthy, being ab-
solutely free from disease.

Mr. Godley obtained from California
the French Merino bucks from which
he built up his flock. These bucks, on
their first introduction in California,
cost \$250 each. He has sold his wool
for some years through the great wool
firm of Denny, Rice & Co., and such is
the superior merit of the wool of this

cross grown at Godley ranch, he told
us, that although marked buck wool,
he has received ewe wool prices for his
buck wool, and that nine-tenths of it
has ranked medium and the rest fine
medium for two successive years in
Boston. His ewes have averaged seven
pounds without sand. He has al-
ready had a fine offer, but will not sell
until about May 15, when he will have
20,000 pounds for the market.

It is probably due to the liberal and
progressive enterprise of Mr. Godley,
as much as to any other one man, that
the sheepmen of Johnson county and sur-
rounding neighborhoods are to organ-
ize an association in the city of Cle-
burne, Saturday, May 8, the purpose of
which is to build up this branch of the
stock business on a better basis than it
has heretofore occupied in this portion
of the state.

They propose among other things to
arrange for a permanent depot in the
city of Cleburne for the purpose of
storing wool, that sheep men may not
be placed to the disadvantage of hunt-
ing buyers, but that their wool all con-
centrated may bring a purchaser who
thereby will be better able to pay good
prices and give encouragement in this
productive branch of stock industry.

Mr. John G. Godley carried us to the
meadow pasture containing the bucks,
and it affords us pleasure to say that
they were a superior class of animals.
While we were delighted with the
fleece now growing upon "Conkling,"
a thoroughbred Spanish Merino, re-
sembling his lordly namesake as much
as a sheep may remind his of a man,
we must state that fleeces of the French
Merino seemed better in many respects.
And we would think from what we
saw here of this branch of the great
Merino family that they would grow in
favor with the sheepmen of Texas in
the coming year.

As we reached the northern limit of
this well located property and took a
hasty review of the surroundings, the
pastures well stocked with all kinds of
birds, plover, quail, etc., the pastures
enclosing fat cattle and well fleeced
sheep, either enjoying the rich grass
or reclining lazily beside cool running
streams, we could but approve the fore-
sight that had made a selection so well
adapted to the various uses: the
cultivation of the purpose in view: the
cultivation of the various breeds and
branches of improved live stock.

FROM HARROLD.

The Movement of Stock. Etc.

EDITOR TEXAS LIVE STOCK JOURNAL: HARROLD, TEXAS, May 5.—The range is not as good through this country as usual at this season of the year. Grass seems to be on a strike for more rain, and the clouds seem to be deliberating whether to concede the demand or not. They hold their consultations during the night and in the morning disperse without any practical results for the better. There were several prominent cattlemen aboard the train this morning as I came up, among whom were Thorp Andrews and Burk Burnett of Fort Worth, Col. Wortham of Henrietta and Col. John N. Simpson of Dallas. Col. Wortham left the train at Henrietta and Messrs. Simpson and Burnett at Wichita Falls, while Thorp and I plodded our weary way to this place. I say weary, because our engine seemed to become weary very frequently and stop for rest and repairs which caused us to be over an hour behind the regular schedule time on our arrival. The Andrews Brothers are here delivering two herds of cattle to Mr. Samples of Montana, which he will drive through to his ranch on the Yellowstone in that territory. They also have one herd of their own which they will drive through on the trail to that territory by way of Coolidge, Kansas. These cattle have been gathered in the counties between here and Fort Worth, and have been driven to this point for delivery. I have also had the pleasure of meeting with that prince of rustlers, Col. Fryor, of the firm of Mabry & Fryor, who is here for the purpose of superintending the passing of two herds, one and two year old, destined for Colorado and for sale, and one of three and four, en route for Hunnewell, Kansas, and sold to Home Bros. These herds were gathered in Mason and Menard counties and have been driven through on the trail this far to their destination. Mr. Fryor reports the range along the trail very poor and water very scarce. He says five herds have passed up the trail to date. The Windsor hotel is headquarters for stockmen, and in fact is a very good hotel for so many places, and a much better one than any older towns can boast of. I have been here but a few hours and have not taken in the town "yet," but I would judge the town is unusually lively for this season of the year. The merchants with whom I have conversed report made very good. The cattle season has barely commenced yet. The citizens here seem anxious for the railroad to be extended from this point. They have their door posts sprinkled ready to embark at any time the angel of death may choose to flap his wings over their young and growing town, but they do not appreciate any calamity. They seem to think the extension will prove a blessing rather than a calamity to them, and why not? The town is surrounded by a very good country and when this becomes settled up why should not Harrold become a good town as well as Dallas?

A friend writing from Prescott, Arizona, says sheep raising is a profitable business in his neighborhood, and that there is over a million head in the territory, mainly confined to the north-eastern part of Yavapai and northern part of Apache counties. Sheep that shear eight pounds of wool per acre are worth \$5.50 per head. J. W. (Bud) Driskill of Austin, Texas, is in the city. In company with John Blocker and W. R. Davis he will drive some 30,000 head up the trail this spring, all of which are contracted for. Bud says he has the finest lot of cattle on the drive this spring that ever left Texas. The past week the meeting of the Colorado Central Wool Growers' association took place at Colorado Springs. A good number of the representative wool growers of El Paso, Bent and Douglas counties were present, and those in attendance represented not less than 100,000 sheep, and possibly \$250,000 in valuation. HORSE - TAMER'S GAME STRUGGLE. Professor Gleason conquers a Kicking Gelding in less than Two Hours. New York Morning Journal: The usual good-sized crowd attended Professor Gleason's horse-training entertainment at the Theatre last night. The theatre last night to watch the changing of a man's best four-legged from a savage, intractable brute into a docile and obedient helper.

The first subject brought into the white-covered arena last night was a beautiful sorrel thoroughbred gelding from the trainer's riding academy at Hoboken. The trouble with this horse was his great objection to being shod. After a preliminary handling during which the white legged sorrel showed himself very nervous and rather intractable, Professor Gleason called out to see if the owner was in the building. He was answered from the front gallery and the ownership of the horse, his character and the fact that the trainer had never seen him all certified to. The teacher was about to commence the educating process after offering \$5 to any one who would come in and lift the horse's foot, when several gentlemen in the audience called out that they had both ridden and shod the horse, then in the ring. The audience was wild in a moment—it looked like a big exposure. Gleason was equal to the occasion and called out that he had handled the horse and that the horse couldn't be ridden or driven, but that he couldn't be shod. "A horse of this kind," he said, "I will give twenty-five dollars," pulling out a big roll of bills, to any one who would come in this ring and lift up any one of his animal's feet. After a little practice the gelding was thrown and great applause after a desperate struggle and after offering \$5 to any one who would come in and lift his front feet raised, but when his hind feet were raised by means of a rope around a wooden pin bound into his tail, the horse stood up and after a few vigorous kicks was never seen. Several new holds had to be taken before he could be conquered. The herd of 3,500 head will be driven to Colorado.

A Welcome Rain.

While there has been generally plenty of rain throughout the southwestern portion of the state for good grass growth, some certain localities have been missed and suffered severely from drought, and in nearly all sections stock water has been scarce.

The San Antonio Cattle Market.

Strictly speaking, the above heading is a satire. There has been no San Antonio cattle market for some time. There are plenty of sellers, but they don't want to sell bad enough to sell at the price offered.
