Denton, Texas, April 30—Three Byers students of Denton Teachers College have been placed on the honor roll of the college, being among the highest 13% scholastically of the 1883 students enrolled, according to P. E. McDonald, Registrar.

There are approximately 200 students listed on the honor roll, with one student making six A's, four making five A's, five making four A's and one B, 19 making three A's and two B's and the remaining honor students making an average grade of B and above.

Mr. Jones made three A's and two B's, placing him in the upper three per cent of the student body in scholarship. CAPITOL NEWS LETTER

Navy Appropriation Bill

Tuesday, April 23rd, the House began its debate on the \$460,000,000 Navy Bill. This bill follows the example of the Army Appropriation in that it is one of the largest ever proposed during peacetime. The Chairman of the Subcommittee explained this in part in presenting the bill to the House by stating that the present



troubled European situation is creative of an occasion for alarm. The debate continued Wednesday and Thursday and finally passed Friday without a record vote. However, the sentiment for the bill was expressed in the vote of 289 to 56 defeating a motion to recommit and reduce the total by 20%. This is the largest Navy Appropriation in more than ten years, exceeding last year by \$172,000,000. The "Big Navy" men's dream of a treaty Navy seems to be a great deal nearer now. As Passed the measure authorizes the laying down of 24 new vessels. It also calls for the purchase of 55 new planes and an increase in personnel to 93,000, or 11,000 more than at present. There is also a provision for the enrollment of 500 additional cadets in the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis.

Works Relief Program

A majority of the interest of official Washington has, for the past week, been centered around the Administration that the President is setting up to handle the expenditure of the \$4,880,000,000 appropriation recently passed. The foundation seems to have been completed and the "Big Three" of this administration have been indicated—Frank C. Walker, former Treasurer of the Democratic Party; Secretary of Interior, Ickes; and the Director of the Federal Emergency Relief Administration, Hopkins. All applications will be sent to Walker first and a complete report on the necessity, practicality, and legality of each project will be made. This report will then go to the Allotment Board, which is to be headed by Ickes. The method of financing is to be determined by this board and the whole then submitted to the President for his approval, revision, or rejection. After this action has been completed, the project, if approved, will be returned to the appropriate government agency. At the same time a copy goes to Hopkins who will be in charge of the operations. It will be his task to see that the supplies are purchased, that persons on the relief rolls are employed, and that the proper speed and progress are maintained. This set-up, it seems, will adequately carry out the President's expressed purpose of spending the huge amount as rapidly and efficiently as possible.

Adjusted Service Certificate Payment

The Senate has been having quite a bit of trouble in considering the payment of the balance due on the Adjusted Service Certificates. To begin with, the Finance Committee of the Senate completely disregarded the Patman Bill which was passed and sent over by the House. It also forgot all about the Vinson

Plans to run special trains from the various farming states have been made. The Texas train leaves May 12th arriving in Washington May 14th. The train leaves Washington the evening of the 15th and arrives in Texas on the 17th. Two full days will be spent in the Capital thus giving the delegates plenty of time to transact their business and do some sight seeing.

A. A. Gainous of Byers was elected Clay County Delegate and J. B. Davis of Bellevue was elected alternate. The expenses of the trip are to be borne by the association and the reservation has already been made. The expenses for the trip amount to not exceeding \$100.00 and any interested farmer or land owner is welcome to make the trip. Reservations must be made by May 5th and interested parties should see the County Agent for particulars.

Bill which the House Committee reported out and substituted for both the compromise bill of its Chairman. However, no provision seems to have been made for the expense of this bill, variously estimated at five to six hundred million dollars, and this will probably have to be worked out before any definite action is taken. Secretary Morgenthau cast a critical eye over the estimated expenditures and hurriedly suggested an increase in revenue to care for the expense. His proposal was to increase greatly the inheritance taxes and is in keeping with the attitude of every Secretary of the Treasury since the World War whenever any legislation has been pending for the soldiers, and his estimates are about as accurate as those of his predecessors.

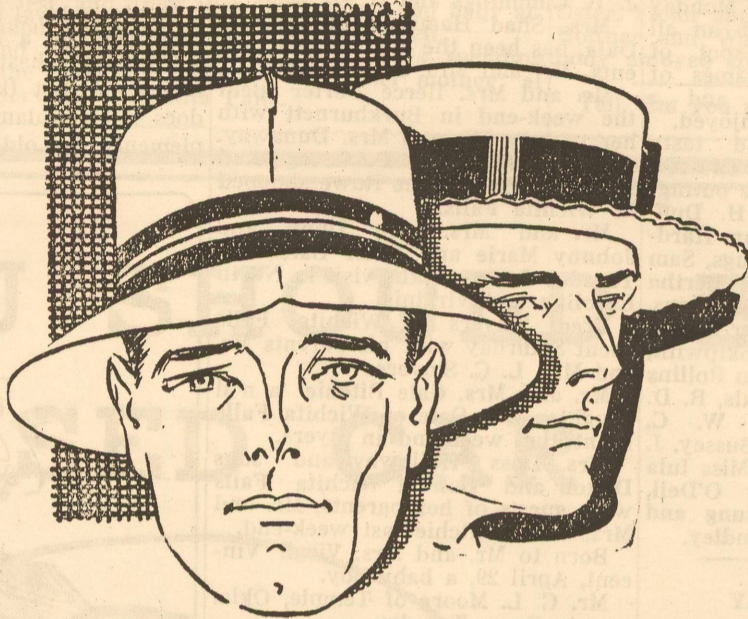

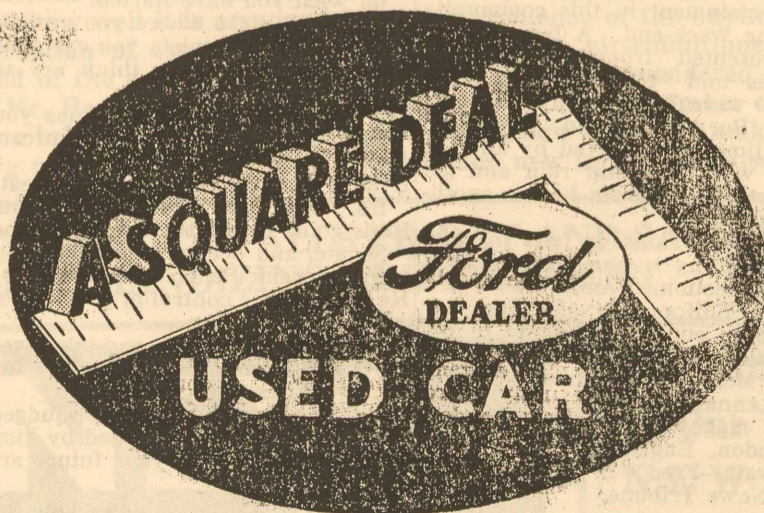

Bring to boil and mash with potato masher and cook 10 minutes stirring constantly, strain pulp and add to each cup of pulp one cup of sugar, stir until dissolved, pour into sterilized Ball Jars, and paraffine and seal. Hot or cold.

FRENCH GOOSEBERRY RAISIN AND APPLE CONSERVE

2 cups gooseberries, grapes or pineapple.
1 cup raisins, dates or prunes.
1/2 cup apples.
1/2 cup nuts
3 cups sugar.
Cook until mass is thick, stirring to prevent burning. Seal in hot sterilized Ball Jars.

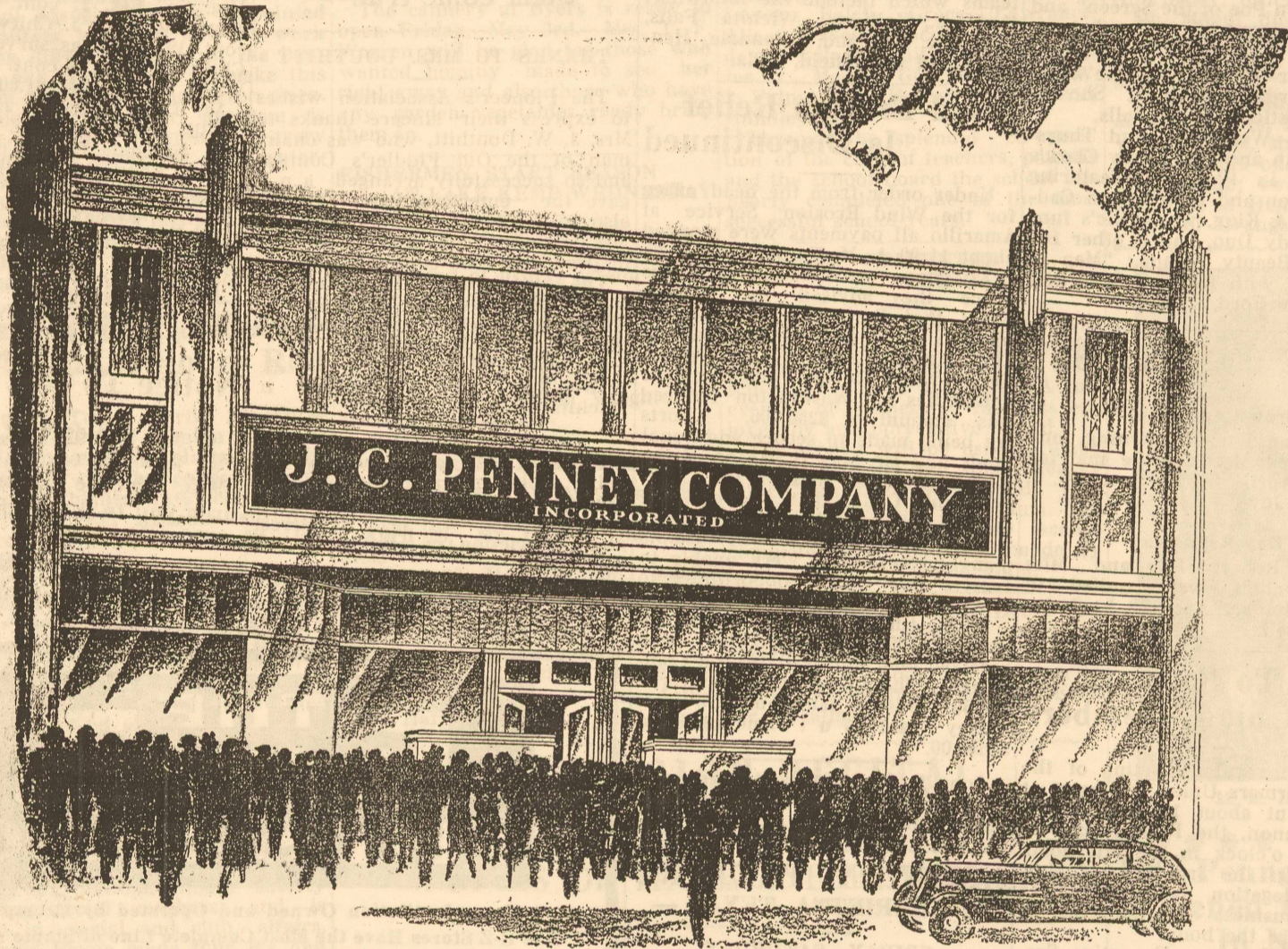

**Wind Erosion Relief
Is Discontinued**

Under order from the head office for the Wind Erosion Service at Amarillo all payments were stopped about 11:00 A. M. Tuesday April 30. In a phone conversation with this office they advised the County Agent that the funds appropriated for this work had been exhausted. The original allotment of funds for Texas was \$750,000; however the authorities in Washington reduced this amount to \$250,000. Efforts are being made to secure additional funds and Mr. Ray G. Heard of the Relief Office has assured the County Agents Office that we will be advised immediately. Should these funds be received it will enable many farmers who were unable to receive this benefit opportunity to secure this relief.

At the time this program was stopped 295 applications had been received and approved by the Committee. These applications covered 26,759 acres of land and the total money paid out amounted to \$2657.00.
