Shamburger, owner of the known Shamburger Lumber Lamber Company, Inc., has purchastots in Henrietta and will soon begin he erection of office building and lumber sheds for putting in his ond retail yard in Clay county. Mr. Shamburger has owned and operaced a lumber yard in Byers for a number of years and told this re-perf for The Leader Wednesday afternoon that he sees a bright future for Henrietta and Clay coun-ty and has decided to put in his

Mr. Shamburger purchased the half block owned and operated he etofore by Mr. James Henry for his grain and feed store and wagon yard and which brick building has used for some time for high ol band practice room. He also hased the lot owned by Rex M. Gates and which Mr. Gates has been using for his Used Car lot. He has also been figuring with Mr. J. B. Oheim on the purchase of his lots to the north of the Gates lot, but they have not yet reached agreement. Should he purchase these lots from Mr. Oheim he stated to lots from Mr. Oheim, he stated to this reporter he would improve the entire block, using it for his new

lumber yard. Mr. Shamburger informed us that he was submitting plans of his pro-posed venture to the city authorities for their approval since these lots are in the fire zone and structures erected in this zone must meet certain requirements. He stated he anticipates no trouble in this in-stance, for he wants his entire plant to be as near fire-proof as it is possible to build such a yard.

Mr. Shamburger says that it will e April 1st before he can secure the Henry brick building, but will begin improvements as quickly as he gets possession and hopes to have his retail lumber yard in full operation by April 15th.




