If they show signs of body lice give examination at Dallas in photo and them a duting at the same time. Worming rids them of internal parasites and dusting of oxfernal parasites. Then feed them properly to restore them to maximum production for the winter.

In feeding for production it is a good idea to feed about four pounds of soaked oats per hundred birds about 7:00 A. M. Feed a wet wash at noon. The wet mash should not be over-fed Give them what they can clean up in about 20 on 30 min. can clean up in about 20 or 30 mincan clean up in about 20 or 30 minutes. This usually equals three this dry weight of feed to 100 birds. During the afternoon dry mash may be put out. The dry mash should be kept before them at all times. M. whole grain should be fed in quantities of about one gallon per hundred birds early and increased to about five quarts in the winter.

When birds have open access to grain, two desirable feeding are:— Mash composed of 100 fbs of 36% concentrate to 50 pouunds of shorts. Two pounds of alfalfa hay (soaked over night) per one hundred birds.
