Fifty local business men and individuals have already signed to sponsor one or more boy or girl in this Poultry Improvement Program, and fifty boys and girls have agreed to receive the chicks and furnish all the feed and return three birds to the Poultry Show next fall.

Bowen Markers For The Graves

"The grave of John W. Bowen, early Confederate soldier to settle in the Shannon community in Clay County and who was buried in the Antelope Cemetery in Jack County following his death in 1916, will soon be marked with a government granite marker according to advise received by his son, E. E. Bowen of Antelope. The marker was secured for Mr. Bowen by Judge R. E. Sparkman of Italy, Texas who has devoted almost five years to this work in Texas, resulting in hundreds of unmarked and poorly marked Confederate graves being properly marked by these government markers which are provided without cost by the government. Approximately 20 graves have been marked during the last six months in Jack County and as many in Wise County. No doubt there are a number of graves of Confederate soldiers in Clay County in need of one of these beautiful markers of granite or marble and Judge Sparkman will be glad to assist any one knowing of such a grave. Mr. Sparkman states that it is a debt we owe to those who fought in the Southern Confederacy and that every grave should be preserved by placing one of these markers at the place. The government provides the marker and the freight is paid to deliver them. In writing give all facts possible as to the soldier's service record.

6 Wartime Lighting Suggestions

Wartime sight needs ample light! A recent survey indicates that people are using their eyes in the home 20 per cent more these days than a year or so ago. The timely suggestions below will help you to have better light in your home with a minimum of trouble or expense.

1. Clean lamp bowls and lamp bulbs frequently. You'll get 25% to 30% more light from the lamps you have.
2. Use white shades or shades with white linings. Repaint them or reline them if necessary. Dark shades waste light.
3. Sit close enough to the lamp to get all the help it can give your eyes. A difference of a few inches may mean 50% less light.
4. Avoid direct glare from lamp bulbs or bowl, by using shades that are deep enough and big enough.
5. Arrange lamps and furniture so each lamp can serve two or more people, if possible.
6. Place each lamp so it puts no glare in the eyes of persons using it.

ANNUAL REPORT TO TELEPHONE USERS

A Summary of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company's 1942 Annual Report, Recently Issued

"PEARL HARBOR" was only three weeks old as 1942 started, but already the telephone system had felt the first of war's pressing demands.

Most metals vital to war are also vital to telephone service. During the year we were able to get, for example, only a tenth of the copper normally needed.
