W. E. Elder Insane.

On last Wednesday W. E. Elder, whose home is seven or eight miles west of Tahoka, was tried on a charge of lunacy and adjudged insane. Chained and in charge of a keeper, he is now confined in a room of the court house waiting to be taken to an insane asylum.

All day Monday Elder sat on the grand jury, then in session and of which he was a member, and although he had but little to say, no one suspected his condition. He was seen in Tahoka at about one o'clock that night by B. F. Nicks who held a conversation with him but noticed nothing wrong in his talk. On Tuesday morning he was nowhere to be found and very early in the day his little boy came in after a physician saying he had shot himself at his home with a Winchester.

Dr. Windham, accompanied by R. D. Morris and the News man, went to the scene at once, and found that the bullet had all but missed its target, the skin on the right side of the head just above the temple being broken as the only result of the attempt at self-destruction. Elder became violent soon after their arrival and it frequently required the combined efforts of the three men, assisted by Lane Williams who lived at Elder's to keep him on the bed. It was finally decided to bring him to Tahoka and Sheriff Doak and Mr. Wells having arrived, he was placed in a wagon with their assistance and brought here where he was adjudged insane the following day as above stated.

Although the fact was not generally known prior to this attack, Mr. Elder's mind was affected about three years and a half ago, just after his recovery from a severe spell of sickness. He did not become violent then, however. It is thought that his condition is partly due to an old wound on the head, caused by being struck with a rock when a boy.

His family, consisting of a wife and several children, have the sympathy of every one in their misfortune.—Lynn County News.

Amarillo-Lubbock Railroad.

Amarillo, Texas, July 17.—(Special.)—The construction of the Amarillo-Lubbock railroad is an assured fact as the land owners along the route stand ready to make liberal donations and Major Gordon and his associates have arranged for means with which to build the road.

C. L. Tallmadge of the Southwestern Emigration Bureau of Chicago, E. B. Stahlman, formerly vice president of the Louisville and Nashville Railway Co., and D. C. Buntin of the Nashville Realty company of Nashville, Tenn., associates of Major Gordon in the enterprise, will meet him in Amarillo, July 18. They will arrange for active prosecution of work on the road. A corps of surveyors are now in the field and no time will be lost in the construction of the

line.

Major Gordon has been devoting his time to this proposition for almost a year and considering it is presidential year and capital is timid, deserves great credit for the success he has achieved.—Ft. Worth Record.

Amarillo-Lubbock Railroad.

Amarillo, Texas, July 19.—(Special.) A corps of surveyors are at work on the Amarillo-Lubbock railway route. The land owners will donate liberally to the road, and there will be no delay in the construction. E. C. Gordon, the promoter, has secured the means necessary for its completion.

E. B. Stahlman, formerly vice president of the Louisville and Nashville Railway Company; D. C. Buntin of the Nashville Realty Company, and C. L. Tallmadge of the Southwestern Emigration Bureau of Chicago are now here in the interest of the proposed road.—Dallas News.

Jim Kelby Caught.

It will be remembered by our readers that on Wednesday of

last week, while all our officers were down at the barbecue grounds, that Jim Kelley, who was held here under charge of horse theft, broke jail and got away.

Sheriff Merrell made a thorough search but could find no trick of the missing man. A few days ago Mr. Merrell received word that a man resembling Kelley was seen on Rough creek near Martin Reep's in the northeast part of the county. Sheriff Merrell and Deputy Sheriff Wilson started at once for the place and were soon on his trail. After several hours hard riding Deputy Sheriff Wilson found his man, who had been captured by Deputy Sheriff Love of Stonewall county.

Kelley stated that he had not tasted food from the time he broke jail until he was caught, just one week, and his amaciated condition bore him out in his statement. He was unarmed and almost given out when found on Rough creek in Stonewall county. He is now safely lodged in jail.—Coming West.

Another Story of Disaster.

Japs Reported to Have Lost 4,000 Men in Destruction of Captured Fort.

Chefoo, July 19.—A junk with eight Russians and fifty Chinese arrived here this afternoon, 5 days from Port Arthur. The Russians refused to talk, but the Chinese say that on July 11 and 12 the Japanese captured and occupied with 4,000 men, one of the eastern forts near Port Arthur. Before reinforcements arrived the Russians cut off the 4,000 troops in the fort and exploded mines, which resulted in the killing of every Japanese soldier there.—Dallas News.

Brownfield The Capital.

The town of Brownfield is situated 1 1-2 miles of the center of Terry county, and was chosen for the county seat at the special election, June 28.

While the town is not very large at present a bright future lies before it. A number of residences and business houses will be erected in a very short time, and Brownfield being the county seat will soon be a beautiful little city. About one third of the town section, where the town is located, is hard land, which makes it a more beautiful place for a town site. There is a draw running on the south side of town, which is of great benefit to the town, giving it a drainage for the waste of the town to be cleared. On the south side of the draw the land is of a red sandy loam with clay foundation. This land is fine land for orchards and gardens.

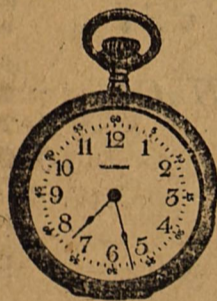
