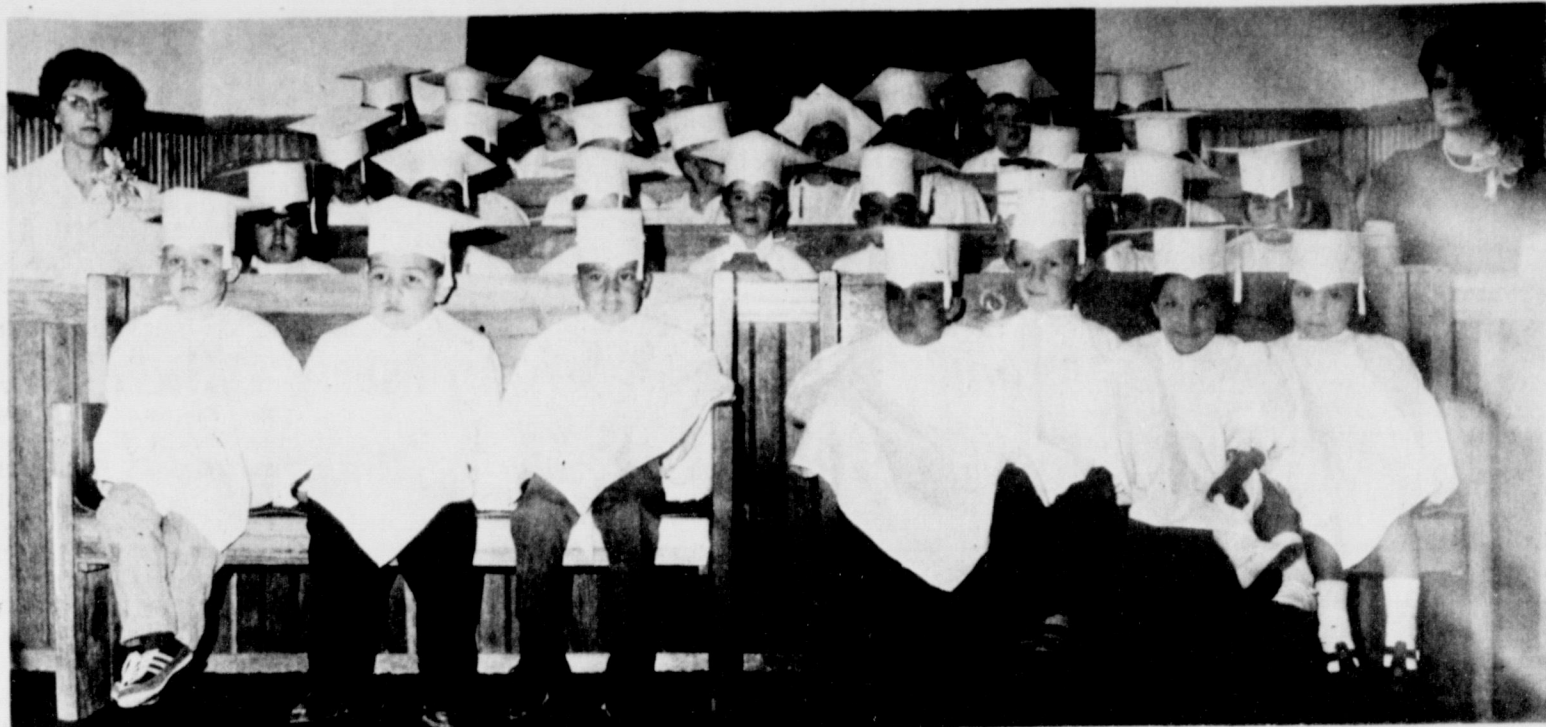

Dear Editor:

Speaking for the voting majority who voted "For" the hospital district for Bailey County and surrounding trade territory, I think, as probably many others did, its which side of the fence you wish to look over and how you wish to look.

I agree that our free enterprise system, which has built the greatest nation on the face of the earth, may be affected in this project by a small degree, however, I do not agree that in voting for the project that we sold our birthright in this deal.

This needed facility for our community is not totally financed by the government, nor will it be federally controlled. Some projects within our community have been totally financed by certain federal agencies and some of these projects weren't needed nearly as much as this one.

Furthermore, I would be one of the first to know that many patients have been lost in our community because of inadequate hospital facilities; many have survived who were still alive when they reached a hospital that was properly equipped and staffed.

We have lost some fine doctors to other communities, also some fine doctors by death due to overwork.

Many fine medical graduates who come from poor families and are not financially able to build a clinic or hospital are naturally forced into areas where facilities are available.

I am wondering if the "silent majority" refuses to accept any government aid, for fear of losing their freedom, and how much income the "silent majority" receives in ASC payments, from REA, co-op telephones and others.

It seems to me the recent disasters at Clarendon, Plainview and Lubbock should be convincing enough that we need to update our hospital facilities.
