

Area Damage **Toll Heavy**

At Friona, Missouri Beef damage, with part of the roof of the facility reported blown away and a number of cars heavily damaged by flying debris. Two women were said to have sustained minor injuries in the debris.

Two trailer parks in Friona were damaged with completely destroyed and several other trailer homes blown over onto their side or top. A \$50,000 grain dryer at Friona Wheat Growers was reported to be scattered across the countryside and a lot of tree, roof, window and sign damage was reported.

It was estimated that the hard, straight gale force wind that hit Friona was more than 115 miles per hour.

The Hereford Sheriff's office said wind was estimated 115-117 miles per hour in that city. This was based on parked 4,700 pound patrol cars sliding off the road, said the sheriff's office spokesman. Hereford received minor damage in the storm.

Crop rotations are important when using AATREX. Cotton, 00 made payable without soybeans, vegetables and sugar beets may be severely damaged or killed if planted on the same land the following year. Reduce residues by using band treatments over the row rather than total spray coverage.

The cheapest chemical for controlling annual and perennial broadleaf weeds in grain sorghum is 2,4-D. However, Metzer emphasizes that this herbicide should be used with caution since sorghum varieties with wheatland parentage are easily damaged by 2,4-D. Nearby cotton or vegetables can also be severely damaged from

spray drift. Treat sorghum after the plants are at least six inches tall but before the boot stage. Weeds of various sizes can be killed but results can be slow. Minimize spray drift by using high gallonage (20 to 40 gallons per acre) and low pressure and spraying when winds are less than 10 miles per hour. Vapor drift can also be reduced by using low volatile formulations such as amines or lithium salt, Ester formulations should not

grain sorghum. According to Metzer, Banvel also gives effective control of small annual and perennial broadleaf weeds. However, severe lodging and head blasting can occur if the herbicide is applied later than 25 days after planting or after head development has started, Reduce sorghum injury during later applications with an improvised shield to keep the chemical off the plant, especially the whorl

Although Banvel is not as toxic to cotton as 2,4-D, it can cause severe damage to soybeans and vegetables. Follow similar spray precautions with Banvel as with 2.4-D.

Karmex gives excellent control of carelessweeds that emerge after late irrigation in 15-inch or taller grain sorghum. This herbicide produces no soil residue and can also be used in six-inch cotton to control carelessweeds.

Metzer recommends that producers select the best possible herbicide for the job at hand. Read label instructions thoroughly and then follow them

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
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
