#### Uncle Sam's Appeal to Farmers

Have you volunteered? Uncle Sam has asked his 50,000,000 farmers to enlist and fill up the ranks. Old men, young men, women, children, girls, maiden aunts and widows, can join this army. What does Uncle Sam want them to do? Just simply plant every acre possible, the fence corners, ditch banks, hill sides, bottoms and prairies, to food plants, and cultivate them well, then carefully harvest and store every grain.

The fact of the business is, our Uncle has declared war against the War Lords of Germany and Austro-Hungary (not the common people of these nations) and is asking for an army of 500,000 arm bearing soldiers and \$5,000,000,000 cash to take some of the starch and conceit out of the Hollernzollerns and Hapsburgs, in cooperation with the other democratic nations of Europe.

Now then, in order to feed and make good fighters out of this army, he wants another army of 50,000,000 farmers to produce something for them to eat. No starving soldier can fight well. It was starvation and not guns that whipped the South as any Civil War Veteran, North or South will tell you. Besides all this, if we don't give more attention to food producing plants and less to cotton in the South, some body is going to get hungry next year, right here at home.

Terry county can play a very important part in this army. Two years ago, and the year before it was estimated that Terry shipped 100 cars of corn, and at we only had about 200 farmers in the country. With the present farming population, we can easily triple, or even quadruple this record by raising plenty of

corn, maize and kaffir to safely run us, and ship four or five hundred cars of food where it is needed.

If it is impossible for you to join the arm bearing army, you can get in this huge army without physical examination, and the part you play will get the same commendation from your Uncle Sam that the heroes do who come marching home after this horrible war is over. We have been forced in this war by the autocrats of Europe, but let's give them the best in our shop. All the fight needs to be taken out of them for centuries to come.

If you plant cotton at all, make it a secondary matter. Food is what the world needs most and is what they must have. Are you ready to volunteer in Uncle Sam's Farm Army?

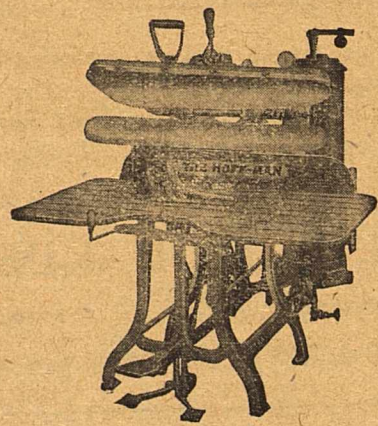

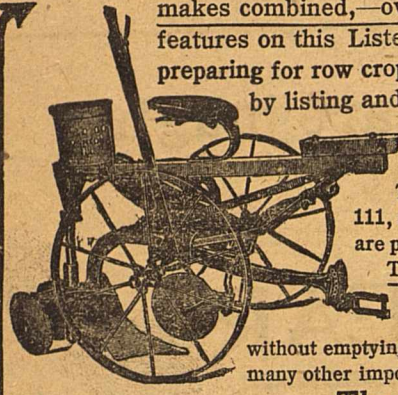

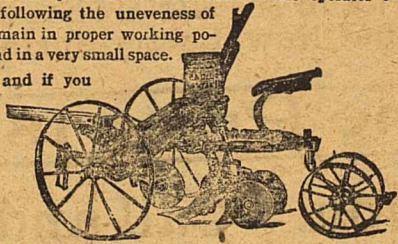
