

#### LET DEMOCRATS THINK

Now the multimillionaires of America are planning for direct action should the Republican party win the presidency. The Chamber of Commerce of New York has adopted resolutions favoring repeal of the excess profits tax and the surtax on incomes and reduction of the inheritance tax, and proposing as compensation a consumption or stamp tax on all purchase of more than \$1, which it was estimated would yield about \$600,000,000 a year. A tax system based on outgo rather than income was urged, in the belief that the present system opened the way of increased prices. The plan is simple. The New York Chamber of Commerce is in favor of removing the war taxes from the wealth of the country. Now why should the income tax be repealed? Why a purchase tax on the masses in order that the holders of swollen fortunes shall escape the payment of that which justly belongs to the government? Senator Smoot of Utah let loose the purchase tax plan last year. He did not originate the plan. It had its origin in Wall street. And now the New York Chamber of Commerce is behind the plan. Shall President Wilson and the national Democratic administration be repudiated to add grist to the political mill of the Smoots of the West and the holders of the swollen fortunes of the East? Let the Democrats of Texas do a little thinking.—Ft Worth Record.

#### EXPLAINING FOREIGN

#### EXCHANGE

Many readers fail to understand why the American dollar is worth so much more than other money in foreign exchange. To explain the matter it is not necessary to know all about high finance. Take the United States. We have one-third of the gold supply of the world, a metallic reserve of three billion dollars behind our four billion dollars in paper currency, our national wealth of 250 billion dollars is behind our debt of about 25 billion dollars. In contrast, Germany, whose mark is badly off, has practically no gold, being on a relative paper basis, owes 50 billion dollars with a national wealth of 80 billion dollars, faces heavy war indemnity payments and budget of 8 billion dollars yearly. Is there any mystery attached to the fact that American money is worth more in exchange for German money? The same reasons, in more or less degree, apply to all European nations.—Ex.

#### WHAT THE INTERCHURCH MOVEMENT IS TO DO

To raise funds in this county for the establishment and assistance of homes, hospitals and colleges in Texas and to carry out the forward movement of 22 denominations of Texas to assist in raising salaries of pastors and teachers for home and foreign mission and church work, a United Simultaneous Campaign will be put on by the Interchurch Movement in Texas April 25th to May 2nd. Official announcement was also made of the appointment of Dr. Newton P. Patterson, formerly Field Director of the Interchurch for Oklahoma and Texas, as State Campaign Director for Texas, with headquarters at the Adolphus Hotel, Dallas.

A State Training Conference for county workers will be held at the City Temple, Dallas, March 26th, at which 150 county leaders will be present for instruction. County mass meetings to stimulate the evangelical stewardship, life enlistment and missionary education program of the co-operating churches will be held in more than 120 Texas counties in one day's session, covering the period from April 5th to April 16th.

#### INCOME TAX UNPOPULAR

Considerable mutterings is heard about the iniquity of the income tax. Some men go so far as to insist that present day high prices are wholly due to it. They say for instance if a man owns a saw-mill, it may pay him to cut half a million feet of lumber but if he cuts more the government collects sixty percent of his income, hence he limits himself to half a million feet though the demands made upon him may call for a million feet. The same thing holds true in the manufacture of thousands of implements and tools; the average factory owner is simply not going to work for the government only, and when he sees that the government is going to get most of the profits of his labor, he simply curtails his output, and the price of his manufactured articles goes up. If this contention be true, and we have little doubt but it is, the income tax costs us a great deal more than it is worth, and it is getting time that it be revised.—Quannah Tribune Chief.






