SANTA CLARA, CAL.

Editor Eagle:
 As I promised I will try to
 give, for the benefit of yourself
 and readers, from time to time
 what I can learn of this country,
 its people, socially, educationally
 and religiously.

First of all the trip. We left
 Temple on the evening of 17th
 inst, as you and your readers
 are familiar with the country
 from Temple, Texas, to Newton,
 Kan, I will say nothing about it.
 From Newton to Dodge City is a
 beautiful country; flourishing
 cities, splendid farms, orchards
 and houses. At Dodge City time
 changes one hour faster, and a
 wreckid country begins. La Junta,
 in Colorado, we changed cars to
 Trinidad, a bold, naked stretch
 of country and lived only by
 numerous prairie dog towns,
 seemingly doing well from their
 activity and antics. On this
 stretch we saw the Spanish
 Peaks of the Rockies, fifty miles
 distant, though apparently quite
 near. At Trinidad we began the
 ascent of the Glarietta range of
 mountains, and reached Raton
 Pass at an altitude of 8000 feet
 and through a tunnel one-half
 mile long down the slope to Los
 Vegas. Night at this place. Next
 morning found us in New Mex-
 ico. Nothing in New Mexico we
 passed over but a dreary, bar-
 ren waste, only relieved by little
 towns for railroad purposes and
 dog towns. At La Guana, N.
 M., is a large Indian village or
 town, where all Indian matters
 are settled, dances, courts and
 other extras are disposed of.

Near this place 200 U. S. Caval-
 ary are stationed. Many Mexi-
 can villages are in this part of
 New Mexico and Arizona. Out-
 side of all Mexican and Indian
 dwellings are hung immense
 supplies of red pepper pods. At
 Flag Staff, Arizona, is the largest
 lumber and saw mill plant in the
 west also U. S. Territory Normal
 school. Next is Williams, Ariz-
 onia. We passed Williams,
 Arizona, at night; there time
 changed again one hour faster.
 At Needles we entered Califor-
 nia and over a distance of two-
 hundred-fifty miles of desert we
 dragged through to the base
 Techap mountain over which we
 climbed to an altitude of over
 four thousand feet and in going
 down the other side we made a
 descent of four thousand feet in
 twenty-two miles, passing
 eighteen tunnels and making
 what's known as the loop. At
 times four railroad tracks were
 visible, over which our train
 passed. Passing over this mount-
 ain is ooth awful and grand. At
 its base is the city of Bakers-
 field, a city of about ten thou-
 sand; its principal industry is oil.
 Ninety miles from there is
 Fresno, a city of about twenty-
 thousand; principal industry
 about this place is raisin grape
 culture. From there to Santa
 Clara, about two hundred,
 twenty-five miles, the country
 is broken and rugged with val-
 leys between the ranges of hills.


