A Visit to Star.

BOYS CORN CLUB.

The boys of the corn clubs of the county, together with a number of the older farmers, held a county convention here Wednesday and listened to good speeches and received a great deal of instruction and good advice from those in position to give valuable information.

Judge L. E. Patterson delivered an address of welcome to the convention and his remarks were evidently much appreciated and were heartily applauded.

Messrs. H. H. Williamson and M. T. Payne of the state demonstrating farming and corn club work, delivered fine and appreciated addresses and their talks will be of value to the boys and older farmers also, if the good advice and information is remembered and put into practical use.

After these speeches Capt. Frederick Opp, candidate for congress from the state at large, made a talk which was beneficial to his candidacy and interesting to his hearers.

The boys corn clubs formed a county organization and elected Hardie Fisher of Mullin, president; Dewey Swindle of Indian Gap, vice president; Earl Davis of Goldthwaite, secretary and treasurer.

After the convention the young men were invited to the ice cream parlor by Mr. R. L. Banks, county farm demonstrator, where they were treated to ice cream. Judge E. B. Anderson and Dr. M. L. Brown were present, by invitation of Mr. Banks, and carried the members of the clubs for an automobile ride over the city. The young men appeared to enjoy their meeting and entertainment and will probably hold another meeting here in the fall and perhaps sooner. It is expected that they will have some fine exhibits at the county fair to be held here some time during the summer.


Oratorical Contest.

Houston suffered a fire loss of \$1,000,000 in the business district Sunday morning. This is the second big fire in that city within the last few months.

There were two tragedies in Bell county Monday night. Will Hunt, formerly of Lometa, was shot and killed in Temple and at Pentleton C. C. McGee was shot and killed. It is thought Hunt killed himself.

The Republican nomination for president is still in the balance and the outcome is uncertain, although the advocates of both Mr. Taft and Mr. Roosevelt feel that their favorite is sure to win.

The women clubs of Indianapolis, Ind., have demanded of the mayor that a number of women be appointed to the police force, agreeing to serve without cost to the city. The mayor has ordered the chief of police to issue commissions to as many women as the clubs designate.

Predictions are freely made and in some of the political centers bets are offered that Wm. J. Bryan will be the Democratic nominee for president. It is thought by many that none of the candidates will secure a majority of the instructed votes and that Mr. Bryan will be the compromise candidate.

The state convention to send delegates to the national convention at Baltimore will meet in Houston next Tuesday. A large majority of the delegates to the state convention are instructed for Hon. Woodrow Wilson for President and it is expected that the Texas delegation to the national convention will be instructed for him, but "dead things sometime crawl."

The crest of the flood waters of the Mississippi passed into the Gulf, leaving in its wake a \$10,000,000 property damage, loss of life and the destruction of crop prospects for the coming year. The Passing of T. A. Lovelace.

In the death of Bro. Lovelace the town of Mullin has lost one of its best and most useful citizens, the Baptist church one of its most influential and exemplary members, his wife a true, considerate and affectionate husband, and his children a loving, provident father.

He was born in the state of Illinois May 26, 1838; moved to Fannin county, Texas, with his parents in 1846; went to California in 1850 and returned to Fannin county in 1874; moved to Indian Gap, Hamilton county, Texas in 1875, where he engaged in the mercantile business for fourteen years. His first marriage was to Miss Mira Price, August 14, 1879, of which union three children were born, all of whom are dead; his second marriage was to Mrs. M. V. A. Abaey, Dec. 11, 1884, and of this union five children were born, two of whom are dead, while three, Roy, Earl and Ina, together with his companion, survived him; united with the Baptist church at Indian Gap and was baptized by Rev. W. J. Hicks in August, 1888; moved to Mullin, Mills county, in July, 1896, where he engaged in the mercantile business again for several years; was ordained deacon of the Baptist church during his residence in Mullin; died of a complication of kidney and heart disease at the family residence in Mullin May 3, 1912. His funeral was conducted by A. R. Watson, assisted by Revs. L. L. Hays, R. D. Moon, L. J. Vann and G. W. Templin, after which his remains were tenderly laid to rest in Oakwood cemetery in the presence of a large concourse of admiring and grief-stricken friends.

During his last illness his sister, Mrs. Ella Gale, of Bonham, Texas, and the only surviving member of his father's family, was present and aided in ministering to his last wants. Thus is briefly told the history of one of God's most faithful and useful servants. His earthly career is ended, but his influence still lives. We shall sadly miss his genial face, his wise counsel and his liberal aid, but notwithstanding our loss, we bow in humble faith to the will of Him who doeth all things well, and in the light of divine inspiration see the rainbow of promise spanning the darkness of the grave and disclosing a bright and glorious immortality.

MUCH SPEAKING.

Prominent Candidates Make Known Their Desires and Intentions.

HOGG ORGANIZATION FOR EDUCATION

The Organization for the Enlargement of Higher Education has been formed and has been endowed under the auspices of the Alumni Association of the University of Texas. The organization and its endowment having been accomplished largely through the efforts of Mr. Will C. Hogg, of Houston, the son of the late Jas. Stephen Hogg, who himself, during the latter years of his life, was greatly interested in higher education and expressed the purpose of conducting in person a state-wide campaign in behalf of an adequate and dependable financial support of all the State institutions of higher education and for their permanent removal from the domain of factional and partisan politics. Hence the organization is popularly referred to as the Hogg organization.

The institutions of higher education comprehended in the work of the Hogg organization, each getting equal consideration, are the four State Normal schools, the College of Industrial Arts, the Agricultural College, and the University of Texas. The common public schools rural and urban, and the private, endowed and denominational schools will also be accorded generous aid and assistance in their efforts at improvement.

Mezes, Austin; Clarence Ousley, Fort Worth; George A. Robertson, Dallas; R. L. Batts, Austin; W. H. Burges, El Paso; John W. Hopkins, Galveston; F. C. Proctor, Beaumont. Advisory Committee—S. P. Broock, Waco; Will C. Hogg, Houston; F. M. Bralley, Austin; Frank Kell, Wichita Falls; C. Lobardi, Dallas; E. O. Lovett, Houston; Charles Schreiner, Kerrville; Ed. C. Lasater, Fallfurrias. Educational campaign committee—F. M. Bralley, Austin; Charles Puryear, College Station; W. B. Bizzell, Denton; R. B. Cousins, Canyon; S. E. Mezes, Austin; S. P. Brooks, Waco; Lee Clark, Austin; F. M. Bralley, being the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, was chosen Executive Secretary of the organization and of the Educational Campaign Committee.

It is the purpose of the Hogg Organization to encourage by all legitimate means the enlargement of the institutions of higher education in Texas, and thereby to increase the volume and the quality of the service rendered to the people by such institutions and to remove them from the domain of factional and partisan politics. In this laudable undertaking all patriotic, ambitious Texans should unite.

Each of the higher educational institutions is in great need of more and better buildings, of a larger supply of well-trained and capable teachers, and of enlarged laboratory and library equipments. Education is fundamental to the welfare of the Commonwealth. It is the basis and hope of happiness, efficiency and prosperity for the individual, for the community, and for the State. No greater or more important work could be undertaken for the State, and the men in charge of the movement command the confidence of the people and give strong hope of achieving great things for education in Texas.

County Seat Election.

It is stated on good authority that if the center of the county is found to be more than five miles from Goldthwaite an election will be demanded by those who favor moving the county seat to Mullin, but if the center is found to be within five miles of this city a two-thirds majority would be required to move the county seat and the election will not likely be called. Goldthwaite people feel confident that the center of the county will be located about three miles northwest from this city, but if it should be found to be further away than five miles and, therefore, require only a majority vote to move the county seat the people here have no uneasiness as to the result of an election on the question, should such election be held.
