County Center Investigation.

The county center location has been the subject of some interest this last week, or rather there has been renewed interest in the matter because of a mass meeting held at Mullin last Saturday, when Judge Wilkerson and Surveyor Ragsdale of Brownwood were employed to look after the interest of the prosperous and enterprising city of Mullin in locating the center of the county. The gentlemen named went to Austin the first of the week and consulted with the commissioner of the general land office relative to the matter, but he was entirely satisfied with his former calculation and refused to change his certificate locating the center a short distance from Goldthwaite, so the Eagle is informed. As this city is within five miles of the county center it would require a two-thirds vote to move the county seat and as there is no appeal from the ruling of the land commissioner it is not likely a county seat election will be held, as very few people believe two-thirds of the voters would favor moving the county seat from Goldthwaite.

Three Lusty Children Burn to Death

The most destructive and heart-rending fire in the history of San Saba county occurred at the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Lusty in the Wallace community last Friday afternoon about five o'clock. The house burned down and three of the children burned to death. One of the children was not rescued from the flames at all, another died a few hours later and the third the next morning. The three children were a boy nine years old, a little girl five and a smaller boy only three and a half years old. The children wanted to help get supper. The daughter was kneading dough for bread and the boys were kindling the fire in the stove, using kerosene oil in kindling. The mother was in the living room. In some unknown way the oil caught fire and exploded. It is believed that the explosion of the oil killed the little girl instantly. This theory accounts for the fact that the others ran out and she was buried just at the spot where she was standing when the explosion took place.—San Saba News.

Higher Education.

Prof. C. W. Foote of Denton, who spoke at the Baptist church Wednesday night on "Education" is certainly in one of the grandest movements of the age. Synopsis of Platform.

Not only did the national Democratic convention act wisely and well in the selection of the standbearers for the party in the campaign, but adopted a platform that will be pleasing to a great multitude of American people and beneficial to the entire country. The Eagle cannot give the entire platform, because of the lack of space that can be devoted to political matters, but we give herewith a synopsis of the splendid platform adopted by the convention and heartily approved by Col. Wm. J. Bryan and other leading Democrats as well as by Governor Wilson and Governor Marshall.

After a short preamble the platform declares the tariff revision to be of vital importance to the American people as a whole and demands an immediate "downward revision." Articles of trust manufacture or control and especially those articles that are sold in foreign markets at a lower price than in the home market should be placed on the free list. Promises tariff duties for revenue only and demands that there be no duties in excess of the actual necessities of the government and condemns the action of President Taft in vetoing the farmers free list and other reform tariff measures.

Declares in favor of the enforcement of the anti-trust criminal statutes as well as the civil law and promises such laws as will strengthen the present statutes to the extent that monopolies will be impossible in the United States. Condemns the action of the present administration in compromising with the oil trust, the tobacco trust and other trusts and its failure to invoke the criminal provisions of the anti-trust laws.

Declares for states rights and promises to protect the people from the interests which would make of the government a private asset rather than a public benefit. Favors the exercise of the government powers in interstate matters only where necessary.

Declares for presidential preferential primaries.

Pledges the party to the enactment of laws prohibiting corporations or individuals contributing to campaign funds beyond a reasonable amount.

Endorses the branch of the sixty-second congress controlled by the Democrats and challenges a comparison of its record with any session of congress where dominated by Republicans.

Denounces the extravagance of the present and previous administrations by the opposing party and pledges the Democracy to a reduction of expenses and the abolition of useless offices and salaries.

Favors the supervision and rate regulation of railroads, telegraphs and telephone lines and legislation that will prevent public service corporations from entering into business that brings them in competition with their patrons.

Condemns the practice of depositing government funds in the larger banks in the financial centers, to the exclusion of the smaller banks. Declares for the enactment of fair and just banking laws that will give the utmost security to the public. Pledges the party to the enactment of laws for the deposit of government funds by competitive bidding, regardless of the location of the banks.

Favors the investigation of agricultural credit societies in foreign countries, to ascertain if a system of rural credits may be

devised suitable to the conditions in the United States. Also promises government co-operation with the several states in the extension of training and teaching in agriculture.

Declares for the conservation of national resources and the development of the waterways. Holds that the control of the waters of the Mississippi river is a national problem and declares that the maintenance of the required depth for navigation by vessels and the building of levees to protect life and property should be given attention by the government.

Declares a purpose to uphold and maintain the dignity of the courts, but condemns the indiscriminate issuance of injunctions in industrial disputes. Pledges the party to the maintenance of a department of labor in the president's cabinet, which department shall include mines and mining.

Declares for laws to prevent the destruction and waste of the resources of the country and the proper preservation of the forests, minerals and waterways and to prevent such resources being absorbed by special interests and favored classes. Immediate action by congress is demanded to make available the vast coal deposits in Alaska and to prevent such deposits being seized by corporations and monopolies.

Declares for the speedy enactment of laws for the better protection of life and property on the high seas and favors the repealing of laws and treaties which allow the arrest of seamen for desertion or violation of their contracts of service with steamship companies. Favors the exemption from toll all of American ships engaged in coastwise trade passing through the Panama canal.

Favors the strengthening of the laws for pure foods, quarantine and vital statistics.

Declares that the civil service laws should be honestly and rigidly enforced, to the end that merit and not political affiliation should be the standard of effi-

ciency in the public service.

Reaffirms the party's declaration against imperialism in the Philippines or elsewhere and favors an immediate declaration of purpose to recognize the independence of the Philippines as soon as a stable government can be established, but favors retaining such land on those islands as will be necessary for coaling stations and naval bases.

Demands for Alaska the full enjoyment of rights and privileges of territorial forms of government.

Commends the action of the Democratic members of both houses of congress in compelling the annulling of the Russian treaty of 1832 and pledges the protection of the government to all citizens whether at home or abroad.

Favors the parcels post or postal express system and the extension of the rural delivery of mail.

Declares the people should control the government and pledges the party to the policies that will represent the whole citizenship of the nation, making of this in truth and in fact a government of the people, for the people and by the people.

A tornado struck the town of Regina, Sask, Canada, Sunday night and many dead and injured were left in its path, besides great property loss. The list of dead may reach 80 when a full search has been made of the ruins of the city.


BROWNWOOD

Evangelism From a Layman's Standpoint.

An essay read by G. W. Jackson before the Mills County Baptist Fifth Sunday Meeting, and published by request of that body.

Evangelism, as we understand the word, means a promulgation or spreading of the gospel of Christ, more especially by preaching. We find the word evangelism used three times in the new testament. In Acts 21: 8 mention is made of Phillip, who was one of the first seven deacons, as "the Evangelist." In Eph. 4: 11 we read, "He gave some apostles; and some prophets, and some evangelists; and some pastors and teachers." And in 2-Tim. 4: 5 Paul exhorts Timothy to do the work of an evangelist. It seems from the foregoing that the work of an evangelist differs from that of a pastor or teacher and that some persons are given special qualifications for this work; not that all pastors, and all Christians for that matter, should not be evangelists in some way, but that God has specially endowed some persons for this work. Phillip, who as before mentioned as a deacon, became an evangelist and went down to the city of Samaria and preached Christ unto them and the people gave heed to the things which he spoke, also the Eunuch was converted under his preaching. The church at Antioch was directed by the Holy Spirit to separate Barnabas and Paul for the work whereunto He had called them, and Paul became one of the greatest Missionary evangelists the world has ever known.

The question might arise why the need of evangelist work? First, we would say, because the world of mankind is lost and the only means of salvation is the knowledge of Christ through the gospel. In John 3: 18 we read, "He that believeth on Him is not condemned but he that believeth not is condemned already because he has not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God." If we could only realize this great gospel truth that the unbeliever is under condemnation and is only waiting the time God has given him in this world until he will be plunged into everlasting punishment unless he accepts Christ as his Savior; and when we realize that "the gospel is the power of God unto salvation," and that "it pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe," and Paul says, "how shall they believe on Him of whom they have not heard and how shall they hear without a preacher?" we can at once see the great need of this work. Again, it might be asked how can those who have not this special gift help in this work? In the same manner as they can in the work of the pastor, by upholding the preacher by their prayers, by their means and their influence. If we cannot do what Phillip, the evangelist, did when he joined himself to the Ethiopian Eunuch's chariot, take up the prophecies and preach Christ unto the lost, we may do what Andrew did when he had found the Savior, go and find a brother and bring him to Jesus, or Phillip, the Disciple, who went and told Nathaniel of the Christ and when asked if any good thing could come out of Nazareth replied, "come and see;" or the woman of Samaria to, whom Jesus talked at Jacob's well, went back to the City and said, "come see a man that told me all things I ever did; is not this the Christ?" and we are told that many believed on Him from the saying of the woman. Brethren, though we may not be able to preach like some of our great preachers, we can let our upright lives and Christ like examples influence the world to give attention to the gospel of Jesus Christ, which is the power of God unto Salvation to everyone that believes.

Mass Meeting Called.

On the day after our court house was burned I called a mass meeting of the people in Goldthwaite to get some expression from them as to the kind of court house they wished to build. This meeting was attended by representative citizens from all parts of the county, as district court had convened on that day. A large number of talks were made by business men, farmers and professional men. Everyone who spoke expressed the belief that we should build a fire-proof house large enough and substantial enough to meet our needs for many years to come. Some speaker suggested that such a house could be built for \$65,000 or \$75,000. At the close of the meeting, in order to have an expression from all present, I requested all who would approve the expenditure of \$75,000—if that much should be needed to build the house they want—to indicate such approval by standing. Practically all of the large audience stood. With this expression as a guide, we hunted for houses that could be built for about the sum of money indicated when the architects invited us to go with them to see some of their court houses.

Now, while the Commissioners Court is the official body that must make selections and contracts for the proposed building, it is a matter of too much importance to be left in the hands of any five men exclusively. It is to be a court house belonging to all of us alike. I have my personal views as to what would be the right kind of house, but have never expressed my views, as I think it improper to do so, since I am a member of the court that is to act for the people. It is my desire to make such selection and to contract for the building of such a house as the citizens of Mills county want. To the end that this may be done, I am hereby requesting the citizens of the county to meet in Goldthwaite on the 13th day of July to discuss the matter. I trust that every citizen will feel enough interest in this to come. The meeting will be called at 2 o'clock in the afternoon. Please make whatever sacrifice is necessary to be with us on that day, for we need your counsel in the important matter before us.

THE WANDERING DOLLAR

Wanderlust Spirit Seizes Texas Dollar.—\$200,000 Per Day Leaves State.

Money, by its close companionship with man, has acquired many of the characteristics of the human race, and one of its most pronounced is its disposition to wander. They probably "get the habit" by being chased by the tax assessor, in running from book-agents and dodging subscription lists. It is incomprehensible how a dollar seeking legitimate investment could voluntarily leave Texas where it is surrounded by such a magnificent array of splendid opportunities and search the wilderness and waste places for a livelihood where bulls and bears lie in wait for it and finally sleep in dens and hovels and tramp the financial highways when it might have remained at home and become a merchant, a banker or a captain of industry and have made frequent contributions towards churches, charitable institutions and the general welfare of the community.

Many a Texas dollar has contributed towards the comic literature of the day by choosing outside investments in preference to Texas properties, and the pride and business reputation of the family has suffered.

No data which could be considered as a reliable basis for an estimate is available, but those familiar with the general run of investment suggest that possibly a hundred thousand dollars per day leave the State seeking outside investment, a portion of which is permanent, the owner leaving with it. Our Federal Census Bureau discloses the fact that 80 people per day leave Texas and estimating that each person takes with him \$250 in property, we will have \$20,000 leaving permanently per day, giving us a balance of \$80,000 per day, subject to recall, as the owner still lives in Texas.

Many of our dollars, lured by the siren voice of speculators, have left Texas and formed unholy alliances with outside capital and must now, for a season, undergo the mental anguish of daily witnessing magnificent opportunities for investment go by in their native land.
