The directors of the Farmers Union Warehouse company held a meeting in this city Tuesday and transacted business preparatory to the opening of the warehouse and cotton yard for the season. Hugh Moorland will be the manager of the business again this season.

COMMISSIONERS COURT.

Court has been in session this week and has transacted considerable business, a great part of it being of a routine nature.

Two voting precincts were created, one at Rye Valley, between Nabors creek and Chadwick's mill, and the other at Ridge, west of the bayou, in what was formerly known as the Cold Springs community.

An election, was ordered to be held on Sept. 21 to authorize the issuance of \$55,000 in bonds to build a new court house. The bonds are to bear 5 per cent interest, to run forty years, with an option of taking up any or all of them after ten years.

The county tax levy was made the same as last year: General fund, 15c on \$100 valuation; court house fund, 5c on \$100 valuation; road and bridge fund, 15c on \$100 valuation. The occupation tax was made half of the amount levied by the state.

The name of Vinegar Hill school district was changed to Rye Valley.

The sum of \$7.50 was appropriated to pay the expenses of Miss Bettie Wilson to Comanche county, she being in indigent circumstances and desiring to go to her relatives in that county, where she made her home previous to coming to this county.

The result of the special tax election in Pompey school district was found to be 33 in favor of the tax and 15 against it.

A special tax levy for school purposes was made in each of the following school districts: A levy of 40c on \$100 valuation in Hanna Valley; 35c in Washboard district; 30c at Live Oak; 25c at North Brown, Trigger Mountain and Mount Olive; 20c at Williams Ranch, Evans, Cold Springs, Pompey, Nabors Creek, Rye Valley, Kelly, Cryer, Pickens, Center, Liberty, Fisher; 15c at Chesser Valley, Bulls Springs, Antelope Gap, Smith, Head, Star, Fairview; 10c at Blanket Springs, Long Branch, Center City, North Bennett, Big Valley, Gray and Bryant.

The application for a road in the Blue Hole neighborhood and one across the Cain ranch were both rejected.

The court had a petition for bounty on rabbit scalps under consideration yesterday. While nothing definite had been done, it appeared doubtful if the application would be granted.

Petitions for elections to increase the special tax for school purposes in Williams Ranch and Fairview districts were granted and the date for the elections fixed for Sept. 14. An election to levy a special tax for school purposes in Pleasant Grove school district was also ordered for Sept. 21.

ASSOCIATIONAL NOTES

The Mills county Baptists met at Big Valley in their annual Association Thursday night, August 8, with good representation from the different churches.

After an able sermon by Rev. A. R. Watson and all were dismissed the Lord smiled on us in a temporal way by sending us a drenching rain, after which some of us were thoroughly Baptist.

Friday morning dawned calm and cool and remained very conducive to the transaction of the varied business to come before the body. Interest and enthusiasm increased throughout the session and we feel that many deep and lasting impressions were made on those in attendance that will result in untold blessings to themselves and the churches which they represent.

As the number of copies of our minutes that we are able to have published is too small for any general distribution and thinking perhaps that some of our business items might be of interest to the general public, I submit here some extracts from our manuscript.

Among others we would mention the report on Ministerial Education. This report delves deep into the vital problem that confronts us of educating and fitting our young and worthy preachers who are financially unable to keep themselves in school. The report stresses the importance of a trained ministry and reports more than 500 preachers in Baptist schools during the past year, many of whom are unable to bear their personal expenses. At Baylor and the Seminary \$5,500 was spent on 75 worthy men. After a stirring address by L. R. Scarborough a small offering of \$15.85 was made toward the support of these young men.

The report on State Missions stresses that phase as the basis of all our work and reports more than 400,000 Baptists in Texas with more than 400 missionaries in the field and work laid out on a basis of \$135,000.

The employment of a suitable man as county missionary was urged by the report on Associational Missions.

Fifteen ordained and licensed ministers were reported in the county.

A very complete report on Buckner Orphans' Home was submitted after which an offering of \$23.85 was made toward the support of the home.

The report on Foreign Missions reports 848 missionaries, 342 churches, 422 Sunday schools, 9 womens' training schools with 312 students, 10 theological schools with 245 students, 13 medical missionaries with 51,796 patients treated last year, 4 publishing plants and 4,300 baptisms last year.

By no means least in importance is the report on temperance, the opening clause reads thus: "Temperance is a bible doctrine, and as one of the fruits of the Spirit, a cordial Christian virtue. Gal. 5-23; 2nd Peter 1-6. We should emphasize temperance in our church covenants, preach it in our pulpits, sing it in our songs, pray it in our prayers, live it in our lives, enforce it in our discipline and vote it in our political franchise."

The report on Sabbath desecration places us on record as opposed to all forms of Sabbath breaking. Also by resolution the body places itself on record as unalterably opposed to the great extremes and consequent evils to which our people are going in the base ball craze.

Each of the other reports deals with vital matters but space will not admit of further mention.

The above items are submitted to show to those not acquainted with our work that we are not standing idle, and feel that a better acquaintance with our practices will enlist greater sympathy for our work.

Besides the introductory sermon Thursday night by Bro. Watson we had a very able sermon Friday night from Rev. W. T. Rouse of Brownwood, from Colossians 1: 19-20 and Saturday night from Rev. J. D. Allen of Brownwood from Galatians 10: 7. Also the missionary sermon Sunday morning by Bro. Watson from 2nd Corinthians 5: 1-10.

The messengers and other visiting members feel grateful to the people of Big Valley for their hospitality and

KILLING AT SLACK CROSSING

J. B. Carter Shot and Killed—J. R. Slack Surrenders to Officers.

Yesterday morning about daylight Sheriff Priddy was summoned to the bayou bridge at Slack crossing, where a man had been shot and killed. The first report said a second man had been shot, but this last report proved to be incorrect.

Sheriff Priddy and Dr. Campbell hurried to the place in an automobile and found J. B. Carter, a stranger in this section, lying dead in the road. A number of citizens had gathered at the place by the time the sheriff arrived and the dead man was placed in a hack and brought to town, while J. R. Slack surrendered to the officer, admitting having fired the shot that caused the death of Carter. He was brought to town and placed in jail to await an examining trial, which will be held today.

The particulars of the tragedy and the difficulty leading to it were given without apparent reservation by Pearl Scott, a young man who was with Carter. He says that he and Carter came from Hazeldell, Comanche county to this section looking for cotton to pick. They had been to Willis mill fishing and had started toward Goldthwaite. They reached J. R. Slack's farm shortly before nightfall Thursday and after stopping there for a short conversation with Mr. Slack they drove across the bridge and pitched camp in the valley on the east bank of the bayou. He says that Carter awoke him sometime during the night to go with him to get corn for feed. They secured a sackful of corn from Mr. Slack's field and returning to camp went to sleep again. About daylight yesterday morning Carter again awoke him and told him to get up and prepare to move on. Just at this juncture Mr. Slack appeared carrying a shot gun and informed them that he intended to bring them to town and turn them over to the sheriff on a charge of

having stolen his corn. Carter announced that he would not come and reaching under his pillow drew out a Smith & Wesson revolver of large calibre and at this time the firing commenced. The shots from Slack's gun took effect in Carter's breast and he fell and died instantly, but Slack was uninjured. The revolver was found to have three empty shells in it, while both barrels of Mr. Slack's gun had been discharged.

Carter was 43 years old, but appeared several years younger. He leaves a wife and six children at Hazeldell and a brother, who is a rural mail carrier at Iredell. Sheriff Priddy communicated with the brother by phone yesterday and was instructed to have the body prepared for burial and ship it to Iredell last night and the instructions were obeyed.

Pearl Scott was placed in jail yesterday and will be held to await the result of the examining trial today.

Just one year ago a man was shot and killed in Mr. Slack's field, while depreddating upon the corn. Mr. Slack admitted killing the man and upon trial was convicted and given five years in the penitentiary. The higher court reversed and remanded the case and it will likely come up for trial at the next term of the district court at this place.

The fire was started by an explosion of gas in a tank car when a workman struck a match while making repairs on the tank. The man was terribly burned and otherwise injured.

The investigation into the killing of a gambler in New York and the confession of some of the parties to the crime reveals a horrible condition of affairs in the great metropolis. The police department is charged with being connected with the gamblers and it is claimed by one criminal's confession that the assistant chief was a partner with the man who was murdered.

The massacre of a company of soldiers and a number of passengers that were on board a train in Mexico Sunday, when the train was wrecked and the soldiers and civilians ambushed by revolutionists, was most savage and demands the attention of civilized nations. PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION SO AS TO AUTHORIZE THE GRANT OF AID TO INDIGENT AND DISABLED SOLDIERS AND SAILORS AND THEIR WIVES.

(S. J. R. No. 9) Senate Joint Resolution.

Senate Joint Resolution to amend Section 51, of Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize the grant of aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors and their widows, and to soldiers who served in the militia and in organizations for the protection of the frontier and their indigent widows, and to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for the indigent and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors, and such women as aided the Confederacy, and authorize a special ad valorem pension tax, and making appropriations for same.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 51, Article 3, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3. Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporation whatsoever; provided, however the Legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1900, and their widows in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide residents of the State of Texas since January 1, 1900, and who were married to such soldiers and sailors anterior to January 1, 1900; to indigent and disabled soldiers, who under special laws of the State of Texas, during the war between the states served for a period of at least six months in organizations for the protection of the frontier against Indian raids or Mexican marauders, and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas, who were in active service for a period of at least six months during the war between the States, to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances, and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1900, provided that the word 'widow' in the preceding lines of this section shall not apply to women born since 1861, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors their wives and widows, and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided for by law; provided, the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home.

The Legislature shall have the power to levy and collect, in addition to all other taxes heretofore permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a State ad valorem tax on property not exceeding five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate Army and Navy, frontier organizations and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia.

Sec. 2. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the State of Texas at the general election of State officers, in November, 1912. At which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: 'For the amendment to Section 51, Article 3, of the Constitution relating to increase of Confederate pensions;' and the voters, opposed to said amendment, shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: 'Against the amendment to Section 51, Article 3 of the Constitution, relating to increase of Confederate pensions.'

Sec. 3. The sum of \$5,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution.

Proposed Amendment To The Constitution Authorizing Cities of More Than 5000 Inhabitants To Adopt Their Charters By Vote Of The People.

(H. J. R. No. 10.) House Joint Resolution.

House Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to Section 5, of Article II, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing for cities of more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants to adopt their charter by a vote of the people.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article II of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. Cities having more than five thousand (5000) inhabitants may by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature, and providing that no charter or any ordinance passed under said charter shall contain any provision inconsistent with the Constitution of the State, or of the general laws enacted by the Legislature of this state; said cities may levy, assess and collect such taxes as may be authorized by law or by their charters; but no tax for any purpose shall ever be lawful for any one year, which shall exceed two and one-half per cent. of the taxable property of such city, and no debt shall ever be created by any city, unless at the same time provision be made to assess and collect annually a sufficient sum to pay the interest thereon and creating a sinking fund of at least two per cent thereon; and provided further, that no city charter shall be altered, amended or repealed oftener than every two years.

Sec. 2. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation, submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election held in this State, or in case any previous election shall be held in this State for other purposes, then this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the State. At such election, those favoring the amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words: 'For amendment to Section 5, Article II, of the Constitution, authorizing cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to adopt their charters by a vote of the people;' those opposing said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the words: 'Against amendment to Section 5, Article II, of the Constitution, authorizing cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to adopt their charters by a vote of the people.' The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much as is necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the Treasury of the State of Texas to pay the expenses of the publication of this amendment and the proclamation for the election.

Proposed Amendment To The State Constitution Providing That Members Of The Board of Regents Of The State University And Boards of Trustees And Managers Of The Educational, Eleemosynary And Penal Institutions Shall Be Elected Or Appointed For The Term of Six Years.

(H. J. R. No. 9.) House Joint Resolution.

An Act proposing an amendment to Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new section thereto, to be entitled "Section 30a"; providing that the members of the Board of Regents of the State University, and the boards of trustees or managers of educational, eleemosynary, and penal institutions of the State, and such other boards as have been, or may hereafter be established by law, may be elected or appointed for a term of six (6) years, one-third of the members of said boards to be elected or appointed every two (2) years, in the manner provided by law, fixing the time for holding the election and making the appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Article 16 of the Constitution be amended by adding a new section thereto, to be known as designated as "30a," and to read as follows:

Section 30a. And all voters opposed to said amendment shall have printed or written on their ballots the words: 'Against the amendment of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas, regulating the term of office of the Board of Regents of the State University, and other Boards of Trustees, or Managers, heretofore or hereafter established by law.'

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published, as required by the law of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of five thousand dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury, not otherwise appropriated, to defray the expenses of said proclamation, publication, and election.

The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to the qualified voters for members of the Legislature of the State of Texas at the next general election to be held in this State. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots 'For a six years' term for Prison Commissioners' and those opposed to the adoption of this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots 'Against a six years' term for Prison Commissioners.'

Sec. 3. The sum of three thousand dollars (\$3,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds of the State Treasury not otherwise appropriated to defray the expenses of publication of the Governor's proclamation submitting this proposed amendment.
