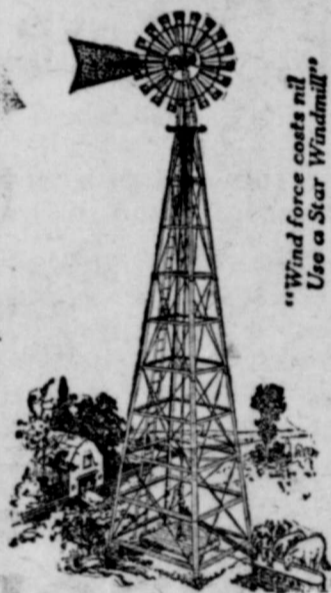

The city of Atlanta Ga., was swept by fire the first of the week, which destroyed a vast amount of property and caused immense financial loss. It started in a negro shanty and burned blocks of buildings.

The appearance of a submarine off the coast of California, outside San Diego harbor, the early part of the week caused great concern throughout the country. The boat was clearly seen by aviators and others.

Some of the speculators in food products who have fattened financially because of cornering the supply of food will likely have an opportunity to explain to the "food administrator" or some other governmental official.

Conserve the food supply in every way possible, not that the people of this country are in any danger of a famine or that there are "hard times" ahead, but because the people of Europe need the food supply we will sell and are willing to pay a good price for the provisions. All we can spare should be sold to those who are in need of it, not alone because of the financial returns, but for humanity's sake.

The people of the Southwest should congratulate themselves upon their frugality this year. They have planned wisely and well in meeting higher food prices, thus conserving the buying value of the crops and animals for the cash product. The "truck patches" are now a factor in the cost of living. More peas, Irish potatoes, sweet potatoes, watermelons, cantaloupes, beans, cucumbers, cabbages, onions and other food crops have been planted this season than usual. It is to our credit that we have made use of favorable opportunity to plant more crops for home use than has been the custom. Let us save these products. Some of them will need preserving, pickling and special processes for safe keeping. But this will be the most important work on the farm because it will be the means of saving a surplus much of which would be wasted.—Farm and Ranch.

The arrest of a number of men in and around Snyder and Roten charged with being members of an organization formed for sedition has revealed that traitors have been at work for some time endeavoring to induce men to oppose the government's plan of conscription and have even gone to the extent of declaring against giving protection to the nation or assisting in the war. Among the obligations said to be required of those who unite with the organization is that they will murder conscription officers, rescue members from the custody of the civil authorities, destroy jails, commit perjury for the purpose of serving on juries to liberate any of the brotherhood charged with sedition or other crimes. Those who reveal the purpose of the organization and give testimony against its members are to be put to death and their property destroyed. While it is not likely that there is any considerable membership in the organization, it is sure that all members have not been placed in custody, for threatening letters, have been received by officers who assisted in making the arrests and in guarding the property of those who have given information which resulted in the arrests.

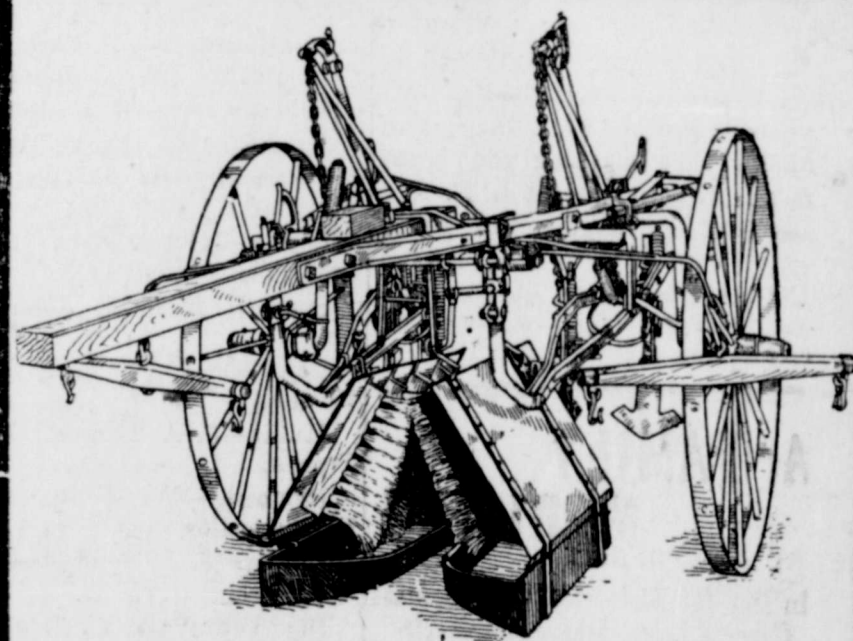

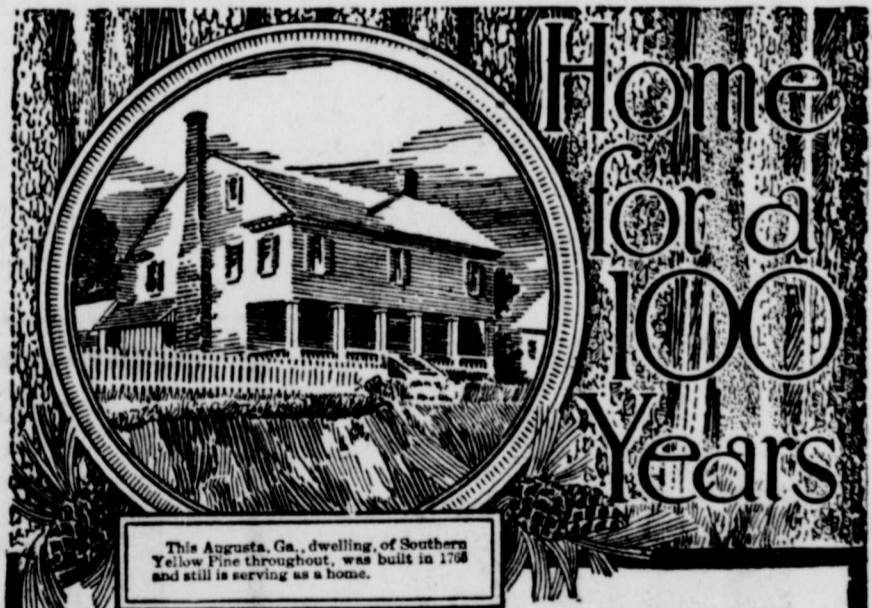

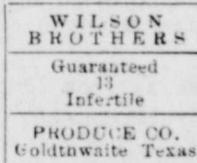
