MILLS COUNTY LEAGUE MEET HERE LAST SATURDAY WAS GREAT SUCCESS

The annual Mills County Inter-scholastic League Meet, under the supervision of the University of Texas, was held at Goldthwaite on Saturday, March 10.

By 9:30 Saturday morning the high school auditorium was packed to capacity by people from all over the county to hear the contestants in the various literary events.

The athletic events were held at the athletic field and drew equally as large crowds.

The participants in both the literary and athletic contests showed that they had conscientiously trained for the meet, and every event was hotly contested.

Since Goldthwaite is the only Class A high school in the county, all the first and second place Senior athletic contestants are eligible for the district meet, which will be held at Comanche. Likewise the first two winners in the Class B high school and the rural school divisions are eligible. The winners in the district meet will have an opportunity to go to the state meet, which will be held at the University of Texas in May. Mills county has several good athletes who should qualify for the state meet.

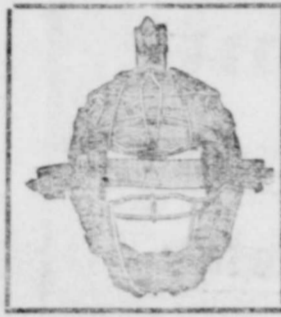

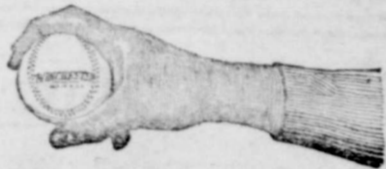

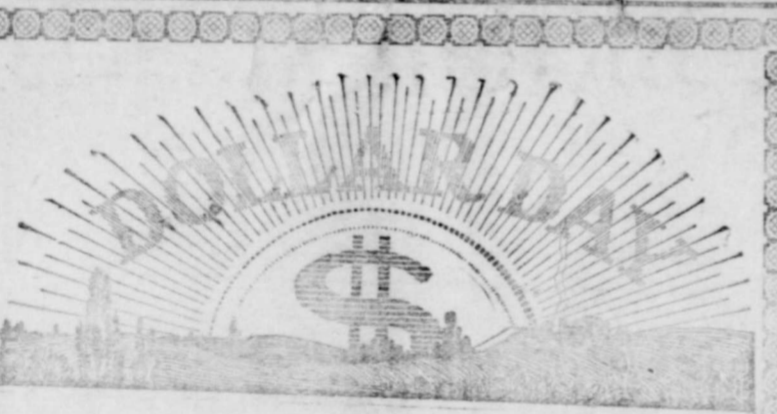

JAMES A. VICKERS.

The following clipping concerning the death of James A. Vickers was taken from the Bristow (Okla.) Record of Feb. 15. Mr. Vickers was foreman of the bridge building gang when the Santa Fe was extended from Lampasas to Goldthwaite in 1885. For a time he was a grocer in this city, his home and business being on West Front street. He was a charter member of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A.

James A. Vickers, another of the early citizens of Bristow, has passed away. He died at his home on West Eleventh avenue, at the advanced age of 77 years, Monday evening at 5 o'clock.

James Andrew Vickers was born in Plantersville, Grimes county, Texas, on Oct. 24th, 1845. When a small child moved to San Marcos, Texas, where he was educated. At the age of 17 he volunteered as a soldier in the Confederate army, serving for four years under Captain Storey and General Wood. On his return he married Elizabeth White, of Navasota, and to this union was born two children, J. C. Vickers, of Bristow, and Jennie Hammond, of Oklahoma City, deceased. Mr. and Mrs. Vickers moved to Goldthwaite, Texas, where they lived until 1902, coming then to Bristow, where he was engaged in the grocery business for a number of years. Mr. Vickers has been a consistent Christian since early manhood, and was a member of the Presbyterian church of Bristow.

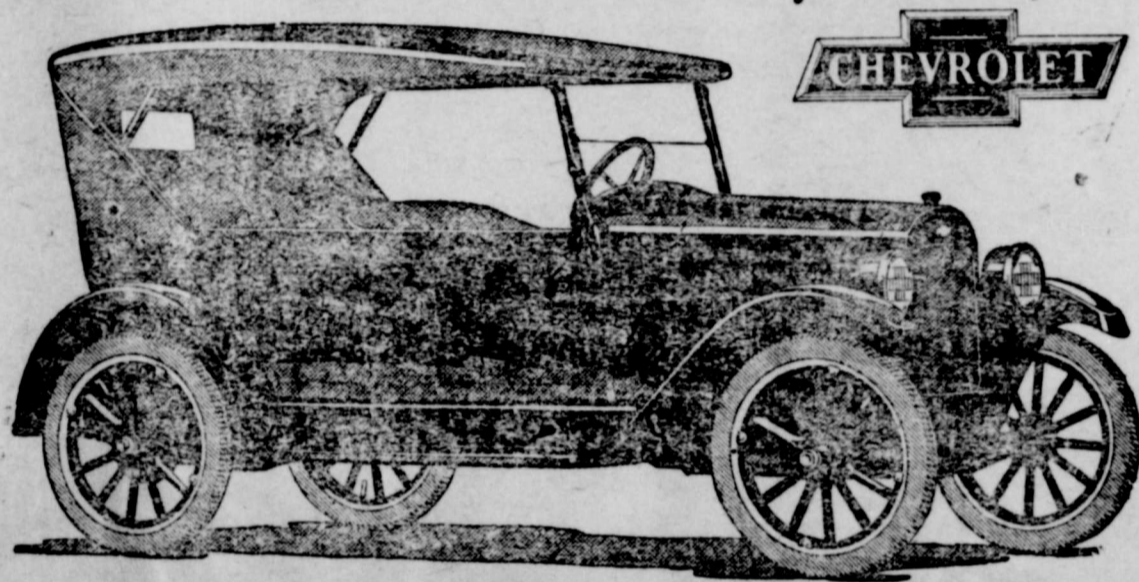

MRS. ETTA KEEL, FIRST WOMAN TO BE ELECTED TO OFFICE IN THIS DISTRICT

The following write-up of "Successful West Texas Women" appeared in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram recently:

Goldthwaite, Texas, March 3.—When Mrs. Etta Keel entered politics as a candidate for office of district clerk of the Seventeenth District she was the first woman candidate in her district. Six years ago it was indeed unusual to find a woman ask for any public office outside educational work. She was elected for the third term the last election, though it is seldom that any one is given a third term in this district. Since her first race she has had no opponent. There is another unusual feature in her method of campaigning, she has never used her photo on her campaign literature nor allowed it to be used in the papers.

Mrs. Keel did not enter politics as a "suffragette" but because she was left a widow with five sons to support and educate. She is doing her work so well that her eldest son has a splendid job as railway telegrapher and her second son is in his third year at the State University. Her other three boys are in high school and are displaying the family characteristic of becoming constructive citizens.

Asked if she would again be a candidate for office, she said "I think not, as I have no desire to hold a monopoly on the office. But I do think that our office holders are snatched back to private life just as they are able to do their best work. I am just now beginning to feel at home and able really to do well what I have been doing for two terms. It seems to me if we had longer terms and better pay for our officials their work could be done better. The money saved by not having such frequent elections would help to pay an increased salary. As it is now, the pay that goes with my office, for instance, would not attract anyone who could do something else well."

Mrs. Keel is attractive in club work and keeps her own house in order as well as attending to her duties at the court house. She is determined that her boys shall have a good education and is willing to make sacrifices to that end, but she says that she will be happy when they will have become able to relieve her as chief breadwinner of the family.

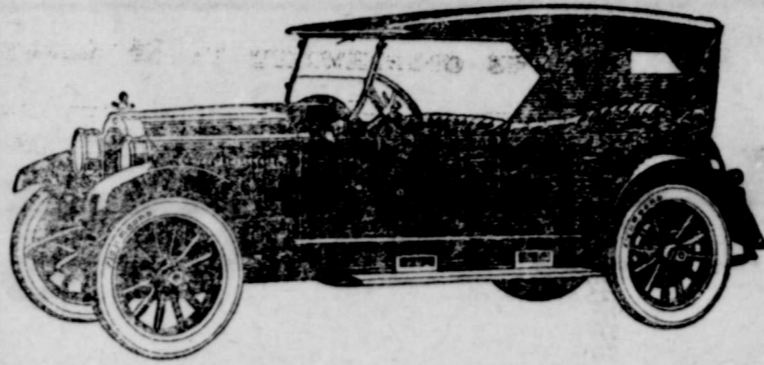
LOAN FUND FOR THE BLIND

It is unnecessary, of course, to explain in detail to the intelligent people of Texas, the need and purpose of loan fund in general. That there is an imperative necessity of this kind is attested by the fact every college and university in the country has its loan fund for the assistance of the needy students.

In 1919, the Alumni and Ex-Students' Association of the Texas Schools for the Blind started a fund for the sightless of this state. This fund is not only for the purpose of aiding worthy blind in securing advanced training in literary, musical and professional lines, but to help those who wish to start in small business enterprises for themselves and who lack the necessary means of doing so.

Until, now the committee appointed for the raising of this fund has confined its efforts to the blind themselves and to the faculty members of the Texas School for the Blind. From this source, about twelve hundred dollars has been secured, and even with this small amount a great deal of good has already been accomplished. Twenty young men and women have been assisted in various lines of endeavor, in amounts ranging from fifty to two hundred and fifty dollars, and in only one instance has the loan been returned.

The fund is administered by a committee of five appointed by the Alumni Association, and is handled in a careful and business-like way, the treasurer being kept under a bond always at least one thousand dollars in excess of the amount of the fund. Adequate security is required of the borrow-

er, and three per cent is assessed to pay the cost of the treasurer's bond and to meet other incidental expense connected with the handling of the fund.

Mr. W. S. Stepter, of Palmer-Ellis County, has been appointed General Field Manager of the Fund, and holds a commission from the Loan Fund Committee duly sworn to before a notary public by the chairman, in this connection, we wish to take his opportunity of cautioning the public against giving for causes for the blind without first requiring satisfactory credentials of the person soliciting the contribution.

Under the management of Mr. Stepter, we are now launching a state-wide drive for this fund, believing that the citizens of our great state will realize the worthiness of this cause and will be glad to assist in this way in lessening the handicap of blindness. An average of ten cents a piece from the school children of Texas would furnish adequate means to carry out this laudible enterprise. With the approval of Mr. S. M. N. Mars, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, we are designating from the first to the fifteenth, inclusive, of April for the collection in the schools. Contributions should be sent to the Citizens Bank of Palmer, Texas, to the account of the Loan Fund for the Blind.

If there is such a necessity of such funds for the assistance of the sighted how much more necessary is this assistance to the person without sight, and thus debarred from the many ways which sighted students earn their tuition and from the world of the wage earner where so many accumulate the means of starting in business for them selves. Often a little financial aid at the right time may mean success in life and the lack of it total failure. Let us join together in giving our handicapped brothers and sisters a chance at this success.
