GREAT ENTHUSIASM DISPLAYED AT CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEET MON.

The regular monthly meeting of the Mills County Chamber of Commerce in the club rooms last Monday night was, from the point of attendance and enthusiasm displayed, one of the best in its history.

Around 60 business men and farmers were in attendance and the interest taken shows well for another successful year, this ending one year's work of the Chamber of Commerce.

At this meeting the matter of a cold storage plant for Goldthwaite, which a committee had been investigating, was brought before the body. The committee estimated that a 2-car freezing plant will cost in the neighborhood of \$10,000. They also reported an offer from Mr. Roundtree of Brownwood to place \$1 into the concern for every dollar put in by local men. In other words, Mr Roundtree agrees to put \$5,000 into a corporation if the people of Mills County will put \$5,000 into it.

The board of directors and the cold storage committee recommended to the body that this offer be accepted and the body went on record as accepting the order.

Subscriptions were immediately taken and \$2250 was subscribed within ten minutes toward the \$5,000 which must be raised and a committee was appointed to solicit the citizens of the county for stockholders. The stock will be issued in units of \$10.00 each and it is thought that there will be no trouble in raising the remainder.

A cold storage plant for Goldthwaite will be one of the best steps that can be taken towards providing a top-price market for Mills County produce. The fact that the Mills County Chamber of Commerce is behind the move and directly responsible for its successful conclusion should encourage all the leading citizens of the county to become members.

Several new members were added at the meeting last Monday and the books are open to all citizens of the county who have its best interests at heart.

THE COLD STORAGE FOR MILLS COUNTY ASSURED

For two years the county agent has advocated the erection of a cold storage plant at Goldthwaite for the purpose of stabilizing the prices of poultry products, taking the gamble out of the market, and turning waste and expense into profits by enabling the growers to concentrate and sell in car lots. Heretofore growers have been compelled to sell largely in coop and dozen lots which entails express charges which cut deep into profits.

All the while we have hoped to see a plant put in that would benefit the grower as well as the man who furnished the capital; otherwise we would prefer the present conditions, which would help those engaged in transportation.

At the meeting of farmers with the Chamber of Commerce, last summer, President L. E. Miller, speaking for the chamber, endorsed the cold storage proposition as did other speakers on that occasion. Later the Mills County Farm Bureau and the Mills County Chamber of Commerce took the matter under advisement and each organization appointed R. F. McDermott, W. H. Linkenhoger, and W. P. Weaver a committee to make investigations and report a plan for the plant. This committee was continued from time to time by both bodies until a plan was drawn and presented to both organizations at the March meetings.

This plan which was accepted by the Bureau and Chamber is briefly as follows:

Mr. Ray Roundtree, a widely known produce dealer of Brownwood, offers to take half the stock in a \$10,000 incorporation to build and equip a two-car cold storage plant at Goldthwaite, the citizens of Mills County to raise the other half. The incorporation is to be in charge of a manager chosen by a local board of directors.

At the Chamber of Commerce meeting Monday night \$2250 of this stock was subscribed by the business men and farmers present, bringing the total amount already subscribed to \$7750, leaving only \$2250 to place.

The Chamber of Commerce appointed W. P. Weaver, W. H. Linkenhoger, J. A. Hester, R. F. McDermott, J. A. Palmer, Floyd Ligon and E. T. Fairman a committee to secure subscribers for the remainder of the stock.

When this plant is put in operation and a mammoth incubator installed at Goldthwaite to do custom hatching so we can raise early pullets for layers, Mills County will take the place it deserves as a banner county for poultry raising. W. P. WEAVER, County Agent.

In the adjoining panel a white card bore the command in big black letters: DO IT NOW!

The Development of Our Railway Net in Texas

The most important assistance to railways during the period 1870 to 1890 was State aid. This took two forms; one the granting of State bonds, the other of State land. In 1870, an act by the Legislature provided that State bonds should be furnished the International Great Northern railroad to the amount of \$10,000 per mile. An act of 1871 likewise provided that \$6,000,000 of 8 per cent, 30 year State Bonds should be furnished the Texas and Pacific Railroad Company. However, neither of these bond issues was made available for railway purposes. There was such opposition that some of the State officials refused to sign the bonds and the next Legislature repealed the law.

From 1869 to 1873 there were no land grants for the benefit of railroad construction. In 1873 an amendment to the Constitution made land grants to railroads lawful. From 1873 to 1875, 42 companies were chartered, 12 of which carried on construction and 10 sufficient amount to obtain land. Under this law 16 sections were granted per mile constructed. However, the International Great Northern and the Texas & Pacific each received 20 sections per mile. This was because of a compromise after the failure of the proposal to furnish aid to these roads by means of State bonds. The International Great Northern also received tax exemption for a period of 25 years. In 1871 a general railroad incorporation and land grant act provided that a road should receive 16 sections of State land for each mile constructed.

This land was to be sold one half in six years and all of it in twelve years. Under this law 67 companies were chartered and 12 of them obtained land. From 1852 to 1882, 41 railroad companies received land in blocks from 49,000 acres to 5,167,000 acres. The total given railroads amounted to 38,900,800 acres. Just what this land brought no one has ascertained. It probably averaged not more than \$1.00 per acre, if that much. In 1890 the capitalization of railroads in Texas was as follows:

Bonds, \$233,000,000.
 Stocks, \$177,000,000.

Other indebtedness, \$30,000,000.

Making a total of about \$440,000,000.

Just what it cost to build these 8,800 miles we had in 1891 has never been determined, and owing to the absence and destruction of records will never be known with accuracy. Since 1891 railway construction in Texas has continued until we now have about 16,000 miles of railroad.

The great problem in the early days was to get the railroads built. Now that we have the railroad net pretty well developed, the problem is how to obtain the most efficient service at the least possible cost.

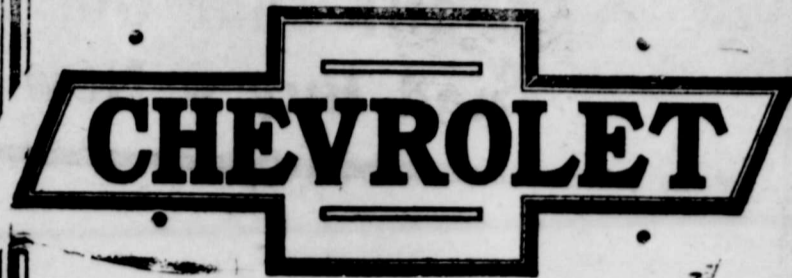

PROGRAM FOR STATE HEALTH WEEK, SUNDAY, MARCH 30, TO APRIL 5.

The following is the program for State Health and Clean-Up Week:

Sunday, March 30—Sermon and Lecture Day.

Arrange for sermons on subjects pertaining to public health, in all churches. These sermons may contain the scriptural references to the Law of Moses in Deuteronomy, and other appropriate passages.

Sermons and lectures might also be delivered on specific health improvement and protection topics.

The ways in which certain preventable diseases are transmitted. Malaria, yellow fever and dengue, by the mosquito. Bubonic plague by the flea. Typhus by the louse. Diphtheria, influenza, and tuberculosis by disease germs in the sputum.

Personal Hygiene is another important topic. Care of the teeth and skin. Ventilations, proper food, exercise and clothing. The danger of infection from the use of the common drinking cup or towel.

Monday, March 31—Health Appraisal and Food Protection Day.

Have health survey of yourself made by competent physician. Have your teeth examined and eyes tested. Ascertain number of cases and kind of communicable diseases in your community.

Filthy food means food not securely protected from flies, dust and dirt. Food establishments of all kinds should be inspected at regular intervals to prevent the sale, or offering for sale, of filthy food.

Tuesday, April 1—Mosquito and Fly Control Day.

Mosquito Control: Create Official Working Committee for providing:

Inventory of number of cases of mosquito borne sickness, in the community.

Quinine and chill tonic sale by druggists.

Days lost from school and industries on account of mosquito borne infection.

Preliminary survey locating existing and potential mosquito breeding places.

Estimate cost to correct and control mosquito breeding for season.

Education: School instruction and four minute talks by health officers, sanitarians, teachers and civic leaders.

Advocating use of 16 mesh screen.

Constructive: Draining standing water and filling low places, stocking ponds and fountains with top minnows.

Screening houses, covering cisterns, wells and other necessary containers.

Removing or destroying other containers, such as tin cans, old barrels, etc.

Fly Control:

Abate all fly breeding places by: Placing all garbage and decomposing organic matter in covered pails.

Seeing that horse and cow lots, pig pens, chicken roosts, are cleaned daily.

Placing all manure in covered pen or boxes, or better still, haul and scatter in fields.

Using sprinkling powder, borax or kailiver in barn yard periodically.

Wednesday, April 2—Disease Prevention Day.

Emphasize special health programs in the schools, in all club meetings and all general gatherings. Have health talks, moving pictures, demonstrations, health plays.

We would suggest that the Su-

perintendent act as State Health Officer of his school, city or rural. Have students and parents get up suitable talks on the prevalence of smallpox, typhoid, measles, diphtheria, dengue, etc., stressing the importance of vaccine in smallpox, typhoid and diphtheria, and tell how to destroy the mosquito breeding places.

Have each child discuss all these topics with the folks at home.

Tuberculosis: It is fitting that on Disease Prevention Day special attention should be given to tuberculosis, as it is one of the most important causes of death in Texas.

Information regarding this very important subject can be secured by addressing the State Department of Health, 616 Littlefield Building, Austin, Texas.

Thursday, April 3—Child Health Day.

Birth registration: Secure the co-operation of all school children parents, teachers and organizations in locality and report to the Bureau of Vital Statistics of the State Board of Health every child whose birth is not recorded in the community, and arrange for the future recording of all births.

Prenatal letters will be supplied by the State Board of Health, Child Hygiene Bureau, to expectant mothers on request.

A study should be made of facilities for care of children's health in the schools. The vital importance of physical inspection of all school children should be stressed. Scales should be provided for each school so that children may be weighed and measured monthly.

Material for programs for this day may be obtained from the Department of Health.

Friday, April 4—Sanitary Im-

provements and Fire Hazards Day.

Appoint committees on sanitation to inspect the town's drinking water supply, sewer system, dumping grounds, swimming pools and mosquito breeding places, fire departments and general fire hazards.

Also inspect surface closets, and leave suggestions for fly-proofing for conditioning as needed.

Specimens of drinking water from public schools and private supplies may be sent to the State Bacteriologist of the State Board of Health for analysis.

Water mains should be flushed, standpipes cleaned out, cisterns covered and fire hydrants tested.

Encourage the use of covered garbage pails.

Examine electric wiring, including attic, basement and garrets to see that no insulation is broken, that no wire is resting on nails or wood, that there are no fuses bridged with pennies or other metal, and that there are no knotted lamp cords.

Saturday, April 5—General Clean-Up Day.

It will be fitting to complete the program with a grand finale, and week end polish for all previous activities started during campaign.

After checking up all rubbish, refuse that has not been collected and burned should on this day be reduced to ashes.

Ditches and vacant lots should be freed from weeds and culverts open for free drainage.

Continue paint up, varnish and white wash activities to add civic atmosphere to the community.

The use of umigrants and disinfectants might be further stimulated in those places where needed.

Permanent play grounds and parks and a systematic campaign for continued health education may receive consideration on this day.

Building codes, health, sanitary and fire prevention ordinances, with enforcement machinery should be perfected, or made to function more efficiently where needed during the ensuing year.

Prizes may be awarded or special mention made of the cleanest premises, etc.

The foregoing program is suggestive only, and every community should take stock of its health and sanitary defects, and concentrate to correct the most pertinent evils.

The State Board of Health may give detailed information on other activities that you desire to carry out during the week and supply a limited number of leaflets, folders and placards.
