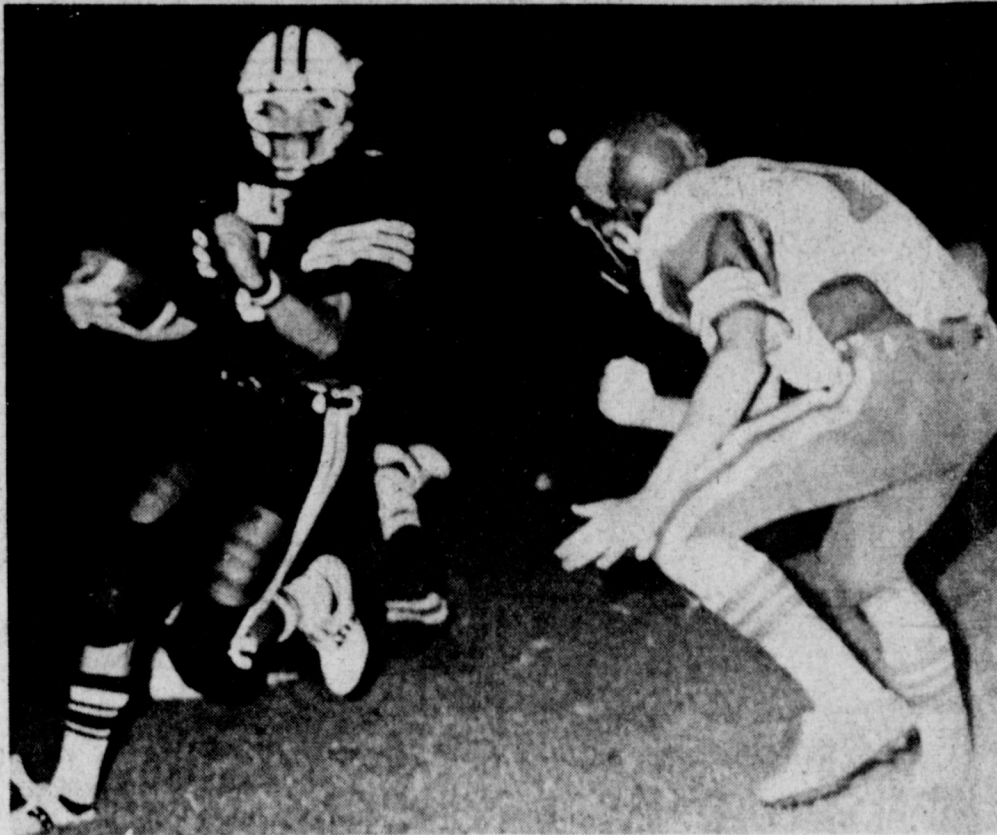
## Kirvens Injured Early Saturday In Car Smashup

## Bailey County Given Disaster Designation

U.S. Representative Kent Hance announced through his Washington office Thursday afternoon that three more counties were added to the disaster area designation in Washington on Thursday. Included were the counties of Bailey, Cochran and Yoakum. They were added to the nine counties previously receiving the designation, which also includes the counties of Deaf Smith, Castro, Farmer, Lamb, Hockley, Terry, Gaines, Dawson and Martin, the 12 counties can qualify for low cost government loans.

Farmers in the designated counties may apply for emergency loan assistance to recover losses caused by the natural disaster and applications for the emergency loans should be filed in local FmHA offices.

## C/F Drive Scheduled Wednesday

Muleshoe Mayor Charles Bratcher declared September 16-22 as "Kiss Your Baby" week in the city of Muleshoe by signing an official proclamation Thursday.

Stressing the need for greater public health education in Muleshoe and Bailey County, the major said that "Kiss Your Baby" week is designed to help parents recognize the symptoms of Cystic Fibrosis in their children.

A door-to-door fund raising drive will be conducted after school on Wednesday, September 19, with the Muleshoe FHA students escorted by members of the Xi Omicron Xi chapter of Beta Sigma Phi.

One of the signs of Cystic Fibrosis, the most serious lung-damaging disease, is a salty taste to the skin. Mothers have sometimes alerted doctors to the possibility of C/F when kissing their babies and tasting salt, explained Mayor Bratcher.

He said Cystic Fibrosis is inherited by approximately one of every 1,600 American babies. It occurs when a child received a gene for the disease from each parent. So far, he added, there is no cure for C/F, but early diagnosis and treatment are helping to lengthen lives. Today, 50 percent of C/F patients can be expected to live past age 19, where once, few survived to school age.

The signs of Cystic Fibrosis and other lung-damaging disease include: recurrent wheezing, persistent coughing with excessive mucus, pneumonia more than once, excessive appetite with poor weight gain and clubbing or enlargement of the finger.

## Light Rain On Friday Slows Crops

Cloudy skies and intermittent rain, at times very heavy, fell in the Muleshoe area and right up to football game time on Friday night.

With a light sprinkle starting around 9:30 a.m., the skies quickly turned loose a downpour that ended up with some .6 in moisture before the day was ended.

The rain moved into the area along with the first warning that winter is not far behind as the temperature hovered in the high 40s all day, and at game-time, was around 46 degrees.

National Weather Service predicted that Saturday's high would near 70 then drop back into the lower 50s for Saturday night followed by Sunday temperatures of around 70-72 degrees.

In the Lazbuddie area, Foster Fertilizer reported .6 to match the amount that fell in Muleshoe, but to the south only light intermittent showers with accumulations of some .02 fell.

From Maple, Bill Eubanks at Maple Grocery said they only received light showers and Coyote Lake Feed Yard said they had a few good showers with light accumulations.

Farmers were indicating that they hoped the cool weather was shortlived so they could get back to the hot days needed to help mature young cotton.

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### Housing Authority Seeks Survey Form

The large number of survey forms will strictly indicate an interest for such a project for senior citizens, especially those on limited or small, fixed incomes.

The new complex will be of brick veneer and the spacious one and two bedroom apartments will be carpeted and have lots of closet and storage room.

### County Raises Tax Rate .20; Will Be \$1.12

Due to rising costs of operating the county government, the Bailey County Commissioners Court voted last Monday to increase the tax rate from 92 cents to \$1.12, a 20 cent raise.

Commissioners determined the raise would be necessary as they have taken over the funding of the ambulance, the increased cost of road equipment and fuel to operate the road equipment.

The tax raise will be finalized following required public hearings.

In other action, commissioners accepted the resignation of Tommy Black as manager of the Bailey County Exhibition Center and Coliseum. His resignation is effective on September 30.

Commissioners authorized the publication for sale of four parcels of property around the Coliseum and accepted a bid of \$501, made by Arnoldo Garcia to purchase a 1962 Ford Truck owned by Precinct One.

### Powerhouse Floydada Falls To Mule Mania

On a cold, wet night, with an almost full house huddling in wraps and plastic to keep dry, it became a 'Storybook' ending for the Muleshoe Mules in their second game of the season.

A last-ditch attempt to pull out a 6-7 deficit resulted in a 25-yard field goal following a pass interference call, and gave the Muleshoe Mules a narrow 9-7 victory over the Floydada Whirlwinds.

A defensive battle started from the initial kickoff in the game, with both teams remembering very well the Mules surprising 27-7 shellacking of the Whirlwinds in their first game in Floydada in 1978. When the Mules went visiting to Floydada, all predictions pointed to a Wind win over the Mules, but at halftime the Mules were leading the 'Winds by a 21-0 score. However, in the second half, the 'Winds penetrated the tough Mule defense and they scored one TD.

This year, when the team visited Muleshoe, the first quarter remained scoreless as both teams were wary and practiced a lot of defense while learning and reading out the opponent.

Then in the second quarter, a 14 yard pass from Mule quarterback Mike Northcutt to Bones Norman waiting in the end zone was called back on a Mules penalty. Also in the second, Sam Whalin made a big play when he intercepted the ball on the Mules 49. His interception was to no avail as the Mules fumbled the ball away on the very next play.

Then, with just 1:00 minute on the clock before halftime, Northcutt again connected in the end zone on a 29-yard pass to Cam Hawkins. Victor Leal's

extra point try failed and the Mules went into the locker with a slim 6-0 lead. All of the third quarter and most of the fourth quarter was defensive action, with the Mules holding Floydada at one point within eight yards of the elusive paydirt.

Then, the Whirlwinds started connecting and put a good drive together and finally 'Wind quarterback Tony Marquis on an option play slammed over on a rollout to his left and into the end zone from eight

As 9:38 showed on the scoreboard clock, Windham attempted to make it 8-0 but failed and by the time 'Horn quarter back Andy Rogers loped 41 yards for the 'Horns second touchdown at 6:49 in the first, the Mules were feeling the sting of the Lazbuddie Longhorns.

Dennis Steinbock added an extra point and the 'Horns rambled on. Again in the first, at 2:28, Steinbock made it over from the three and an attempted pass for extra points failed.

We too have been members of the silent majority for too long. This letter is a letter in support of the one written by G.R. Albertson, D.O. in the Sept 13 issue of the Muleshoe Journal.

Having had first-hand experience with the migrant program of the Muleshoe School system we can honestly state that for a child that comes from a totally English speaking home this program is a total loss. Moving here in the middle of a school year both of our children, kindergarten & first grade, were placed in this program. Our oldest had missed six weeks of school due to illness but was still ahead of some students in his class. The work our kindergarten son had been doing was equal to & better than that of most first grade. He was so disappointed with his work he had to be forced to go to school, and we had to question why we were sending him. This created so much disharmony in our home, and all of this from a child who previously had been as quiet as a church-mouse.

We will be the first to admit our guilt. We were content just to ride the waves instead of creating any new ones. No More! When our children were registered for school this year the teachers were informed they were not to be placed in this program. I, (as their mother) was ask to sign the forms anyway - even tho they would not be placed in the migrant classrooms. They needed my signature for federal funding of the program.

Our intention is in no way meant to question the teachers or their work. In some schools we have seen, its all teachers can do to stop knifings and save their own lives much less teach the students anything. But, we do question any program funded by tax-payers money that entitles any person, citizen or not of the United States, to free anything while this so called free program was offered to our children it cost them a great deal. It is geared primarily for children who have practically no concept of the English

language. This cannot possibly do anything but harm to a child who has known nothing but English all his life. So parents, if you move during a school year and your child is placed in a program such as this BEWARE! Unless the child is raised in a practically non-English speaking family this program can do more harm

than good.

The taxpayers of this great country can only take so much before their backs begin to break from the weight of it all. They have all they can do to support their own familys & this countries elderly & disabled without having to support programs such as this from which they receive no benefit.

We are ready to get off our rears !!!

### PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would:

- Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and
- Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

**Comptroller**

**Holds Checks From Workers**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Tuesday said he'd hold up state employee paychecks again this month for anyone owing the state a debt unless a district court tells him differently.

Last Friday, Bullock held back August paychecks to 150 state employees who have defaulted on state sponsored student loans.

At the same time, a Texas Employment Commission

employee in Kingsville filed a lawsuit in an Austin district court against Bullock and the TEC in an attempt to have his paycheck released.

State law prohibits a person owing the state a debt from receiving state payment of any kind.

"I'm simply following the law," Bullock said, adding, "until these loans are

repaid there will be less money available for new loans to the next generation of students."

Collectively, the 150 workers who weren't paid owe the state \$311,072 in overdue student loans. They were identified in a computer cross-check of payroll records.

He said 491 of those identified settled up

\$896,563 in debts to the Texas College and University Coordinating Board, which last month held loan defaults worth more than \$39.9 million under the Hinson-Hazelwood program from loans to 24,685 former students.

## Chief Richards, Sgt. Holmes Talks To PTA

The first Parents Teachers Association meeting of 1979-80 was called to order by President Doris Palmer Monday at Richland Hills Elementary. Linda Huckaby gave the invocation. The Girl Scouts, represented by Tina Reed and Shannon Pelton, presented the colors. Rita Lane read the minutes and Linda Huckaby gave the treasurer's report.

Milton Oyler and Bill Taylor introduced their new and newly reassigned

teachers for the year.

Norma Prather presented the budget for 1979-80 which was approved.

The room count winners for September were Norma Prather at Richland Hills and Barbara Finney at Mary DeShazo. Chief Johnny Richards and Sgt. Wayne Holmes of the Muleshoe Police Department gave a program on school safety. Chief Richards explained the policy guidelines for the police department stressing that a police department is only as good as the community it serves. He urged everyone to report all traffic offenders and to be on the lookout for strangers who should also be reported with a description.

Chief Richards pointed out that children learn traffic safety rules by observing their parents. He said children should cross streets only at controlled crosswalks, should never get out of a car into traffic, and should always obey bus drivers.

Sgt. Holmes played a tape recording left by a young man before he committed suicide. The boy made the recording for his parents describing his problems due to LSD drug abuse. Chief Richards listed the ten frequent indications of drug abuse. They are: (1) the eyes-bloodshot, watery, extremely wide or extremely small pupils, (2) odor-bad body and breath odor, (3) needle tracks, skin boils and sores, injection points sometimes get infected, (4) unusual emotional extremes hysterical crying or hysterical laughter. Often anti-authority, (5) unusual dispositional extremes-over stimulated or constantly sleepy, (6) Appetite extremes- none or very little; huge, particularly for sweets or liquids, (7) fear complex (paranoia) - convinced someone is after them. Very suspicious, (8) poor physical health-body deterioration in tone, skin color, stance and weight, (9) poor mental health-paranoid behavior, emotional extremes, loss of interest in former goals. Dull, unresponsive with bad grades. Personality changes, and (10) poor moral health, former values destroyed and abnormal ideas and ideals adopted in their place.

Chief Richards added that there have been strangers around the schools selling marijuana, cocaine and p.c.p. or angel dust. tion were presented to Chief Richards and Sgt. Holmes.
