**STYLES IN CATTLE CHANGE LIKE WOMEN'S CLOTHES**



Dallas, Tex.—(Special)—"Styles in cattle change, just as surely as do the styles in women's clothes—the not perhaps, so sudden," says Henry C. Barlow, superintendent of the Shorthorn Division of the cattle show at the State Fair of Texas.

"Can you remember the old-fashioned kind, that paraded the tanbark at the State Fair, 40 years ago? They were called 'Durhams' then—a long-legged, long-necked, uneven-bodied animal. But he was a vast advance upon the old Longhorn, and he filled the bill for his time and age.

"What a difference today! You modern Shorthorn is a short-legged, deep-bodied, even-fleshed beast, which matures in half the time of the older kind and this with no sacrifice of milking qualities—the ideal 'farmers cow'."

Shorthorns, Jerseys and all other preferred breeds of beef and dairy cattle will be shown at the State Fair, October 8 to 23. It is claimed that the Jersey show alone will be the largest ever held in the United States.

Famous breeders from all over the country will show the most famous animals, champions all of them. The swine show will out-top any thing ever held at the State Fair, as the interest in hog raising is growing by leaps and bounds, it is said. Sheep and goats also will be better represented than ever. The sheep industry of Texas is expected soon to outrank that of any other state.



**CHEVROLET**

Refrigerator automobiles, capable of maintaining a constant temperature of near zero, denote a new advance in the adaptation of the motor car to every type and kind of transportation problem.

Twenty Chevrolet chassis were recently purchased by the Detroit branch of a national firm whose business is selling ice cream and ice cream products on the major traffic arteries in and around the city.

On every chassis is mounted a specially-constructed body into which the refrigerator has been placed as a unit. The refrigerator occupies the upper section of the body, while beneath it is the cooling compartment with a capacity of 960 bricks of ice cream. The temperature of this compartment, according to Pat Potter, special representative for the company, is maintained at from five to ten degrees above zero to insure that the ice cream bricks and "suckers" will be sufficiently hard-frozen to tempt the parched motorist.

"This refrigerator," Mr. Potter explained, "has a six inch insulated wall and a capacity of 300 pounds of ice and 75 pounds of salt. Average consumption of ice in 24 hours is about 125 lbs. This is packed into the tank through an opening on the roof, and is sufficient to keep the ice cream appetizing in the hottest climate."

Every morning the twenty trucks at the Detroit office take on a fresh supply and then hurry to designated places around the city. All sales are made from the roadside form these portable store rooms. Chevrolets were selected to carry the refrigerators, it was explained, in order to get rapid, economical and dependable transportation and at the same time neat and attractive ears with a "sales appeal."

In addition to the Detroit branch, others are operated in 25 leading cities extending from coast to coast.

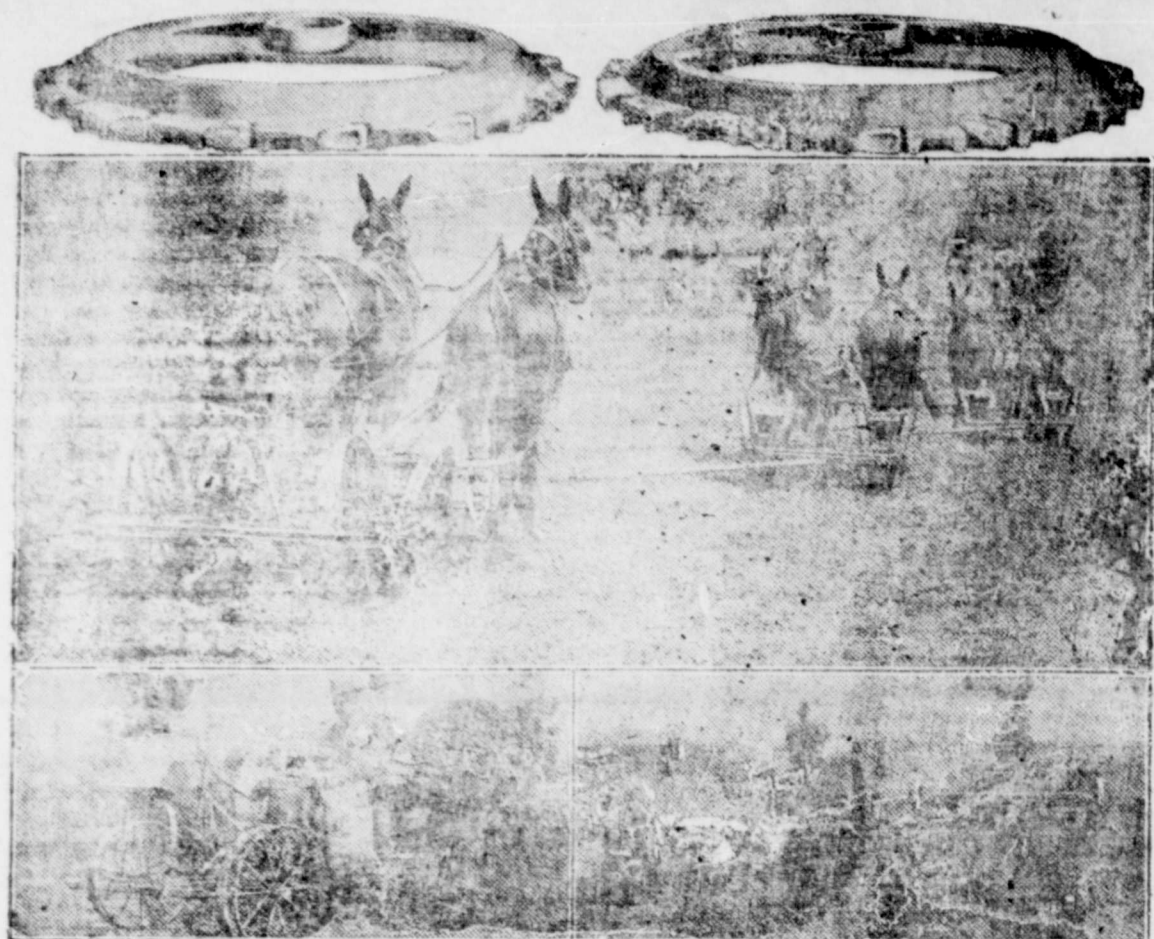

Corn Production Going Through Revolution

CHICAGO—The click of the corn planter, like the appearance of the first robin, or the first marble game of the season, marks an annual event in the limitless drive through space pursued by the Universe, says the Research Department of the National Association of Farm Equipment Manufacturers. A corn crop of around 3,000,000,000 bushels, is a bumper affair, reached on two different occasions in recent years. Practically all of the acreage is planted swiftly and accurately by the check-row corn planter, to get a near perfect drop for the soil and seed conditions encountered on each farm. Several agricultural colleges are now working out 4-row planters to double the man labor output.

The most remarkable corn production record is that of Mr. Ira C. Marshall and his two sons on their Hardin county, Ohio, farm. In 1925, Mr. Marshall set the corn world record when his 10-acre plot averaged 160.01 bushels to the acre, and he and his two high school sons produced 120 acres that averaged 95 bushels to the acre. Last year, they repeated their world's record breaking pace and set an even more remarkable record with 168.65 average for one 10-acre plot, while Glenn, the older son, beat 159 bushels to the acre on the 10-acre plot next his father's, giving them both places in the famous Ohio 100-Bushel Corn Club.

The Marshalls are tractor farmers, who make good use of the disk harrow in following the plow and working down the soil. They use the tractor in plowing, working down the ground, cultivating with 2-row cultivators and on the mechanical corn picker. Last year, Mr. Marshall added a fertilizing idea he had never tried before, using the planter with fertilizer attachment to put on a top dressing when the corn was 2 inches high, just ahead of the cultivator. Three cultivations left it in good shape, the 100-bushel growers of Ohio, Indiana, Missouri, Michigan and Iowa all agreeing that cultivation is essential in high producing corn. Breaking up of crusts after rains, weed eradication and aeration all benefitting the crop.

**STATE FAIR MAY SHOW  
BRONZE STATUES OF  
THE PIONEER WOMAN**



The men and women of Texas, descendants of pioneer mothers, may have a chance to see and vote upon the twelve models of "The Pioneer Woman," the gigantic bronze statue, which is to be erected upon the plains of Oklahoma by E. W. Marland, public-spirited oil man, of Ponca City, Oklahoma.

Mr. Marland, noting that statues and memorials had been erected to such pioneer heroes as Sam Houston, Davy Crockett, Dan'l Boone, Kit Carson and others, but that no one had thought of a fitting memorial to the brave women who labored, fought, prayed and conquered at the side of their husbands during the winning of the West, decided to erect such a tribute to the heroic mothers of pioneer America.

He set aside \$100,000.00 to be used in the erection of a bronze statue, about 60 feet high, to be placed near a national highway running through the plains of the Cherokee Strip, the last public lands opened to settlement. He commissioned 12 of America's most eminent sculptors to make each a model of his idea of a statue typifying his conception. These 12 models are now finished and, through the kindness of Mr. Marland, are being shown in several of the large Eastern cities. Those who view them are asked to vote upon which one he or she believes to be the best design.

President Harry Olmsted, of the State Fair of Texas, which opens at Dallas October 8, has requested Mr. Marland to send the statues to the State Fair, where a million of the descendants of the same type of pioneer mothers may have a chance to see them and vote upon them.

Mr. Marland, who wishes the choice to be a popular rather than a purely artistic one, at once saw the point of Mr. Olmsted's request and promised to try and rearrange the route of the models so that Texas may have them for at least two weeks. It is hoped that definite announcement may be made soon.

Between times, they visit this or that show or amusement and at the end of the day they have found that their trip has been not only pleasant but highly profitably as well."

**THE GREATEST HORSE  
OF THE CENTURY**

Those who visit the State Fair of Texas at Dallas, October 8 to 23, will be able to see "The Greatest Horse of the Century," by which name Mr. McElwyn, owned by W. H. L. McCourtie, president of the Trinity Portland Cement Company of Dallas, has become known wherever men talk horse flesh and records.

It is not generally known that this champion of champions is owned in Texas, but such is the case. This grand animal is now at stud in Lexington, Ky., but he will be brought to Texas in time for the great Fair and will be shown every day, in harness, in front of the grandstand.

While there will be no harness racing at the State Fair, the fact that the famous Mr. McElwyn will be at the fair grounds will interest many a Texan, for the love of a good horse which was inbred in most sons of the Lone Star State is by no means dead, even in this age of the motor car and the tractor.

Therefore, doubtless, thousands who otherwise might hesitate, will make the trip to the State Fair when they know that they will be able to see this prince of stallions, who, as a two-year-old, broke the record for that age with a mark of 2:04; who, as a three-year-old, again shattered a world's record, going the mile in 1:59 1/4 (the best two-minute trotter in his age and still the only one), and who, in 1925, as a three-year-old, again made a world's record of 1:59 1/4.

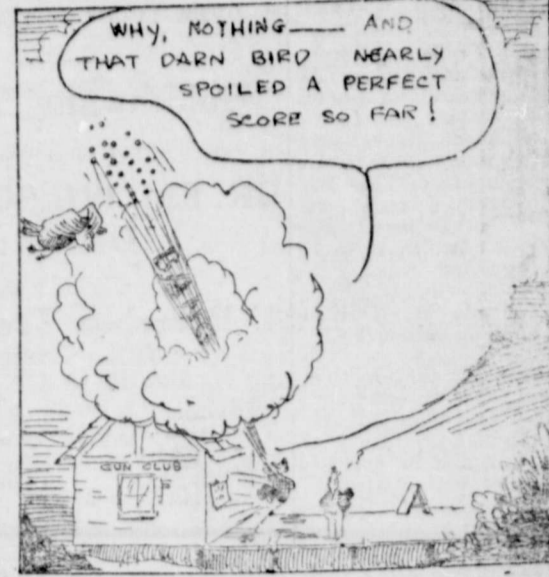

## FAIR EDITION

### SELECTING EXHIBITS

In selecting agricultural products for exhibit, the following should be kept in mind. These suggestions apply to both Community and Farm Exhibits:

#### SUGGESTIONS

**Uniformity of products and containers is most desirable.**

**Cotton**—The exhibits of 20 bolls each, should be of the same variety of cotton. Each exhibit will be judged on size of bolls, color of lint, and quality of lint. They should be put in neat boxes of sufficient size to prevent their being crowded and should fit in box without surplus space.

The samples of ginned lint should be of the same variety of cotton, and each in a neat box.

The stalks of cotton should have roots on them. They should be of the same variety and as nearly alike as possible. Pick the stalks of the type that are most desirable to grow on your farm. It is not the big stalks with the large vegetative branches that are the most profitable.

The exhibits of seed cotton should be of the same variety. They should be in neat box containers. They will be judged on the basis of color and quality of lint.

**Corn and Grain Sorghums**—These exhibits will be judged on uniformity of type, color and the shape of the ears or heads.

The exhibits in the corn and grain sorghum class may be of either one or more varieties. However, there must not be more than one variety in one exhibit.

**Small Grains**—The gallon samples will be judge on weight, general market quality, as indicated by uniformity of all grains as to size, and shape; freedom from foreign material.

Observe that the small grains to be shown are wheat, oats, rye, and barley.

**Legumes**—The gallon samples of seed will be judged on the same basis as the gallon samples of small grains.

**Other Hay and Forage**—Hay and forage crops will be judged on the basis of quality, product and market conditions; and in addition the bundles will be judged on neatness and attractiveness.

**Fruits and Vegetables**—Strive for high quality and uniformity of type, size, shape and color.

In showing peppers or tomatoes be sure the whole exhibit is either red, pink or green. Do not mix colors.

**Neatness and Attractiveness**—In order that the agricultural and home-products of the community may be displayed to the best advantage, simple decorations are most desirable. Flowers, plants, grains, and other natural products are more desirable than paper, bunting and other artificial products.

### HONEY

### JUDGING COMMUNITY EXHIBITS

**DAVID SPARES SAUL**  
1 Samuel 26

**GOLDEN TEXT**—Be not overcome of evil, but overcome evil with good. Romans 12:21.

**Lesson Setting and Survey**

After parting from Jonathan, David had many thrilling experiences as a fugitive from court. At Nob he was helped by the priests. At Gath he feigned insanity in order to save his life. At Adullam he gathered an army of 400 men. At Mizpeh in Moab he cared for his parents as refugees from Saul. At Hareth he heard of the heartless massacre of the priests who befriended him at Nob. At Keilah he repelled the Philistine raiders. In Zikh he had his last interview with Jonathan. In Maon he barely escaped his pursuers. In the cave of Engedi he first spared the life of Saul. In Samuel he heard of Samuel's death. At Carmel he encountered a churl in Nabal. And at the hill of Hachilah he spared the life of Saul a second time.

**Lesson Text and Outline**  
1 Samuel 26: 7-14, 17, 21

**I. DAVID'S KINDNESS.**

7. So David and Abishai came to the people by night: and behold, Saul lay sleeping within the place of the wagons, with a spear stuck in the ground at his head; and Abner and the people lay round about him. Then said Abishai to David, God hath delivered up thine enemy into thine hand this day: now therefore let me smite him, I pray thee, with the spear to the earth at one stroke, and I will not smite him the second time. 9 And David to Abishai, Destroy him not; for who can put forth his hand against Jehovah's anointed, and be guiltless? 10 And David said, As Jehovah liveth, Jehovah will smite him; or his day shall come to die; or he shall go down into battle and perish. 11 Jehovah forbid that I should put forth my hand against Jehovah's anointed; but now, behold, I pray thee, the spear that is at his head, and the cruse of water, and let us go. 12 So David took the spear and the cruse of water from Saul's head; and they got them away: and no man saw it, nor knew it, neither did any awake; for they were all asleep, because a deep sleep from Jehovah had fallen upon them.

**II. ABNER'S CARELESSNESS.**

13 Then David went over to the other side, and stood on the top of the mountain afar off; a great space between them. 14 And David cried to the people, and to Abner the son of Ner, saying, Answerest thou not, Abner? Then Abner answered and said, Who art thou that criest to the king?

**III. SAUL'S CONFESSION.**

17 And Saul knew David's voice, and said, Is this thy voice, my son David? And David said,

It is my voice, my lord, O king.

21. Then said Saul, I have sinned: return, my son David, for I will no more do thee harm, because my life was precious in thine eyes this day: behold, I have played the fool, and have erred exceedingly.

**Notes Analytical and Expository**

1. THE PROGRAM OF FORBEARANCE was definitely planned by David in the wilderness of Ziph whither he was being pursued by Saul at the head of 3,000 men. One night from a nearby eminence of the camp he saw exactly where Saul lay in profound slumber. Accompanied by his nephew, Abishai, David descended to the camp and walked unobserved among the sleeping soldiers. When Abishai suggested the assassination of Saul, David instantly repelled the idea; he would not stretch forth his hand against the Lord's anointed, but leave to Jehovah through disease, battle, or some sudden stroke to compass the king's death. In finest forbearance, he left the king asleep, but took the spear at his head and hastened away to a place of safety.

2. THE TRUTH OF FORBEARANCE was exhibited from a hill-top across the ravine whence David addressed and aroused the sleeping host. He spoke particularly to Abner, calling him in irony a valiant man who, though protector of the king, had let David come to his very couch and take the royal spear and cruse of water. No doubt Abner winced under the words of the fugitive.

3. THE POWER OF FORBEARANCE was seen in the changed attitude of the king. Recognizing David's voice at once, Saul himself replied, calling David his son. The plea of David touched the monarch's heart. The animus of Saul in the present pursuit was not of Jehovah but of sinister influences at court. David knew it and Saul felt it. When, therefore, Saul saw that for a second time his life had been completely in the hands of David and had been graciously spared, he burst forth impulsively with the declaration that he had sinned and played the fool, and beseeching David to return to court. Though these words were so hearty, yet David knew the moods of the king and would not trust himself in his hands. But he did trust in the Lord and expressed his confidence that Jehovah would deliver him out of all tribulation in the future as in the past.

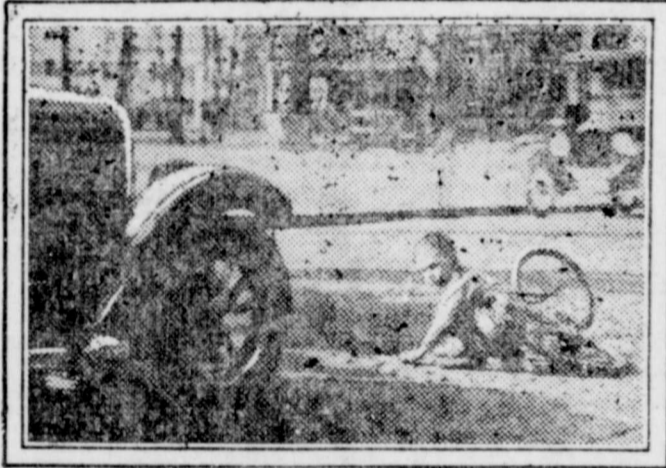

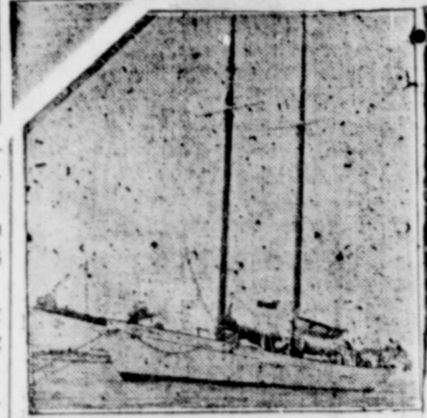



1. What is meant by sanitation?
2. How many deaths occurring annually are preventable?

### Answers

1. Sanitation means methods used to promote public health. Applied sanitation is a battle waged against filth disease.
2. About one-third of all the deaths occurring annually in the United States are preventable. The average length of human life has increased from approximately 40 years to 58 years during the last 12 or 15 years, and this has been due largely to the decrease in infant mortality. If preventable diseases were really prevented by application of scientific knowledge, the average span could be increased from 58 to 70 years.
3. Adenoids are little tumors (small swellings) which grow in the throat just back of the opening of the nose into the mouth and in front of the two small tubes which lead from the throat to the ears. These little tumors are reddish gray in color, soft and slimy in composition, and vary in size from that of a small pea to a mass that may completely fill the upper part of the throat.
4. A child with adenoids becomes a mouth-breather. Thus the air reaches the lungs in a cold and unpurified condition, resulting in frequent attacks of cold, bronchitis, or possibly pneumonia. The child also does not get into his body sufficient amount of air, which retards growth. Adenoids also cause ear trouble and often deafness, disturb digestion, produce a peculiar facial expression, and cause mental dullness.
5. Certain substances in food

which aid growth, improve the appetite, help the body to absorb food, and prevent certain diseases, are called vitamins.

6. Infectious diseases are the ones generally termed "catching" and are caused by germs that are spread from person to person or from animals.

7. A baby's birth should be registered to prove its right in later life to enter school, to marry, to enter military service or get exemption therefrom, to inherit property, to vote, to obtain a passport, to hold certain public offices, and for various other reasons.

8. By receipt of birth registration from the state health department. If you have not been notified that your baby's birth certificate has been received by this department, it has not reached us. Your physician should make this report—see him in regard to reason for delay.

9. Yes. In 1911, the pulmonary tuberculosis death rate for white persons was practically three times as high as at present. The death rate has also been decreased among the negroes, but to a smaller extent.

10. Flies are hatched in filth, and prefer to live and eat it. Flies may come to us from the manures of the barnyard, the decaying flesh of dead animals, the sputum of the consumptives, the body wastes of the typhoid patient, or other places equally as repulsive. They walk in this filth and carry tiny bits of it on their hairy feet and legs, which they deposit as specks on our food. Swat the fly, screen him out, and destroy his breeding place.

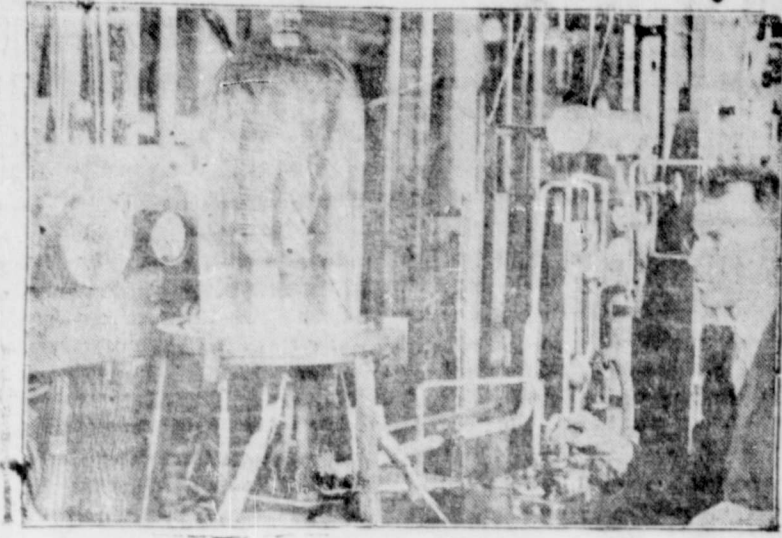
