

Mary had one little lamb, but each soldier in the United States Army has to have 26 sheep to provide wool for his clothing for his first year of service. Each enlisted man receives the

equivalent of approximately 199 pounds of wool, as is comes from the sheep's back. According to statistics compiled by the Quartermaster Corps it takes the wool output of 10 sheep to provide the soldier with clothing in the beginning of his military service and six more to maintain proper clothing stocks. poverty. The Thirty Years War NEW ARMY DEVICE CHANGES of 300 years ago was more than FLAT TIRES IN A JIFFY

An effective device made of aging reality, the results of readily available odds and ends has been developed at the Army's Holabird Quartermaster Depot, Baltimore, making it possible to change automobile

Conceived by Major C. Ellford Smith, the device consists of a piece of chain, four wood blocks a couple of metal rods, two hooks, a spare piece of serap iron and an ordinary jack.

Flat tires are placed flat on the wooden blocks. The trick is done by cranking up the jack so that the chain pulls the rim up from the bottom while the metal bars, pressing on the four blocks. push the casing down off the rim. The rim springs free. The casing can be pushed off by turning the tire over and repeating the process.

THE TWO ROADS AHEAD

By GEORGE C. HESTER

America today has two supreme tasks before her. The first is to support the war against Hitlerism. The sooner we stop dillydallying around and really get at the job in a serious way, the better it is going to be in the long run.

But America is also engaged in another struggle. It is a sort of rear-guard action against the forces that corrode and sap the strength of democratic institutions. In the final outcome, it is the Tight against these internal dangers and tendencies that may ultimately decide the fate of the democratic experiment. It is to that home front that we likewise must pay more attention.

Before us today are two roads, a parting of the way it may be for us Americans. One of them is paved with loose fiscal policies and the wasting of the very substance of democracy, accompanied by the ever looming specters of devaluation in spite of blighting taxation, the withering of all private enterprise and initiative, and eventually bankruptcy, regimentation, and stagnation. We all know what that way is. It is plainly marked by the wrecks of other democracies. It is the line of least resistance now,, marked by spineless politics and by apathy and indifference on the part of our people. It is that road we must not take.

We hear much today about the so-called "wave of the future. It is a vague term, ordinarily used to imply what may happen in the impact of events ahead, especially in the post-war era. Some day peace will come again and with it all of its problems. Already governments are planning to cushion the effects of peace, and to ease as much as possible the re-adjustments from the vast dislocations of wartime economy. The task of again gearing production to a peacetime economy, the shift of millions of men into new employment, the opening up of new markets and the stabilization of monetary systems, together with the reconstruction of much of the world that will be prostrate from the ravages of war, are all possibilities that challenge the imagination.

It is that day for which we must now plan so as to create a world where the springs of democratic liberties can flow again through the release of the initiative and the creative energies of men and women. This is the other road. Every business, with all the technical skill at its command, should be probing the possibilities and planning its course. Governments should be planning for that task. Municipal, county and state officials, instead of racing to Washington or to the state capital for largesses and handouts, should be planning for a competent, intelligent, and efficient administration of the public affairs entrusted to them.

MUST FACE REALITIES

Of all the great domestic difficulties confronting us in the future. I predict that the most difficult, the most obstinate and perhaps the most dangerous will be that of "public finance." Here again, the chief difficulty is the fact that we refuse to face reali- ward this vital phase of health. morning, Bartlett wrote, "the HARDIN-SIMMONS U. HAS

We borrow and borrow, instead of paying and paying. We cater to every group that has cooked up some scheme to raid the public treasury instead of saying "No," and meaning it. We especially dislike to face financial truths, but prefer or pretend to believe that some political hokus pokus will get us out of all of it. Under the present course of events, some sort of prodigious crash is ahead of us in public finance. Public debt, and its handmaidens, fiscal and monetary policies have betrayed racies. Down that path we have been traveling and traveling fast.

Above all things, this country today needs hard-boiled credit To solve this problem the public and fiscal policies. And the problem is one that won't wait very long. With a national debt shooting further and further beyond onr reach every hour we live, we are today being subjected to a subtle philosophy which says in substance that the solution of domestic problems is more and higher government spending. Such political philosophy is both untimely and dangerous simply because it is temporarily easy and popular now, but can be made a front behind which political blunders and the swollen and incompetent bureaucracies of the future can become entrenched.

It may be necessary for government to take from one-third to one-half of their people's income during an emergency.

But peacetime economics just won't operate under such a burden. There isn't a precedent for it. The preservation of the average taxpayer and his ability and willingness to carry his burden is the warp and woof of this democratic system. Its mudsills are private enterprise and initiative in business under a philosophy of live and let live, public integrity, and common honesty. If we bring our children to adult life with fixed bayonets. As soon as cannot perpetuate those principles we may as well dismiss the idea of preserving democracy

when a modern factory building is born. Industrial construction for national defense is now being accomplished in some instances in half as much time as under normal conditions, it is indicated in a report made public by Bethlehem Steel Company's Division of Fabricated Steel Construction.

The report reveals that up to July 15th this company alone completed the erection of \$0,000 tons of steel construction for defense manufactory and subject time required on any one job was 122 calendar days, and the shortest time 12 days.

The steel is up, the report indicates, and in some cases has since been roofed over and is now in production. For new units for the Douglas bomber factory at Long Beach, Calif., for the Westinghouse naval gun factory at Canton, for new buildings for the Curtiss-Wright airplane factory at Buffalo, for an armor plate machine shop for the days required to complete each one of more than twenty major defense industry projects was 66 days. The longest time required on any one job was 122 calendar days, and the shortest time 12 days.
