LEGION PLANS NAVY RECRUITING

W. Underwood, United Andrew Dilworth of San Antonio and Capt, H. W. Underwood, United States Navy, commanding the Naval ROTC Unit at the University of Texas. The campaign was started by the American Legion in response to a telegram from Secretary of Navy, Legionnaire Frank Knox, asking the American Legion to "recruit a minimum of one company consisting of not less than 140 men * * . The Navy has 338 ships in commission and 353 building. Need for men is obvious," said the telegram in part

and the telegram in part.

Commander Dilworth wrote the Secretary of the Navy "Texas will recruit two companies of 140 men each from the Houston and Dallas. recruiting area."
Capt. Underwood said "The Naval ROTC unit of the University

of Texas is anxious to make any contribution to the success of this "I am ready to do all I can for the War and Navy Departments and all-out defense as urged by President Roosevelt, in fact I think I am about two jumps ahead," said Governor Stevenson.

Each American Legion Post is requested to send to the nearest Naval Recruiting Station, or sub-station, at least one recruit for the Navy or the Naval Reserve on or before October 27. Fitting ceremonies will be held on October 27 either at Austin, or Houston and Dallas with high State, Navy and American Legion officials

participating.

Governor Stevenson issued a proclamation calling upon Texas citizens to observe Navy Day, October 27 "For it was in October, 1775 that our forefathers * * * came to the conclusion we must have a Navy to maintain peace."

Changes Coming In Social Security By GEORGE C. HESTER

According to information coming out of Washington, it appears that plans for changing the entire social security program are now taking place. In order to better understand the true nature of these changes, let us note the different phases of the social security program which they are designed to modify.

There are four major provisions at present, which might be termed as the four legs of the program. These, together with the changes proposed are as follows:

(1) The first is that of "old age insurance." This is strictly a federal program supported by a one per cent payroll tax on each the employer and the employe. It is both a worker and family insurance program since it offers some seven different kinds of benefit payments, including the retirement benefit for the worker when he retires at 65.

Now comes the proposal that the payroll tax be increased from the one per cent to two per cent on each the employer and the employe. It is further proposed that farm workers, casual laborers, professional people, domestic labor and self-employed business men be brought into the program. Here is to be seen a vast extension of this phase of social security, since the classes named above are not at present covered by its provisions.

In addition, it is proposed that disability insurance be included. This would take care of workers becoming permanently disabled before reaching 65, and any worker who through sickness or N. (3) The "old age benefits," or "old age pensions" will probably be left to the states, with the fifty-fifty financing arrangement down as he fled from the continued. There is strong support, however, to increase the share of federal aid to the poorer states in the South, in order that pensions may be increased without further state funds. This would benefit each Texas pensioner. probably as much as five dollars per month.

In addition to the above changes, some form of general health insurance may be instituted. Such a vast extension of the Social Security program is being offered with several objectives in mind. Like nearly every proposal, it is parading under the defense label. by contending that such taxes will help avoid inflation by siphoning off savings.

The heavy payroll taxes on employers, which must be paid regardless of profits or losses, will drive many employers into bankruptcy should a depression return and profit margins are wiped out. Such a condition could only add to and intensify insecurity instead of bringing security. Moreover, the vast payroll taxes over and above those used to meet the current obligations, are invested in federal securities. This means, of course, that the money goes into current expenditures. The increased payroll

taxes, therefore, would secure more revenues for present spending This means, of course, that the social security benefits, such as the retirement payments and the like, will depend largely upon the future value of the government's bonds which will constitute the reserves. Thus, much of the so-called social security of the future will depend on our government's ability to finance its obligations including its ever-increasing national debt,

Moncus aided in the search all of Saturday night and together with Sheriff Bill Collins of Curry County arrested one of the men in a Clovis hotel Sunday afternoon.

Getting two bloodhounds, the posse followed the trail from the car the men abandoned, and found they had separated on foot about 10 miles west of Clo-vis. By use of the dogs the posse trailed Compton to a farm house six miles west of Clovis, where he had eaten dinner. A farmer had taken him into Clo-

One of the boys finally said, "Well the trouble is, when you get into the army, the training is often the same, day in and day out, and you begin to think that the whole of life centers in what you get to eat, and when you get your pay." I wonder if perhaps one aspect of our officers' training is not being neglected. Should we include a course in the art of encouraging conversation among your associates? Should we remember that in both the German and Russian armies there is a relationship between the officers and their men which is not entirely official in character?

I have been sent a little brochure from the Consumers Book Co-operative, which they call Reader's Ob-server. It is a helpful little publication because it lists books in various fields, and has an article at the beginning, telling one about the trend of interest in reading material, and commenting on books in many fields. I was interested to find that a popular vote which they have taken shows a great interest in religious books, and secondly in books that can be classed as educa-tion for democracy. 
