Mr. Sykes also has 10 acres of oats that he is grazing. 125 ewes were placed in this field on March 10 and have lambed out in this field. He has 128 lambs out of these ewes and still has a thick cover of oats on the field.

Mr. V. C. Segelquist of the Payne Gap Soil Conservation Group is grazing 40 acres of oats and hubam clover with 50 calves averaging 376 pounds. The oats and clover were seeded last October with 100 pounds of superphosphate and on the 5th of March the calves were turned in. The calves have been fed 2 bales of dry hay per day to help prevent scouring.

Mr. Segelquist stated that the kendall Sunday. growth of the oats and clover is about the same as it was on March 5th.

Applicants will be required to assemble in an examination "Sooner or later, each of us will grow old or die. When either of these events occurs wage income stops. It is upon these simple truths that old-age and survivors insurance under the Social Security Act is based," said James B. Marley, Manager of the Austin Office of the

Social Security Administration. "Under this system of Federal insurance, wage-earners earn. and they and their employers pay for the financial protection of their families," he continued. "The insurance is paid when it is likely to be needed the most -that is, when older people or young children are left without wage income. When earnings cease in old age or death, the retired wage-earner or his family receive the benefits which have been earned. The insurance payments are not large, monthly amounts, but when paid over a period of years, they aggregate very substantial sums, and they are paid as an earned right to those who are entitled to them. The payments partially replace an insured wage - earner's average wages

IT IS A SIN to tell the truth out of So declares a famous Protestant creed. It is not always good nor wise to tell everybody everything you

know. Keeping may be one of the best things you ever do. himself knew how to keep a secret till time to tell it. He never uttered an untruth about himself, but for



a long time he did not openly declare his conviction, in spite of being pestered to say Yes or No

The question was: Are you the Messiah? This was the same as asking. Are you the King? Jesus would not say Yes, because the mere word would be taken to mean "revolutionist" or "traitor." But he would not say No, because he was a King; indeed of all men he had the best right to the title.

Royal Entrance

BUT WHEN the time came, Jesus did declare himself king in a spectacular way. We know the story as the "Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem," the story of Palm Sunday, now so fresh in our minds. who were familiar with the mean ing of symbols, both in word and

When Jesus rode into the ancient capital where his forefathers reigned, astride a mule colt, the people knew, and he knew they would know, that this was not just somebody riding a mule on a Sunday morning. In the history of the Hebrews, mules were the steeds of kings.

temple offerings be paid). The racket was notorious; every decent Jew hated the priestly profiteers. But no one had ever done anything about it, for that would mean assuming an authority over the temple that no man dared to assume,

But Jesus took it on himself. His direct and even violent action in smashing the racketeering ring was a mark of something more than ordinary self-confidence. He laid claim to being no less than the Master of God's Temple. He was acting in the name of God and with the authority of God.

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




