Postal Receipts A year-end financial state- Here Last Year

good news is most useful came this week from the Goldthwaite Post Office where Postmaster Lucile Fairman announced that during 1951 postal receipts locally increased more than 14 per cent over the previous year.

"A check of postal receipts of the Goldthwaite Post Office as of the close of business on December 31, 1951, showed a total of \$18,319.82 as compared with \$16,029.59 for the calendar year of 1950," the Postmaster said.

For the last quarter of 1951 the Goldthwaite Post Office receipts totaled \$6,226.92 as compared with \$5,442.56 for the corresponding quarter of the previous year. That also showed a gain of better than 14 per cent. Postmaster Fairman took note of the fact that parcel post rates increased last October 1 but she added that their share in the gain for the last quarter of 1951 amounted to approxing the entire calendar year



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

I found the people to be of issues with which we are conconcerned about high taxes, debt and the present-day cost of government. Most of the people want this nation made strong and powerful during the critical and uncertain times. But they loathe the waste and extragagance by the military as well as all other agencies.

They feel there has been poor judgement used by the Executive branch in hiring many key officials, and that the Congress has acted with wisdom and propriety in exposing crime and corruption wherever it could be found. Many expressed the hope that these investigations be continued so long as they seem to be doing any good.

The president's action in calling for a complete revamping of the Bureau of Internal Revenue, with the offices of Collectors to be abolished and most key officials to be put under Civil Service, offers a plan patterned after the Hoover-Commission recommendations. The proposal will receive the attention of the Congress early in the session. While coming at a late date, the plan seems to be basically sound. There is no way of preventing dishonesty and corruption if dishonest or corrupt men are employed, whether under Civil Service or not But the reorganization should discourage a practice of political rewards in making appointments, and thru an independent inspection service, should be a very proper step in the ight direction.

Commissioner of Internal Revenue, John Dunlap, is said to be about the busiest man in Washington these days. Having aken over the job last Summer after serving ably as Collector of Internal Revenue at Dallas, he has been prying into the caliber of personnel and has removed a lot of them. He has disclosed that a total of 166 employes of the tax agency were fired or forced to resign in 1951, including six Collectors. Dunlap and thousands of other Federal employes are considered to be honest, but it seems that he inherited a good many politically inspired appointees who turned out to be corrupt.

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

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


