Wool Sheared After January 1, Is Eligible For Payments Under Act

To be eligible for the new wool incentive payments the wool must have been sheared after January 1, 1955 and marketed beginning April 1, 1955. L. H. Soules, Chairman of the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee stated today.

He explained that those wool producers who shear between January 1 and April 1, 1955 who want the wool to be eligible for the wool payments provided under the National Wool Act of 1954 must retain ownership of the wool until after April 1. Wool sheared during the January-March period may be stored in a commercial wool warehouse or consigned for future sale but the owner must retain title during the period if the wool is to be eligible.

Under the National Wool Act of 1954 the Secretary of Agriculture has announced an incentive price of 62 cents per pound for shorn wool, grease basis, for the 1955 marketing year. If the national average price received by all producers of wool falls below the incentive price, payments will be made to producers.

Payments made to producers will be based on the percentage needed to bring the national average price received by producers up to the incentive level, and that percentage will be used in calculating the payment to be received by each grower for his wool. For example, if the incentive price is 20 per cent above the national average price each producer's incentive payment would amount to 20 per cent of the net sales proceeds he secured for his wool.

"The method of determining

any payment made means that each producer should sell his wool for the best possible price because his incentive payment will be a percentage of the net amount he obtains in selling his wool", commented Chairman Soules.

Further details of eligibility and other requirements will be announced later. Payments cannot be made until after the marketing year when the national average price can be determined.

City Installs More Mercury Vapor Lights

Twelve new mercury vapor lights have been installed by city crews during the past week, according to announcement by W. C. Barnett, City Utilities manager. Installation of these lights is a continuation of a program of additional lights throughout the city which was started some time ago. They were approved and have been on order for several months and arrived about ten days ago.

Most of the twelve mercury vapor are being used at certain locations to replace other lights which are being moved to locations where there have been no lights and where they are needed.

Two new lights have been installed in front of the new elementary school, two at the high school, one at the Locker plant corner, one at the corner of Littlepage produce and Horton Lumber Company. New mercury vapor lights are also being placed at the corner locations of the Baptist Church, Methodist Church, Church of Christ and the Nazarene Church.

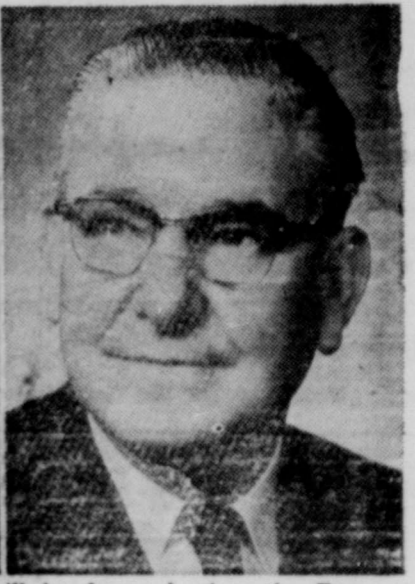
New lights are being placed in these locations where there is need for additional lighting because of heavy traffic. Old lights from these locations are in turn moved to other locations where lights are needed.

Plans Have Been Completed For Seventeenth Annual Mills County Stock Show Next Monday And Tuesday

Mills County Livestock Raisers' Association's seventeenth annual Livestock Show will be held at the show barns in Goldthwaite next Monday and Tuesday, January 17 and 18. The show will officially open Monday morning and close late Tuesday evening. After this county show a good number of local exhibitors will be ready to make their bid in the big shows of the state.

R. L. "Bob" Steen, president of the Association, along with other officials, Luther Jernigan, vice-president, Glynn Collier, treasurer and Carl Casbeer, secretary, and their many committees have done a good job in getting plans formulated for this year's show. They report that everything is all set for two big days.

All livestock must be in the stalls by 8:30 a. m. Monday morning, January 17, and remain until 4:30 p. m. on Tuesday, January 18.

NOTICE ABOUT WEIGHTS

All hogs and calves to be entered in the show must be weighed between 7:00 and 9:00 o'clock Monday morning January 17. Show secretary, Carl Casbeer, will be at the public scales at Harper Feed Store during those hours to get official weight of all hogs and calves. No other weights will be honored by show officials.

Officials report a record number of entries have been turned in to the secretary for this year's event. According to their report 55 steers, 21 hogs and 140 sheep have been entered by 4-H and FFA members. This represents an increase in number of

er last year. Fifty-seven goats and a good number of breeding cattle have also been entered.

Tom Henry of Burnet will judge Swine, Arthur Davis of Sabin is the judge for goats, Guy Powell of Kerrville will judge Sheep and Frank Jordan of Mason will judge Hereford breeding cattle and fat steers.

A new feature of the show this year is the grass judging contest. Superintendents for this event will be David Walters and J. H. Priddy, of the Brown-Mills Soil Conservation Service board.

The show will officially open at 10:00 a. m. Monday morning. Judging for the two days will follow this schedule. Monday: Hogs—10:00 a. m.; Goats—11:00 a. m.; Sheep—1:00 p. m.; Grass Judging Contest—3:00 p. m. Tuesday: Breeding Cattle—10:00 a. m. and Fat Steers—1:00 p. m.

The general arrangements committee is composed of Charles Davis, Hog Superintendent; Glynn Sanders, Sheep Superintendent; Luther Jernigan, Goat Superintendent and W. V. Horton, Cattle Superintendent. Show secretary is Carl Casbeer. Col. A. L. Muller will serve as auctioneer for the sale to follow the show.

According to report from Col. Vance Cornelius, chairman of the merchants contact committee, retail stores will close from 1:00 to 4:00 o'clock on Tuesday afternoon while fat steer judging takes place. This has been customary for several years.

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Nixon to Be Target of '56 Demo Attack Speakers to Hit At Ike Via Young V. P.

WASHINGTON—Democrats will try to use the kill-two-birds-with-one-stone technique in one phase of their attempt to recapture the White House in 1956. They will be aiming at President Eisenhower through Vice President Richard M. Nixon. Nixon irked the Democrats not end with his 1954 campaign theme accusing them of "softness" toward Communism.

Democratic orators, in their retaliatory onslaughts against the young vice president, will keep charging that Ike himself fully endorsed Nixon's stand and therefore is equally deserving of Democratic enmity.

One of the ideas behind this strategy is this: Should Mr. Eisenhower by any chance decide not to seek a second term, Nixon, at the moment, appears to be the President's political heir. So the dual attack will be calculated to undermine the popularity of both men in advance of the GOP 1956 convention.

GOOD PARTNERS—The Eisenhower administration will soon start a vigorous campaign to convince its "good partners" in South America to relax their many restrictions on United States investors. Many American businessmen hesitate to pour capital into the Latin-American nations that need it so badly because of these restrictions.

For instance, most South American governments refuse to allow foreign investors to do any more than lend their money. They have absolutely no voice in policy. In some places, they cannot even suggest who might be hired or fired.

This, the Eisenhower administration will go out of its way to point out, is no way to encourage would-be investors, who like to have some sort of reasonable say on how their money is spent. Unless there is a change, the United States will warn, South America may find itself virtually cut off from the funds it needs so badly to develop itself.

OUTLOOK ON UMT—A trial run for Universal Military Training appears to stand a good chance of favorable action by the new 84th Congress which convenes on Jan. 5, despite firm opposition from some groups to a UMT program.

The Eisenhower administration is preparing to ask authority to try out a reserve program that would amount to UMT when legislation is submitted to extend the draft for another four years. The Defense department plan requests permission to set up a voluntary UMT for 100,000 youths to see how the system would work out.

Rep. Dewey Short (R), Missouri, outgoing chairman of the House armed services committee and leader of a bloc of congressmen who succeeded in killing an earlier UMT program in 1952, termed the new plan "the best thing I've seen" and strongly indicated he would endorse it.

In addition, Senator John C. Stennis (D), Mississippi, a member of the Senate armed services committee, declared that Congress would enact a UMT program in the coming year if there is "strong presidential support" given it.

POTENTIAL VETO—A presidential veto apparently awaits any move by the Democrats in the 84th Congress to boost farm price supports back to 90 per cent of parity. Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson has signified he will fight any effort to replace the new flexible price support program with the old system of rigid, high supports. Benson has also made it plain he will use his influence at the White House to obtain a presidential veto of any bill that would alter to any extent the agriculture act of 1953 passed by the Republican Congress.

In view of the fact that the GOP sustained no serious congressional defeats in predominantly farm areas, Benson's influence with President Eisenhower could be expected to prevail.

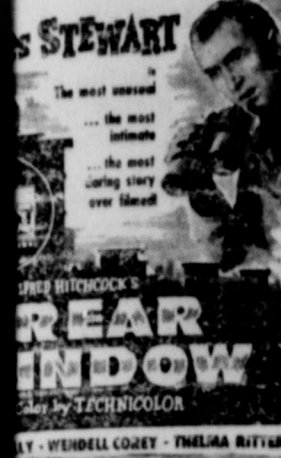

Some Sardine Specials

By ALICE DENHOFF

HERE are some interesting and pleasing dishes, all using Norway sardines.

Potatoes and Sardines

Put 1 oz. butter in saucpan; add 2 oz. minced onion and heat to golden brown. Add clove of garlic (if desired) and 2 tomatoes, peeled and cut in pieces, 1/2 tsp. salt, pinch each of black pepper and thyme, and 3/4 c. water and juice of 1 lemon.

Cook for a few minutes. Add tsp. parsley, chopped.

Pour 1/2 of this mixture on bottom of baking dish. Take enough for a layer from 1 lb. of potatoes, raw-sliced. Arrange about 2/3 can of Norway sardines on top of potatoes. Then cover with remaining potatoes. Decorate with 6 or 7 sardines.

Add remainder of sauce. Cover

with piece of waxed paper. Cook at 350° F. for 30 min. Serves 4.

Rizzotto Valencia

Rizzotto Valencia is another fine dish or a good Friday special. To serve 4, chop a medium-sized onion and brown in tsp. melted butter. Add 1 green pepper, diced, and then 1 c. rice. Mix well and add 2 c. chicken broth gradually, stirring constantly with a wooden spoon.

Creamy Rice

Add 1 tbsp. butter and 1/2 tsp. grated cheese. The rice should be creamy.

Open and strain 2 3/4-oz. cans Norway sardines. Roll them lightly in milk and flour. Saute in butter until golden brown.

Place sardines on top of the layer of prepared rice and serve hot tomato sauce around rice.

Dr. Calleros, El Paso historian, says, "When you live in its shadows, you learn to look up at the whole imposing mass—sometimes dull and barren,

sometimes mighty, sometimes delicately beautiful—and you call it all Mt. Franklin. You'll find that even Mt. Franklin has a few trees, a few springs, and legends galore. And when you're gone from it, you'll still remember how it turned purple in the sunsets and bright rose in the morning light."

There are television spires on the mountain which always give out red lights at night. But ever since the Sunday before

Christmas there has been a lighted star on the mountain.

CATTLE GRUB EXPERIMENTS

A recent event in Houston may have marked a milestone in the search for better cattle grub control methods.

Entomologists are making continuous studies of various grub killing tactics and new experiments are announced almost every month. One of the most recent tests conducted in Texas was the injection of chemicals into grub infested cows which showed good prospects.

In Houston, however, a report

by U. S. Department of Agriculture Entomologists A. R. Roth and Gaines W. Eddy, uncovered a phosphate-type insecticide spray that is lethal to the destructive pest.

The experimental insecticide is designated simply as 21/199. Technically it is compounded from the tongue-twisting elements: 3-chloro 4-methylumbelliferone O, O-diethylthiophosphate.

Roth and Eddy told the Entomological Society of America delegates at Houston that they found a 5 percent spray of 21/199, applied to the backs of nine grubby cattle killed all the grubs—245 of them—in less than a week. In a comparable test, using the older rotenone sprays, 84 percent of the grubs were killed the first week and 91 percent by the end of the second week. This was somewhat slower than the new experimental chemical.

Apparently, 21/199 kills grubs by direct contact. As grubs reach a late stage of development within the body of cattle, they form cysts under the skin on the animals backs and make a hole in the hide. Trace amounts of the spary or wash penetrate these holes, killing the grubs.

If the grub is uncontrolled, it eventually drops to the ground and pupates. Heel flies emerge from the pupae and lay eggs on cattle. These hatch into tiny, worm-like larvae that burrow through the skin and re-commence their development as internal parasitic grubs.

The spray 21/199 is still experimental, however. Its toxic effect on cattle is not yet known. In the meantime, cattlemen should continue to depend on rotenone for grub control until the tests on 21/199 are completed and final opinions are obtained.

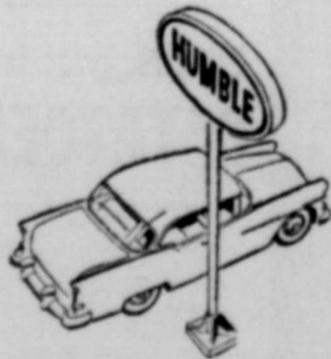

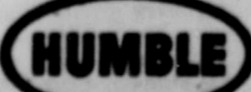

PARENT PROBLEMS

Nobody Likes Tattlers

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

IN Russia, many a child is rewarded by the police or other public officials for tattling to them about his parents or other relatives. Telling family secrets to government officials is considered the patriotic thing to do in that country. Under such conditions, it's easy to see how some children with a strong imagination, or an urge for vengeance when punished by parents or denied privileges by them, might easily venture into all sorts of falsehoods about their parents. Can you imagine how insecure the parent-child relationship would be then?

Telling on Others

A slightly similar urge to "tell" on loved ones seems to lurk around in human hearts in any country, ready to go into action. It's apparent among young children tempted to tattle on a brother, sister or playmate when the tattler usually is rewarded by seeing the one he tattled on get punished.

It's more subtle and insidious when the wife or husband begins to tell a relative or close friend about some real or imagined vice or trait she or he has come to dislike in the spouse, or about some matter on which this wife and husband strongly disagree. The bearer of such tales is warmly rewarded by the avid eagerness of

the listener to hear more. Many a divorcee can date the beginning of a wrecked marriage to the first of such talebearing.

Advice to Couples

Often, in this column, I've entreated young married couples never to talk of their doubts or worries about their marriage to a relative or close friend, or to anybody but a wholly disinterested person, preferably a marriage counselor.

Another sinister practice only slightly different from the foregoing is "undercover talk" with a child about the other parent, such as: "We just won't let Mother know about it," or "We'll keep this from Daddy."

Discussing Children

In the same class, is similar talk by one parent with a child about this child's brother or sister. It can happen when the child sharing in such talk is not quite 6, or when he is 12, 30, or 60.

Once a wife or husband, parent or child, begins carrying stories as mere gossip among his loved ones about another loved one, very precious relationships are impaired. The greatest loss comes to the one who does this—the loss to his inner self, loss to his self-regard and integrity. Certainly it is not the road to happiness for anybody.

Brown-Mills Soil Conservation News

CHARLES HAENISCH beginning of the New Year's Resolutions: The time to review the past year. It is time to look toward the future and to plan and re-plan to make the new year a better one. The past few years have painfully pointed out the importance of water for production. For the new year the main resolution of all ranchers will be: "To hold all of the rainfall on my fields and pastures for maximum production of grass and grain."

Each this objective of holding all of the rainfall in resolutions for different aspects of agriculture might

- go something like this.
- A dry land farmer's New Year's Resolutions:
- 1) I will treat each acre of my land according to its needs and capability.
 - 2) I will terrace that land that is in need of terracing.
 - 3) I will use strip crops and cover crops on that land that needs protection from wind erosion.
 - 4) I will leave as much stubble as possible on or near the surface of the land to protect it from the rain drop erosion and excessive summer heat.
 - 5) I will follow a crop rotation plan using a legume regularly to condition the soil, maintain its productivity and

its water holding capacity.

A rancher's New Year resolution:

- 1) I too will treat each acre of my land according to its needs and capability.
- 2) I will maintain a minimum of 2000 lbs. of cover and litter on all my pasture to assure maximum production of grass and livestock.
- 3) All areas in my pasture that are bare because of drought or overgrazing I will pit or chisel to hold as much rainfall as possible.
- 4) I will completely defer, during the entire growing season, all pitted and chiseled areas so that sufficient cover and litter for rainfall conservation will be established.
- 5) I will develop conservation plans so that when the drought is broken, cover and litter will be maintained on all of the land, thereby insuring that full use can be made of all rainfall.

The Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District's resolutions:

- 1) We will assist farmers and ranchers in every way possible to conserve their soil, water, and plants.
- 2) We will work with Federal and State agencies for programs that will fit the needs of the land and the people.
- 3) We will work with business and professional men to help them understand the needs of the land and the farming people.
- 4) We will assist farmers and ranchers develop and apply conservation programs for their farms and ranches.

W. A. Robbins Jr., Funeral Services Are Held Last Saturday Afternoon

Funeral services for W. A. Robbins, Jr. 56, were held at the First Methodist Church of Goldthwaite, Saturday afternoon, January 8, 1955 at 3:30 o'clock. Rev. Ed. H. Lovelace pastor of the church assisted by Rev. C. E. Lancaster and Rev. W. L. White both of San Saba conducted the services. Mr. Robbins was born October 17, 1898 in San Saba, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Robbins Sr. and passed away Thursday, January 6, 1955 by accidental drowning in a tank on the Leonard Ranch, where he lived, some 13 miles southwest of Goldthwaite, when he apparently fell off a makeshift barge. Mills County Sheriff C. F. Stubblefield, investigating officer, said Mr. Robbins, who could not swim, had built the barge using four large barrels. He had placed an overhead wire across the tank with which to pull the barge across. The overhead wire broke, apparently causing Mr. Robbins to lose his balance and fall from the barge. The body was recovered at 10:50 p.m. by Truitt Auldridge, who was casting the grappling hook from the bank. The body was in an estimated 20 feet of water about 12 feet from the bank. Estimated time of the drowning was about 4:00 p.m. Mills County Justice of the Peace Jess Tullos, returned a verdict of death due to acci-

idental drowning. On December 18, 1918 he was married to Miss Eula Mae Haley of San Saba and to this union four children were born, all of whom survive. The family moved to Mills County in 1940 where they had lived since. Survivors are the widow, four children, William Wiley Robbins and Mrs. S. W. Holcomb of Goldthwaite, Mrs. Van Gauny of San Antonio and Mrs. T. A. Davenport of San Saba; his mother, Mrs. W. A. Robbins Sr. of San Saba; five grand sons, a number of nieces and nephews. Also four sisters, Mrs. Floyd Massey of Lubbock, Mrs. Edgar House, Mrs. John Jackson and Miss Earline Robbins of San Saba. Pallbearers were: Macey Berry, Ferrel Stewart, Hugh Forrest Smith, J. M. Wrinkle, Mike and Wallace Johnson. Burial was in the San Saba City Cemetery under the direction of the Roy Wilkins Funeral Home.
