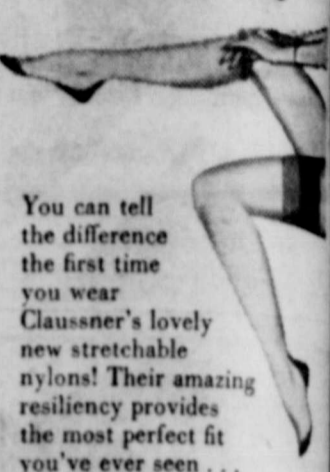

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Long Labor Peace Era May End This Spring Auto Workers to Ask Annual Wage Guarantee

Special to Central Press

WASHINGTON—President Eisenhower in his two years in office has enjoyed a consistent record of labor peace insofar as strikes are concerned. However, the mill-pond atmosphere may be disrupted this spring when CIO President Walter Reuther begins negotiations with the motor industry on a new contract. Bargaining is scheduled to get underway in April.

Reuther has bluntly announced that he will demand that the Auto Workers union, which he also heads, be given a guaranteed annual wage and has implied that he will not be averse to strike action if his proposals are rebuffed.

Negotiators for the industry have maintained a discreet silence on the proposals that their workers be assured of a guaranteed income each year. It is doubtful if the President could invoke the Taft-Hartley injunction provisions to halt an auto strike because such a move in the courts must establish that a strike would constitute a national emergency.

On the other hand, the nation's economy is geared closely to the general health of the auto industry, where competition has waxed fiercer and fiercer in recent years. A prolonged auto strike could cause Mr. Eisenhower and his advisors completely to revamp their hopes for a flourishing and prosperous year in the United States for management and labor alike.

RED STRATEGY—Diplomatic officials in Washington believe they have found a hint of the Communist world's strategy in the contrasting attitude between Red China and Russia on the issue of jailed Americans. While Russia recently freed three American citizens who had been held for years, Communist China has refused to release imprisoned American flyers and even has exploited them for propaganda reasons.

Russia's conciliatory attitude compared with China's war-like stand at first puzzled the State department, but officials now believe they have found the answer. Their opinion is that the Communist bloc has decided to intensify its drive in the Far East rather than in Europe. Despite protests about German re-armament, the Reds have been unusually quiet in Europe.

On the other hand, Red China—undoubtedly with the Soviet Union's backing—has turned the Far East into a powderkeg with its provocative actions. The Communists apparently believe they now have a better chance of success among Asia's millions than in any of the free nations of Europe, and thus are concentrating on the Far East for propaganda purposes.

TWO ROSE WOODS—Mrs. Mamie Eisenhower and Vice President Richard M. Nixon have something in common. Each has a Rose Woods as an aide.

Nixon's is his secretary. Mrs. Eisenhower's is a personal maid who has been with the First Lady since before the Eisenhowers came to the White House. To prevent confusion, Nixon's Rose Woods now generally says: "This is Rose Mary Woods calling" when she telephones the White House.

Questions And Answers On Filing Income Tax Returns For Year 1954

Question: We often hear that the filing of a Federal tax return is a "Mental Hazard". What are some of the reasons for this concern?

Answer: There are two reasons that are primarily responsible for the difficulty some taxpayers have in preparing their returns. The first is the uncertainty as to what deductions and credits may be claimed on the return. The second is due to the taxpayers' not maintaining adequate records. The first can be remedied by reading very carefully the pamphlet received with the blank form. It is very important that a taxpayer read and study the pamphlet before preparing his 1954 return.

In most instances, the taxpayer will find that the study of this pamphlet will be profitable, as the new law contains many changes that are beneficial. Obviously, unless proper study is made, the taxpayer will overlook some change that would have saved him money. At times, problems are involved requiring specific information which may be obtained by a telephone call or visit to your local Internal Revenue Service office.

The second reason for the difficulties that a taxpayer sometimes finds himself in is due to not maintaining the proper records, such as cancelled checks, receipts, contracts, etc., during the year, and then putting off the preparation of the tax return until the last minute. The Service cannot keep a record of a taxpayer's expenditures; that he must do himself. It is suggested that you become tax conscious through the year and

make a record of your expenditure form the first to the last day of the year.

Further, where a record is made of a deductible expenditure, be sure that you preserve the paid bill or other documents in a systematic manner. Since the wives do the majority of the shopping and otherwise look after the family finances, they are in the best position to maintain these records. Get into the good habit of jotting down these expenditures at the time they are made. If this is done, you will find that much

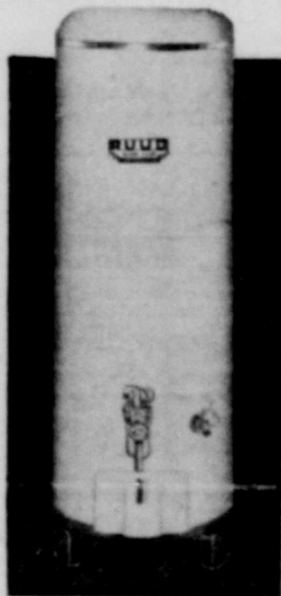

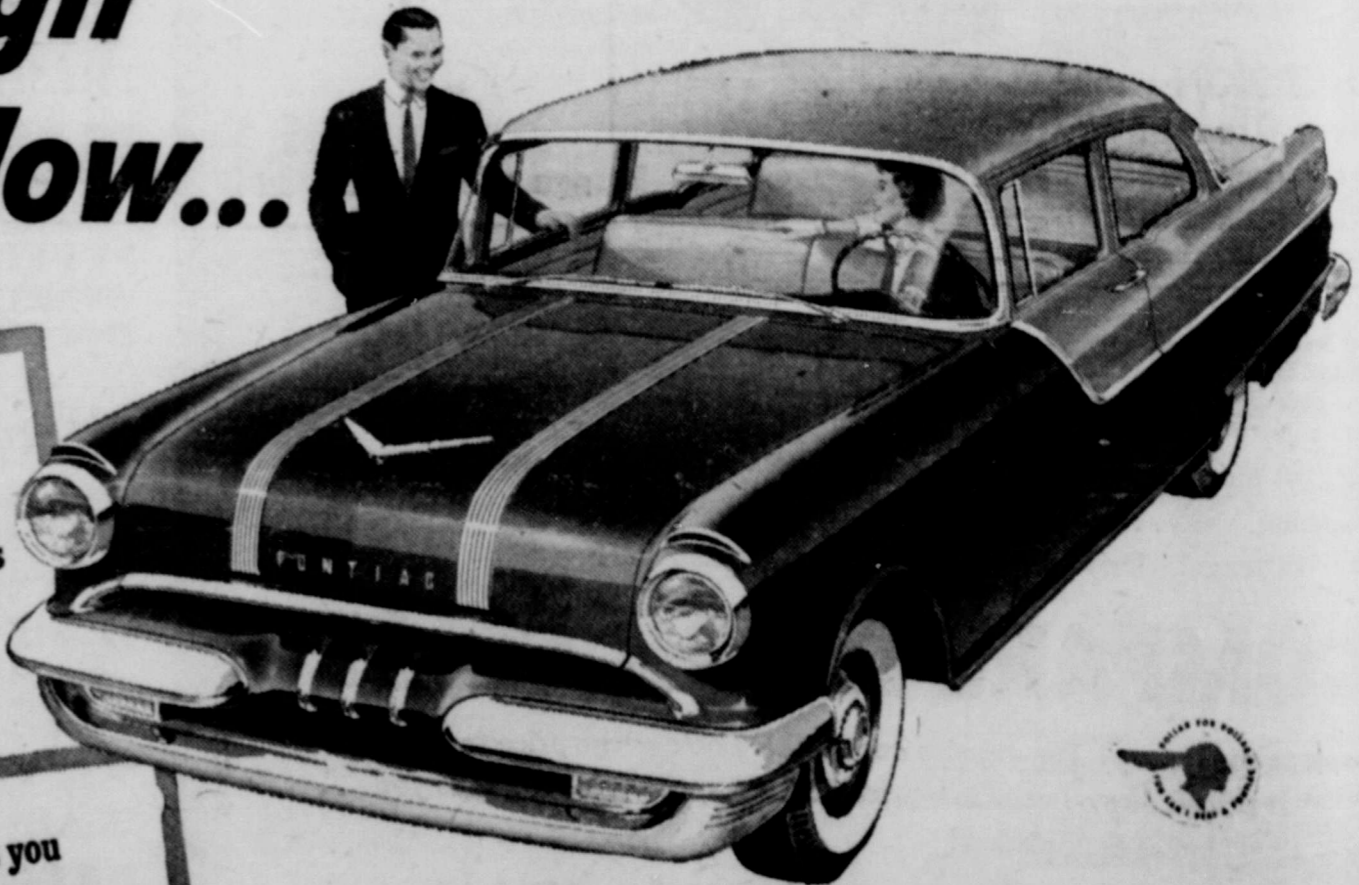

DROUTH HAY PROGRAM SURVEY

Half a loaf appears to be better than none as far as the drouth relief hay program for Texas is concerned. According to a survey made by the Texas Department of Agriculture, the program which paid a part of hay transportation costs to drouth areas proved to be of some benefit to hard-hit cattlemen, but it could stand some improvement.

March 31st marks the final

phase of the present program inaugurated jointly by the state and federal governments. Should it be continued in 127 counties designated in the disaster area? The department wanted to find out and sent questionnaires to leading agriculturists in each county.

Some 200 hundred replies to the first question "Should the program be continued", leaned heavily toward extension beyond March 31, especially if additional rains were not received.

Seventy-five said "yes", indicating drouth conditions were still serious in those counties. "No", said 63 letters and "perhaps, if no rain comes," declared 66 others.

Judging from the answers and other sources, many of the counties have fair to good prospects for spring grass at this time. More moisture is still needed, however, before adequate pasture are assured.

Was the hay program adequate? Fifty-seven flatly stated "no", 91 said "yes", and another 57 said some benefits were derived from it but the program should be improved if it is continued.

Most of the criticism was directed at the price of hay by the time it reached the drouth areas. Any benefits derived from the reduced freight rates was absorbed by the increased cost

of the hay, most correspondents said. Others cited too much red tape which caused the program to lag. Still others asked that protein feed was needed more than hay.

In reply to suggestions for program improvement, a Palo Pinto man summed up the general feeling by requesting a cheaper source or supply of hay with less red tape and more aid in freight rates.

But a Stonewall farmer recommended that the department take the only sure method of drouth relief.

"Have it rain more!", he said.

Peach And Plum Trees Should Be Fertilized Now For Best Results

College Station, Spec.— Peach and plum trees will grow-off faster and offer chances for bigger harvests if treated early in the year with a complete fertilizer.

Three-hundred to 400 pounds of 12-12-12 in February or 300 pound application of 5-10-10 will do the job in an orchard March followed in April by a of 70 bearing trees an acre.

Spread four to six pounds of the 12-12-12 mixture around each tree and a like amount of 5-10-10 in April, advises J. F. Rosborough, extension horticultural marketing specialist. Scatter the fertilizer in an area from the outer edges of each tree's shade cover to within three or four feet of the trunk, Rosborough says.

Disk the fertilizer into the soil to a depth of three or four inches immediately after ap-

plication.
A grove of 70 trees an acre needs at least 60 pounds of nitrogen, 80-100 pounds of phosphoric acid and 60-80 pounds of potash yearly. These requirements are met with the above recommendation, the specialist adds.
Rosborough explains that fruit trees need abundant nitrogen early in the season. Heavy applications later, however, may cause excessive terminal growth and delay ripening of the fruit.
Late April and early May is a critical time in fruit production, he concludes. That's the time when trees develop a fruit crop and set next year's fruiting buds.

A report from the Attorney General's office reveals that since the beginning of the veterans' land investigation in October of last year, John Ben Shepperd's office has been a beehive of activity.

Shepperd estimates he and his assistants have traveled over 18,000 miles and have put in over 41,000 man-hours of time on the veterans land investigation.

Shepperd has met with grand juries almost daily.

Thus far, the Bexar and DeWitt Co. grand juries have returned a total of 188 indictments against eight persons involved in veterans' land sales.

In addition, the State has filed three criminal complaints in Travis County.

Ten civil suits have been filed against 25 separate promoters. The total recovery sought by Shepperd in these 10 suits is \$1,604,000.

Attorney General Shepperd plans to meet with 13 different grand juries during the month of March. He forecasts that this month will see the returning of "hundreds of criminal indictments against most of the persons involved."

Shepperd has added a complete new division to his department to process veterans' land civil and criminal cases. It is headed by Cecil E. Burney of Corpus Christi an ex-prosecutor and former president of the State Bar of Texas.

SESSION PASSING

Half of the regular session of the 45th Legislature is gone.

Governor Shivers said he wasn't perturbed at the slow start on important tax, water, appropriations and other legislation. He hadn't expected lawmakers to finish much legislation in the first half of the session.

There still is plenty of time, the Governor believes, to complete the program.

MINOR WATER BILLS

Two minor water bills got an okay in the House.

One gives the State Water Board power to review proposals for federal projects. Veto power for the governor, originally in the bill, was stricken out.

The other requires water districts to register with the state board.

Important water conservation measures, involving millions of dollars, have not reached a vote in either house.

INSURANCE BILLS

Two big insurance bills were hung in committee. Rep. Floyd Bradshaw's omnibus bill would regulate fire and casualty companies of all kinds. Sen. Searcy

Bracewell's would regulate life companies.

Regulations in Bradshaw's bills would: Raise minimum capital and surplus requirements (combined) to \$200,000 for fire companies; \$300,000 for casualty; and \$500,000 for companies writing more than one line.

One advocate of his bill said, "Insurance companies have to be born big."

Governor Shivers, on the other hand, said that just because an insurance company is small doesn't mean it isn't sound.

Bracewell's bill would raise minimum capital and surplus requirements of life companies to \$200,000 and require that it be kept in cash or bonds, not in real estate.

Rep. Vernon Smith charged that "vicious ad false propaganda" by out-of-state insurance companies had impaired confidence in Texas insurance.

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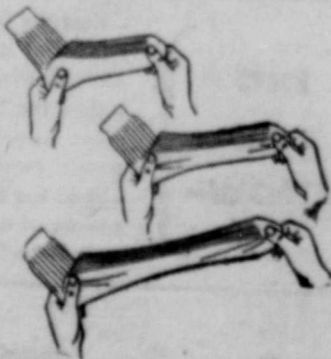


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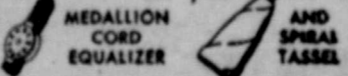
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
