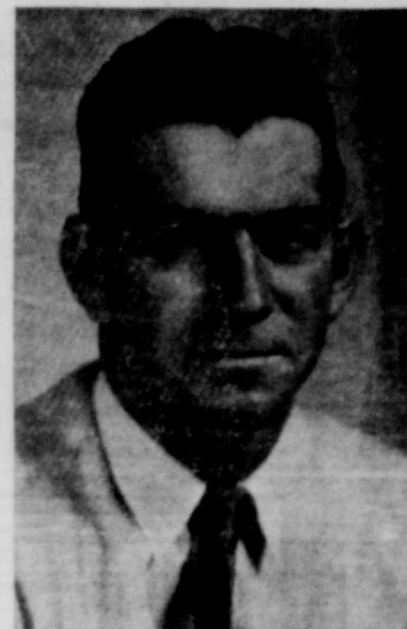
### Jerry Priddy Attends Tarleton

SOLILOQUY

Some guys work at the game of fishing for a lifetime and never even get close to the experience that came along while this little fellow, Wayne Morris, one but lost it. He came out long time—three to four years—and goes at it like a veteran. Three to four years in quite a while for an eleven year old, but, considering the many years that have been spent fishing by some of the oldsters, it is really just the beginning.

Well, here is the story on Wayne's experience.

Wayne Morris, 11 year old, four foot, eight inch boy, was the David who conquered Goliath, in this case, a six foot, nine inch tarpon in thirty minutes, on Saturday afternoon June 4, from the Bob Hall Pier, Padre Island. Wayne, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Boyd Morris, 738 Ashland, Corpus Christi, hooked the big silver king while fishing from the pier and had a lively tussle for thirty minutes before landing it. The tarpon led Wayne around the pier eleven times before being subdued. A second tarpon could be seen following the hooked one just before the end.

This was the first tarpon Wayne has ever caught and the

second one of the year caught at this pier. He first started fishing for tarpon on Thursday afternoon of last week, hooked one but lost it. This time he came out best though, using a 12-foot Calcutta rod, 60 pound test line and a 4-0 Penn Senator reel.

Wayne is the first boy, according to the Corpus Christi Caller, to land a tarpon unaided. The only help he received was when his father gaffed the fish for him.

Wayne is the grandson of Henry Morris of this city, and no doubt has inherited his love of fishing from his granddad, who is an ardent fisherman.

His parents lived here for several years and Wayne attended school here for part of his first year before moving to the Valley with his parents. They are now making their home in Corpus Christi.

One day last Summer when Wayne was visiting with relatives in Goldthwaite he went fishing with his Grandpa, Henry Morris, and Clyde Estep. They went down to the river, and his grandpa recently reported, "Wayne outfished us something terrible".

Last week Thursday, June 9, brought to the memory of H. C. Ezzell, pioneer resident of Mills County, some of the hardships endured by the citizens of this section, in the early days. On June 9, 1877, a freeze killed all crops, gardens and vegetation here.

Mr. Ezzell, twelve years of age at the time, well remembers the diet people existed on after the freeze. It was corn bread, the meal supplied by the Government, and black molasses, made from broom corn stalks. Asked if the people did not have milk and butter, he replied "this section was not stocked with registered Jersey's, but Texas Longhorns. If a cow was extra good she supplied one quart of milk a day. By good management a family sometimes was able to have butter for breakfast every third day."

At the time of the frost the Ezzell family lived just below the Robert Robertson place in Big Valley.

MARCH OF EVENTS

Pan American Union HQ Inter-American System's  
Washington Tourist Mecca 'Capitol' 45 Years Old

WASHINGTON—Thousands of visitors to the national capital this spring—editors of daily newspapers, 1955 high school graduating classes, women attending such national conferences as that of the Daughters of the American Revolution, and Washington's ever-growing stream of tourists—find particularly significant a visit to the beautiful headquarters of the Organization of American States.

International tensions this year, marked by reshuffling of forces by cold war participants and new racial power-juggling in Asia and Africa, make enlightening and refreshing a visit to the Pan American Union building—"capitol" of the oldest and most successful international organization on earth.

It was on May 11, 1908, that President Theodore Roosevelt, Andrew Carnegie, who contributed \$750,000 toward the construction of the million-dollar building, and other notables laid the cornerstone.

Two years later, just 45 years ago, on April 26, 1910, President William Howard Taft, Carnegie, and other officials dedicated this headquarters of the Inter-American System.

Furthermore, 1955 marks the 65th anniversary of the founding of the inter-American organization known today as the Organization of American States. It is a good year for peoples of all the American republics to look back, take stock of the present, and look toward the future.

"THIS GREAT INTER-AMERICAN SYSTEM, which was first a vision and a dream and then an expression of faith," Secretary of State John Foster Dulles recently told representatives of the 21 republics, "has become in our time the most solid international organization of free peoples on earth."

Andrew Carnegie said at the dedication of the Pan American Union building that he was "persuaded that the rulers and statesmen of the earth, all of whom are today constantly proclaiming their earnest desire for peace, are sincere in their protestations." Failure to secure this universally desired peace, he added, "lies in the fact that these rulers and statesmen know not each other well."

A "peace tree" was planted in the sky-lighted patio 45 years ago this spring, and visitors today find it looking very healthy and reaching almost to the ceiling.

PRACTICAL VALUES of the inter-American system have been demonstrated many times in terms of cultural, economic, and military co-operation. Within the last year, concerted support by other American republics encouraged the people of Guatemala to throw out its Communist-controlled government.

Exchanges of people are today on the increase between the United States and Latin America. It is expected that 1,500 Latin American technicians, teachers, and students will come to the United States this year to study, teach, do research, and lecture.

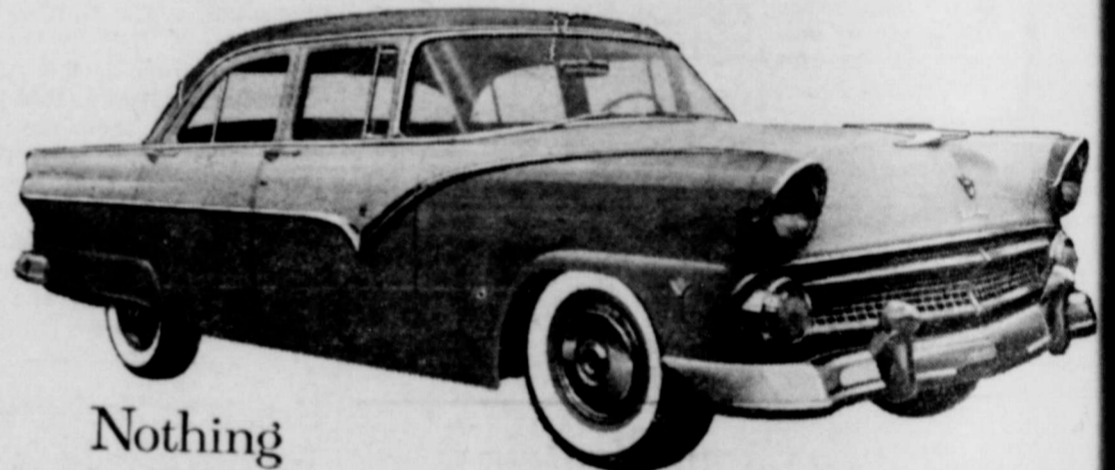
Two-way trade between the United States and Latin America is now an annual \$3.5 billion exchange of commodities in each direction. Latin Americans take more than one-fifth of all United States exports—about the same as go to all of Europe.

UNITED STATES EXPORTS from Latin America exceed those from Europe or the other continents and are about 32 per cent of United States total imports. Latin Americans get more than 50 per cent of their imports from us.

Within 20 years both our imports and exports with Latin Americans may double, economists predict, for Latin America's economy is developing rapidly. It would seem that statesmen of the Americas are carrying out the mission with which Andrew Carnegie entrusted them nearly a half century ago when he said:

"One of the chief missions of this palace (the Pan American Union building) should be, as their natural home, to draw together the diplomats and representative men of all our Republics and enable them to know each other . . . and their anxious hope that peace will ever reign among them."

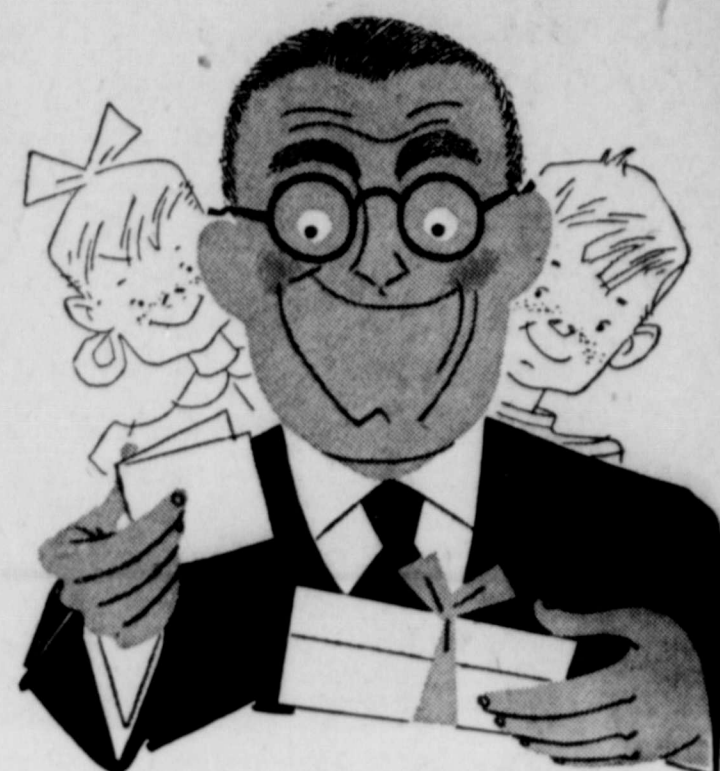

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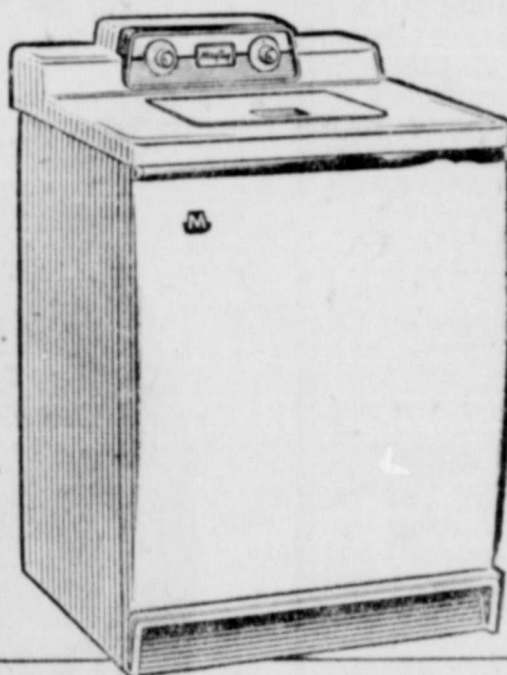
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### S. J. Fishers Observe Golden Wedding Anniversary

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**Lyndon Johnson Favors Water Bill In U. S. Senate**

Development of Texas water projects costing up to \$10,000,000 for irrigation and other purposes would be given a boost by enactment of a bill Senator Lyndon B. Johnson is now supporting in the United States Senate.

The bill proposes to permit the Federal Government to aid local communities, acting through proper organizations, in financing these projects. The local irrigation and water districts could secure Federal loans up to \$5,000,000 on projects costing not more than \$10,000,000.

Local interests would be required to finance the difference between \$5,000,000 and the total cost of the project. Loans would be repayable over a 50-year period. If a community organization can qualify, some part of the sum needed for a project might come in the form of a grant from the Federal Government.

"I am supporting this bill," Senator Johnson said. "I think its enactment would be a good thing for Texas. It would be an important step in helping Texas communities to advance toward a solution of their water problems."

"The legislation is in some respects supplemental to the upstream flood prevention law," the Senator said. "In addition to its irrigation features, it would make funds available to municipalities to capture water for domestic use under the same general rules."

A similar bill already has passed the House of Representatives.

**ERADICATION OF KAPRA BEETLE**

A continuing battle is being waged to keep the world's worst pest of stored grain—the Khapra Beetle—out of Texas.

This oriental-born pest, especially threatening in warm states, was first discovered in southern California in November 1953. It has spread eastward across Arizona and on into New Mexico, infesting at least 172 locations in the three states. Quarantine barriers were set up several months ago along the state borders to protect Texas grain and more recently a gigantic fumigation project was launched in states already infested.

The new fumigation-eradication program is a joint effort of state pest control agencies, property owners and chemical companies. In the unique extermination process, entire buildings are sealed over so the methyl-bromide gas fumigant will reach the crevice-seeking beetle.

More than a million feet of beetle-infested storage were cleaned in a California fumigation experiment last January by wrapping the area in a gas-tight cover of sealed tarpaulins and injecting 2½ times the normal dosage of the gas. This method proved

most effective against the persistent khapra beetle and has been adopted in other state eradication projects.

Khapra Beetles have been found by control workers in warehouses 21 feet deep under solid masses of grain. They have worked their way through a two-foot brick warehouse wall; hence their name "Khapra", which comes from an Indian word meaning "brick".

The Texas Department of Agriculture is cooperating with the Agricultural Research service in an extensive survey of farm storage to keep the destructive pest out of the state.

Any grain dealer warehousemen or farmer who discovers an unfamiliar insect is urged to notify the Quarantine Division of the Texas Department of Agriculture immediately.

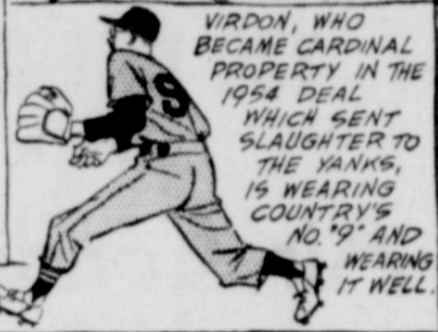
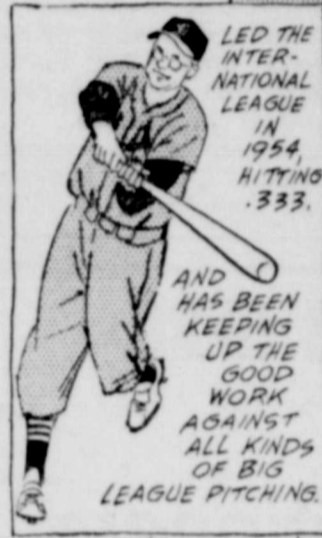

### Court Of Criminal Appeals Upholds Sentences Of Two Brady Ranchers

The Court of Criminal Appeals last week up-held five-year sentences assessed two Brady ranchers for the emasculation of an Army sergeant at the home of a widow in western Mills County.

The court said it found the evidence sufficient to support the conviction of Roy Barton 58, and David Dutton, 46.

The two ranchers were convicted of emasculating the soldier, Clyde Bennett, July 4, 1954. The defense had pleaded temporary insanity. Witnesses

at the trial testified the pair were "crazy drunk."

Barton and Dutton paid \$32,000 in a civil case growing out of the incident, according to United Press report from Austin.

The appeals court referred to testimony that the two ranchers came to the home of Mrs. Arlie Daugherty and found Bennett sleeping alone in a bedroom. Bessie Hosek, who lived with Mrs. Daugherty, said that while one of the defendants held Bennett's head and arms, the other opened a knife and attacked him.

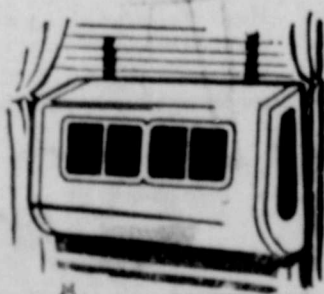

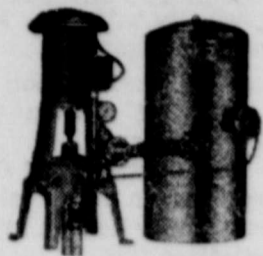

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## PARENT PROBLEMS

### Memory Work Is Good For Children's Minds

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

In one of his last editorials, before he resigned as editor of the Journal of the National Education Association, Dr. Joy Elmer Morgan urged that children be encouraged to memorize favorite passages of poetry and prose.

Here and there one finds a teacher who believes as Dr. Morgan does about the value of having children fill their minds with literary treasures; but so much has been said against this practice, that most teachers do not advocate it. As a result, literary or Biblical allusions are lost on the average high school or college student.

#### Required Work

A few educators are now saying that it's good for children to memorize poems they have enjoyed. Yet one rarely hears them recommend as required work, memorizing literary gems in the same way that learning to spell, to add and subtract is required work.

Of course, the modern trend

developed as a natural reaction to the folly of half a century ago, of memorizing in parrot-fashion, words that had no meaning. "So away with learning by rote" became the cry, which is still heard today. But how far would the average student get, in law, medicine or other technical fields, if he did not memorize by rote a good many symbols and facts—if he didn't do a lot of boning?

#### Hold Fast to Ideas

Once the student, even in the grades, has turned words he reads or hears at school into ideas and language of his own, why should he not hold fast to these ideas? Why should he not commit them to memory?

And isn't there a place at school for memorizing some of the choicest bits of prose and poetry—even before they are wholly understood? How many would pray the Lord's Prayer or the Rosary or repeat the Twenty-third Psalm if they waited till they wholly understood them?

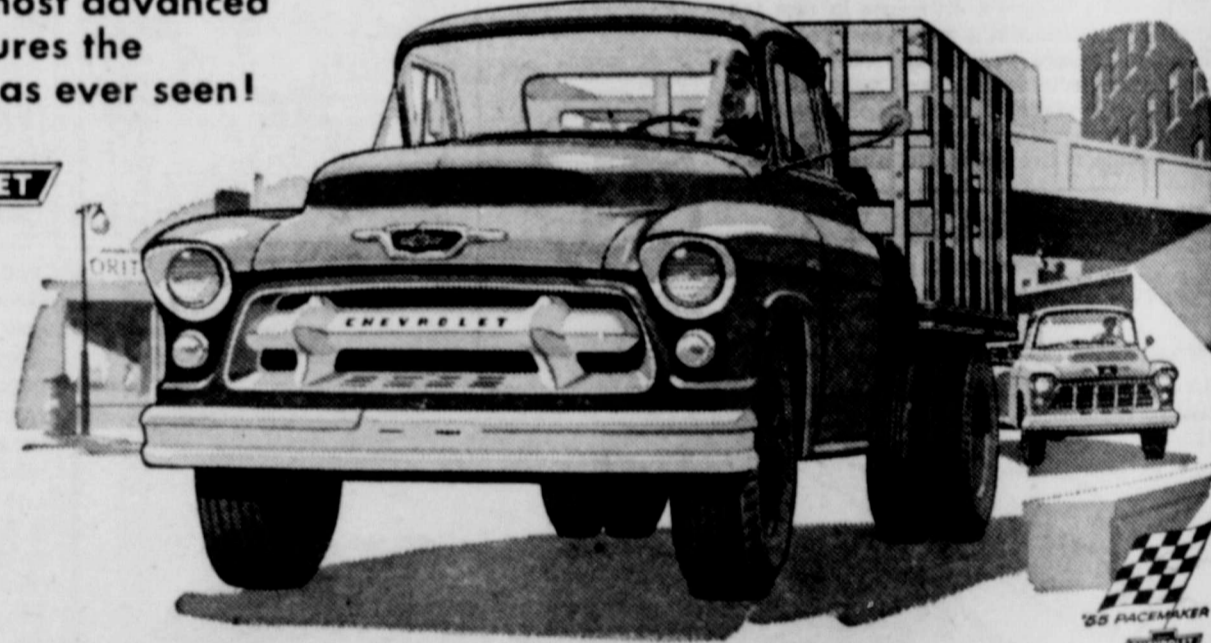

**Sweet Mixed Pickles Perk Up Summer Meals**

By ALICE DENHOFF

SWEET mixed pickles work themselves nicely into many dishes. Here's one way to use them in a delicious meat dish.

Pickle Vegetable Braised Round Steak: Have 2 lbs. round steak cut about 1 in. thick. Sprinkle the meat with salt and pepper and dredge with flour. Melt 1/4 c. fat over medium heat and add 5 sliced, medium-sized onions. Cook until lightly browned.

**Add the Steak**  
Remove onions and add steak. Cook until browned on both sides. Add the onions and 1 c. water. Cover and cook over low heat 1 to 1 1/2 hrs. or until almost tender. Add one c. each sliced carrots, diced sweet mixed pickles, and diced celery. Salt and pepper to taste. Cover and cook over medium heat until vegetables are tender—about 30 minutes.

**Unusual Chicken Curry**  
To serve 4-6 with an unusual chicken curry, have a 3 1/2 to 4-pound chicken cut in serving pieces. Sprinkle chicken with salt and

pepper. Combine 3 c. all-purpose flour and 1/4 tsp. curry powder, mixing well. Then dredge chicken in the curry-flour mixture. Melt 1/4 c. butter or margarine over medium heat. Add chicken, browning well.

Add 2 1/2 c. drained, sweet mixed pickles and one c. canned drained, pineapple chunks. Cover and cook over low heat 45 to 55 minutes, until chicken is tender.

**Using up Leftovers**  
Chicken Pickle French Toast is the answer to how to serve leftovers. To serve 4, combine one c. diced, cooked chicken, 1/2 c. coarsely cut chopped sweet mixed pickles, 2 canned pineapples cut in thin strips and 2 10 1/2-oz. cans condensed cream of chicken soup. Mix well and heat.

Meanwhile, combine 2 beaten eggs, 1/4 c. sweet pickle liquid, 1/4 c. milk and 1/2 tsp. salt, beating well until blended. Melt 1/4 c. butter or margarine. Dip bread slices in egg mixture and saute in butter or margarine until browned on both sides. Serve chicken pickle mixture over French toast.

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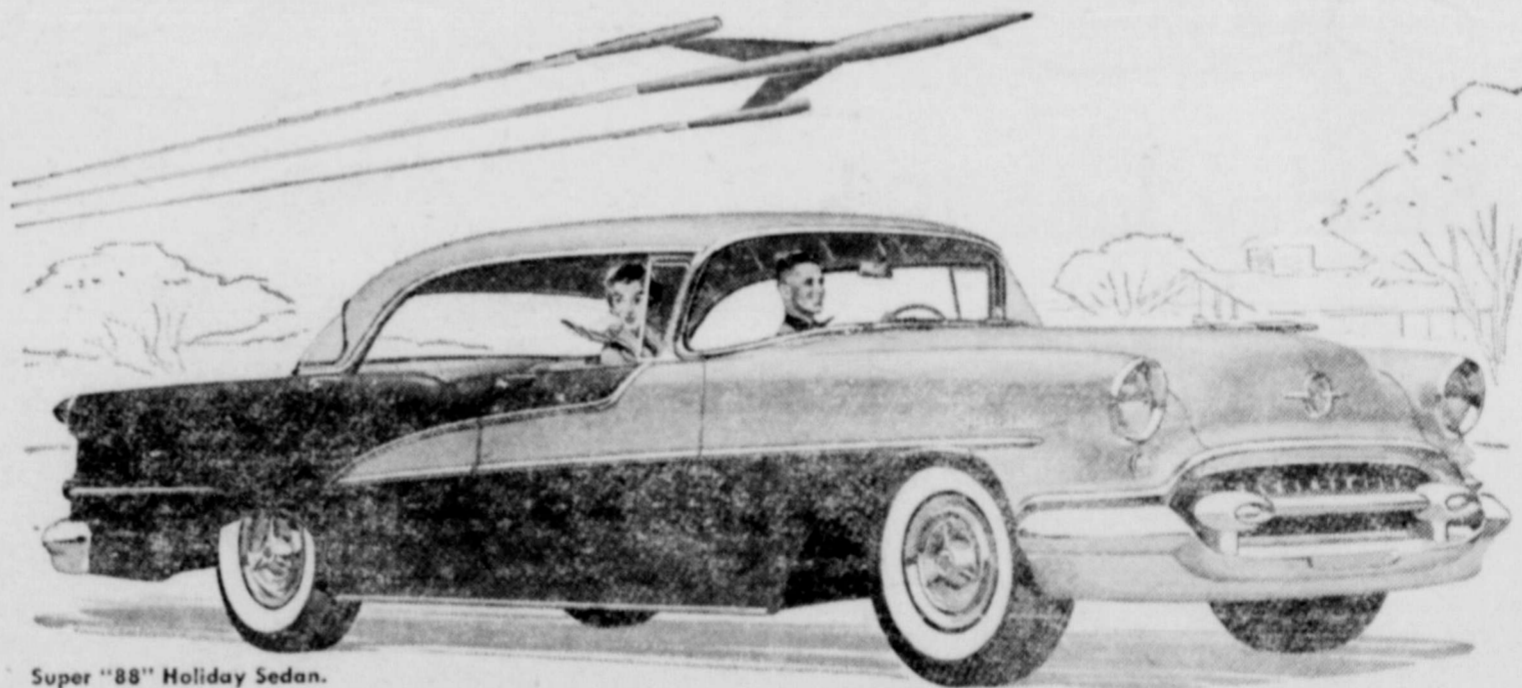

Austin, Tex.— Now that the legislature has adjourned—all eyes are turned to the next political campaign. It is anyone's guess who will be in the 1956 races, but many are guessing.

Hardly had the gavels of Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey and House Speaker Jim Lindsey sounded the end of the 54th legislative session, when one widely known political figure took the adjournment as the starting signal for the 1956 races. He is former Speaker of the House Reuben Senterfitt, of San Saba.

Senterfitt was the first announced candidate for Governor in 1954. But he withdrew when his father passed away, and Governor Allan Shivers announced for re-election. He took no sides in the bitterly contested campaign last year, nor in the presidential campaign of 1952.

Senterfitt's announced intention to run in 1956 set tongues wagging about other possible contenders for the Governorship. Mentioned were Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey of San Augustine; Atty. Gen. John Ben Shepperd of Gladewater; U. S. Senator Price Daniel of Liberty; Associate Justice of the Texas Supreme Court Will Wilson of Dallas; Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White of Wichita Falls; and State Senators Otis Lock of Lufkin, Jimmy Phillips of Angleton, and Jerry Sadler of Percilla.

Labor publications have said that Ralph Yarborough of Austin will make a third attempt to land the job. He campaign-

ed against Shivers in 1952 and 1954.

Others talked as "possibles" include Mrs. Oveta Culp Hobby of Houston, wife of Ex-Governor W. P. Hobby, and present Secretary of Health, Education and Welfare; Roy Hofheinz, mayor of Houston; Robert B. Anderson of Vernon, U. S. Secretary of Defense; and County Judge Jim Sewell of Corsicana. Prospects appear strong that State Senator A. M. Aikin Jr. of Paris will run for lieutenant governor if Ramsey does not seek re-election. Probably in the running for that same office will be Sen. Searcy Bracewell of Houston.

Mentioned frequently as a candidate for Attorney General is House Speaker Jim Lindsey of Texarkana.

Capitol talk continues on the subject that Governor Shivers may step out of office before the end of his present term to accept a high federal appointment. This rumor cropped up again after Shivers' first assistant, Maurice Acers, was appointed by the Governor to serve on the Texas Employment Commission.

Should Shivers resign, Ramsey would become governor automatically. He then would have the inside track in the 1956 campaign.

Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, third-term member of the House, emerged as the uncontested prospect for Speaker of the 55th Legislature. When the 54th session adjourned Representative Carr held signed pledges of support from more than 100 members of the present legislature. No opponent had announced.

Sen. Nevelle Colson of Navasota, only woman in the Texas Senate, was elected President Pro Tem of the upper chamber for the period between sessions. This means that she will have an opportunity, under precedent, to sit in as acting Governor for a day. When this happens, she will become the second woman in Texas history to serve as chief executive.

Texas' first and only elected woman Governor, Miriam A. Ferguson, was honored with a birthday party by a statewide gathering of dignitaries.

Renominated and confirmed for new terms during the closing hours of the 1955 legislature were Adjutant General K. L. Berry, for a third term, and Mark Wentz, fire insurance commissioner, for his first full six-year term.

Session adjournment meant that the new tax law and hundreds of other statutes will go into effect on Sept. 6 or 90 days after adjournment.

Completed as one of the session's final acts was a law bringing 30,000 state employees under Federal Social Security as well as the state retirement system.

Another bill permitted college faculty members to enter Federal Social Security coverage.

Laws correcting and tightening up state regulation of insurance, increasing capital and surplus requirements on insurance companies, and subjecting insurance securities to state regulation, were termed probably the session's top achievements.

And the legislature left behind issues which promise to figure in state politics.

It projected investigations into the future on the scandal-ridden veterans' land program.

It failed to pass the key measure of the administration's water program—the \$100,000,000 state aid to local projects.

It left untouched the issue of desegregation.

The water bond measure was killed by the clock at sine die adjournment, in a bitter House squabble over the tax method to finance it.

But Governor Shivers said the legislature achieved 85% of its task—"a good batting average."

It made notable progress, he said, in such fields as insurance reforms, hospital improvements, public welfare and health, safety, and necessary financing for highways, old age pensions, edu-

cation and general operations. "On the whole," said Shivers, "this has been one of the best and most constructive sessions of the legislature in recent history."

It handed him a new tax bill, raising \$28,500,000 a year for state operations and \$20,500,000 a year for highways.

Both the House and the Senate set up committees to continue the Veterans Land investigations. Investigating committees filed reports. The Senate committee said that Governor Shivers and Attorney General Shepperd, members of the Veterans Land Board, hadn't been too punctual in attending board meetings. But it said evidence showed they had no part in the mishandling of the program.

Despite all the hullabaloo over Governor Shivers' appearance in California to make the commencement address at the University of Southern California, and threats to boycott the exercises, an overflow crowd of 14,000 attended.

The Texas Legislature had condemned California's "intolerance" and defended the Governor's record.

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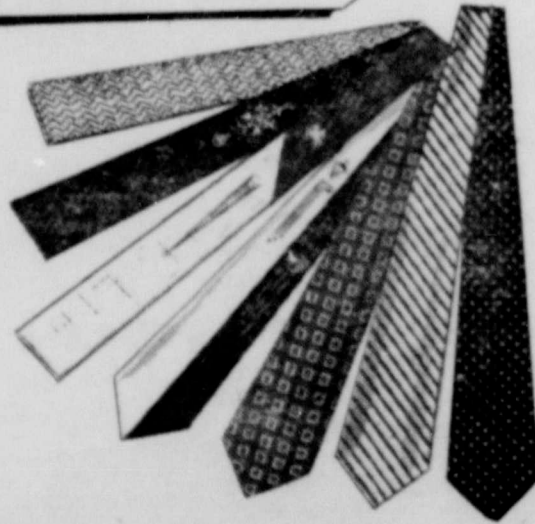
