## Coach Standley Attends Girls' Basketball Clinic

Athletic director for Goldthwaite Schools, Ray Standley, returned last Friday night from Waco where he attended the Texas High School Girls' Basketball Clinic. The clinic was held in the Roosevelt Hotel and Baylor University Gym on Thursday and Friday, July 21 and 22.

More than one hundred girls' high school basketball coaches attended the two day session, which was informative with both lectures and demonstrations by championship teams and coaches from over the state.

Dr. Rhea Williams, director of the Texas Interscholastic League made the final address on Friday. He pointed out the increased interest in Girls' basketball over the state. In 1952 there were 500 Girls' Basketball teams in Texas. Today there are 894 teams playing with 25,000 high school girls participating.

Dr. Williams told those present that this is only about 200 teams short of the number of high school boys' basketball teams.

building is being constructed which will house the complete grinding and mixing department of the firm. The new building will provide dock high loading facilities and also drive-in space for pick-up and large trucks so that loading and un-loading can be done during all kinds of weather.

A new 18 inch Hammermill with 50 HP Electric Motor will be installed in the new building. The present syrup mixing machine will be moved into the new addition which will be equipped with one 3,000 and one 2,000 pound mixing machines. The present store room will be re-arranged and all facilities will be under one roof. The Syrup storage tanks will be underground.

When the building is completed trucks will deliver feed to the hammermill and from there it can be taken to the mixers, syrup mill, or bags, in one operation. This new arrangement will also provide more storage space for feed products.

Jesse Moreland stated they hope to have the project completed and in operation by September 1.

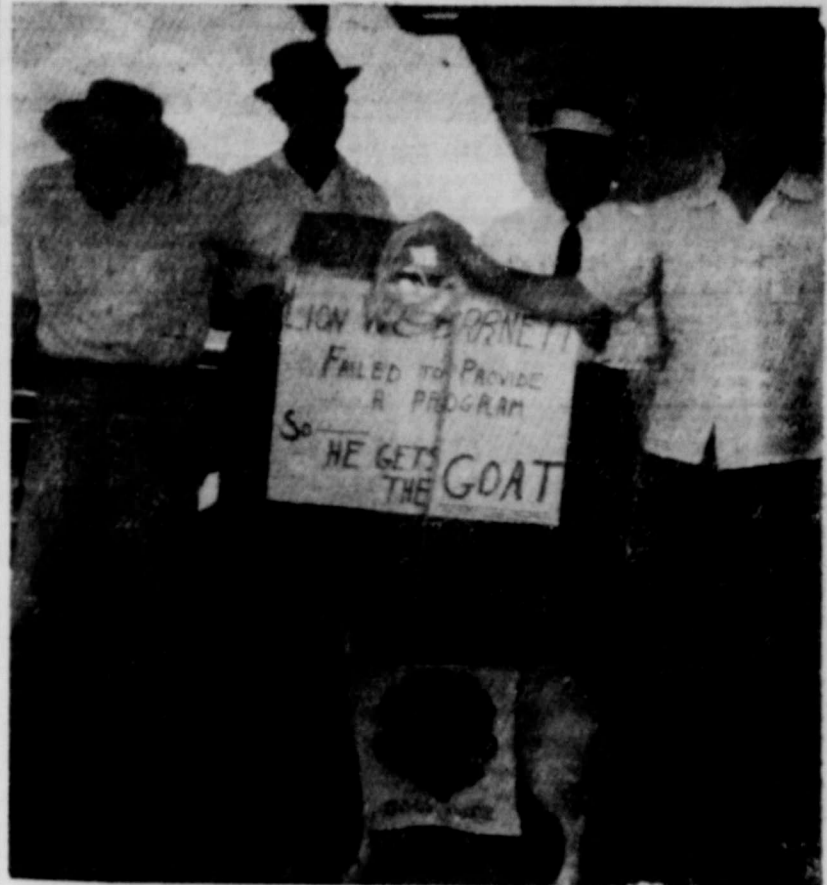

Inside WASHINGTON MARCH OF EVENTS

Friends Close to Stevenson Say He Isn't Keen to Run Unless Conditions Change, He'd Rather Try for Senate

WASHINGTON—Most political commentators have taken it for granted that Adlai E. Stevenson is very much available for the 1956 Democratic Presidential nomination.

But sources close to the former Illinois governor say he is not nearly so eager to make the race as the pundits would make it seem.

Stevenson is represented as believing that if the Big Four "parley at the summit" makes progress toward ending the cold war and if the business boom the U. S. is enjoying continues, President Eisenhower will seek another term.

In such circumstances, Ike would probably be unbeatable, and Adlai has no desire to make another losing race.

Still in his early 50's, Stevenson is said to believe that it might be wiser for him to wait until 1960 to try again for the Presidency.

But those who know him say he definitely would not be averse to running for the U. S. Senate next year, with what he considers a good change of unseating the Republican incumbent, Senator Everett McKinley Dirksen.

Adlai Stevenson • SOCIAL SECURITY—Chances are good for the Democrats to get through Congress this year their proposals for liberalizing the Social Security law by lowering the benefit age for women and requirements for payments to disabled persons.

Look for the House ways and means committee to approve the measure soon and send it to the floor for a vote despite Republican demands for a lengthy study of the proposals.

The proposals may run into more trouble in the Senate, but even there the outlook isn't dark. Democratic senators hope they can get action before the end of the present session.

The boost in benefits probably will mean a higher social security tax, however. Republicans are sympathetic with the liberalization of the law but they insist that the social security trust fund must not be jeopardized.

The result may be a one per cent increase in the present social security tax. A Democratic spokesman claims this would bring in enough money to cover the increased payments.

Even if the social security changes don't get approved this year, they almost are certain to be enacted next year. Sentiment is strong for them and the only issue is the timing.

EARLY ENDING—Congressional leaders appear convinced they can send members of both houses home by July 31, their target date for adjournment.

Most of the key legislation which will go through this year has already slid to passage. Nearly all the appropriation measures seemed certain of approval before the 1956 fiscal year was to begin on July 1.

Part of this speed is due to the efforts of Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon Johnson, who has cut down on the usually lengthy debates and has frequently obtained unanimity among members of his own party.

But Johnson also gives at least half the credit to Senate Republican Leader William F. Knowland for seeing to it that touchy issues are disposed of swiftly.

MCCARTHY AFTERMATH—Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon Johnson is annoyed that his efforts to give President Eisenhower a show of wholehearted Senate support in the Big Four conference have been ignored by the White House.

Johnson maneuvered around the clock to make certain of a roll-call defeat for a resolution by Senator Joseph McCarthy (R), Wisconsin, which would have compelled the President to discuss the satellite issue at the Geneva meeting.

The vote against the resolution was 77 to 4 and it was considered a strong endorsement for giving Mr. Eisenhower a free hand at the Big Four talks.

Despite this, Johnson has not yet received a word of thanks or acknowledgement from the President or any of his White House aides.

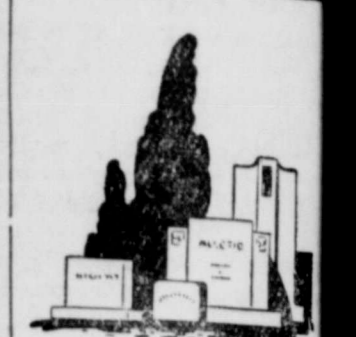
edged tools, and in keeping good repair articles which are used frequently.

Hazards to life and limb on homes and farm buildings are many and obvious. A systematic check will reveal them, and knowledge of them is an sure way to remove them. Falls cause more injuries in the home than any other type of accident. Looking before stepping can reduce such accidents, suggests the Safety Committee.

Finally, the Committee suggests that these seven days should take on special significance. It is time that farmers and their families and neighbors pooled their efforts toward making their industry as safe as any other in the nation. And as stated in the theme of Safety Week . . . "Your Safety is in Your Hands."

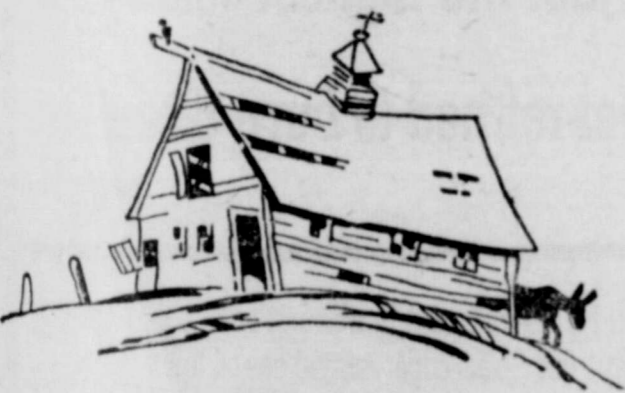

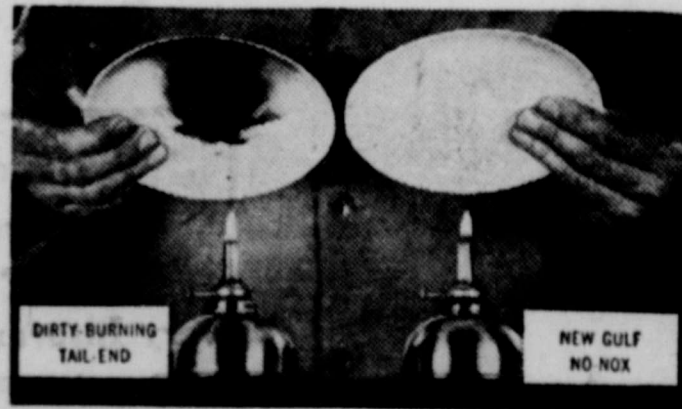

### New Law On GI Farm Loans For World War II And Korea Veterans

World War II and Korean conflict veterans will find it easier to get GI loans to purchase farms on which there is a home or to construct or improve farm houses under a new law recently signed by the president.

The new law increases the Veterans Administration guarantee of GI farm loans made by private lenders to 80 percent of the loan with the maximum guaranty of \$7,500 on the following three types of loans:

1. For the purchase of a farm which there is a farm residence to be occupied by the veteran as his home. The guaranty would cover not only the farm and residence but include other buildings which are considered as part of the realty.
2. For the construction of a farm residence to be occupied by the veteran on land owned by the veteran. In the case of a veteran who wants to build a residence on his farm on which there is an indebtedness secured by a lien against the land, the GI loan with the increased guaranty can be used to liquidate that lien if the indebtedness does not exceed the reasonable value of the land.
3. For the repair, alteration or improvement of a farm residence owned by the veteran and occupied by him as his home. Such repairs, alterations and improvements must promote or improve the basic livability or utility of the farm residence.

VA said the new law puts the same types of farm loans on parity with GI home loans—each of which now carry the same guaranty of \$4,000. The guaranty of farm non-

realty loans for such things as stock, feed seed and equipment remains at 50 percent of the loan with a maximum guaranty of \$2,000.

VA said that while maximum guarantees are set by law, the amount of the loan obtainable by a veteran depends on the policies of the lender. A veteran desiring to avail himself of the benefits of the new Act should get in touch with a lender who is agreeable to making him a GI loan for his specific purpose. If the lender decides to make the loan, he will process all necessary papers in order to obtain the Veterans Administration guaranty.

In the 11 years of the GI loan program, VA has guaranteed or insured 67,760 farm loans totalling \$264,786,200. Veterans have already paid in full 39,867 GI farm loans totalling \$120,909,670.

VA has had to pay claims on only 2,099 farm loans. Net amount of the claims paid is \$1,456,400 and that amount is subject to further recovery through the liquidation of tangible security or from the veterans.

World War II veterans have until July 25, 1957 to use the GI loan benefits while Korean conflict veterans have until January 31, 1965.

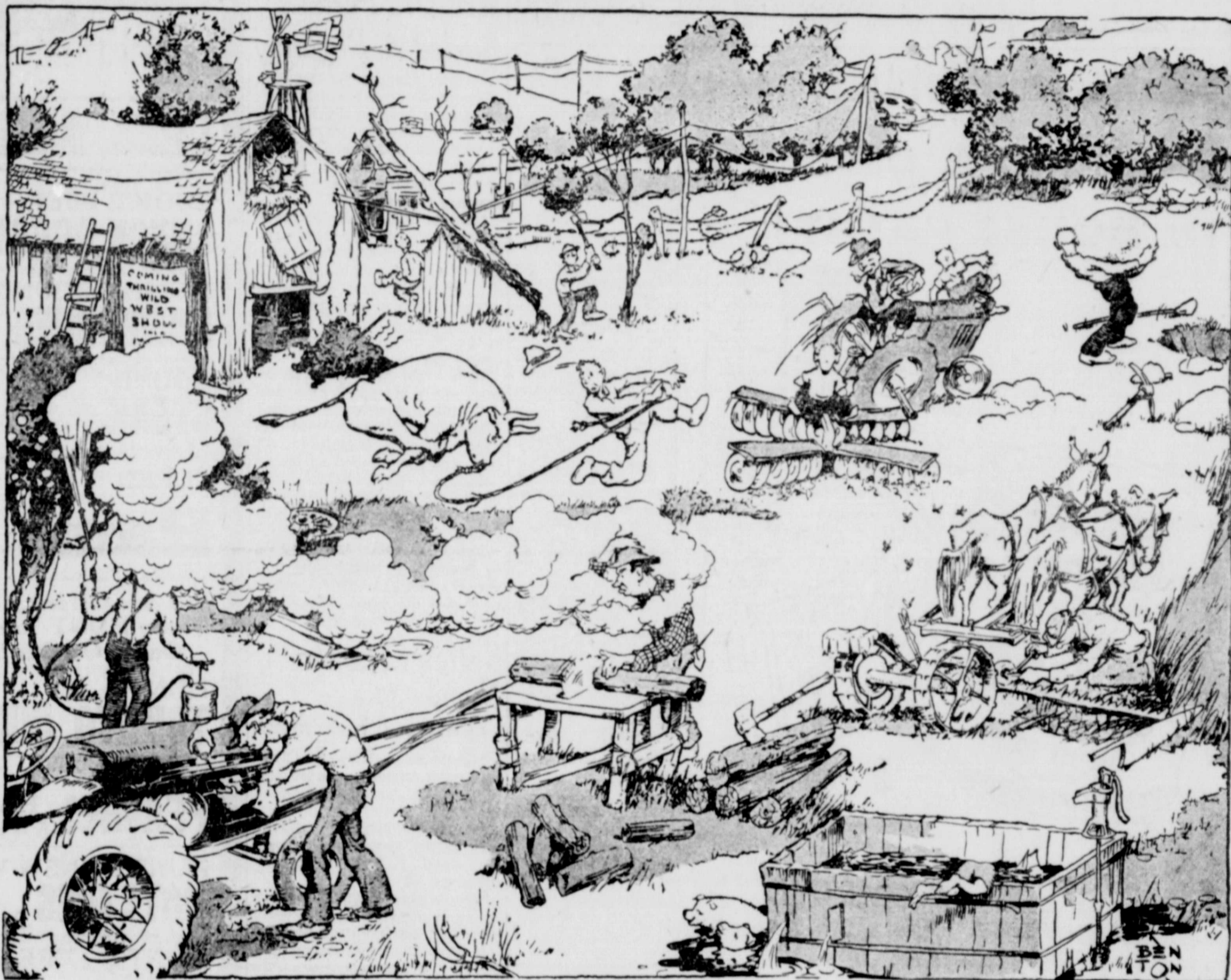

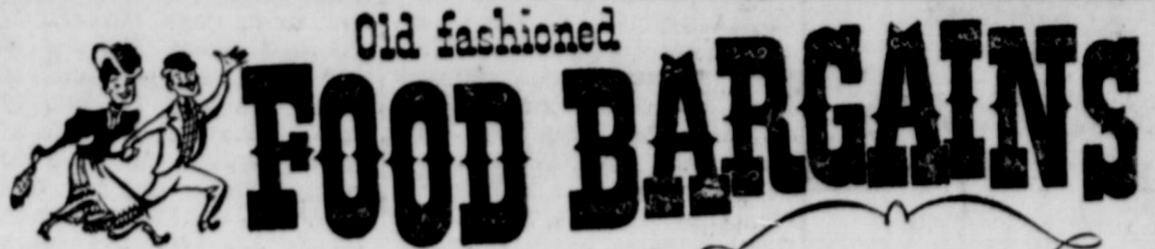

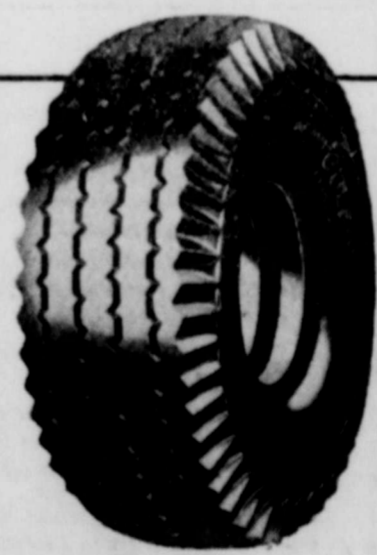

College Station.—"More accidental deaths occur in farming than in any other major industry in the nation. Texas, with its widespread farming and ranching operations, is in a position to help reduce the toll taken by such accidents," said Governor Allan Shivers in his proclamation designating the week of July 24-30 as Farm Safety Week.

Earlier President Eisenhower had proclaimed the same period as National Farm Safety Week. He requested organizations and leaders interested in farm life to join in the continuing drive to reduce needless injuries and deaths to farm people.

**A YEAR OF CROP SURPLUSES**

Prospects for the fall of 1955 foretell another bumper farm crop year despite the ravages of drouth in mid-western states.

That is the prediction of the National Agricultural Research bureau in Washington. Not only will it be a "bumper" year, but perhaps the biggest production year of all time, if the experts are correct.

It is a paradox that increased production in 1955 will spell trouble ahead for Texas and the nation's farmers in the form of prices, mounting surpluses and critical storage problems. And no relief from the farm cost-income pinch is in sight. As a result, the "farm problem" is certain to become more and more of an issue in 1956 politics.

Washington apparently is uncertain as to what-if anything—to do next. It is not likely that Congress will act to ease the price squeeze before adjournment around the first of August.

Farm officials in Washington show no sign of easing their determination to block a return to 90 per cent mandatory supports for basic crops. Large supplies of most farm products now indicate supports will be lowered to the 85 per cent of parity minimum for basics—

cotton and tobacco excepted—next January. Wheat already has been announced at 76 per cent.

Crop reports indicate SURPLUSES—in capital letters. Storage space, especially for feed grains, is at a premium. The Commodity Credit Corporation announced this month plans to build up to 100 million bushels of new space. Need for storage will be even greater than that if crop prospects hold up. And the farmer must have his goods stored to get sup-

ports. Nation-wide it looks like record production on barley, soybeans, grain sorghums, hay—and near record for corn, oats and dry beans. Compared with last year, production may fall on wheat, cotton, rice sugar, tobacco, apples and peaches.

Trouble looms for potato growers. Irish potato production is forecast at 44.3 million bushels

over last year and the sweet potato crop looks 15 per cent larger. There is now talk about a demand for potato price support program—an unpopular notion with those who remember the disastrous program of the 1940's.

### Santa Fe Rail Travel Available On Rail Travel Credit Agency Card

Imagine being able to step up to any Santa Fe ticket agent and buy a rail ticket to any city in the country without spending a single cent in cash. It can be done after Aug. 1, according to announcement made today by R. T. Anderson, Santa Fe Railway's general passenger traffic manager at Chicago, provided the individual holds a credit card issued by Rail Travel Credit Agency.

While Santa Fe and 16 other roads have been members of this agency since 1947, 26 additional railroads today announced their cooperation in this plan designed to reduce the risk and inconvenience of carrying large amounts of cash. No

deposit or cash balance is necessary as Rail Travel Credit Agency simply clears credit rating of applicants for its member roads which will handle billing directly with the card subscribers.

The Rail Travel credit card can be issued both to regular travelers on company business as well as to individuals for personal travel. Card will be honored in lieu of cash in ticket offices for rail transportation (excluding commutation) including sleeping and parlor car tickets, all-expense tours as well as for meals and refreshment aboard trains. Cards will also be honored by the Fred Harvey organization in their hotels and

restaurants for lodging food and refreshments. In short, Santa Fe will honor the new Rail Travel credit card for anything a patron could buy in a ticket office for cash.

Holder of a credit card previously issued by Rail Travel Credit Agency will automatically receive a new card. Application for new cards may be made at any Santa Fe ticket office and applications will be processed by the Rail Travel Credit Agency as they are received.

### Texas Banks Principal Lenders To State Farmers And Ranchers In '54

Texas farmers and ranchers met their credit needs during 1954 chiefly by loans from their local banks, according to W. P. Duren, President, Mills County State Bank, who represents the Texas Bankers Association as Mills County Key Banker. Texas banks remained the largest lenders to the state's farmers and stockmen during the year, providing far more financial aid to our agriculture than any other lending agency, he noted.

Quoting from the fourteenth annual farm lending survey of the Agricultural Commission of the American Bankers Association, Mr. Duren stated that on January 1, 1955, Texas banks had loans outstanding to farmers and ranchers totaling \$265,235,000 including both production and mortgage loans. This compares with a total of \$137,016,000 held by the Federal Land Banks, the second largest lender to Texas farmers. In addition, Texas banks held \$346,876,000 in C.C.C. loans under the government's price-support program not included in the above figures.

"Despite reduced net income and continued high production expenses on farms," Mr. Duren said, "repayment of loans is rapid, and farm assets are at near-record levels, indicating that these factors have not in any sense weakened the financial soundness of agriculture. Bank loans play an important part in maintaining this strong

financial position by permitting our farmers and ranchers to make use of the latest equipment and modern production and marketing methods, resulting in greater efficiency. The majority of farm and ranch loans held by Texas banks are for these production and operating expenses."

Bearing out Mr. Duren's statement regarding the use of bank loans to farmers is the fact that of the total farm debt outstanding in banks in Texas on January 1, \$231,772,000 was in non-real estate or production loans. This compares with \$56,837,000 held by Production Credit Associations and \$62,289,000 held by the Farmers Home Administration. "It can be seen from these figures that about three-quarters of the production credit used by the state's farmers and ranchers in 1954 came from banks," he stated. He also pointed out that a high percentage of the \$33,463,000 in farm mortgages held by banks in the state at the beginning of this year were made for production and operating purposes.

Mr. Duren reported that 859 of the 886 insured commercial banks in Texas served agriculture by making farm loans during 1954.

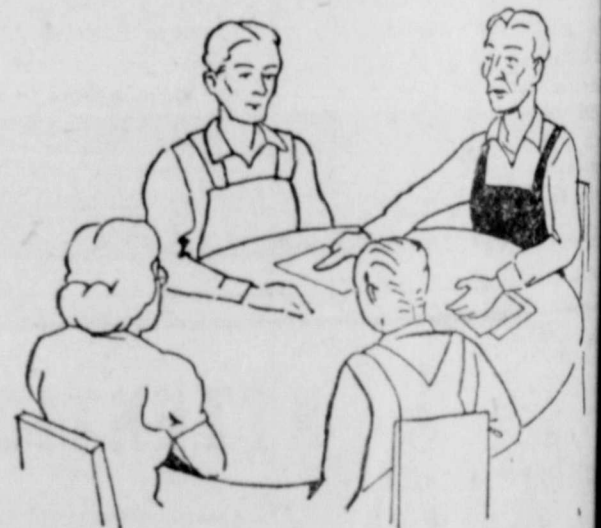
