WASHINGTON-President Eisenhower's veto of the natural gas bill will have far-reaching implications on his legislative program for 1956. In rejecting the measure to free gas producers of strict federal price controls, Mr. Eisenhower incurred the wrath of both Democratic and Republican leaders in Congress.

Foremost among these are House Speaker Sam Rayburn and Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon Johnson, both Texans and strong

backers of the gas bill. Another is Senate GOP leader William F. Knowland.

Heretofore, Johnson and Rayburn have been willing to go along with many of the administra-tion's legislative proposals. However, Capitol Hill observers say they now are so riled with the President that the picture is changed.

In other words, the "honeymoon"-at least, the period of relative peace between Congress and the White House-is over. From now on, the President is going to have to justify fully everything that he expects to get out of Congress.

e MCCARTHY MISCUE-The veto will have its Speaker Rayburn effect in another quarter. Senator Joseph R. McCarthy (R), Wisconsin, may find himself in

trouble in his home state over his vote in favor of the natural gas bill.

Even his staunchest supporters were dismayed by the fact that McCarthy has let himself be linked with influential oil and gas interests, including acceptance of free plane transportation by the Superior Oil company of California.

It was the latter firm which provided the \$2,500 campaign contribution offered to Senator Francis Case (R), South Dakota, during debate on the gas measure.

While McCarthy voted for the bill, almost every prominent Wisconsin Republican was opposing it, including firm McCarthy friends. The fact that Wisconsin's other GOP senator, Alexander Wiley, for whom McCarthy has never lost any love, voted against the gas bill hasn't helped the junior senator's standing in the state either.

• REALISM—A striking example of congressional candor emanated recently from the pen of Rep. Craig Hosmer (R), California, obviously a man with a sense of humo

Hosmer noted that election year brings more and more news (?) releases from members of Congress. "A quick glance at some of these reveals that the republic is truly on the brink of chaos, disaster, destruction and oblivion," he remarked.

"However, don't be too alarmed," he added soothingly. "A similar glance at others reveals the nation is truly entertaining a veritable wonderland of never-ending good things for its citizens. It all depends on who is talking-the 'ins' or the 'outs.' "

Hosmer has this word of advice for John Q. Citizen: "Keep your sanity firmly in hand and don't let the politicians snatch it away from you before the Nov. 6 elections."

• TALKING MACHINES-The Postoffice department admits it's been getting uncomplimentary comments over its plans to buy seven \$4,000 automatic stamp-vending New Stamp machines that say, by recording: "Thank you for Venders buying stamps."

However, officials explain that the talking part of Assailed the machine is its least important feature. They point out that the device will automatically make change for stamp

purchasers at any time of the day or night. All this, the officials claim, will actually save the Postoffice money

through improved service. Besides, they say, the recording gimmick is being installed almost entirely at the manufacturer's expense for experimental purposes.


SCHOOL APPORTIONMENT RAISED

> The State Board of Education raised the per capita school apportionment \$3, to \$76 per student for 1955-56.

The board approved an estimate of \$278,240,000 as the cost for the minimum foundation school program. By law, the local districts must contribute 20 per cent of this, or \$55,480,000.

Each county and each district's obligation to the foundation program will be apportioned on the economic index.
