In contrast, the total direct cost of the five "homemade" dresses was \$11.15. Thus, total money saved by making, amounted to \$10.79, or an average of \$2.16 per dress. Time spent in making averaged a little less than 2 hours a dress.

A comparison of figures for the three types of dresses shows that making children's dresses saves less than making women's street dresses but more than making women's house dresses. Ready-to-wear women's street dresses purchased at about \$10 could be made for about \$5, but housedresses purchased at about \$3.50 cost about \$2.25 to make at home.

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
