### Many Farmers Expected To Claim Gasoline Tax Refund

Approximately 45,000 North Texas farmers are expected to file a claim for the refund of the Federal excise tax on gasoline, according to V. W. Newman, Administrative Officer of the Brownwood office.

Under the law enacted on April 2, 1956, farmers are entitled to claim refund each year for the three cents a gallon Federal excise tax on gasoline used on a farm for farming purposes. Farmers can obtain Publication No. 308 from their local Internal Revenue Service office or from their County Agent. This 15 page pamphlet explains in detail how to file the claim for refund.

Forms 2240, the farmers' gas tax refund claim form, is also available at County Agents' offices as well as Internal Revenue Service offices. September 30 is the deadline for filing a claim for refund on the taxes covering the fiscal year from July 1, 1957 through June 30, 1958.

HUNTSVILLE — (Spec.) — A five-thousand dollar annual scholarship plan has been authorized for the Southwest School of Printing, a division of Sam Houston State Teachers College.

The Scholarship plan will give ten top ranking high school graduates more than five-hundred dollars a year to attend the school said Phil North of the Fort Worth Star Telegram, chairman of the school's scholarship committee.

Robert L. Gleason states, "Applications should be mailed immediately to me in care of the college, Huntsville." Gleason also stated "the college will have a special air-conditioned dormitory for printing students next year."

Afton Schulz, publisher of the Temple Daily Telegram, and retiring president of the printing school said, "Our school has doubled its enrollment in the past eleven months and I predict that within the next two years it will be the finest school of its kind in the south, if not the nation."

Forty-five newspaper publishers and commercial printing plant operators attended the recent one day meeting, and pledged their moral and financial support in order to perpetuate the school's proposed scholarship program.

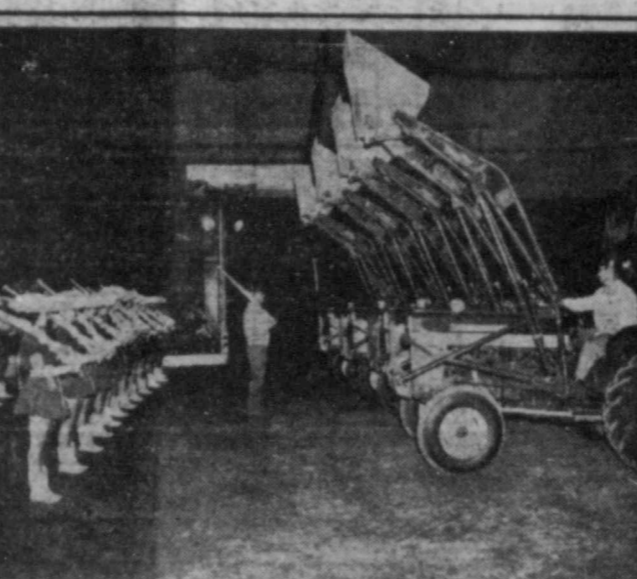

## Conservation Reserve Program Is Now Being Set Up For Next Year

Chairman E. L. Burkett of the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee has announced that work is under way in setting up the Soil Bank Conservation Reserve program for the 1959 crop year.

A tentative program has been drawn up by the Department of Agriculture and submitted to State ASC Committees throughout the country for study and comments.

After these recommendations are reviewed, the program will be put in final form and contracts will be made available to farmers for sign up later in the year.

Contracts may not be signed at this time.

General highlights of the tentative program for next year, the Mills County chairman said, are as follows:

1. The proposed national average rental payment to participating farmers will be \$13.50 per acre as compared with \$10.00 per acre in previous years of the program. The tentative average annual payment rate for 1959 in Texas is \$12.00 an acre, compared with \$10.00 an acre under 1956-58 contracts.

2. County and individual farm payment rates will be determined by ASC committees as in the past primarily on the basis of relative productivity, rental rates, and agricultural land values. County committees will have more freedom to make individual adjustments than in the past.

3. The full payment will be earned by putting into the Conservation Reserve land which has been in Soil Bank "base" crops (grains, oilseeds, and row crops) during the past 2 years. Lower payments may be earned by putting in non-diversion land (principally harvested hayland and rotation pasture land which has been in a regular rotation on the farm).

4. Farmers who put all of the eligible cropland into the Conservation Reserve will be able to earn the maximum regular payment rate for all "reserved" acres plus an additional 10 percent for "whole farm" participation.

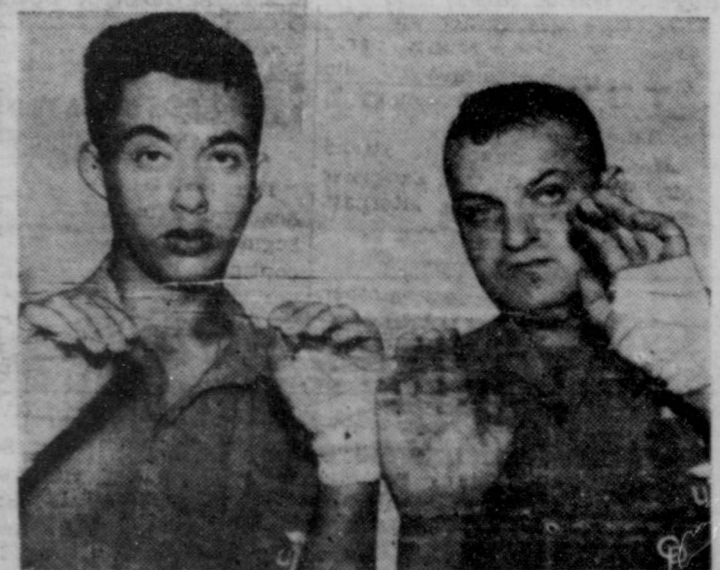
5. A farmer will be able to offer land at less than the regular rate if he wishes. This may make his offer more certain of acceptance in certain cases. In addition to the annual rental payment, a farmer who participates in the Conservation Reserve can get a payment covering a substantial part of the cost of establishing approved conservation practices on reserved land.

## VOTERS - ATTENTION

In this issue of the Eagle there appears the full text of all of the Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election (Nov. 4). So that you may be fully informed we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

☆ ☆ ☆

A brief digest of the nine different amendments follows.

**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 1)**—Provides for annual sessions of the legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expenses of members of the legislature and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol Building.

☆ ☆ ☆

**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6)**—Authorizes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the elective officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct.

☆ ☆ ☆

**NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 30)**—Provides that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

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**NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 31)**—Provides that any District, County, or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unserved more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected.

☆ ☆ ☆

**NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 48)**—Provides that a Home Rule City may provide by Charter Provision, and a City operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years.

☆ ☆ ☆

**NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 4)**—Provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows.

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**NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 4)**—Authorizes the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas.

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**NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR 36)**—Gives the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing for the acceptance of funds from the Federal Government for the purpose of paying such assistance.

☆ ☆ ☆

**NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 3)**—Authorizes the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits to the City of Amarillo, Texas, and a county wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas.

### MARCH OF EVENTS

Code for Federal Personnel Proposed by Senator Javits

Behavior Pattern Urged for U. S. Employees and Officials

WASHINGTON—Senator Jacob Javits, New York Republican, currently is espousing a code of ethics for federal government employees and officials as an aftermath of the Sherman Adams affair.

Javits would set out lines of behavior to avoid future incidents of the kind which saw President Eisenhower's "chief-of-staff" accepting payment of hotel bills on an Oriental rug and material for a hawk which coat.

The New York senator has modeled his proposals after the so-called "Dewey Code" which was put into operation in the Empire state when Thomas E. Dewey was governor, and administered by Javits when he was the state's attorney general.

There is nothing new in this business of advocating a uniform code of ethics for government officials. A similar code was widely used at the Capitol Hill during the height of the "man scandals" in 1951.

Nothing became official then, and it isn't likely that anything will come of Javits' suggestion. To paraphrase Mark Twain, everyone talks about ethics, but no one does anything about them.

**● PUBLIC DEBT—**Many costs can be attributed to the nation's current economic recession. Perhaps the most long-lasting one, however, will be the size of the federal debt. It now stands at \$25 billion, and is heading higher.

House Speaker Sam Rayburn, Texas Democrat, has estimated it will increase \$5 billion this year. Other estimates are that it will rise overall \$10 billion to \$15 billion. It now costs American taxpayers some \$7 billion a year, just to pay the interest on the debt.

The prospective increase will add another \$500 million a year to this figure. The rise in the debt comes not only from increased federal spending for public works as an anti-recession measure, but also from lower tax collections resulting from smaller personal incomes and corporate profits.

What is needed over the long pull, some observers think, is a measure of responsibility and self discipline that neither party has been willing to shoulder in the past. When the next cycle of prosperity returns, corporate and personal taxes, they say, should be increased for a period to make a significant reduction in the size of the national debt.

Only in this way, the argument goes, will the interest on the debt be reduced to manageable proportions, and the constant drain on the taxpayers eased.

**● MAN IN SPACE—**Some members of Congress and government officials are showing signs of restiveness about all the talk of getting a man into space. Typifying this sentiment is Senator Stuart Symington (D), Missouri, who has charged a Pentagon scientist with "misleading the people" regarding Army Project Adam.

"Adam" contemplates sending a man into space in a missile nose cone, and upon reaching a height of some 150 miles, having him released and parachuted back to earth.

Symington and others, argue that the project is nothing more than a stunt, and that it would contribute nothing to scientific knowledge.

On the other hand, should it fail, it could have serious repercussions on the space program, for it would be difficult to convince the public that the loss of a human life was necessary in this kind of experiment.

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### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SJR #3—Number Nine on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 10, proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section 1, to read as follows:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 1, which shall read as follows:

"Section 1. (a) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of two hospital districts, one to be coextensive with the County of Potter and the other to be coextensive with the County of Jefferson, as such boundaries now exist or may hereafter be lawfully established, and the other to be coextensive with Wichita County.

"If such tax is authorized, no political subdivision or municipality within the district may levy a tax for medical or hospital care for needy individuals, nor shall they maintain or erect hospital facilities, but the district shall be responsible for the care of such individuals.

lution assume all such responsibilities and obligations (including bonds and warrants) of such subdivisions or municipalities or both. The maximum tax rate submitted shall be sufficient to discharge such obligations, to maintain and operate the hospital system, and to issue tax bonds for the purpose of the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of the same, and such bonds shall be payable from said Seventy-five Cents (75¢) fund. The Legislature shall provide for transfer of title to properties to the district.

"(b) The Legislature may by law permit the County of Potter (in which the City of Amarillo is partially located) to render financial aid to that district by paying a part of the expenses of operating and maintaining the system and paying a part of the debts of the district (whether assumed or created by the district) and may authorize the levy of a tax not to exceed Ten Cents (10¢) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation (in addition to other taxes permitted by this Constitution) upon all property within the county but without the City of Amarillo at the time such levy is made for such purpose. If such tax is authorized, the district shall by resolution assume the responsibilities, obligations, and liabilities of the county in the manner and to the extent hereinabove provided for political subdivisions having boundaries coextensive with the district, and the county shall not thereafter levy taxes (other than those provided for hospital purposes herein) for providing hospital care for needy individuals of the county.

"(c) The Legislature may by law authorize the creation of a hospital district within Jefferson County, the boundaries of which shall include only the area comprising the Jefferson County Drainage District No. 7 and the Fort Arthur Independent School District, as such boundaries existed on the first day of January, 1957, with the power to issue bonds for the sole purpose of purchasing a site for, and the construction and initial equipping of a hospital system, and with the power to levy a tax not to exceed Seventy-five Cents (75¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) valuation of property therein for the purpose of paying the principal and interest on such bonds.

"The creation of such hospital district shall not be final until approved at an election by a majority of the resident property-taxpaying voters voting at said election who have duly rendered their property for taxation upon the tax rolls of either said Drainage or said School District, nor shall

such bonds be issued or such tax be levied until so approved by such voters. "The district shall not have the power to levy any tax for maintenance or operation of the hospital or facilities of such subdivisions of the state or private individuals, associations, or corporations for such purposes.

"If the district hereinabove authorized is finally created, no other hospital district may be created embracing any part of the territory within its boundaries, but the Legislature by law may authorize the creation of a hospital district incorporating therein the remainder of Jefferson County, Texas. The Legislature shall provide for the powers and duties and with the limitations presently provided by Article IX, Section 4, of the Constitution of Texas, except that such district shall be confirmed at an election wherein the resident qualified property-taxpaying voters who have their property within such proposed district for taxation on the county rolls, shall be authorized to vote. A majority of those participating in the election voting in favor of the district shall be necessary for its confirmation and for bonds to be issued.

"(d) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of this amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid because of their anticipatory character. "Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the general election to be held the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a county-wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas." "AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to create a Hospital District coextensive with the incorporated limits of the City of Amarillo, Texas, and authorizing Potter County to lend financial aid to and participate in the operation of said Hospital District, and further authorizing the Legislature to create a county-wide Hospital District in Wichita County, Texas, and Hospital Districts in Jefferson County, Texas." "Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

## PARENT PROBLEMS

### Parents Must Be Firm With Bedtime Truant

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D.

MANY a child from about six to ten develops bedtime nuisances, resulting in great annoyance to his parents and, in the long run, to himself. Often he finally goes to bed very unhappy.

A frequent problem is to get such a child started away from the family and off to bed promptly at a reasonable time. As a rule, the parents keep reminding him over and over, until perhaps they blow up. The child usually finds all sorts of ways to linger longer.

He may dawdle on his way to bed, waking another child or quarreling or fighting with him. If he shares a room with another child, they may fight or have fun long before settling down.

#### Other Delays

From twenty minutes to half an hour after he has left the family, he may return to them or go to the kitchen for something to eat. Much time expires before he finally gets into bed.

When the family takes him visiting friends or relatives, the latter must share these annoyances, night after night. So may guests who come to the home on evenings.

Clearly this child is gaining poor training in self-reliance and responsibility—in growing up.

There is no use telling this child each evening when to get to bed and to keep telling him until he does. Announce for a long period what the bedtime hour shall be in terms of when he is in bed for the night, quiet and with the lights off.

To correct these problems, it might be wise to set the bedtime hour half an hour or so later. Announce once to the child, of six to twelve who dawdles, his bedtime hour and the penalty if he doesn't observe it. You might properly say to him that if he is fifteen minutes late at meeting this deadline, he won't be allowed to go to bed for say, 30 or 60 minutes, but will spend that time unamused in a chair, doing nothing, where he can be checked.

#### Enforcing Rule

One or two evenings of enforcement might settle this problem permanently.

too small. The law provides that the count must not be more than 65 to the pound, yet there are thousands of pounds of smaller shrimp being taken. Packers are having to buy these small shrimp under protest. They say if they don't buy what the fisherman brings in, he'll go elsewhere with the desirable catch. As a result thousands of pounds of these small shrimp are being processed daily and canned for the commercial market.

It is generally agreed that the shrimp catch has gone up in the last few years because there are more fishing units. We are getting more shrimp from the Mexican waters. But it also is agreed that unless something can be done to protect our inshore waters from losing all the small shrimp, our inshore fish will be out of food.

We'd lose and lose heavily under those circumstances. And speaking of fishing with shrimp, I recently had a wonderful trip to Port Aransas. The Boatman's Association there entertained a group of outdoor writers with a fishing trip. The weather was very bad so we didn't get into much water.

We did our fishing with shrimp in the bay waters and several of the boys came away with a nice mess of speckled trout.

I can recommend speckled trout fishing for anyone. In the first place, it is a comparatively easy fishing trip. There are ample accommodations along the Texas coast. You can fish in the bay waters either wading, the jetties or piers, or from boats. Many Texans now are trailing their outboards to the coast and finding excellent sport fishing.

Another thing, you don't have to buy more tackle. You can fish for trout with your bass equipment. Furthermore you can use either shrimp or lures. Most of those who go to the coast for the first time like to free-shrimp. They use a small treble hook. Just back of the eye on the shrimp's head is a black or brown spot. This is the toughest part of the shrimp. Put your hook through the shrimp head at this point, cast it into the water and let it run free. Chances are, if you set your hook in time, you'll come in with a trout.

These trout also are called weakfish, because the mouth is very tender. Don't jerk the hook out of its mouth. Work it in easily.

Of course there are many other angles to successful trout fishing, like being able to locate their movement, either from watching them move about in the water, or watching the gulls feed. But you can learn about coastal fishing in a short time, and you'll never learn it all as long as you live.

### A FARM AGENCY THAT ALSO HELPS CITY FOLKS

How does a state farm agency help city folks?

The most commonly accepted answers to that question would likely relate to services at the farm level which, through quality improvement and assistance, give the city consumer a better product.

Not so. For not only does the Texas Department of Agriculture have responsibility for guarding against inferior production of farm goods; we also have a number of functions and responsibilities aimed directly at protecting and serving the consumer—and most consumers live in cities.

A prime example of first-hand service to every consumer is the department's division of Weights and Measures, which checks to keep every grocery store scale accurate, makes certain of printed weights on all food stuffs, and even inspects for proper measures on gasoline pumps.

Another direct consumer service evolved just this year with the enforcement of the Texas Egg Law, which makes available to consumers more accurately-labeled eggs than ever before possible. Although you can't always tell an egg by its shell, you can now tell it by its advertised label, because the Texas Department of Agriculture, as the agency responsible

for the law's applications, makes the necessary inspections and checks.

In other significant ways, the department's agricultural services provide as much direct protection to the city citizen as to the farmer. Such a service is that which deals with nursery stock inspections. City homeowners all take pride in their yards, and often invest a great deal of time and money in them unhesitatingly.

The nursery business, then, must be regulated to see that the homeowner gets what he pays for in nursery stock—undiseased, properly represented plants. And this is a service of the Texas Department of Agriculture. More than one offender of Texas nursery regulations has been brought to justice through departmental action.

This department serves all the people of Texas, which is why the voters of Texas are the ones to determine the department's administration.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for the election of a mayor and a city council in cities having a population of more than 10,000.

Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

Section 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

### STATE POULTRY GROUP ANNOUNCES ANN'L MEETING

All Mills County Commercial poultrymen are invited to attend the annual meeting of the Texas Poultry Improvement Association that is scheduled for August 19-21 at the Baker Hotel in Dallas.

Ben Wormell, extension husbandman, describes this meeting as a must meeting for all those interested in seeing the State's poultry industry continue its forward progress.

Highlighting the speakers' list will be the presidents of three national poultry organizations: Peter C. Crafts, National Turkey Federation; V. F. ## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #30—Number Three on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for the election of a mayor and a city council in cities having a population of more than 10,000.

Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

Section 28. Vacancies in Offices of Judges of Superior Courts To Be Filled By The Governor.

"Vacancies in the office of Judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next succeeding General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast shall be in favor of said amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #1—Number One on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 2 and 34 of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for annual Sessions of the Legislature; changing the composition, per diem and travel expense of the Members of the Legislature; authorizing the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol, providing for an election; providing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

Section 5. The Legislature shall meet every year, under the condition and limitation hereinafter set forth, at such time as may be provided by law, and at other times when convened by the Governor.

"During the First Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January, 1959, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thirty (30) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty (30) days of the First Regular Session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership.

"During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January 1960, and each succeeding two years thereafter, the Legislature shall be authorized to consider and act upon the following only:

"a. Make annual appropriations for the general operation of the State government; which appropriations may be passed by majority vote of each House.

"b. Consider emergency matters submitted by the Governor; bills embodying such matters shall become law only if the same shall be passed by a two-thirds vote of the Members elected to Each House.

"Whenever the term 'Biennial Session' appears in Article 37 of this Constitution, it shall be construed to mean 'First Regular Session.'

"Any bill or resolution in the Second Regular Session of the Legislature must be introduced in that session."

Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a salary of Seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) per annum and expenses of office in amount and manner as determined by law. The Legislature shall not provide for any per diem for a greater number than one hundred and twenty (120) days during the First Regular Session, sixty (60) days during the Second Regular Session, and thirty (30) days during any Called Session.

Section 25. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 24a to read as follows:

Section 24a. In addition to other compensation provided herein, the Lieutenant Governor of the State of Texas and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to temporary residence in the State Capital during their term of office in such quarters and under such conditions as the Legislature may provide.

Section 4. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for annual Sessions of the Legislature, prescribing the compensation and expenses for members thereof, limiting the per diem for each Session, and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives in the Capitol."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for annual Sessions of the Legislature, prescribing the compensation and expenses for Members thereof, limiting the per diem for each Session, and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives in the Capitol."

Section 5. That the Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**Questions And Answers About Social Security**  
Question: I am a dentist. Back in 1951, I was informed that my profession was not covered under social security. Lately I read in a professional journal that my earnings should have been reported for social security purposes beginning with the year 1956. While I filed income tax returns for 1956 and 1957, I did not pay any social security tax. What do I do now?  
Answer: You should immediately file amended tax returns for 1956 and 1957, being sure to prepare Schedule C completely, and pay the social security tax due on your net earnings for those years.  
Question: I am 68 years old and I have been farming all my life but haven't been making any profit since security came in for farming. Is there any way I can get benefits?  
Answer: Yes, if you have adequate records, you may possibly qualify for benefits reporting your income as "optional method." So a farmer had gross income of least \$800 in 1955, or \$600 in later years, he is entitled to report for social security purposes and receive just as though he had a profit. For 1955, he may one-half of his gross; after 1955, he may report his gross income.

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 4. The Legislature of the State of Texas shall have the power to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation, and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any said money may be expended."  
Section 2. The Legislature shall have the power to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation, and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any said money may be expended.  
Section 3. The Governor of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the amendment shall be published in the major newspapers of the State at the time and length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this State.

There are few things nicer, few things more provocative of nostalgic memories in years to come, than summer night suppers. The sweet-scented air, the happy talk of the day's doings, the gay table settings, the colorful foods, the ease and help-yourself informality—all are part of it.

For Mom, these occasions mean less work in cooking, table setting and service. She makes good use of the many easy-to-fix foods that are so readily obtainable, but she also, despite all the novelties and innovations, clings firmly to old favorites such as cold cuts and salads.

**Sandwiches and Snacks**  
Leftover cold cuts come in handy for sandwiches and snacks, when tightly wrapped and refrigerated. But they should be used within a day or two.

Fresh fruit and fine bakery products make things easy, too. Tomatoes sliced go nicely with cold cuts. So do stuffed tomatoes with macaroni or egg salads or coleslaw.

To make the cottage cheese filling, combine 2 c. cottage cheese with 1/2 c. diced radishes, 1/2 c. cucumbers and some sausage pizza!

chopped chives or green onions to taste and let stand an hour or so before filling toasts.

Peel 6 large tomatoes, letting them stand 5 minutes in cold water, then dipping cold water over them from the top into the bottom.

**Attractive Arrangement**  
Present the cold meat with a flourish. Arrange prettily in a round platter garnish, use carrots in combination with olives, radish roses and carrot sticks.

Ruby-spiced crab apples water dress also make a garnish.

It's a time-saving idea to range the platter several in advance of serving, with two thicknesses of paper or foil, tucked under the edges of the platter and storing it in refrigerator.

For a quick hot dish, English muffin halves, place two slices of tomato or thuringer, then a slice of tomato. Top with American cheese and melt with either basil or a little of both.

Broil until cheese melts, and there you have it!

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# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

TEX—During much of the century Texas was the great land frontier. From older days the restless, the hopeful who'd there was plenty of room for the sod huts and free land.

leaders, in both government and industry, have taken the position that favorable circumstances alone will not convert the frontier to empire. Other states are angling, too, for energetic men with capital and know-how to start new factories humming.

And most states are not hampered, as Texas is, by a constitutional provision prohibiting use of tax money to advertise the state's advantages. Despite this hindrance, the last Legislature, at Gov. Price Daniel's request, reactivated the Texas Industrial Commission to start the ball rolling. E. B. Germany of Dallas is Commission chairman.

In operation only four months, with a piggy bank budget of voluntary donations, the Commission is, nevertheless, making itself felt.

Its showpiece is a 68-page, two-color brochure called "A Plan of Action to Win New Industry for Your Community." This do-it-yourself manual was mailed to every Chamber of Commerce, mayor, county judge, industrial foundation and legislator in Texas.

Letters of commendation and requests for extra copies have "poured in," according to Bob Bray, member of the governor's staff assigned to the Commission. Said a letter from the Huntsville and Walker County C of C, "Never have I seen any publication so full of excellent guidance material for communities."

With the letter came a contribution to carry on the Commission's work.

Next big goal is passage in November of a constitutional amendment to remove the legal

shackles on financing. "Failure of the amendment," said Bray, "will handcuff the Commission. Our big job now is selling Texans on the need to sell Texas, both industry-wise and tourist-wise."

With funds and staff, the Commission will be ready to go ahead on an extensive effort—already mapped out—for research, information, advertisements, films, aid to local organizations, etc.

Says Germany, "Disastrous droughts, the alarming loss of rural population and the stark realization that the state no longer can depend on its oil revenue, all emphasize the need for developing our industrial resources."

**Schools "Bust Out"**—Some seam-splitting from Texas' expanding population was reflected in the reports of Texas Education Agency survey teams on conditions in the state's public schools.

As a result of the reports to the State Commission on Accreditation, nine schools were removed from the accredited list, and accreditation was withheld from six others. Fifty-one were warned they face loss of accreditation unless they improved standards.

Most of the schools' troubles seemed to stem from pupil population and needs that outran community leadership and financing. Samples from the unfavorable reports: not enough textbooks, few or no library books, no laboratory facilities for science courses, unsanitary or outmoded facilities, use of condemned or "miserably overcrowded" buildings, teachers instructing courses in which they had had no college study.

Actually, the number of schools having trouble meeting standards was only about 3.5 per cent of the total—or 66 out of Texas' approximately 1,800 school districts.

**New Roads Ahead**—Better driving days are seen ahead as the State Highway Department unveiled its plans for 1959-60 interstate highway building.

A \$260,000,000 program has been authorized to add 567 miles of controlled-access highways to Texas' portion of the national network.

Of this, \$210,495,300 is earmarked for construction, \$16,272,100 for right-of-way buying and an additional \$33,322,500 for advance right-of-way buying.

Eventually, Texas is to have 3,033 miles of the interstate system within its borders.

**Fresh Start**—National Bankers Life Ins. Co. of Dallas may continue in business, but without the control of its founder and majority stockholder, Pierce Brooks.

This was the effect of a ruling by State Insurance Commissioner William A. Harrison after a three-day hearing on NABLICO's affairs. State officials conceded the solvency of the company, but objected to certain investments and management practices.

## 1958 Fall Hunting Regulations Set By Game And Fish Commission

Austin, (Spec.). Basic hunting regulations in Texas have been set by the Game and Fish Commission for the 1958 fall season. In general they will be very much the same as last season, according to the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission.

The regulations were approved by the Commission last week from recommendations made by biologists after they had studied conditions throughout the

state, particularly in areas where regulatory authority has been granted to the Commission.

The hunting season will begin Sept. 1 for doves in the North zone. The season will extend through Oct. 20. In the South zone the season will be Oct. 1 through Nov. 19, except in the counties of the Rio Grande Valley where it will be legal to shoot mourning doves for the two-day open white-winged dove season. Here the season will end Nov. 17 inclusive.

Dove hunters also get another break. The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service has authorized the possession of 20 mourning doves, after the first day. The daily bag will continue at 10.

The white-winged season begins 2 p. m. daily on Sept. 14 and 16, only, and ends at sunset on each of the two days. The bag limit is 10 per day and 10 in possession.

Deer hunters will find the white tailed season in the Edwards Plateau and South Texas areas open Nov. 16 to Dec. 31, inclusive.

Antelope seasons will be the same as last year, except that in the Trans Pecos area three more days have been added. The dates are Oct. 1-3; 5-7, and 8-10 inclusive. The Panhandle dates for antelope are Oct. 14-16 and Oct. 17-19, covering two areas.

Quail season will remain from Dec. 1 to Jan. 16, except in a few counties where the season has been closed by the legislature. Quail season has been opened in Crockett county this year.

The turkey season will remain the same this season as last year.

A digest of the Game and Fish Laws now is being prepared and will be ready for distribution through license dealers, wardens, and sporting goods stores as soon as possible.

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
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

### Voters To Pick State Senator In Run-Off Aug. 23rd

SAN SABA, Tex. (Sp.)—Only one Central Texas district runoff race will be decided in the Second Primary election on August 23. Voters in the big 18-county 16th State Senatorial district — extending from the Hill Country, through Central Texas to Kinney County on the Rio Grande—will pick a new state senator.

The ballot will be one of the shortest in Central Texas voting history.

In the two-man runoff race, Louis Crump, 42-year-old lawyer of San Saba, is opposed by Joe Swanner of Brownwood. Crump's runoff campaign got off to a fast start over the weekend when the San Saba lawyer received the endorsement of two of his opponents in the first primary.

Judge Sylvester Lewis of Lampasas, and State Representative Harold G. Kennedy of Burnet, announced they are backing Crump over his Brownwood op-

ponent. The winner will take over the Senate seat vacated by Senator Carlos Ashley of Llano.

The Crump-Swanner runoff generally pits the voting strength of the county areas of the big district against the largest city in the district, Brownwood. Swanner drew a heavy portion of his vote in the first primary from Brownwood. Crump carried the largest number of counties in the 18-county district in the four-man race in the first primary. San Saba gave Crump the largest majority ever received by a candidate seeking public office in that county. He received 90 per cent of his home county vote in addition to carrying Kimble, Kerr, Kinney, Llano, Mason, Menard, Mills and Real Counties. Lewis and Kennedy received a combined vote of 11,000 in the first primary. Crump's vote was an unofficial 9,255.

Crump said of the support of Lewis and Kennedy, "I think these two fine men and the citizens from their home counties as well as those over the district for their support. I plan an aggressive runoff campaign."

Other counties in the widespread district include: Zavala, Uvalde, Bandera, Gillespie, Lampasas, Burnet, Concho and McCulloch. (Paid Political Adv.)

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #17—Number Six on the Ballot.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17 proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 45, to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions to certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows; stating the maximum of each pension; and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 45, to read as follows: "Section 45. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 352, Acts of the Fifth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any

such Texas Ranger or his widow, provided that such widow was legally married prior to January 1, 1937, to a Texas Ranger qualifying for such pension.

"These pensions may be paid only from the special fund created by Section 17, Article VII for a payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for widows of such soldiers serving in said service, navy, organizations or militia."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

## Questions And Answers About Social Security

**Question:** My husband died in 1953 and I received a lump-sum death payment from his social security account at that time. I am 58 years of age. A month ago, I was advised by my doctor that I could no longer work, and I gave up my job. I have worked 14 months on jobs where social security tax was deducted from my salary. Can I draw disability benefits from either my husband's account or my own account?

**Answer:** There is no provision for the payment of disability benefits to you from your husband's account; at the age of 62, you will be able to draw widow's benefits. Since you have not paid social security tax on 5 years of work out of the 10 years preceding the month in which you become disabled, you cannot draw disability benefits from your own account.

**Question:** I am receiving social security benefits. This year, I have earned \$1400 in wages from work which is not covered by social security. Must I report these wages to the social security office?

**Answer:** Yes, even if your work is not covered by social security, if you are a social security beneficiary under age 72, you must report your total earnings. This is true even though social security tax was not deducted from your wages.
