## Goldthwaite Schools To Open September 2

### Faculty Meeting And Registration Scheduled For Friday, August 29th

Vacation season for Goldthwaite school population is rapidly drawing to a close and school bells will ring again Tuesday morning, Sept. 2—the day after the Labor Day holiday. Buildings, grounds, books, schedules, etc., are being readied for the nine month term that will see most faculty members returned to their places.

All summer, Mr. Terry and Mr. Keyser have been on the job readying the buildings and grounds. Supt. Jones has been in his office but most other employees have been away for the summer.

The elementary school will open without a change in personnel. In high school Mr. Williams will be back as principal. There are some new faculty members in the high school. Robert Sills will instruct high school math, Max Blansit will coach and teach Physical Education; Mrs. Frankie Blansit will instruct in girls' P. E.; Mr. Thurman Head will work in the agricultural line, and a science teacher is expected to be named soon.

A driver for the Ratler route has not been selected and resignation has been received from Kenneth Doss as driver on the Bull's Creek run, leaving two vacancies. Dan Long will again supervise the buses and will be assisted by Joe A. Kemp, Elton Horton, Hugh Owens and Cruz Corona. The routes will be the same as last year with the exception of route number 2 which will be reversed for the semester in order to equalize the ride for students. This bus will be driven by Dan Long and will leave Goldthwaite, travel out the Hamilton Highway to Homer McCasland's and make the first pick-up. The afternoon run will be the same way and the same order. Mr. Horton's route will be extended to pick-up the Wright family children who have bought a farm in the extreme northeast corner of the district.

There will be the same group of workers in each lunchroom, however if the student participation in high school is not greater than last year, then that work will be handled by Mrs. John Elliott and Mrs. J. C. Long. Mrs. Lola Huffman has been helping in this lunchroom and shall continue if needed. Supt. Jones said the high school lunchroom lost money last year and if participation does not increase, then the prices of lunches will need to be raised so as to again make the lunchroom self-sustaining.

Last year, many patrons paid for lunches for longer periods thus avoiding loss of time and money in collections and book-keeping. Every parent of every child is asked to pay for lunches in advance and for as long a period as possible. It would be much better if all people paid by the semester or by the year. Several people adopted that method of pay last year and saved the teachers and the bookkeeper much time that is badly needed for other duties.

Prices of lunches will vary from 20c to 30c. No tickets will be sold at the door other than parents who are casual visitors to the schools. Mr. Jones stated, "This program strictly belongs to the people. All monies saved goes into making a better lunch for the money."

New students for the top six grades will register with Mr.

Williams at the high school on Friday, August 29, at 1:30 p. m. Any student who needs a change in schedule should contact Mr. Williams on the same day. Pupils taking private music lessons should schedule them as soon as possible. Elementary students will register on opening day.

Books in all grades will be issued on Tuesday, Sept. 2, when a short schedule of classes will be conducted. School will dismiss at 2:30 p. m. on opening day.

A light turnout is predicted as Mills County voters go to the polls this Saturday, August 23, to cast their ballot in the second primary election of 1958.

Only two offices are to be filled in this run-off election. One is the office of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, place 1, and the other is the office of State Senator for this senatorial district.

J. Edwin Smith of Harris County and Robert W. Hamilton of Midland County are candidates for the court posts. There has been little activity with respect to this race locally.

In the State Senators race there has been much work and activity in this area as Louis Crump of San Saba County and Joe Swanner of Brown County are battling to the finish line in their bid to succeed Carlos Ashley of Llano, who did not seek re-election.

Both Crump and Swanner

have been campaigning actively throughout the district and have had many workers in the field. Swanner led the district in the first primary with Crump running in second place with four candidates in the race.

Crump was the top man in the four-man race in pulling votes in Mills County in the first primary.

Kennedy of Marble Falls and Lewis of Lampasas, the other two candidates in the bid for the senate seat in the first primary, have come out and endorsed Crump in the run-off battle.

Mrs. Raymond Cockrum, chairman of the Mills County Democratic Executive Committee is urging everyone who is qualified to go to the polls and vote Saturday.

Polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

Absentee voting has been light with only 22 ballots having been cast by Tuesday noon of this week. Deadline for securing absentee ballots was Tuesday at midnight.

There were a few interruptions during the evening (also throughout the three days) asking for some boy to please find his group or that "Johnny Jones" was lost and please come get him.

The following two days were spent in programs at the coliseum. There were many foreign missionaries present to help present the program, the theme

of which was "Christ For Me." The program ended with testimonials from many men who told how Christ came first in their different vocations and could be used by each Royal Ambassador in choosing his vocation.

There was also a period of trading among boys from different states. Alligators, horned toads, hats, horns and hundreds of items were swapped.

All of the boys attending had a most enjoyable time and are looking forward to the next Royal Ambassador Congress to be held somewhere in the United States.

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# OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

After your name has been drawn, you are assigned to an area for the hunt. The land owner can charge you as much as \$60 for a buck and \$40 for a doe. In some instances, particularly in the Panhandle, no charge, or a nominal charge, is made.

Many West Texas ranchers, because they have been subject to heavy drouths and feed shortages, feel they are entitled to a hunting fee for killing the antelope. This fee, is strictly up to the land owner. The legislature passed a law making it possible for him to collect such a fee. None of this money goes to the Game and Fish Commission, and neither is it collected by the game personnel.

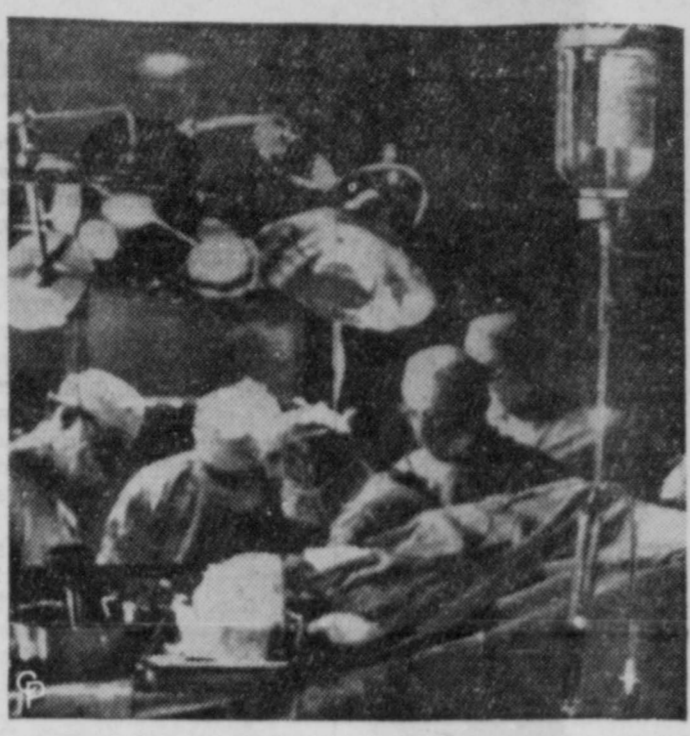
All hunts, however, are carefully supervised by the game wardens and biologists.

The antelope season will open this year Oct. 1, with staggered hunts through Oct. 20.

**Deer-Quail Seasons Overlap**  
Trans-Pecos deer hunters will find a new season this year, which they may like better. It will be Dec. 1 to 8 inclusive. The quail season begins Dec. 1. This means a hunter may get his mule deer and some blue quail on the same hunt.

Since you must have a lease, or hunt by the day basis, you might want to have an understanding with the landowner regarding the hunting of birds before you close the deal. Some ranchers don't like to have their quail killed. In most instances this is a fallacy as any wildlife biologist will tell you.

There has been a good fawn crop this year not only in the Trans-Pecos but other areas,

too. There was a good carry-over on deer from last season, so hunting should be exceptionally good.

**Plan Your Hunt Early**  
This word of warning also should be given those who plan a big game hunt. Get your rifle ready.

There is nothing more important to a hunt than having an accurate rifle and knowing where it will hit. You can spend a hundred dollars for a lease, buy a wagon load of groceries and have pleasant companions. But, if you can't hit the side of a barn, simply because you didn't check your gun, you've tossed away a lot of good money.

I think more deer are missed because of this one oversight than all other reasons combined. Many hunters borrow guns or rent them. Naturally some just can't afford to own a deer rifle. Others don't want to be bothered with them. There are thousands, however, who do have guns and they should know where those guns shoot.

Perhaps the best shooters are those who have been using the same rifle for years. They know exactly where it will hit, and they take the time to keep it clean and keep the sights lined up.

If you are a novice at handling a deer rifle, right now is the time to get used to your gun. First get you a good ballistics table and learn just what your gun is capable of doing at a given range. Determine what load you want to shoot, and what brand of ammunition.

All ammunition is good, much better than the average shooter. That doesn't mean that you can mix brands and get good results.

For instance, if you are shooting a 30-06 and decide upon a 180 grain load, which is a pretty good all-around piece of fodder, study on your table and

## 75-Day Season On Waterfowl Set For Texas

There will be a 75-day season for ducks and geese in Texas this year for all species except Canadas and white-fronts. This is the information brought back from Washington by the Executive Secretary of the Game and Fish Commission. The dates approved by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service were those asked for not only by the Texas Commission, but the Central Flyways Council. This group met in Corpus Christi two weeks ago and heard technicians who had been making duck and goose counts.

The duck and goose season will open in Texas Nov. 1, and continue through Jan. 14, both days inclusive. Shooting will be permitted from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset.

The open season on Canadas and white-fronts (specks) will be from Nov. 16 to Jan. 14, inclusive. This reduction of 15 days is the result of a decreased population of the birds, according to the biologists.

Hunters may take five ducks and/or five geese a day. The possession limit on ducks is 10, while the possession of geese is limited to one day's kill. On geese, only two Canadas or their sub-species may be taken, or one Canada and one white-front. On snows and blues five of either or in the aggregate may be taken.

Rail and gallinule season has been set for Sept. 1, through Nov. 9, with a bag and possession limit of 15.

The coot season is the same as the duck season, with a bag and possession limit of 10.

Wilson snipe and jacksnipe may be taken from Dec. 16 through Jan. 14, with a bag and possession limit of eight.

The woodcock season is Dec. 8, through Jan. 16, with four for the day or eight in possession.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4** proposing an Amendment to Section 66 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature be authorized to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing, however, that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising; and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money may be expended.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

**Section 1.** That Section 66 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 66. The Legislature of the State of Texas shall have the power to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

**Section 2.** The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4** proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas to provide that any officials for whom four-year terms of office were authorized in 1954 may resign such office prior to the expiration of their term, and providing for the filling of such vacancies in the manner now provided by law.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

**Section 1.** Section 65 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereinafter to read as follows:

"Section 65. **STAGGERING TERMS OF OFFICE.**—The following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, shall serve only for terms of two (2) years: (a) Sheriffs; (b) Assessors and Collectors of Taxes; (c) District Attorneys; (d) County Attorneys; (e) Public Weighers; (f) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (g) Constables. At subsequent elections, such officers shall be elected for the full terms provided in this constitution.

"In any district, county or precinct where any of the aforementioned offices is of such nature that two (2) more persons hold such office, with the result that candidates file for 'Place No. 1,' 'Place No. 2,' etc., the officers

selected at the General Election in November, 1954, shall serve for a term of two (2) years if the designation of their office is an uneven number, and for a term of four (4) years if the designation of their office is an even number. Thereafter, all such officers shall be elected for the terms provided in this Constitution.

"Provided, however, if any of the officers named herein shall announce their candidacy, or shall in fact become a candidate, in any General, Special or Primary Election, for any office of profit or trust under the laws of this State or the United States other than the office then held, at any time when the unexpired term of the office then held shall exceed one (1) year, such announcement or such candidacy shall constitute an automatic resignation of the office then held, and the vacancy thereby created shall be filled pursuant to law in the same manner as other vacancies for such offices are filled."

**Sec. 2.** The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that any District, County, or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unexpired more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected."

"**AGAINST** the Constitutional Amendment providing that any District, County, or Precinct official serving a four-year term must resign before announcing for a different office if there remains unexpired more than one (1) year of the term for which he was elected."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said Amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

**Sec. 3.** The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed Amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**Rodent Control**—Most farm people are aware of the money losses represented in the property destroyed by rats, but possibly many do not realize that this animal also is a carrier of some of the most dangerous diseases.

In the U. S. alone in a single year, rats still cost an estimated one billion dollars in damage to food, property, humans and livestock—equal to the total production of more than 100,000 average farms. Each rat cost you, on the average about \$20.00 per year.

Rodents are a community problem, one pair of rats can produce over 50 young per year. The entire community is a rodent's playground and because rats and mice travel great distances, it is necessary to organize an entire community if we are to get rid of these robbers.

Mills County is in the process of setting up a rodent control demonstration. Mr. Aday, with the rodent control service, was in the county last week and he will be back on the night of September 8. He will discuss the control of rats with the Board of Directors of the Farm Bureau. The bait will be sold through the Farm Bureau, to the people in the county.

We plan to set up control demonstrations in different sections of the county whereby you may be present and obtain the bait and instructions on how to do the job of ridding your farm of rats and mice.

**Brucellosis Must Go**—Brucellosis (formerly called Bang's

disease or infectious abortion) has driven more dairy and beef cattlemen out of business than any other disease. Infected cows produce about 22 per cent less milk than healthy cows. Calf crops from infected cows are cut about 40 per cent.

In human beings, brucellosis is also known as undulant fever or Malta fever. Farm people contact the disease three times more often than city people, because there are more opportunities on the farm for exposure.

Losses to the livestock industry due to brucellosis are conservatively estimated to exceed \$65 million a year.

Brucellosis can be wiped out—There are 4 plans now recommended as aids in the eradication of this disease. Plans A and B as set up for dairy herds will do the job quickly. But plan C was designed especially for beef herds. It allows a beef cattle man to outgrow his problem over a period of a few years.

Fifteen states have been certified as brucellosis free, and in addition, 570 counties in 28 other states have been certified. For a state to qualify for certification, not more than 1 per cent of the cattle and not more than five per cent of all herds can be infected with the disease.

How does Texas rank in this fight to stamp out brucellosis?

Texas is one of the 34 states yet to be certified, and is one of seven states that does not have one or more certified counties within the state. As a livestock and dairy state, Texas has a big stake in this movement.

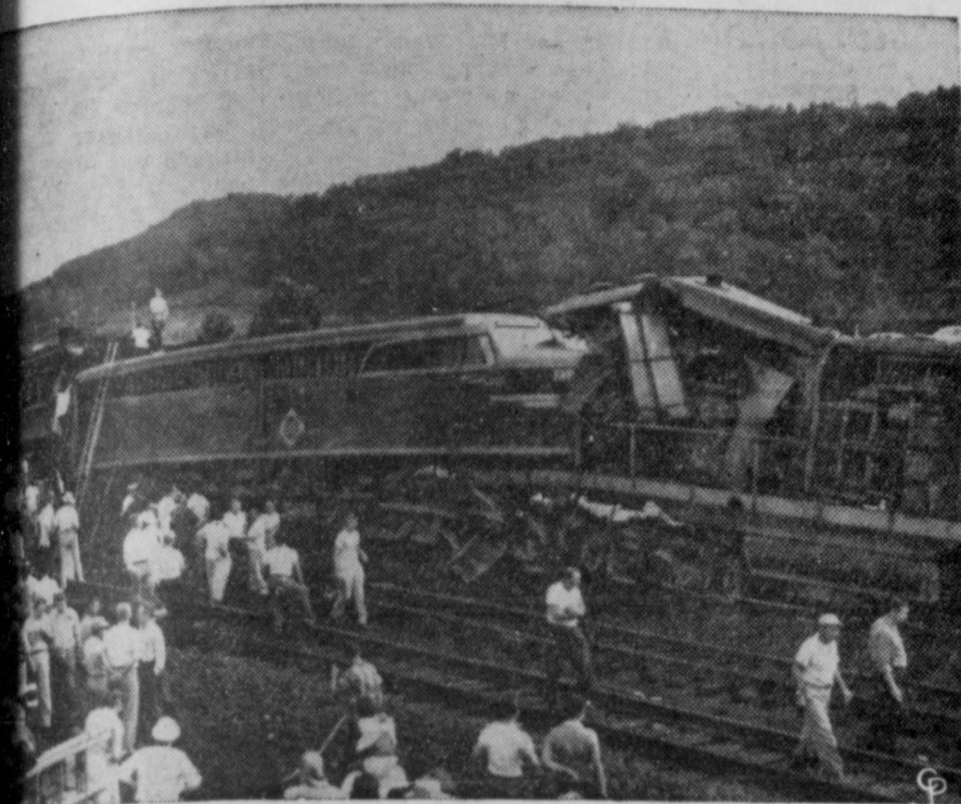

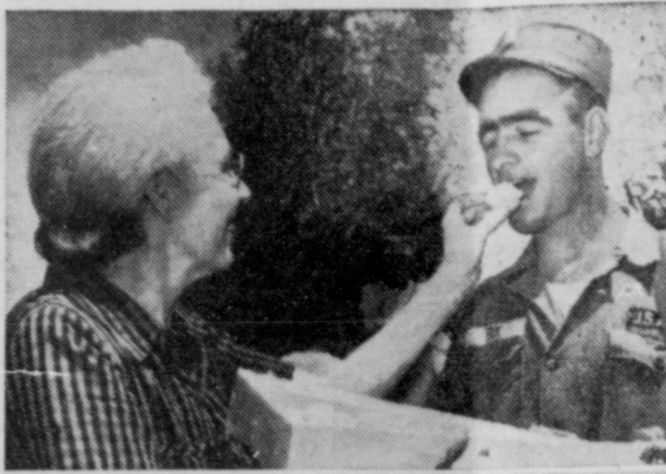

For freezing or canning, select only fresh top-quality vegetables at the right stage of maturity for eating.

SJR #6—Number Two on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6** proposing an amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, authorizing each county to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for appointive and elective officers and employees of the county or precinct, providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to the voters qualified to vote thereon, and providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:  
"(b) Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for the appointive and elective officers and employees of the county or precinct, provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after such election has been advertised by being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in said county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such fund shall be at least equal to the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7½%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county."  
"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as so received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is

guaranteed by the United States, provided that a sufficient amount of said funds shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said fund; provided that the recipients of benefits from said pension shall not be eligible for any other pension retirement compensation fund from the State of Texas, unless the fund from the creation of which is provided for herein, contributed by the county, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such pension aid."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at the General Election in November, 1958, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:  
"FOR the amendment of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the appointive officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct."  
"AGAINST the amendment of subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution, to authorize each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a retirement, disability and death compensation fund covering the appointive officers of the county or precinct, as well as the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct."  
"Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties in which subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment."  
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have notice of said election published as required by the Constitution of Texas and laws of this state.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**  
HJR #17—Number Six on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17** proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 66, to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions to certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows; stating the maximum of such pension; and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid.  
**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 66, to read as follows:  
"Section 66. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows, as provided by Chapter 352, Acts of the Fifteenth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any such Texas Ranger or his widow, provided that such widow was legally married prior to January 1, 1957, to a Texas Ranger qualifying for such pension."  
"These pensions may be paid only from the special fund created by Section 17, Article VII for a payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:  
"FOR the Constitutional amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."  
Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Nellie had visited me, but I had never seen her home. She lives with her brother, Bob, and her sister, Ann. 

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON  
AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.  
HJR #30—Number Three on the Ballot.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."  
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."  
If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes have been cast in favor of said amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.  
Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.  
HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Section 5 and 24 and authorizing a new Section of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for annual Sessions of the Legislature; changing the compensation, per diem and travel expense of the Members of the Legislature; authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol; providing for an election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.  
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:  
"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet every year, under the condition and limitation hereinafter set forth, at such time as may be provided by law, and at other times when convened by the Governor.  
"During the First Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January, 1959, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thirty (30) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the continuation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty (30) days of the First Regular Session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of its membership.  
"During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January 1960, and each succeeding two years thereafter, the Legislature shall be authorized to consider and act upon the following only:  
"a. Make annual appropriations for the general operation of the State government; which appropriations may be passed by a majority vote of each House.  
"b. Consider emergency matters submitted by the Governor; bills embodying such matters shall become law only if the same shall be passed by a two-thirds vote of the Members elected to each House.  
"Whenever the term 'Biennial Session' appears in Article II of the Constitution, it shall be construed to mean 'First Regular Session.'  
"Any bill considered in the Second Regular Session of the Legislature must be introduced in that session."  
Section 2. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:  
"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a salary of seven thousand, Five Hundred Dollars (\$7,500) per annum and expense of office in amount and manner as determined by law. The Legislature shall not provide for any per diem for a greater number than one hundred and twenty (120) days during the First Regular Session, sixty (60) days during the Second Regular Session, and thirty (30) days during any Called Session."  
Section 3. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 24a to read as follows:  
"Section 24a. In addition to other compensation provided herein, the Lieutenant Governor of the State of Texas and the Speaker of the House of Representatives shall be entitled to temporary residence in the State Capitol during their term of office in such quarters and under such conditions as the Legislature may provide."  
Section 4. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for annual Sessions of the Legislature, prescribing the compensation and expenses for members thereof, limiting the per diem for each Session, and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives in the Capitol."

A YEAR OF GROWTH FOR THE TEXAS EGG LAW

The Texas Egg Law—a milestone in Texas agricultural legislation—is a year old this month. And the year that has passed has been a year of growth—complete with growing pains—for the law and for the industry it serves.

When the law requiring accurate labelling of eggs offered for sale in Texas became official in August of 1957, it had already suffered pre-natal pains of growth. Heated complaints were heard that, once in operation, the law would ruin the industry. This was somewhat like cussing the cook before the soup was poured. And, fortunately, once the soup was poured, the complaints began to subside and the law continued to develop.

Dove Season Outlook Good Through State

Prospects for the mourning dove season appear excellent at this time, according to the Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration of the Game and Fish Commission.

Call-counts made throughout the state in cooperation with the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service indicate a breeding season population comparable to last year.

Open season periods this year are September 1 through October 20 for the North Zone and October 1 through November 19 for the South Zone except in counties having a white-winged dove season or special regulations. The North Zone borders on and includes Kinney, Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, Comal, Hays, Travis, Williamson, Milam, Robertson, Leon, Houston, Cherokee, Nacogdoches, and Shelby Counties. Shooting hours will be from 12 noon to sunset.

Favorable weather conditions this year have provided mourning doves with ample native and domestic food. The abundance being due to a spring growing season which produced good weed seed and grain crops, the Assistant Director said.

The call-count method of estimating dove populations was begun in 1951. A base line of time and place was determined to keep conditions similar for each year's count. By this method the counts are made May 20 through June 10, beginning one-half hour before official sunrise. Along established 20-mile routes, counts are made at one mile intervals of 3-minute duration, noting the number of calls heard during this period and of birds seen en route to the next one-mile stop.

"At that time of year, the nesting season is getting into full swing," the Assistant Director said. "It is also the time when most birds are singing, making for an accurate count."

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## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

Austin, Tex.—Everyone wants harmony at the State Democratic Convention Sept. 9 in San Antonio.

Gov. Price Daniel, U. S. Senator Ralph Yarborough, National Committeeman Byron Skelton, and Speaker Sam Rayburn—all say they want harmony.

Even National Committeewoman Mrs. R. D. Randolph, who has tirelessly needed Governor Daniel and the state committee for two years, more or less joined in by predicting "a spirit of good will" among delegates.

Despite all the expressions of good intent, harmony among Texas Democrats is hard to come by. Like a huge household of relatives and in-laws, the party always has many clashing personalities and viewpoints under one roof. In the past, there've been rump conventions and separate rival delegations to the national convention.

It is the hope of avoiding this in 1960 that lies behind the cementing efforts. Many leaders

contend that a unified Texas delegation could have a key role in naming the next presidential nominee.

All the above-mentioned leaders are presently agreed on one issue—support of the party nominee. Point on which they part is whether the governor should have a veto over the state committee members selected by vote of district delegations.

Governor Daniel, following the practice of past governors, bumped some of the district-selected committee members in 1956 and submitted people more in line with his program.

Mrs. Randolph and Senator Yarborough, now joined by Rayburn, insist the governor has no right to do this.

But Governor Daniel has not promised he wouldn't. He said he felt no district should propose a committee member who is "dedicated to the sabotage of . . . duly elected officers of the party." This almost certain-

ly refers to members of the Democrats of Texas (DOT), an ultra-liberal group that has heckled and hindered the governor and other official party leaders at every turn for the past two years.

Delegates from each of the 31 senatorial districts are allowed two state committee members—a man and a woman. It is estimated that perhaps six of these districts may be controlled by anti-Daniel forces. Therein lies the possibility for discord. If any of these districts proposes a DOTer for the state committee, the governor is not likely to "harmonize."

**HIGH HOPES**—Mr. Wilson went to Washington, his saddlebags full of multi-million-dollar hopes for Texas school children.

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson personally delivered the Texas brief in the upcoming U. S. Supreme court case on Texas tidelands. At issue is whether the state of federal government owns submerged lands between the points 3 miles out and 10.5 miles out.

Wilson carried the arguments for Texas ownership in 40-year-old saddlebags that belonged to a heroic Texas Ranger. He declares optimistically that the case is jinxed—in Texas' favor—because the brief is dated Aug. 13, trial is set for Oct. 13, oral arguments will last 13 hours and 13 people worked on the research.

More seriously, he noted that Texas had spent "a big sum of money" marshalling its facts, that a bevy of top-notch legal minds from over the state, nation and two foreign countries had spent some 2,000 hours on the 409-page brief.

"We feel like we have an overwhelming case," he said. "We feel like we will win it." Exploration indicates that the 7.5 mile band of disputed land is exceptionally rich in oil and gas. If Texas is successful in holding its claim, revenue from these resources would go into the Permanent School Fund.

**PLACE IN THE SUN**—Texas Republicans have served notice they will demand an even break at getting their candidates in the favored position on the general election ballot.

Desired place is the first column on the left. GOP leaders say people automatically begin reading in this column, and some never go any further. Republicans hope to work

things out on the local level with some sort of coin-tossing arrangement. But they say they will go to court, if necessary.

**CITIES WIN OUT**—Cities and utility companies won the first round of a court battle to determine who pays the cost of re-locating utilities for new interstate highways.

An Austin district court ruled that the cost can be paid from federal-state highway funds, as provided in a law passed by the last legislature. State Highway Department is challenging the constitutionality of this law.

Ultimate decision will, of course, be made by the Supreme Court. Some estimate the re-locating costs could run as high as \$100,000,000.

**PAROLE STAFF COMPLETE**—Board of Pardons and Paroles has announced the appointment of 10 new parole supervisors, rounding out the 40-man statewide staff.

Adult parole staff was authorized by the last Legislature to allow for release of prisoners who show promise of "going straight." About 3,000 persons are now on parole in Texas, and more are expected to be released as the new supervisors go to work.

Latest appointees to the parole staff are Louis Bramblett of Dallas, Julian Chafia of Sherman, Cecil Smith of Jourdanton, Walter Williford of Houston, Massey Herrera of Corpus Christi, Thomas Casso of El Paso, Herbert Gnepper of Lubbock, Alfredo Garcia of Aus-

tin, Terry Cromwell of Fort Worth and Charles Davis of Goldthwaite.

**COLLEGE FUND SEEKERS**—Members of governing boards of state colleges have formed a committee to urge additional appropriations for the colleges. Jointly the college directors feel they need about \$13,000,000 a year more, mostly for faculty salaries.

Herman Heep, Austin oilman and member of the Texas A&M Board, is chairman of the committee. Said Heep, "It is time we point out that Texas, ranking low among the states in its support of higher education, is getting about what it is paying for."
