A graduate of Spencerian College in Milwaukee, Wis., he later served as credit and collection manager for a nationally known firm, and was also associated with finance and banking.

Objective of the south central district now is to add 12 new units and 160 new boys during the year, stated Mr. Cady who succeeds Vall A. Hinkle as executive of this district.

Duren stated: "You guys just as well come on and bring in your check, because if we have to come after it, it will cost you \$10 more than you had planned to contribute."

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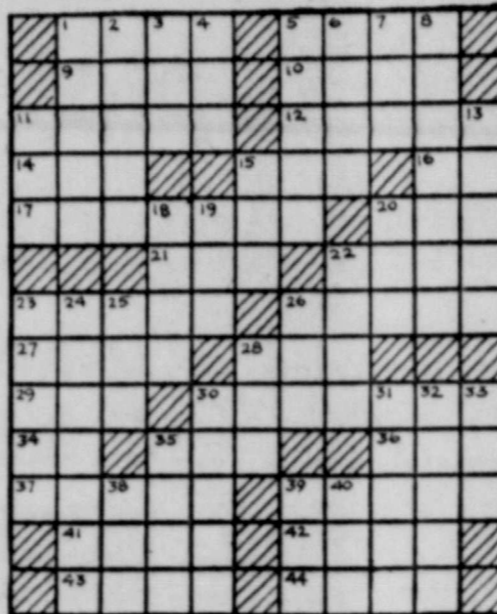

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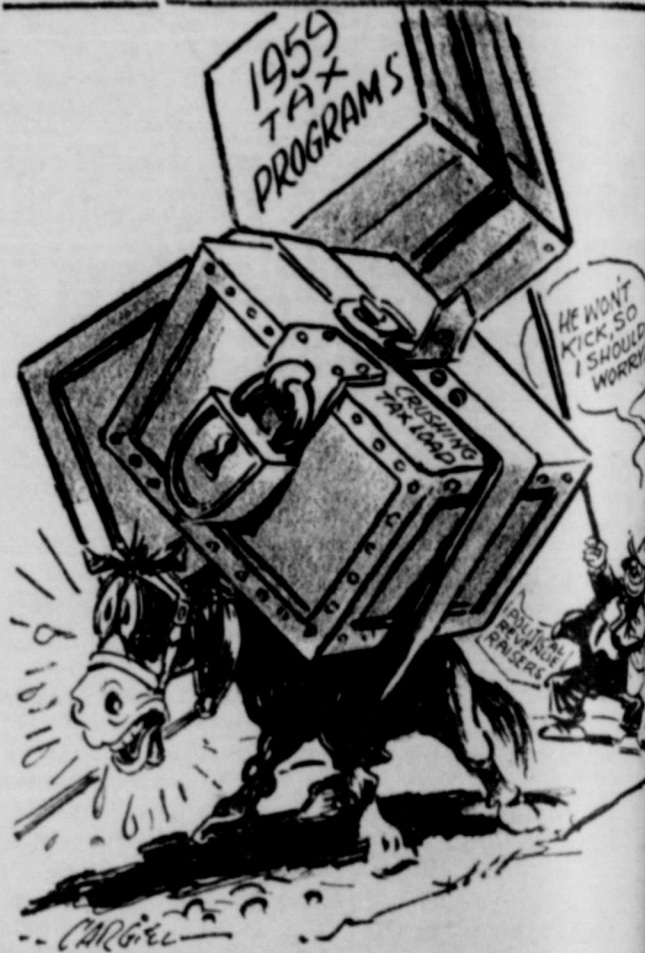

Scholarships ranging from \$250 to \$500 per year are now being offered students to attend the Southwest School of Printing. The school is a division of Sam Houston State Teachers College, Huntsville, Texas.

"Last year 10 boys and one girl were selected as recipients of these scholarships from a large group of applicants. It is our hope that again this year it will be possible for us to select additional outstanding students who wish to make a career of Printing," stated Robert L. Gleason, director of the school.

"It is the desire of the printers and publishers of the Southwest, who make these scholarships possible, to assist and encourage young people to enter the industry," he continued.

Gleason explained that applicants will be tested in the areas of general intelligence, aptitude, motivation, and other factors. This procedure will be under the direction of Dr. Hilton Shepherd, of Shepherd Associates in Fort Worth.

The Southwest School of Printing was merged with Sam Houston State Teachers College in 1957. Prior to the merger it had been operated for twenty years in Dallas as a private institution sponsored by printers and publishers of the Southwest.

Scholarship application forms can be obtained at the Goldthwaite Eagle, or by contacting Robert L. Gleason, Southwest School of Printing, Huntsville, Texas. Applications should be on file in Huntsville by March 23, 1959. Screening and testing will begin in Fort Worth April 4 and in Huntsville April 6.

Thousands of ducks and geese now are working their way back up the Central Flyway to the nesting grounds in Western Canada.

We didn't kill nearly all of them in Texas during the hunting season just recently closed. In fact, there were many hunters who didn't do too well on ducks. Others, however, got their fair share.

There was considerable disappointment in far southeast Texas. Here, with Federal Aid, the state purchased some 8,000 acres of marshland for a wildlife refuge. It was opened to hunters five days a week. But the hunters got very few ducks.

As a result, not nearly so many hunters took advantage of the permit shooting as had originally been planned. Fortunately, there was a good answer for the absence of the ducks, which should be under control by next season.

This land was purchased only a few weeks before the hunting

season opened. It had not been managed land. There was insufficient food on the area for the ducks. Resting areas had not been provided.

A management program is underway now, and by the time the 1959 season rolls around, there should be some excellent shooting in the area. This, of course, providing a good hatch come back down the flyway from Canada.

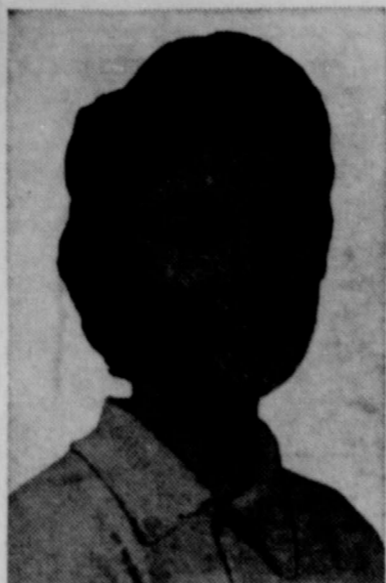
Duck stamp sales were heavy in the United States in 1958. In the 10 Central flyway states there were 555,525 stamps sold at \$2 each. Texans bought 167,383, or more than twice the number of any other state. Oklahomans bought 50,033, and 10,207 were sold in New Mexico.

In the Mississippi flyway states they purchased twice as many licenses as in our flyway, but no state equaled Texas. In fact, California, in the Pacific flyway, with 183,011 duck stamps sold, was the only state exceeding Texas. (Alaska sold only 9,796 stamps!)

Proceeds from the sale of duck stamps are used to finance Federal waterfowl refuge and law enforcement programs. Every individual, 16 years of age and over, who hunts migratory waterfowl, is required to have such a stamp.

The price this year, has advanced from \$2 to \$3, with the added money set aside to finance an enlarged refuge program.

The 1959-60 stamp was designed by Maynard Reese, Des Moines, Iowa. He won the designing award, with a drawing featuring a Labrador retriever carrying a mallard drake. This is the third award he has won. In addition to the purchase of

duck stamps, hunters and fishermen also paid more than \$20,000,000 in excise taxes on outdoors equipment last year.

Under apportionments from this federal excise tax, Texas will receive \$207,027.78 for fishing and \$820,000 for wildlife development.

The funds are expended in Texas under the direction of the Game & Fish Commission. Each item must be projected by the Commission in advance, and approved under the federal program.

Texas, fortunately, has been able to provide the necessary 25 per cent matching funds from its own license sales. With a program like this, it looks like we'll have good hunting and fishing for a long time.

This also shows conclusively that the people who hunt and fish are not only paying their own way, without general tax funds, but are providing for protection of renewable wildlife resources for everyone.

The wild game and fish of Texas belong to everyone. There can be no harvest of either without the fullest cooperation of the landowner and the man who buys the license. Texas has done a remarkable job.

More Water Means More Fish

Speaking of remarkable jobs, Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game & Fish Commission, was on the program of the meeting of the Texas Press Association in Austin recently. In describing the department's activities, he made a significant statement. "We have more fish today than the Indians had," he told them.

Those of us who have been thinking of fishing back in the so called "good old days" must agree with him. Perhaps we might have had more fish in the Indian days if we had had as much water as we have today. With all our lakes and streams now heavily stocked, our fishing is good. We are told that it will continue to be good because legal fishing pressure cannot reduce it.

Dodgen went on to explain the work of the Commission in keeping the studies going on these lakes to furnish even better fishing for those of us who find a little time to wet a hook.

Fishing definitely has increased a great deal within the last few years. In the first place, fishing is a sport anyone can participate in and enjoy.

Incidentally, there is a \$20,000 fishing contest going on in the Corpus Christi area. Last fall the North Beach Women's Club sponsored a program for tagging a bunch of fish in the Corpus Christi Bay. These tags are worth from \$10 to \$500 each if they are caught and returned to the club group.

The contest, which started last November, will end April 1 of this year. Two of the more than 1,000 tagged fish are worth \$500 each; 10 of the fish are worth \$100 each; 50 are worth \$50 each; 100, \$25 each; and 900, \$10 each. The contest is limited to tourists only.

The Texas coast is ideal for tourists during the winter months. If one should catch one of these \$500 fish, he'll be double lucky, for he's just plain lucky to be there in the first place.

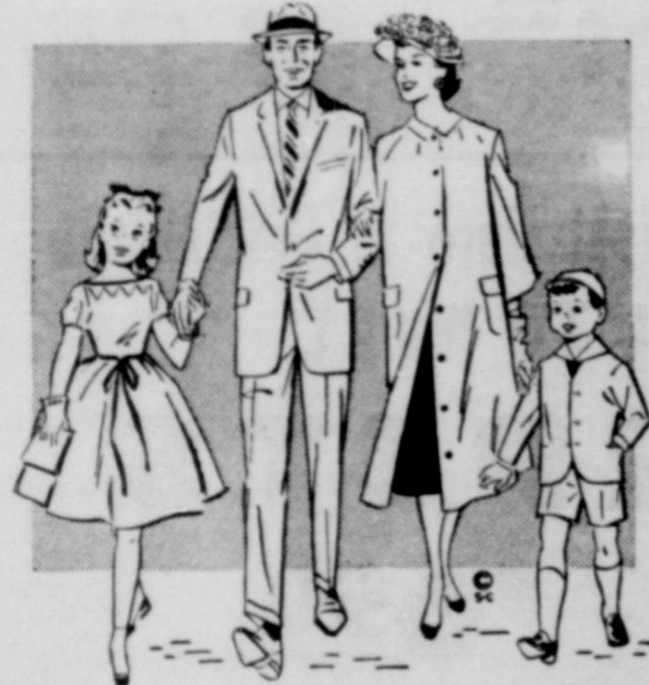

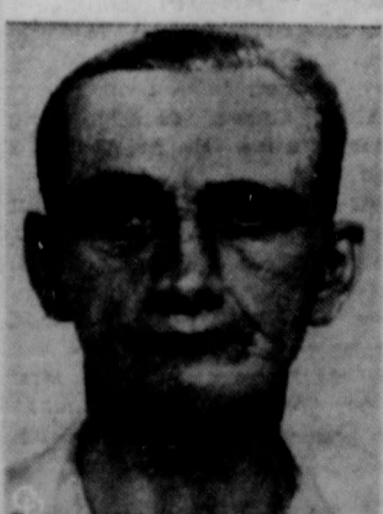

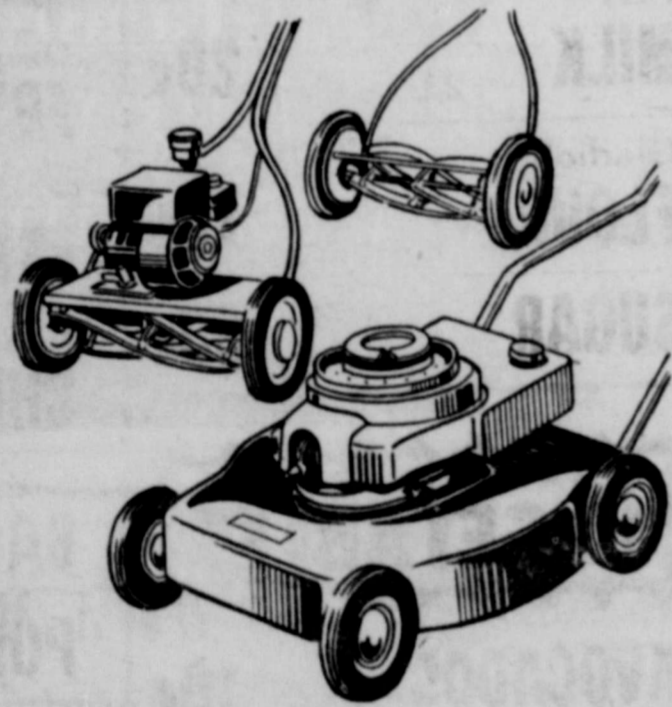

Income TAX FAX

Your charitable contributions are deductible up to 30% of your adjusted gross income . . . provided that at least 10% is to churches, educational institutions or tax exempt hospitals. Otherwise your contributions are deductible up to only 20% of your adjusted gross income. Contributions, to be deductible for 1958, must have been paid in 1958. It is not enough to have pledged to contribute at a later date. Payment must have been made in 1958.

Payments in money or property are equally deductible.

If a contribution was made in property, the amount of the deduction is the fair market value of the property at the time the contribution was made.

This has interesting possibilities. Assume that you purchased a piece of real estate for \$5,000 in 1940 and that you made a contribution of this piece of real estate in 1958 and its fair market value at the time of the contribution was \$10,000. You receive credit for the contribution of \$10,000 but you do not pay tax on your gain of \$5,000. However, if you sold the real estate for \$10,000 and contributed the \$10,000 you would be taxed on your long term capital gain of \$5,000. It does not matter if the recipient of the contribution immediately sells the property.

All forms of property may be contributed — stocks and bonds, automobiles, furniture, fixtures, equipment, clothing, etc.

To be deductible your contributions must be to a religious, charitable, educational, scientific or literary organization; or an organization for the prevention of cruelty to children or

Also deductible are gifts to fraternal organizations if they are to be used for charitable or religious purposes, gifts to veterans organizations, and gifts to governmental agencies for public purposes, etc.

Do not deduct political campaign contributions or contributions to any organizations that devote a good part of their activities to propaganda, lobbying or trying to influence legislation, even for a worthwhile purpose.

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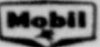

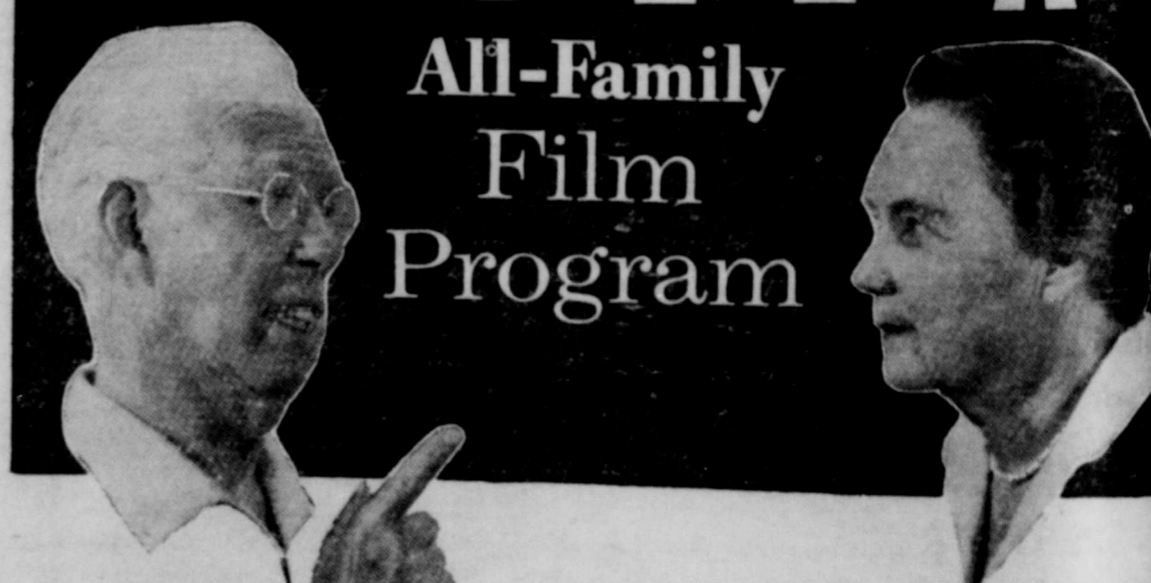

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PARENT PROBLEM

Handedness In Children Subject Of Two Studies

By GARRY CLEVELAND MYERS, Ph.D. ABOUT a year ago, I reported in this column a survey by H. M. Wiley of 17,662 elementary school children of Wheeler County, Texas, in which he found that 10.4% of them were left-handed.

Two Groups As reported in his doctor's dissertation, Dr. Enstrom found that, of 1,103 left-hand writers carefully studied, there were two main groups: those who kept the writing hand below the writing line, and those whose writing arm approached from the left side of the paper, producing a somewhat hooked wrist.

He further found six habitual variations of the first group and nine distinct variations of the second group. He presented pictures of these types of hand-paper positions.

In addition, he measured quality, speed and ability to produce smear-free papers. He concluded that of the first group (those who keep the writing hand below the writing line) there are three techniques that "are efficient in quality, rate, ability to produce smear-free

The reader is requested to read from the Gospel of St. John Chapter 18:33-37.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

By HUBERT BERRY

There is a place for a waterway on practically every farm in the District. V ditches with excessive grade have no place in a coordinated conservation program.

A waterway provides a means of safe disposal of excess runoff water on cropland. Many waterways are natural depressions and need only to be seeded or sodded to an adapted, sod-forming, perennial grass. In a few cases, a reasonable amount of shaping is necessary to avoid gulleying and soil erosion. Just as a chain is no stronger than its weakest link, a terrace system is no better than the outlets provided. Terraces which cannot empty on permanent grassland should be provided safe outlets into a grassed waterway.

Many objections to waterways, through the middle of a field, are voiced by landowners. They say this is the best land

on the farm and that it should be cropped to obtain high yields. Chances are if it will produce good crops, it will also produce abundant grass and convert an erosion problem into soil stability and economic gain. The problem of inflation in this livestock area has brought about a feeling among farmers and ranchers of more security in abundant grass than in money in the bank.

Grasses suitable for waterways are numerous, but best results are likely to come from K. R. bluestem or bermuda grass. Coastal bermuda is gaining rapidly in acceptance from this rainfall belt and East. According to Scott Lanford, Brown-Mills Soil Conservation District supervisor, "practically every farm in the District has small areas where coastal bermuda will do well. Forage production is considerably higher than that of common bermuda and indications are that it is somewhat more drought resistant.
