In the matter of Lake Merritt and the Browns Creek water supply will be discussed as a possible source of additional or supplemental water supply.

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Dedication Sunday At First Baptist Church

Sunday, September 6, will be a day of dedication for members of the First Baptist Church in this city. On this day the church will dedicate a new educational building and chapel. This new building will mark the seventh building to be dedicated by the church since 1901. The church was organized in 1887. Buildings were dedicated in 1901, 1935, 1949 and 1952. With the completion of this building the church will have a capacity for 500 in educational facilities. The dedication services will

begin with Sunday School at 9:45 a. m., when the new building is used for the first time. The dedication will be in the morning worship service.

The dedication sermon will be brought by Dr. E. S. James, editor of the Baptist Standard. Dr. James is one of the outstanding leaders of Baptists in the state of Texas. He was pastor of First Baptist Church, Vernon, Texas, for 18 years prior to coming to his present post.

Dr. W. R. White, president of Baylor University, and former pastor of the Goldthwaite Baptist Church, will be speaker for the evening service. Theme of his subject for the evening will be "The Challenge Of The Church."

There will be an open house for all of the facilities in the afternoon from three to five o'clock. All are invited.

The new building houses a suite of four nurseries which will care for babies, birth through three years of age. The nurseries have their own kitchenette and rest room. They have the finest of educational facilities.

Also, in the new building is a new spacious kitchen built on a cafeteria style for serving. The kitchen opens into a new banquet room that will seat approximately 100 people.

On the second floor of the new building are two new departments for Sunday School. There are twelve class rooms plus the two assembly rooms upstairs. New chairs and equip-

Polio Vaccine Is Now Available

A good supply of Salk Polio Vaccine is now available in Goldthwaite according to announcement made this week by local doctors and druggists.

This announcement came after there had been a shortage of vaccine for the past several months.

It is recommended that all persons under 40 complete the basic series of three shots. The National Foundation also recommends now a booster shot for all those who have completed the basic series of three.

Booster shot is also recommended for anyone who may travel to areas where large number of polio cases are reported.

In the elementary school approximately 98 per cent of the pupils used the facilities while in the high school approximately 82 per cent of the pupils ate at the lunch room.

"The crowded condition presented problems of enough food but no student went away hungry," Jones said.

Dr. Terrell is chief surgeon and founder of the Stephenville Clinic-Hospital of Stephenville. He is a stockholder and a member of the executive committee of the board of directors of Continental National Bank of Fort Worth.

He also owns controlling interest and is chairman of the board of Mills County State Bank, Goldthwaite, as well as the Stephenville State Bank.

August rainfall in Goldthwaite measured 1.57 inches, according to official report by Harry Allen, weather observer.

Of this amount 1.07 inches was recorded the last week of the month.

This brings the total for the January through August period to 20.07 inches.

Mills County men were the top winners in the Central Texas Registered Angora Goat Breeders Association show and sale held in Goldthwaite last Friday and Saturday. F. B. Daniel of Goldthwaite had the top Billy and W. A. Elms of Mullin had the top Doe. This makes Elms a two-time winner, having had the top Doe in 1957.

Miss Phyllis Sweeten of Rocksprings, "Miss Mohair" of 1959, honor guest, presented sterling silver trophies to the winners. The trophies were presented through the courtesy of Black-

well Wool & Mohair Company. Mayor Y. B. Johnson presented the prize money to the grand champion winners.

Approximately \$200 in prize money was awarded to exhibitors of the second, third and fourth place does. Armor Earwood of Sonora was judge of the show.

W. A. Elms took first, third and ninth in the top ten listings of the doe division. Bob Kerby of Goldthwaite showed second, fourth and eighth; M. L. Jernigan of Goldthwaite showed tenth place.

In the top buck division, F. B. Daniel of Goldthwaite showed the first and fourth place bucks with T. C. Chaney of Mullin showing the second and third. V. Z. Cornelius of Goldthwaite showed fifth, 13th and 14th.

Bob Kerby showed sixth, 11th and 24th places in the buck division, seventh and 21st went to Johnny Martin of Goldthwaite. Eighth place went to M. A. Wilkinson and A. B. Wilkinson of Gatesville showed 9th and 23rd places.

In the same division W. A. Elms was awarded recognition for 10th and 20th places. W. W. Ratliff of Goldthwaite for 12th and 16th. The 15th, 18th and 22nd places went to Otha Medard of Gatesville.

Peggy Pafford of Mullin, the only girl in the association, took 19th place with her billy and Glenn Nickols of Goldthwaite took 17th and 25th.

V. Z. Cornelius, president of the association, bought the first place doe at the auction for \$120. Average prices for the first ten does was \$88; 35 does averaged \$69.15.

The first place billy was sold to Wilford Schuster of Priddy for \$260; average on the first ten billys was \$108.00; average on first 25 billys was \$114.60; total average on the 135 billys was \$69.00. Sales amounted to \$11,310.00.

J. C. Bridges, who has held a position in the Eagle office for the past year, will leave tonight with his family for Arlington.



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
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Twenty-Fifth Annual Reunion Of Wheeler Family Held August 22-23

Wool Growers Are Urged To Vote On Referendum

Chairman E. L. Burkett of the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee urges all wool growers to cast a ballot in the September referendum on the lamb and wool marketing development program to insure the widest possible representative vote.

The outcome of the referendum to determine whether or not deductions will continue to be made from payments under the wool incentive program should reflect the attitude of the many difference types of producers affected throughout the Nation, the Chairman said. While the primary basis for approval will be the volume of production represented in the referendum, consideration will also be given to the number of producers voting as an indication of representative producer approval or disapproval.

To prompt as large a turnout as possible, the entire month of September has been set aside as the voting period in the referendum. A ballot has been mailed or will be mailed to each

known producer in the county, but any producer not receiving a ballot can get one at his county ASC office. To further encourage a large total vote, the voted ballots may be re-

turned by mail to the county office.

In Mills County, about 800 producers are eligible to vote in the referendum. The national total is around 300,000 producers.

The deductions from payments being voted on in the referendum makes up a fund used by the American Sheep Producers Council, a producer organization, in carrying out a program of advertising, promotion, and related activities on lamb and wool under an agree-

ment with the Secretary of Agriculture. The agreement was continued for three more years if approved in the referendum. Deductions under the agreement would not exceed 5 percent per pound from short payments and 5 cents per pound weight from unshort payments. Deductions have been made at these rates since 1954.

Mr. Burkett urges all growers who have any questions about the referendum to consult the County Office by casting their ballot.

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

Questions And Answers About Social Security

Question: I have been a self-employed plumber for many years and have paid social security taxes since 1951. I had a heart attack last month and must sell my business. Since I am only 52, will I lose what credits I have?

Answer: No, you never "lose" your social security credits. If you are still disabled after four months, you should go to your social security office and inquire about filing an application to protect your social security rights, as well as for possible disability insurance benefits.

Question: One of my foremen hired two extra men on a construction job but didn't get their social security numbers. Do I just forget about them in making my quarterly tax report to the Internal Revenue Service?

Answer: No, if you cannot locate these men and obtain their social security account numbers, then report them by name and last known address, together with the amount of wages you paid each of them.

Method Of Determining Wheat History Acreage Credit Is Changed

Chairman E. L. Burkett of the Mills County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee on August 19 announced a change in the method of determining wheat history acreage for wheat farms on which the allotment is underseeded. The change is the result of a law which has just gone into effect and which is designed to help farmers who underplant protect their future wheat allotments.

Under the new law, a farmer who plants no wheat for 1960 harvest may still obtain maximum history acreage credit for 1960 if his actual planted acreage of wheat in either 1958 or 1959—plus any acreage diverted from wheat under the Soil Bank or Great Plains program—was equal to 75 per cent of his farm wheat allotment.

If a farmer does not meet this requirement and wants to get maximum wheat history credit for 1960, then he must meet the 75 per cent planting requirement for 1960. In other words, by planting 75 per cent of his wheat allotment in any of the three years 1958, 1959, or 1960, the farmer assures himself of full history credit for 1960.

In addition, a farmer who is prevented from seeding wheat for the 1960 crop because of unfavorable weather can preserve his maximum 1960 wheat history credit if he notifies the county committee by Dec. 1, 1959, (June 1, 1960 in spring wheat areas) and the committee makes an official determination of this fact.

There has been no change in the law or regulations relating to history credit for farmers who overproduce their 1960 allotments, Mr. Burkett said. The farmer who exceeds his allotment will receive history credit only for the allotment unless he stores his excess wheat or delivers it to the Secretary of Agriculture to avoid or postpone the marketing quota penalty.

Mr. Burkett urges farmers who have questions about these provisions to consult the county office in the short time that remains before winter wheat planting.

Austin, Tex.—Texas will have a virtual "government on wheels" for the last part of this month as 31 state agencies pick up their filing cabinets and move into the new State Office Building.

This is the second new headquarters building to be completed this year. First to be occupied was the new Texas Employment Commission building, completed only a few weeks ago.

Transferring into the new State Office Building undoubtedly will be the biggest move of state agencies since horse-drawn dray wagons moved the government into the present Capitol Building in 1888.

First to move will be a host of commissions, boards and divisions which have been in rented quarters scattered over Austin.

Later, probably October or November, another big move will take the Supreme Court, Court of Criminal Appeals, Attorney General's Department and Supreme Court Library out of the Capitol into the new State Courts Building... third state building to be completed this year.

It has been the dream for some time of the Supreme Court's elderly Chief Justice John E. Hickman to stay on the job until the day he could preside in the new Courts Building. Built of granite similar to that in the Capitol, but with modern styling, the new buildings are to the north of the Capitol. Combined cost of the two buildings is some \$7,000,000.

With all the happiness over the prospect of splendid new quarters, there are some regrets. Many employees are worrying about where they'll park their cars once all the scattered agencies move into one building.

Supreme Court jurists feel a touch of sadness at leaving behind the historic walnut bench, inscribed with the Latin phrase, "As God was to our Forefathers, so may He be unto us." It has been in use practically since the memory of man. Replacement is a handsome marble piece which the judges compare to a soda fountain.

Progress And Property—A tangle of excitement, fear and hope runs through landowners and business people when they learn that a new super-highway is to come through their area.

Some residents fret over the prospect of losing the old home place. Others dream of wild profits. Businessmen worry whether the motorists will be able to get to their places.

As more and more expressways pierce the countryside, the State Highway Department is making every effort to explain the procedures for acquiring highway right of way.

Samples from recent official

Department statements:

1. Although its first responsibility is to the public—the taxpayers and millions of highway users—the Highway Department "tries to create a minimum of private injury or inconvenience."

2. When private lands are needed for public roads, the law guarantees "adequate compensation" to the owner. Independent professional appraisers are hired, and an "approved value" figure determined.

3. Once the "approved value" is settled on, the Department negotiator can't "horse trade" with the landowner. This might reward the greedy and tough-minded at the expense of the timid or public spirited person. But a dissatisfied owner can have the matter settled in court.

4. When part of a piece of property is taken and the rest left isolated or of little value, the state will make payment for the loss of value.

5. Owners will be given ample time to move buildings to another site or find new buildings.

6. If an owner with a GI mortgage has to sell, the Veterans Administration will restore his GI loan privileges for getting a new piece of property.

7. An owner who sells property for more than he paid for it will not have to pay income tax on the profit, providing he uses the money to buy similar property within a year.

8. Controlled access highways cannot have an entrance and exit for every piece of property along the way. Real estate developers are urged by the Department to contact the local planning engineer before making any commitments based on access to the through lanes of a controlled access road.

Water Fight Due—State Board of Water Engineers has scheduled a hearing for Aug. 31 on the City of Houston's controversial bid for Trinity River water.

Houston seeks permission to build two reservoirs near the mouth of the Trinity, one near Livingston and one near Wallisville, and divert more than a billion gallons daily.

Slow Up For Holiday—With Texas' 1959 traffic deaths running six per cent higher than last year, Gov. Price Daniel issued an urgent safety plea to Labor Day motorists.

He called on law enforcement agencies, civic organizations, safety councils and "most important of all, drivers, to help in this most important of all Texas efforts, the saving of human lives."

Department of Public Safety reported traffic deaths for the first half of 1959 at 1,097, compared to 1,032 for the same period in '58.





Austin, Texas — During the next few weeks young Texans by the thousands will troop back to their classrooms.

Many will be entering a brand new world. There'll be some 250,000 first-graders, some 28,000 college freshmen. In cities and towns across the state, children will take their last swim in the city pools. Parents will re-set their alarm clocks and re-figure their budgets.

Parents of the incoming college freshmen—most of whom got their own schooling at rock-bottom depression prices—face what most will regard as an appalling expensive future. Average cost for a Texas college student is \$1,100 a year—not including a car, clothes, dates, etc. In the larger cities it may run \$1,500 a year.

For four years the average is about \$5,000. But hardly any other investment can be expected to return such handsome dividends. Statistically, the college graduate can expect to earn \$100,000 more in his lifetime than the non-graduate.

Aside from the students and the parents who are affected, "back to school" has a wider impact on the economy. Employment will jump as many of the jobless are absorbed into the operations of the dormitories, boarding houses, lunchrooms. Retail stores look to the brisker sales since Easter in the annual re-outfitting that ranges from blue jeans to book satchels, calicos to crayons.

Real estate, customarily, also has a flurry as families try to "get located" before school starts.

Why Go Back?—Why go back to school when you can stay out and earn some money?

Texas Board of Pardons and Paroles has some sobering answers. Its annual report shows that of 1,186 prison inmates released during the past year, only 119 had completed high school. Only six were college graduates.

Percentage is about the same

for those persons still in prison. Overall, the Board feels that people who complete their educations and are therefore able to get useful, better-paying jobs are much less likely to run afoul of the law.

All But Three—Gov. Price Daniel signed the huge new state appropriations bill, but he exercised his constitutional prerogative to scratch out some items.

Daniel vetoed appropriations for (1) a \$216,000 home for old folks; (2) a \$200,000 tourist advertising program by the State Highway Department; and (3) \$1,033,500 for interim legislative expenses.

He vetoed the old folks home, said the governor, because "the hospital board does not have responsibility for seniles and... state policy should be to get these unfortunate people into private rest homes near their families rather than making them permanent patients of the state hospital system."

As to tourist advertising, the governor said that the Highway Department already is spending twice this much from other funds, and the appropriation would reduce activities.

Daniel said he saw no need for the interim legislative expense money inasmuch as \$330,000 had been appropriated in a separate bill for future legislative expenses.

Legislative leaders replied that perhaps the state isn't supposed to be responsible for housing the aged, but the fact is it has some on its hands.

They're now housed in the 50-year-old Confederate Home in Austin. It has been labeled a fire trap.

Legislative expense money was to be used to put a new carpet in the House, refinish desks and provide offices for House members. Rep. Bill Heatly of Paducah said he felt it was "unprecedented for the executive branch to tell the legislative branch how to finance itself."

Dividing It Up—Now that all state agencies know how much money they'll have for the next two years, governing boards have been busy deciding how to make the most of it.

State Hospital Board, with an appropriation that jumped 8.9 per cent to \$83,142,340, plans to spend \$4,500,000 for new buildings. This will include a new 300-bed unit at the Denton State School and a new home for older patients at Denton, a new ward building at Terrell State Hospital, a new recreation building and warehouse at the Austin State Hospital and numerous road building and renovation projects.

Texas Youth Council, with a kitty that jumped from \$7,767,441 for the 1958-59 period to \$10,112,450 for the new biennium, plans to add both dormitories and personnel to the two correctional institutions, Gatesville School for Boys and Gaineville School for Girls. Some new construction and personnel also are planned for the homes for orphaned children.

Texas A&M Board of Regents has allotted a substantial portion of the \$1,969,686 increase in its \$44,174,865 appropriation for salary increases on a merit basis. All in all, some 10 branches and services are a part of the A&M system. New student apartment buildings on the main campus are in the offing.

Vet Land Program Slows—Texas Veterans Land Program will have to be stopped down to a trickle from now until after November, 1960.

State is running low on money for this program. It has authority to sell bonds to raise more money. But with the interest rate on the bonds limited by the law to 3 per cent nobody wants to buy the bonds. In the general election in 1960, the voters, may, if they choose, raise the interest the state can pay to 3½ per cent and make possible the sale of more bonds.

Of course, if the state has to pay more interest on its bonds, it will have to go up on the interest it charges veterans—probably to 4 per cent.

Under the plan, the state buys land and re-sells it to the veterans on a long-term, low-interest contract. It's the only "bonus" to Texas veterans. But it has resulted in the purchase by veterans of 1,997,404 acres of Texas land at an average price of \$69.39 per acre.

Suit Over Hay Seen—In the midst of piteous rain, State Agriculture Commissioner John White has a problem arising from the 1953 drought-relief program.

White says the U. S. Department of Agriculture plans to sue Texas for some \$162,670 which the USDA claims it overpaid for shipping hay to Texas farmers and ranchers.

White says the federal government agreed to pay 50 per cent of the cost of shipping the hay. About that time the railroads and truck lines reduced their rates 50 per cent for the drought relief feed shipments. White felt that this would mean that the federal government would then pick up the remaining 50 per cent of the tab. But USDA charges it should have paid only 50 per cent of the reduced rate.

Broken Water Line; Short School Day

The first day of school was cut short when the water supply into the high school building was cut off due to a broken valve in the line between the meter and the main line.

When the trouble was located city repair crew was dispatched to the job and the water supply was restored before nightfall.

School opened on schedule Tuesday.
