Mills County Has Grand And Reserve Champion Steers At Houston Show

Jerry Duren Shows Grand Champion; Ella Ruth Clary, Reserve Champion

Two Top Steers Sold For \$19,100

Mills County 4-H Club had four first places and captured the two top honors with their fat steer exhibits at the 1962 Houston Livestock Exposition last week.

Jerry Duren, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman G. Duren, Goldthwaite, took top honors when his Hereford steer, "Horton's Pride," was named grand champion of the show.

Ella Ruth Clary, 13, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Woodson Clary, Star, took the reserve champion honors with her Angus steer, "Amos."

The two steers sold for a total of \$19,100. The grand champion Hereford brought \$12,600 for Jerry. Buyers were three Pearl Beer Distributors of Houston. Ella Ruth's Angus was sold to Sonny Look Restaurant for \$6,500, the second highest price paid for a reserve champion in the show's history.

Duren's Hereford, bred by Mills County Hereford breeder, W. V. Horton, won first place in the heavy weight Hereford class, was named champion Hereford of the junior show, champion steer of the junior show and champion Hereford of the entire show before being named grand champion of the show.

Miss Clary's steer took first place heavy weight Angus in the junior show, champion Angus of the junior show, reserve champion steer of the junior show and champion Angus of the show before being selected reserve champion steer of the show.

Both steers were fed and fitted under the supervision of

Mills County Agent George Reese.

OTHER FIRSTS

Brady Wayne Duren, Mullin, showed the first place light weight Angus in the junior show. Reserve champion Angus of the junior show and reserve champion Angus of the show. Jimmy Soules, Star, had first place light weight Hereford in the junior show. The steer sold for 50 cents per pound.

OPEN SHOW

Charles Cornelius, Goldthwaite, exhibited his Hereford to reserve champion steer of the open show. His steer was second place light weight Hereford in the open show and reserve champion Hereford of the open show. The steer sold for \$1 per pound.

OTHER STEERS

Other places in the fat steer division were: Jerry Duren, 10th place light weight Angus. Brady Wayne Duren, 12th place light weight Hereford. Lynda Cook, 9th place light weight Hereford and 10th place heavy weight Hereford. Rhonda Cook, 23rd place heavy weight Hereford. These steers sold from 40c per pound and up.

OTHER YEARS

In 1948 two other Mills County 4-H Club members took the two top honors when they captured the grand and reserve grand champion banners with their steers at the Houston show. That year Robert Henry Johnson showed his Angus steer for grand champion and Marion Reynolds had a Hereford that was reserve champion. Johnson's steer brought \$11,500 and Reynolds' sold for \$1,500 for a

Mills County Farm Bureau was organized in 1947 with 26 members and during the past few years the membership has grown to 244.

Farm Bureau offers a number of advantages through membership that are not available in other organizations, according to the officials, who are going all out for a new high in memberships.

Hatchery Added In Expansion Of Don Geeslin Turkey Farm

The name stayed the same but activities have changed considerably at Don Geeslin Turkey Farm, Route 1, Goldthwaite this year with the addition of a new hatchery.

"It's just another phase of the Turkey Industry," said Don Geeslin in commenting on the new hatchery which has been opened since the beginning of 1962.

The new hatchery is housed in a new 33 by 108 foot masonry building which was started last October and completed in early January. M. F. Horton was contractor for construction of the building which is equipped with forced ventilation to assure control of air at all times, and has auxiliary power unit for electricity in case of emergency or power failure.

Various departments of the building include: Office, wash room, unloading or utility room, egg cooling or holding room, pre-fumigating room, incubator room, hatching room, delivery or shipping room and clean up room.

Incubator room is equipped with four units consisting of 12 compartments with 114,000 egg capacity.

The hatchery room has a

capacity of 30,000 eggs.

The first hatch of 28,000 turkey eggs was set on January 11 and came off on February 8. Twenty-eight days are required for turkey hatching.

They have been setting one hatch consisting of from 30 to 34 thousand eggs each week with one coming off each week.

Infertile eggs are candled out at the end of ten days and the eggs are transferred from the incubators to the hatching room on the 26th day. Two days later the poults are taken out and ready for delivery.

The fourth hatch consisting of 22,000 poults came off last Thursday. Another will be coming off this week and this process will continue until mid-July. By the end of this season in July when the last hatch comes off they will have hatched one-half million turkey poults.

About one half of the eggs used by the hatchery are produced by Geeslin's own turkey flock with the balance being furnished by other turkey producers of the area.

Turkey poults are delivered by special truck with over 20,000 capacity within hours after hatching. Most of them go to

Texas, Oklahoma and Arkansas. About 50 per cent are delivered in Texas. Poults are sold to anyone although most of them go to larger or commercial producers with orders running from 2,000 up.

Geeslin started selling turkey poults last year while having custom hatching done by Shepherd Hatchery in Goldthwaite and also some other hatcheries. Some were custom hatched in Missouri and shipped back to Texas for Geeslin. Shepherd Hatchery with a capacity of 8,000 per week is still custom hatching for Geeslin.

Mr. and Mrs. Don Geeslin have been in the turkey business for the past 15 years. Their primary project has been to ship hatching eggs throughout the north. Last year they shipped 1,600,000 eggs. About 70 per cent of these were produced by their own flocks. They are still shipping hatching eggs and will supply about 300,000 this year.

The Geeslins have three children. Linda 15, Kent 11 and Mark 7. All three play a part in the Turkey Farm operation, especially since the hatchery has made its appearance. They play their part in the process of egg candling and other chores.

Screwworm Fly Control Program Continues; More Help Is Needed

The Screwworm Fly control program continues to move ahead but more financial help is needed, according to L. B. Burnham, Mills County Chairman.

Burnham announced Monday that the easy money has come in and what is needed now is a concerted effort on behalf of stockmen to get contributions from those who are for the program but have not contributed to it.

Safe Driving Clinic Scheduled

A Safe Driving Clinic is scheduled here for the next two Monday and Tuesday nights, March 12 and 13 and March 19 and 20. Mrs. Rachel B. Trent, Mills County HD Agent, announced.

The clinic is sponsored by the Mills County Home Demonstration Clubs and will be held in the Mills County Youth Center at 7:45 p. m.

Miss Eudora Hawkins will open the first evening's program with "The Challenge In Safety." A film on "What and How To See" will be presented by Sgt. Joe A. Perry, from the Department of Public Safety, Waco.

On Tuesday night the program will consist of a film, "What's Your Driver I. Q.," with a discussion following. After this film discussion Julian Whitley will tell about the new changes in drivers' license, including when, where and how to obtain new information.

County Judge Has Family Shelter Books Available

County Judge Cecil Egger told The Eagle Wednesday morning that he has about 300 copies of the Family Shelter Design book available at his office.

The books are prepared by the Department Of Defense, Office Of Civil Defense. There is no charge for the books.

Those who would like to have a copy may get one at the office of County Judge.

"We must get in the rest of the finances so that the program may continue in full speed," Burnham said.

U. S. D. A. Containers are available from Burnham or County Agent Reese to send samples of screwworms that are found by stockmen to the Eradication Program office in Kerrville. These containers have information sheet to be filled out by ranchers who find the screwworms on their stock. After information sheet is filled out and screwworm samples are placed in the Container it is ready to mail. No postage is required.

Only 18 counties in Texas are not organized as of this date. Louisiana is getting organized, livestock raisers in Oklahoma are taking up the program and meetings will begin before the end of March in New Mexico.

The fund drive for \$3 million is about half way. Funds are now being spent on building fly raising facilities.

Ten million flies are being released each week and this will be up to 20 million shortly.

New plant is being constructed to produce 75 million sterile files per week for the program.

Moreland Sells Feed Equipment To Boykin Feed Store

Sale of all feed grinding, mixing and pellet making machinery from Moreland Feed Store to Boykin Feed Store was announced this week by Jesse Moreland and Woodrow and H. W. Boykin. Announcements with details appear in this edition of the Eagle.

Boykin Feed announced that they will move and install the additional mixing machinery in their plant as soon as the job can be done to take care of the farmers and ranchers with their grinding and mixing needs.

Other equipment will be moved during the Summer months. They plan to remodel and enlarge their building to increase their grinding and mixing capacity, additional equipment and provide more grain storage space.

Moreland will continue in business in the same location concentrating on sales of feed, seed and fertilizer.

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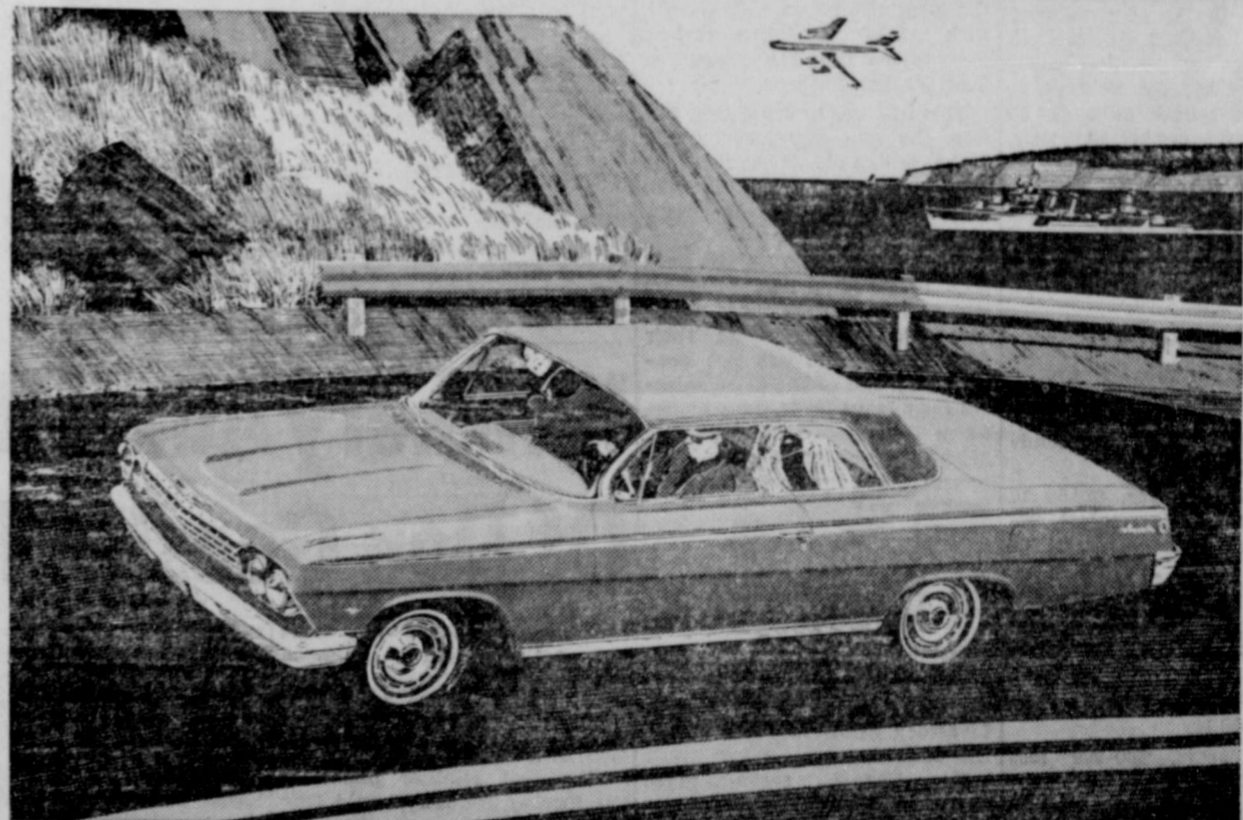

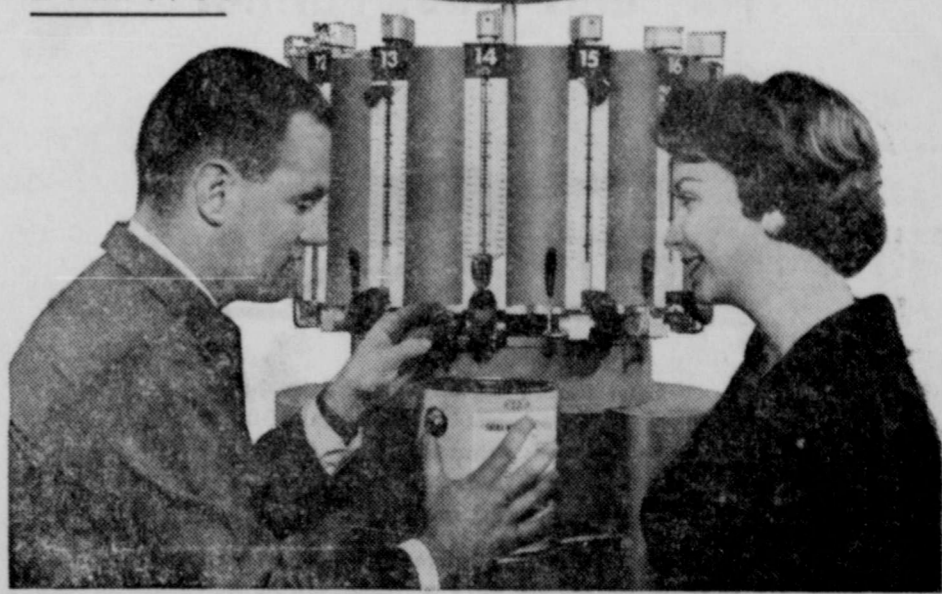

Independent Producers Opposed To Proposed Turkey Marketing Orders

Bertram Geeslin, Goldthwaite, has returned from Chicago where he attended a meeting of the Independent Turkey Producers Of America (formerly the Committee For Less Government), on February 28 and March 1.

Geeslin is a member of the organization and was sent to the meeting as a representative of the Texas Turkey Producers from this area, to participate in their behalf.

On his return Geeslin issued the following report:

"The specific purpose of this meeting was to organize and to stir action in all 48 states to prevent the Proposed Turkey Marketing Orders from being submitted to referendum, and if unsuccessful in this endeavor,

to bring about a decisive and shattering defeat of the referendum. We did succeed in organizing and laying the ground work for and instigating the actions within ALL the 48 states. Our battle plans were blueprinted with a unanimity of expression voiced by this group assembled as follows:

"It is our firm conviction that the turkey industry does not need, nor does it want, a National Turkey Marketing Order. It is our contention that the vast majority of the 'Grass Roots' turkey growers are in opposition to the proposed marketing order. We feel that the National Turkey Federation is in extreme jeopardy, to the point of losing its prestige and position of leadership in turkey

industry affairs, by not giving lip service and action to what can now be considered a majority expression of opposition to the proposed turkey marketing orders.

"We expressed grave concern regarding the procedure to be employed in establishing a vote count if and when the proposed turkey marketing orders are submitted to referendum. It is our recommendation that the National Turkey Federation instigate action to appoint teller committees composed of local turkey growers to assist with the vote count at all stations if a referendum becomes a reality.

"It is the honest and sincere conviction of the Independent Turkey Growers of America, that the majority of turkey growers in this great country of ours desire to manage their business to the best of their inherent abilities and free from government intervention and intrusion.

"Time and space will not permit my listing all the points taken in unanimity of action or expressions for the two days meeting nor to detail the blueprint of our battle plans to be carried out in all the 48 states—but it is a vast program of action. In our discussion it was pointed out that other phases of the over-all American total Agriculture was being faced with the possibility of having the same undesirable programs pushed at them, especially if the turkey program is put on us against our wishes. We did not feel that it was our place to take any action in this regard. However, it was pointed out that surely these other phases of Agriculture men would be watching and studying our efforts and maybe lending a helping hand in our battle to keep our freedoms. We hope for and solicit the encouraging aid of our friends, Senators, Representatives, and news media."
