## Mills County Ranks 209th With Prison Commitments In 40 Years

... (Spec.) — During 40 year period from 1920 through 1959 a total of 109,949 individuals were committed to the Texas Prison System, according to a study of crime in Texas, recently completed by R. C. Koeninger, director of Department of Sociology, Houston State Teachers College, Huntsville.

The study was made by Dr. Koeninger, a sociologist and criminologist, to show the number of persons in prison commitments in the state and for each county in Texas.

Mills County committed 63 persons to the prison during the 40 year period, and ranks 209th in the state for the number of persons committed during the 40 year period.

The third, or a total of 35,989 persons committed came from 215 counties in Texas," Koeninger said. "The five most popu-

## Appeal Filed In Cattle Case To County Court

J. D. Edmunson of Mullin has filed with County Clerk Walter A. Bryant an appeal to Mills County Court on the decision of the Justice Court against him last Friday.

Date for trial in County Court has not been set.

Edmunson was declared guilty on charges of evading the law by not having his cattle tested for brucellosis and was fined \$25 and court costs in Justice of the Peace J. Y. Tullos' court Friday afternoon. He was released on bond.

The verdict was returned by the jury of six men who deliberated 20 minutes after a trial that lasted about 2½ hours.

Members of the jury included O. K. Berry, L. B. Burnham, Floyd Daniel, Phil Nickols, Darrell Head and Milton Schwartz.

The brucellosis control program provides that all cattle herds, or a certain percentage established by law, be tested in a county in which 75 per cent of the cattle owners had signed a petition requesting the program. If an animal is found to be infected, it must be disposed of for slaughter purposes.

Dr. James D. Henderson, representative of the Texas Animal Health Commission, testified that Edmunson had evaded having his cattle tested.

The control program went into effect Sept. 14, 1961, and notices, according to state law, had been posted to inform citizens of Mills County that the program would go into effect, according to Henderson.

## Kelly Air Force Base Building Is Bought By School

A building approximately 118 feet by 166 feet has been purchased by Goldthwaite Independent School district from Kelly Air Force Base for \$486, Supt. J. T. Jones has announced.

Announcement of acquiring this building was made at the school board meeting last week when a committee was named to check on the matter of having it moved here.

The building will be moved in sections and is expected to be erected in three different buildings to provide facilities for Agriculture shop, Band Hall and Health and Physical Education building.

The buildings will be utilized to meet requirements of the Texas Education Agency in these three fields, Jones stated.

Location of where these buildings will be situated is to be determined, according to Jones, who stated that there is some discussion about demolishing the old high school building and erecting Agriculture building in that location.

In addition to the one Miss Cook exhibited Brady Wayne Duren had first place in the class and Jerry Duren had 10th place. Jerry's steer was bred by W. O. Kemp, Mills County Angus breeder.

## School Trustee Election Ballots Will Have Choice Of Candidates

Mills County voters in Goldthwaite, Mullin, Star and Priddy school districts will have a choice of candidates on the official ballots when they go to the polls to elect school trustees on April 7.

There will be no contest in

electing the three members to the County School Board.

County Judge Cecil Egger reported that there are six candidates on the ballots for Goldthwaite, seven for Mullin, five for Star and six for Priddy. Three are to be elected in each

district for a three year term.

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## Farm Bureau To Sponsor Safety Clinic At Mullin-Priddy Schools

Students of Mullin and Priddy schools will have an opportunity to see for themselves how the false impression and sense of security that a driver of a modern automobile gets, can and does, often lead into the danger zone and trouble, when they participate in a series of driving tests next Tuesday, March 20, according to announcements by Supts. R. A. Carr of Mullin and H. Earl Culp of Priddy. The tests will be at Priddy at 8:45 a. m. and at Mullin at 1:00 p. m.

The tests, which will be in two parts, will be given under the direction of Joe Smetana, Director of Safety of the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department.

The first section will be a short talk on traffic safety and the showing of the much-talked about "Death On The Highway."

High point of the demonstration will come when driving tests are made with various students and faculty members in the specially equipped car. An electric detonator which is

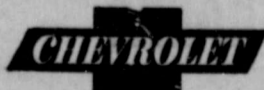

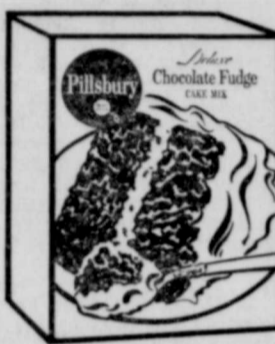

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

Austin, Texas—Although the Texas Youth Council lost its fight for a legislative appropriation of \$100,000 to add more officers to its Juvenile Parole System, it just won a battle for the benefit of orphans in state institutions.

Attorney General Will Wilson turned over the deed to a \$200,000 Bell County ranch along with a check for \$12,446 to Dr. James A. Turman, Youth Council director. Presentation represented the outcome of a four-year court battle. Heirs of the late Mrs. Parrie Haynes contested her passing the property to the state.

Dr. Turman said the orphans of Texas will receive all benefits from the 4,160-acre ranch on the Lampasas River. It will be used as a summer camp and activity center for orphan's homes. Youth Council will raise cattle, pigs and sheep there to help feed the thousands of children in its care.

**Hearings Shock Turman**  
Speaker of the House James A. Turman, candidate for lieutenant governor and former educator, expressed concern about the House Textbook Committee, which he appointed.

Turman was shocked when he heard that a witness in an Amarillo textbook hearing alleged that Rep. Ronald Roberts of the committee was a 'communist.'

"I am afraid the committee members have been too nice and open about letting anyone appear to talk about any sort of censorship," Turman said. He is worried about the committee getting too far astray of its goal of studying the textbook situation in Texas.

In an Independence Day address at Washington-on-the-Brazos, he advocated the teaching of Texas history in all grade levels, and declared, "I think it is a mistake—a sad mistake—for our educational system in Texas to relegate our great state's history into a sort of grammar school fairytale."

The speaker may be tempted—or forced—to touch on the subject again Wednesday when he is honored guest at the Public Schools' Week celebration in Jasper, Texas.

**Space Age Seminar**  
Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, head of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, came to town to tell a congregation of high school counselors how the move into space will affect American youth.

The Vice President's talk was the highlight of a two-day conference at the University of Texas which featured a NASA exhibit of space vehicles and a talk on "Space Satellites" by NASA representative Dr. Robert Krebs.

Texas leads the nation in highway building, the State Highway Commission issued orders to proceed with \$18,000,000 worth of road building, planning and repairs throughout the state.

Biggest assignment was an okay to purchase right-of-way on three projects on Interstate Loop 635 in Dallas County at a cost of about \$6,410,000. The Commission also authorized right-of-way on a 1.4-mile section of Interstate Highway 10 in Harris County for \$2,500,000. Original estimate was only \$600,000.

Other expensive items included: Purchase of \$1,900,000 worth of right-of-way on US 99 in Bexar County; plans for development of US 290 out of Houston at a starting cost of \$2,810,000; \$797,000 to repair freeze damage in the Abilene district; a \$680,000 right-of-way okay for a two-mile segment in San Antonio and \$477,800 for relocation of US 59 around Wharton and El Campo.

Less costly projects are set for Fort Bend, Angelina, Brazoria, Gillespie, Hudspeth, Martin, El Paso and Nolan counties.

**Sunday No Exception**  
Just because April 15 will fall on a Sunday this year, drivers won't be allowed to put off auto inspection until the following day. Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the State Department of Public Safety, says April 15 is the deadline—Sunday or no.

Garrison said he won't ask inspection stations to stay open that Sunday, either. So, owners of the 2,000,000 cars in the state will just have to take care of this problem by the 14th of April, or risk arrest.
