



## Light Vote Cast In Mills County On Wool-Lamb Promotion Program

Ballots on the Wool Referendum on advertising and sales promotion of Lamb and Wool,

for Mills County were counted Monday, September 24, at the ASCS Office by the County Committee, according to Lee W. Tabor, Office Manager.

Of the more than 700 eligible voters in Mills County a total of 298 voted in this referendum. Of those voting there were 232 that voted in favor of the referendum owning 55,404 head of sheep. In addition to those casting their ballots FOR and AGAINST there were also 26 ineligible ballots cast.

If the referendum should carry nationally it would mean that 1c a pound on wool and 5c per cwt. on lambs would be deducted from the incentive payment to promote wool and lamb consumption. This referendum does not include the Mohair Program.

# Eagles Will Tackle Comanche After Defeating Evant 44-0

The Goldthwaite High Eagles will tackle the double A Comanche Indians this Friday night after defeating the Evant Elks 44-0 last Friday night. Game time is 8 p. m. at Comanche.

Eagles scored in every quarter Friday night for an easy victory over the Elks.

Halfbacks L. V. Benningfield and Ronald Cagle shared scoring honors for the Eagles, each

getting 14 points on two touchdowns and points after a touchdown.

The Eagles started early in the game after grabbing the kick-off and in six plays went 44 yards to score. Benningfield scored from the 15 and quarterback Gene Gray flipped to Cagle for the points for a 8-0 lead.

They added two more tallies in the second period on drives of 15 yards and 34 yards. On the first, Cagle went over from the 5, and after the Eagles blocked an Evant punt, they scored again in three plays.

The big play was a 23 yard pass from Gray to Clyde Cockrum. Benningfield scored from 10 yards out and Goldthwaite held a 22-0 lead at the half.

The Eagles took the second half kick-off and moved 55 yards in 4 plays for their fourth TD. The score came on a 26 yard toss from Gray to Cagle. The extra point try was good, making it 30-0.

In the fourth quarter, Goldthwaite again got the ball on their own 40, and in 8 plays crossed the goal line. Cagle made 27 yards and then freshman fullback Jim Childress went over from the seven to make it 36-0. The final drive covered 65 yards. Another big

pass from Gray to Cecil Campbell for 43 yards. Gray went over from the eight and Benningfield added the points for the final score of 44-0.

Benningfield led the rushing with 110 yards. Cagle had 77, fullback Harlan Jernigan had 35 and Childress made 32 yards.

## SGD Election Scheduled October 2

Zone 4 residents of Texas' 182 soil conservation districts are reminded that they have an important election coming up on October 2. The Mills County election will be held at 8:00 p. m. at the Mills County State Bank in Goldthwaite.

The farmer or ranchman elected by them will serve as their supervisor and representative on the District's Soil Conservation Board for the next five years. All eligible voters are urged to cast a ballot.

A qualified voter is a Zone 4 landowner who is 21 years of age or older. Wives of landowners are also eligible to vote and they are advised to do so since they have an interest in their soil conservation district, its program and activities.

Soil conservation districts are political sub-divisions of the State of Texas, and by law their governing boards are charged with the responsibility of carrying out a soil and water conservation program in the district. Through them, technical services, equipment, leadership in small watershed projects and many other services are provided to cooperating landowners.

**SMALL BUSINESS WEEK**—The week of September 10 has been observed as Small Business Week. The honor is deserved. The contribution of small businesses, to the growth, strength and living standards of this country could hardly be exaggerated. It would be a sad day if opportunity for the creation, expansion and the very existence of small business ever disappeared.

But some of those who are concerned about the future of small business seem to be seeing the wrong specters — such as, for instance, big business. One of small business' worst enemies is found in super-government, with its tax laws and crazy-quit administrative and regulatory procedures. These place burdens on the small business that, in innumerable instances, make its progress impossible and lead to retrenchment and failures.

What this country needs is a climate that is favorable to all legitimate business, regardless of size. There are certain fields in which capital requirements and other economic considerations demand the huge enterprise. There are others in which the small business can do as good or a better job than the big one. Let both flourish — and then we'll really activate the national march forward that everyone is talking about these days.

**"FREEDOM IS INDIVISIBLE"**—It is an unfortunate fact that many words of wide connotation are so often used, abused and misused as to lose their basic meaning in the minds of great numbers of people. Two of those words are "capitalism" and "socialism." Ask the next man you meet for a definition of them, and it will be a minor miracle if you get a clear answer.

Henry Hazlitt, in one of his Newsweek magazine columns, says something that should be far better understood than it actually is. To quote: "Capitalism is merely the name for a system of economic liberty. Under it civil and political liberties flourish and are secure. Under a complete or nearly socialism neither economic nor political liberty can exist. Freedom is indivisible. How can there be freedom of press, speech, or assembly when the government owns all the newspapers, presses, and assembly halls? As Leon Trotsky (who knew) wrote in 1937: 'In a county where the sole employer is the State, opposition means death by slow starvation: The old principle: Who does not work shall not eat, has been replaced by a new one: Who does not obey shall not eat.'"

One phrase alone, taken from this quotation, sums up the story: "Freedom is indivisible". Without economic freedom there can be no other basic freedom. This is why capitalism, whatever its faults, has done more good for more people, tangibly and intangibly, than any other system yet devised by man.

"A secret ceases to be a secret if it is once confided; it is like a dollar bill—once broken it is never a dollar again."—Josh Billings.





These place burdens on the small business that, in innumerable instances, make its progress impossible and lead to retrenchment and failures.

What this country needs is a climate that is favorable to all legitimate business, regardless of size. There are certain fields in which capital requirements and other economic considerations demand the huge enterprise. There are others in which the small business can do as good or a better job than the big one. Let both flourish — and then we'll really activate the national march forward that everyone is talking about these days.

**"FREEDOM IS INDIVISIBLE"**—It is an unfortunate fact that many words of wide connotation are so often used, abused and misused as to lose their basic meaning in the minds of great numbers of people. Two of those words are "capitalism" and "socialism." Ask the next man you meet for a definition of them, and it will be a minor miracle if you get a clear answer.

Henry Hazlitt, in one of his Newsweek magazine columns, says something that should be far better understood than it actually is. To quote: "Capitalism is merely the name for a system of economic liberty. Under it civil and political liberties flourish and are secure. Under a complete or nearly socialism neither economic nor political liberty can exist. Freedom is indivisible. How can there be freedom of press, speech, or assembly when the government owns all the newspapers, presses, and assembly halls? As Leon Trotsky (who knew) wrote in 1937: 'In a country where the sole employer is the State, opposition means death by slow starvation: The old principle: Who does not work shall not eat, has been replaced by a new one: Who does not obey shall not eat.'"

One phrase alone, taken from this quotation, sums up the story: "Freedom is indivisible." Without economic freedom there can be no other basic freedom. This is why capitalism, whatever its faults, has done more good for more people, tangibly and intangibly, than any other system yet devised by man.

## Farmers Hike Horsepower 70% in Decade



The average horsepower size of farm tractors in the U. S. and Canada has jumped 70 per cent in the past ten years as farmers have turned to bigger, more productive machinery to ease effects of the cost-price squeeze.

The average size of all farm tractors shipped by U. S. manufacturers in 1961 was 51 horsepower compared to 30 horsepower just ten years earlier in 1951.

In 1951, of all wheel tractors shipped by manufacturers 88 per cent were under 35 horsepower. By last year these figures were reversed and 88 per cent were over 35 horsepower.

In fact, in 1961, 33 per cent were over 60 horsepower and 10 per cent were over 70 horsepower.

There is no sign the demand for bigger tractors is slowing down. The first standard farm

tractor ever to exceed 100-horsepower has just been developed by John Deere engineers. The 117-horsepower unit is roughly a third bigger than largest standard tractor available up to now. To transmit the huge power load efficiently, the largest farm tires ever built are being produced.

The bigger tractors permit farmers not only to handle larger equipment, such as the 27-foot wide double-action disk harrow shown above, but also have the power to permit farmers to work at faster field speeds.

## \$152 Million Made Available For FHA Rural Housing Loans

An additional \$152 million has been made available for rural housing loans, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced today.

Today's action makes a total of \$182 million available through the Farmers Home Administration for this type of credit during fiscal 1963. The funds come from the \$430 mil-

lion authorized by the Housing Act of 1961, to be expended within a four-year period. Approximately \$95 million was obligated during fiscal 1962.

"These funds will help 20,000 rural families who do not now have adequate housing to obtain credit to finance a new home or improve the home they already own," Secretary

Freeman said.

"The rural housing program is also a driving force in rural areas development. The construction carried on with the funds provides work for local carpenters, masons, plumbers and electricians and steps up the sales of building supply dealers and other merchants in small rural communities. The wages received by the workmen and the profits retained by the businessmen are in turn circulated through local trade channels, invested in local enterprises. The effect of the housing dollar is multiplied many times before its force is diminished.

"In addition the housing loans are helping to stabilize and strengthen rural communities by creating attractive modern living facilities, the type of house construction that makes communities desirable places in which to live.

"Here again the impact of the program multiplies, for the new homes built with Farmers Administration loans provide guide lines to the community in the economical construction of homes. In many areas the construction of these homes has stimulated the investment of private capital in similar types of construction.

"The program has also been

highly successful so far as repayments are concerned," the Secretary said. More than \$417,000,000 has been advanced in rural housing loans since 1949. Principal and interest payments total \$147,000,000. Only \$86,000, or two one-hundredth of one per cent have been written off as uncollectable.

Rural housing loans may be used to construct, modernize or repair homes and farm service buildings. They are available to farmers and residents of rural communities who cannot obtain credit from other sources.

Under the Rural Housing Program the Farmers Home Administration has made in Texas over 2,700 loans for over \$20,440,000. There have been no losses on these loans. As of December 31, 1961, these borrowers had paid over \$5,966,000 on principal and \$2,870,000 on interest, which leaves only about \$14,474,000 owed on principal. 665 of these borrowers have already paid their loans in full ahead of their maturities.



find they had the authority under an old law on horses.

But Capitol parking regulations by the Board of Control is illegal, Wilson's ruling said. So far, the Legislature never has authorized the board to regulate parking.

**Property Tax Hearing**

Texas Commission on State and Local Tax Policy will hold a public hearing in Austin on Friday, November 9, on property taxes. Announcement came from Senator George Parkhouse of Dallas, commission chairman.

Hearing will begin at 2 p. m. in Room 644 of the Texas Employment Commission building. Anyone wishing to testify is requested to inform the tax policy group in writing to Drawer C, Capitol Station, Austin.

Parkhouse said the Commission will consider a tax which now raises \$800,000,000 a year in the State.

The Tax Policy Commission, created by the Legislature in 1959, is scheduled to make its final reports to the new Legislature in January.

**Education Committee**

Texas State Committee on Public Education will meet in Austin on Sunday, Sept. 30.

Two of the speakers will be Dr. Irby B. Carruth, superintendent of schools in Austin and president of the American Association of School Administrators, and Dr. J. W. Edgar, Texas Commissioner of Education.

Their talks will be followed by comments and questions from committee members.

**Legislative Study**

A three-member subcommittee of the Texas House Committee on Saving Taxes will make a study of the operations of the State Railroad Commission. Members are J. W. Buchanan of Dumas, chairman; Olen R. Petty of Levelland and George Preston of Paris. Preston is chairman of the full committee.

Purpose of the parent committee is to seek ways to effect a saving in the State tax dollar.

**Documentary Exhibit**

Archives division of the State Library has on display a collection of documents which may be unique.

James M. Day, archivist, and his staff assembled photographic reproductions of portraits or pictures of every Texas president and governor. Then they added an original document, either personal letter or legal paper, on which the official's signature appeared.

Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, state librarian, said no one could recall a similar exhibit before.

First displayed at Governor-for-a-Day Culp Krueger's "Operation Hometown" in El Campo, the exhibit drew much favorable comment.

**Polio Report**

Dr. J. E. Peavy, State Health Commissioner, reported that Texas has had 158 cases of paralytic polio this season. State's cases are almost half as many as in all the rest of the nation combined.

Total number of polio cases has risen to 206 to date.

Without the mass immunization campaigns, he said, the Texas number undoubtedly would be much greater.

The Health Department recommended that oral vaccine types I and II be continued and accelerated; that type III be limited to preschool and school age children except in type III epidemic areas where it should be given to all age groups.

**Talking Books**

Catalogs of new talking books are going to more than 2,300 persons served by the State Library's service for the blind section.

Catalog covers all books recorded from 1955 through 1961 and is the current publication of books distributed by the Library of Congress.

All legally blind Texans are eligible to obtain talking

**Highway Construction Safety**

Traffic deaths on highway construction projects in Texas reached a five year low in 1961.

Credit for the good showing is given to a cooperative effort undertaken in 1958 by the Texas Highway Construction Traffic Safety Committee.

This group consists of representatives from the Texas Highway Department, Department of Public Safety Highway Heavy Branch of the Associated General Contractors of Texas and the Governor's Highway Safety Commission.

Fatal crashes on highway construction projects last year totaled 58, compared with 71 in 1960.

**Urban Government**

Writing in "Public Affairs Comment," Dr. Stuart MacCorkle of the University of Texas Institute of Public Affairs, suggests that Texans in the cities might consider revision of their local governmental set-ups.

MacCorkle points out that the county and city governments in urban areas have overlapping duties. He proposes that the idea of modernizing county governments in such areas be studied carefully.

It's a basic problem of modern life, MacCorkle states, now that Texas is 75 per cent urban in nature.

**SHORT SNOOTS**

Attorney General Will Wilson has asked the Federal Court in Austin to dismiss a suit which seeks to force racial integration of Southwest Texas State College in San Marcos.

The Texas Safety Association has announced awards to be given to school bus drivers with safe driving records during the 1961-62 school year.

The Department of Agriculture estimates that heavy spring rains followed by hot, dry weather in Austin have cost Texas pecan growers 5,000,000 pounds for the 1962 crop.

Representatives expect to tread on \$17,000 worth of new carpeting in the House next January—but if a threatened textile strike occurs before the carpet can be especially woven, they may have nothing except a bare floor.

Ernest O. Thompson, Texas Railroad Commissioner, hopes

to recover enough from a current illness to get back on the job soon.

Governor Daniel has appointed John C. Dezelle of Houston, United Gas Corporation Vice-President, to the State Industrial Advisory Board, which assists the Texas Industrial Commission in attracting and expanding industry.

Johnny Mitchell, president of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Association, sharply criticized the new rash of crude oil price cuts, calling them "unnecessary, irresponsible and extremely damaging."

Governor Price Daniel has appointed Brac Wilson of Leona to the board of directors of the Trinity River Authority.

Chairman of the Texas Water Commission has stated that San Antonio may be out of water in less than 20 years if its present sources are not supplemented in the not too distant future.

The State Railroad Commission has reported that October nominations for the purchase of Texas crude oil total 2,490,333 barrels a day, a decrease of 47,837 barrels a day from September.

Texas Industrial Commission is reminding industry, and business, by advertising in trade magazines, that it has information and data about Texas available to help attract out-of-state prospects.

Texas Railroad Commission has ordered that Texas oil wells be held back to an eight-day producing pattern for October.

Judge D. B. Wood of the 26th District Court postponed until March 11 Attorney General Wilson's civil anti-trust suit which charges a conspiracy to fix school bus prices in Texas—thus Wilson will not get to prosecute his suit.

**OLD FOLKS**

Board for State Hospitals and Special Schools, faced with a report that 3,000 of its "patients" in state mental hospitals aren't sick—but just old—will ask the Legislature to do something about it.

Reports indicate county judges are "committing" aged persons to state hospitals mainly because they and their families can't care for them.

Board suggests the State pay part of the cost of placing such persons in privately owned nursing homes. Sons and daughters would be required to pay

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
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
