The opening salvo in the 1965 wildlife harvest season will be fired at noon, Wednesday, September 1, in 185 Texas counties. That time marks the opening

of the mourning dove season in the north zone, which covers about three-fifths of the state.

P. B. Uzzell, wildlife coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said prospects are favorable for substantial numbers of the most popular upland game bird in Texas. He said reports indicate a generally good hatch in most areas and that food and water conditions have been adequate, except in a few scattered areas.

The opening mourning dove bombardment at noon September 1 will be reinforced within one week by two distinctive shoots. One will be the traditional white-winged dove shoot in Rio Grande Valley counties, September 4-5 and September 11-12. The other will be an experimental season on teal ducks, September 4-12. Special permits, already issued by deadline, are required for the teal hunt, for which there is a four-per-day and eight-in-possession limit after the first day.

Uzzell cautioned hunters that dove hunting will be permitted from noon to sunset, that the usual regulations involving plugged guns to three shots and such, will prevail, and that the south zone season will not open until noon September 25.

The wildlife coordinator said the best time to hunt usually is late afternoon and that grain fields, wild seed areas and the stock tanks are favored shooting spots. He advised hunters to obtain land owners permission and to avoid shooting on highways or from cars.

The dove limit is 12 a day or 24 in possession, after the first day. The white-winged dove are limit is 12 mourning doves and 10 whitewing, with double that in possession after the first day. Each dove must retain one fully feathered wing until finally processed.

Hospital To Have LVN Graduation; Open House Next Saturday & Sunday

Childress and Cruzcosa Clinic and Hospital will observe a special "Get Acquainted" weekend next week Saturday and Sunday, September 4 and 5, according to announcement by Dr. M. A. Childress and Dr. C. S. Cruzcosa.

Dr. "Chris" is in charge of arrangements and he stated Wednesday that plans are shaping up for the dual event of graduation exercises for their first class of graduates from their LVN school of nursing and open house for the hospital showing of their new wing which has just recently been completed.

Graduation exercises for the LVN class will be held on Saturday night, September 4, in the First Baptist Church auditorium. Open house for the new hospital wing will be on Sunday, September 5.

The new wing which has been provided mostly by local citizen financing costing approximately \$120,000.00 is now open and in operation. Alterations of the old part of the hospital to provide more much needed room for every department have also been completed.

A new department, "Hospital Records Section," is situated in the old operating room and the medical records personnel members are now doing the operating in that room.

Three office staff members, including Katherine Arnold who heads the office department, are presently taking a course in medical records. After taking their examination in about a year they will become licensed medical records librarians, Dr. Chris stated.

The X-ray department has a new filing section increasing its capacity to twice the original space available. This provides additional room for a projected 10 to 15 years hospital growth. After such a period of time microfilming will be brought into the picture in order to store old records on film and prevent backlogging.

The new wing added eight rooms with an additional 10 beds to the hospital capacity. Six are private rooms and two double rooms. Total bed capacity with the new wing has been increased to 31 patients and in case of emergency they could easily take care of 36 patients.

Included in the new wing is a new and larger operating room.

More details of the "Get Acquainted With Your Hospital" weekend will appear in the Eagle next week.

Stamp Vending Machine Installed In Post Office

Something new has been added in the post office, according to Lucille Fairman, Postmaster.

A brand new stamp vending machine has been installed in the south lobby adjoining the box section.

This machine is a much needed additional service to patrons before its installation, stamps could only be purchased in the post office from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Now they can be bought any time—day or night. It is especially convenient after 5 p. m. and on Saturdays, Sundays and Holidays when the office is closed.

A nickel will buy one 5 cent stamp.

A dime will buy two 5 cent stamps or two 4 cent stamps and two pennies change.

A quarter will buy five 5 cent stamps—in other words you get face value for the money spent in this vending machine.

It will also be a big help during Christmas when everyone is rushing here and there and in need of stamps when clerks are also rushing here and there and patrons have to wait in line for service.

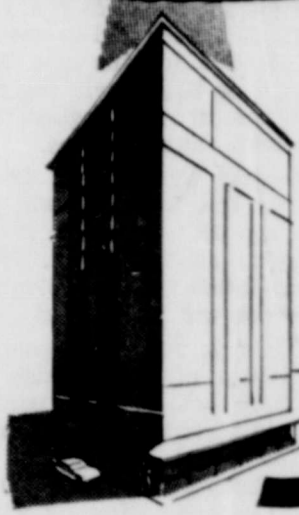

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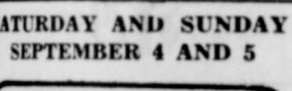

Two new "Koen's," Lige S. Koen of Jacksonville, grandson of the late Benjamin Franklin Koen, and M. J. or Matt Koen of Midland, a grandson of the late Monroe Koen, formerly of Koenton, Alabama, met with the group. Also present were 147 relatives and friends.

Saturday at noon we ate our dinner at the Legion Hall. Also home made ice cream, sandwiches and cookies were served for supper. Movies were shown soon afterwards, of the years 1953, '54, and '55 of the family reunion held at Lake Eanes, Comanche, which we all enjoyed very much.

Sunday morning quite a few ate breakfast there, which is always enjoyed.

Sunday morning the meeting was called to order by the chairman, Floyd Koen of Lubbock, and the invocation was given by Clarence A. Koen of San Angelo. Minutes of the 1964 reunion were read by Jessie Wicker.

As a memorial for our loved ones who have passed on in the last year, also all other relatives, we sang "Amazing Grace," directed by Clarence Koen. We decided to meet again at the Legion Hall in 1966.

According to our Koen family historians, O. V. Koen of Austin, and John Koen of Nashville, Tennessee, the Koen's who attended this reunion are descendants of the Koen family which lived in Pasquotank County, North Carolina, for over 100 years.

About 1788 Daniel Koen Sr., left North Carolina with about six of his eight sons and their families and went through the Cumberland Gap to Tennessee, near Nashville. One of the sons was Benjamin (1768-1840) who married Nancy Jones. Four of their sons were Dr. John Wesley, (1805-1868). He lived in Collierville and Memphis, Tenn. John Harvey, born in 1811. He lived in Henry County, Tenn., and some of his descendants lived in Little Rock, Arkansas.

Benjamin Franklin Koen was born in 1813. He has descendants in Gorman, Palestine, Sweetwater, and Jacksonville, Texas.

Frederic Davis Lott Koen was born in 1815 and died in 1908 in Hamilton County, Texas. He also has descendants scattered throughout these states.

Through the years there have been descendants who came to the Texas Koen reunion from Oklahoma, New Mexico, Tennessee, California, Montana, New York, and Arkansas. Other Koen reunions are held in Arkansas, Alabama and Missouri.

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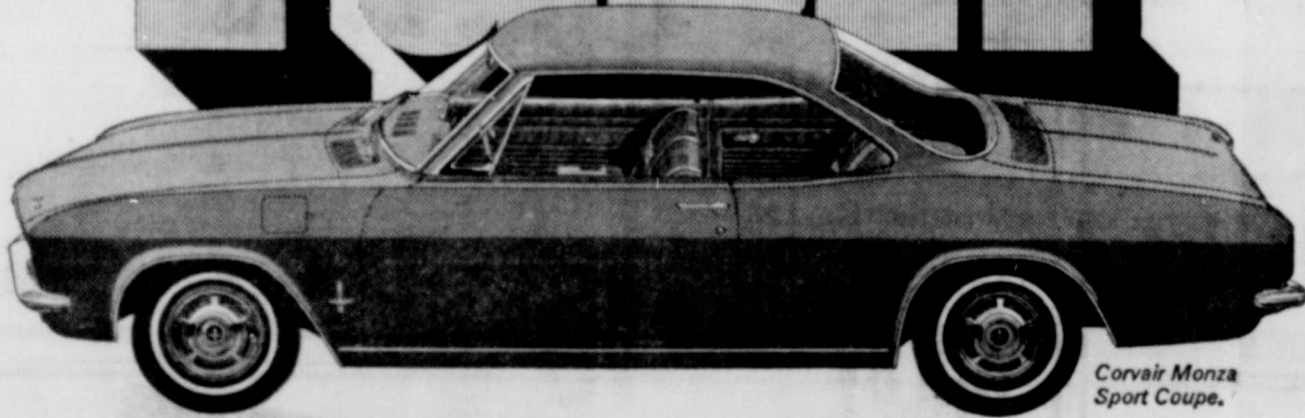

Congress And Discrimination

WASHINGTON — Congress outlawed discrimination in employment because of color, race, religion, and sex in the Civil Rights Act of 1964. So it is ironic, according to the Chamber of Commerce of the United States, that after banning so many grounds for discrimination a majority of the members of the House have approved discrimination based on non-union membership.

They did this when they voted, 221 to 203, to repeal Section 14(b) of the Taft-Hartley Act. The section permits state right-to-work laws. These laws forbid discrimination because of non-union membership.

The issue is now before the Senate. Hopefully the Senators will see the paradox of banning job discrimination last year but sanctioning it this year. Labor unions have nothing to fear from right-to-work laws, as shown by the growth they have had in states with these laws as compared to those without. U. S. Chamber officials point out.

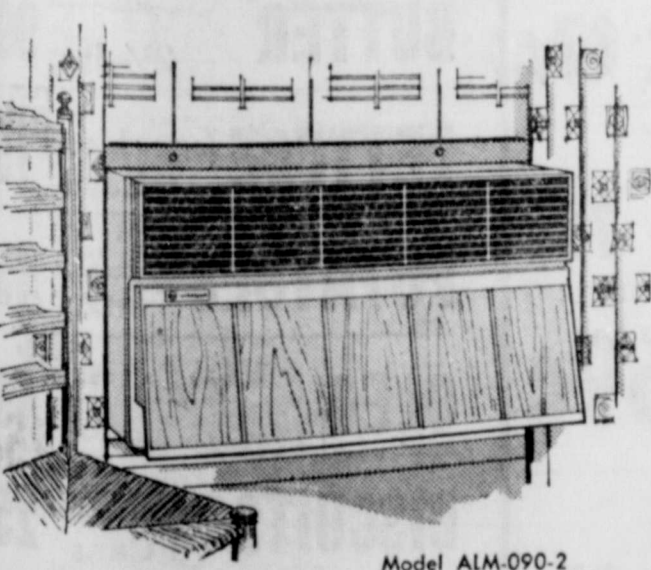

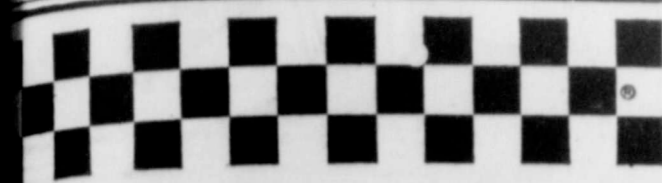

Local Nursing Home Selected To Membership In State Association

The Heritage Home, Goldthwaite, has been selected for membership in the Texas Nursing Home Association. It was announced this week. The Heritage Home's application was approved at the August 10th meeting of the Executive Board of TNHA. Mrs. Inez Arnold will serve as the member representative of the home.

TNHA is the state wide association of licensed nursing homes in Texas and represents homes with over 11,000 Nursing Home Beds. TNHA represents nursing homes across the State of Texas, regardless of whether they are large or small, proprietary or non-profit.

The objectives of TNHA are: to seek to achieve the highest and best possible health care for the aged in homes organized, operated and licensed for this type purpose on a professional level; to actively promote educational opportunities in the field of aging for nursing home administrators and staff which include problems of administration as well as techniques in the health care of the aged; to support research and development in the field of aging.

Also, to maintain close liaison and encourage cooperation between all groups interested in the health care of the aged, whether public or private; to exchange information of mutual interest with benefits to the members; to intercede for the membership with a solution of common problems of vital interest to it.

TNHA's objectives also are: to inform members of developments in the field of aging which effect them; to inform the public and interested persons in the field of health of the services and advantages made available through nursing homes; and through affiliation of the American Nursing Home Association, to promote these objectives on a national scale.

Dove Season Will Cover 120 Part Days

Texans will have a total of 120 half days to pursue the popular sport of dove hunting this year. Many other states have only 60 full days.

The season set by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission provides a substantial bonus for white-winged dove hunters in the Rio Grande Valley of Texas. This year, a full limit of mourning dove is permitted in addition to the limit of whitewings.

For mourning doves, the daily limit is 12 and 24 in possession (after the first day). For whitewings, the daily limit is 10 and 20 in possession (after the first day).

WHITE WINGED DOVES

Dates for the white-winged dove season which attracts gunners from as far away as New York City, are Saturday and Sunday, September 4 and 5, and Saturday and Sunday, September 11 and 12. Shooting hours are from noon to sunset.

MOURNING DOVES

On mourning doves, the season is the same as last year in the north zone, which includes Mills County. Dates are September through October 30, and the south zone from September 25 through November 23 except in those counties having a white-winged dove season where it will be September 25 through November 19. Shooting hours are from noon to sunset.

Counties in the whitewing zones are: Brewster, Brooks, Cameron, Culberson, Dimmit, El Paso, Hidalgo, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Jim Hogg, Kenedy, Kinney, La Salle, Maverick, Presidio, Starr, Terrell, Val Verde, Webb, Willacy, and Zapata.

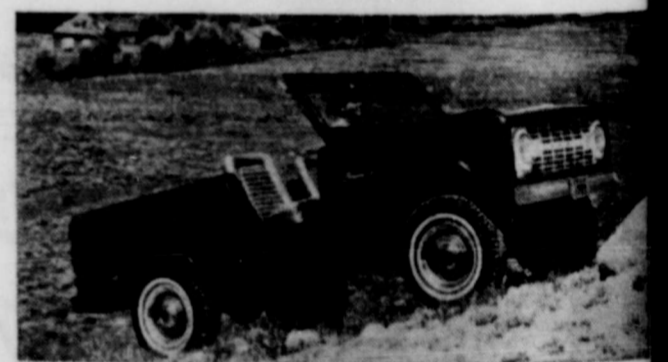

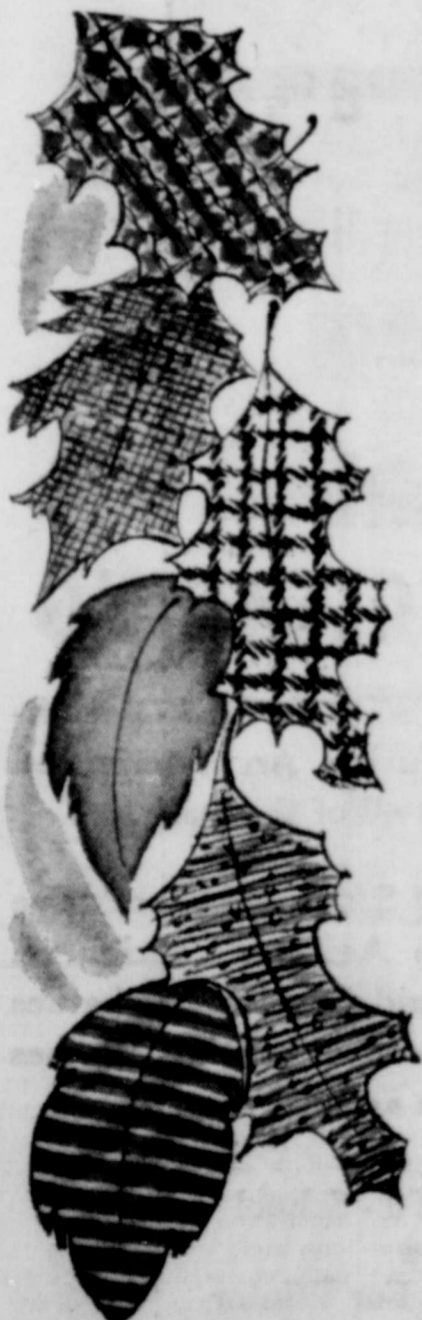

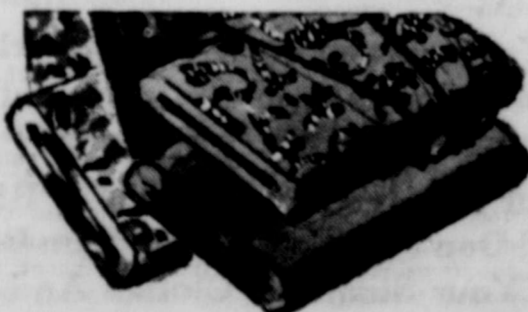
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
