In 1964 during September 7.19 inches was recorded and 25.78 inches for the nine month period.

Childress came back in the third quarter with a touchdown and Miller kicked again. This time the score was 35-0.

The reserves took over in the fourth quarter with Gary Warlick running 11 yards for a touchdown. Bobby Rountree made the extra points by running the ball over. The score then stood at 43-0. Miller intercepted a pass and ran 15 yards for another touchdown, but the try for extra points failed. The Eagles kicked-off to the Indians for the last play of the game, as the clock ran out with the final score 49-0.

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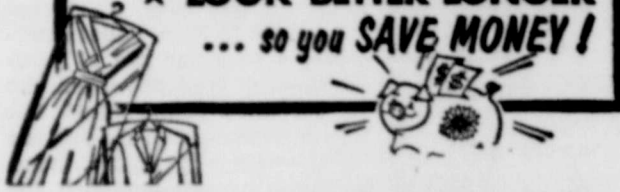
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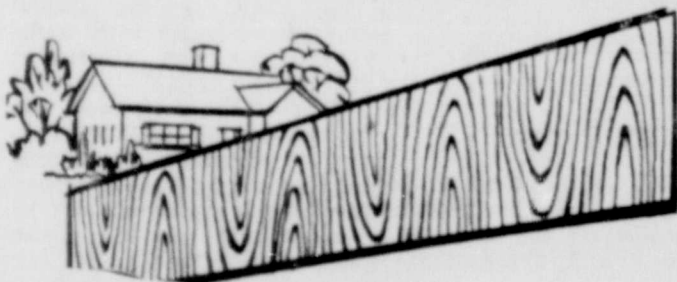

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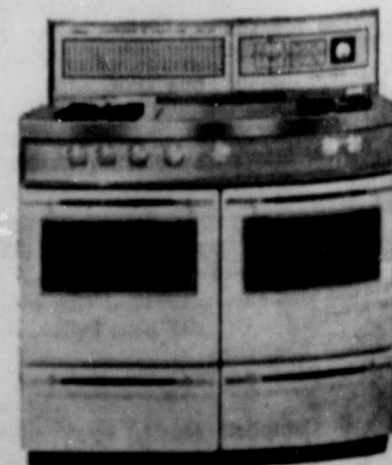
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## SCS To Give Technical Assistance In Improving Beauty Of Countryside

Natural beauty of the countryside is recognized as a national product of Soil, Water and Plant Conservation as planned and applied in Soil Conservation Districts across the land. The Secretary of Agriculture has recognized the significance of rural beautification and has made plans for action.

The Soil Conservation Service has been assigned the responsibility of providing technical assistance in improving the natural beauty of the countryside. The assignment was made by a memorandum from Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman.

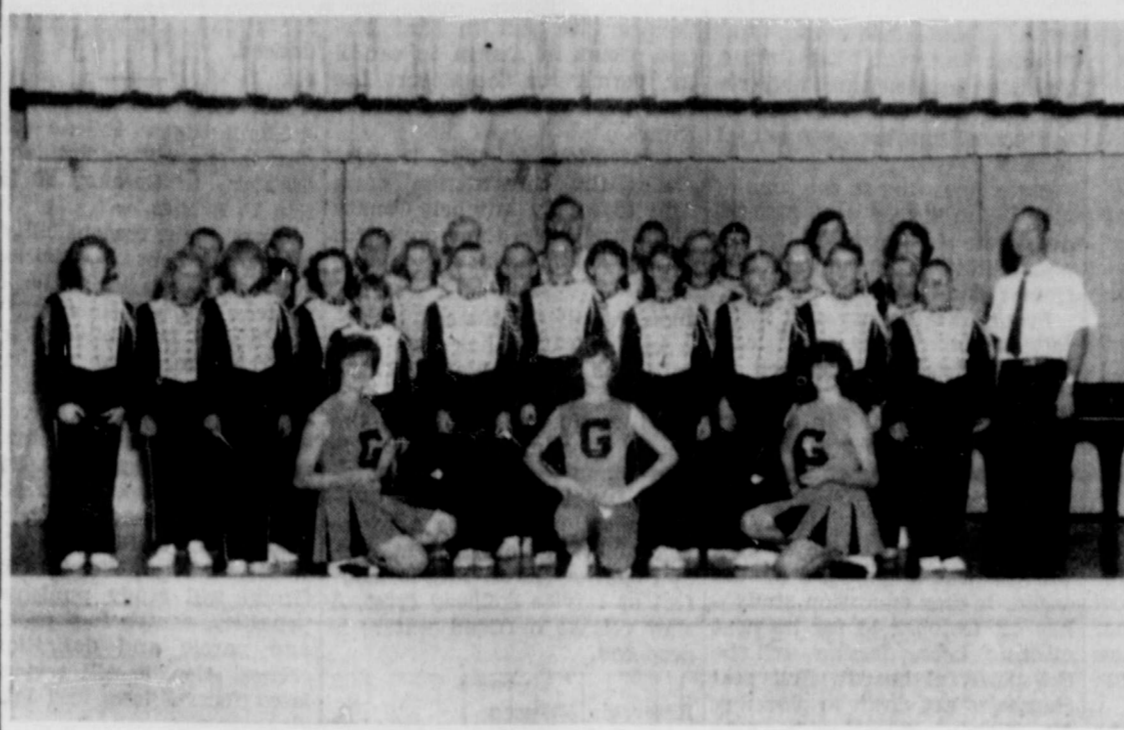
This will be another part of the technical assistance rendered through local Soil Conservation Districts, according to Elton Smith, Work Unit Conservationist at Goldthwaite. The policy of the Department of Agriculture is to give greater emphasis to beautification of the rural landscape. The SCS

will give emphasis on improving fish and wildlife areas, recreation areas, landscaping of farmsteads, parks, and other programs relating to natural beauty.

Conservation and beauty are closely related, Smith said. Both are important to city as well as rural residents.

The technical assistance will be mostly in the form of consultative service. It will be available to landowners, operators, communities, and state and local governments. The SCS will also work with other Federal agencies and Rural Areas Development Committees to improve the natural beauty of the countryside through soil and water conservation practices.

Driving for pleasure is the number one outdoor leisure activity of most American families according to studies by the Outdoor Recreation Resources Review Commission. The nation's roads provide pleasure to millions of Americans. Proper land use and conservation treatment along highways are especially important. Special emphasis will be given to conservation and beautification work along highways and areas such as strip pits, dumps, eroded and other disturbed areas. Local leaders in urban and rural areas will be encouraged to work in projects that build up community pride and increase the natural beauty of our Nation.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex.—A governor's committee soon will embark on the most-ambitious effort yet undertaken in Texas to find what's wrong with the public schools and to make them better.

Governor John Connally rapidly is completing appointments to his 15-member committee on public school education which was authorized by the 59th Legislature. It is expected to be in operation within the next

month.

Activities, to a large extent, parallel those of the earlier Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School which probed needs of higher education. However, this new assignment necessarily is more massive.

A three-year study of the public school system and formulation of a long-range plan to make Texas "a national leader in education aspiration, com-

mitment and achievement" was directed by the Legislature. Connally insisted the study requirement be made a part of the school teacher pay act of 1965.

State financing to the tune of \$100,000 this year and \$150,000 next year is provided for — with additional funds expected from federal sources.

Every state agency and institution and all state and local school officials are directed by the Legislature to cooperate with the committee in a "per-vasive inquiry into every facet of Texas public elementary and secondary education."

Meanwhile, the Coordinating Board for Texas Colleges and Universities—a product of the earlier higher education study—has set October 18 for its next meeting here. Session will be the powerful board's first real chance to get down to planning for higher education needs since its organizational meeting September 20.

### Attorney General Rules

A person placed on probation for first-offense driving while intoxicated is not subject to automatic suspension of driver's license, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has ruled.

In an opinion requested by Fort Bend County Atty. R. A. Stallings of Richmond, Carr concluded that since a probated sentence is not a final conviction, there is no automatic license suspension. If probation is revoked and judgment becomes final, the license would be suspended at that time, Carr said.

Opinion settled widespread speculation on terms of the new Misdemeanor Probation Law.

In separate opinion, Carr held a newspaper printed by contract and mailed in one county for distribution in another county legally is eligible to publish Constitutional Amendment advertising. Secretary of State Crawford C. Martin requested the opinion, referring specifically to the Ganado Tribune, circulated in Jackson County, but printed and mailed in Lavaca County.

Permit Cancellation Sought  
Colorado City and Mitchell

County filed suit in 53rd District Court in Austin to cancel the permit for the Robert Lee dam project on the Colorado River.

Contention is that it precludes the construction of a dam to supply Mitchell County needs and hurts their hopes for future development.

### Dam Permit On Nueces

An application has been filed with the Texas Water Rights Commission for a proposed dam on the Nueces River at the Smyth Crossing site in the Zavala-Dimmit Water Improvement District No. 1.

Application proposes a reservoir of 66,670 acre-feet at normal spillway level, 164,350 acre-feet at service spillway crest. A slow release of flood waters is proposed.

### Reservoir Refused

Texas Water Rights Commission denied application for \$4,750,000 reservoir on Village Creek near Kountze in Hardin County.

Commission acted after opponents testified the project would mean an added tax burden of \$308,992 a year for property owners in the southeast Texas area and that additional 33,000 acre feet of water which the dam would impound will not be needed for more than 30 years.

Advocates were advised they could reapply for creation of a district empowered only with making surveys to determine feasibility or to develop plans

for a water supply program if desired.

### Appointments Announced

Glenn Biggs, Abilene relator, now is executive administrative assistant to Speaker of House Ben F. Barnes.

Biggs' main responsibility will be management of activities involving interim legislative committees and implementing work of Texas Legislative Council, research arm of the Legislature.

Barnes also appointed five lawmakers to the important committee to study criminal law revision. They are Reps. Dudley Mann of El Paso, Walter Knapp of Amarillo, Rayford Price of Frankston, Joe Shannon of Fort Worth and Jack Woods of Waco. Group will study punishment, penalties, sentencing, probation and parole and definition of crimes. Also, it will review related federal laws and laws of other states.

### Soldiering

Draft quotas have doubled and local boards no longer are as liberal in deferment policies for students.

Col. Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, still is recommending deferment of undergraduate students enrolled for 12 or more semester hours.

A student is recommended for deferment only if there is evidence to prove he is making progress toward his bachelor's degree in four years, or in five if the degree requires additional study, Schwartz said.

A student may take even less than a full load if he is able to complete his college training in four or five years.

Colonel Schwartz said draft headquarters would not recommend deferment of students taking less than nine hours.

Those who drop out of school, carry less than the full academic load, or are placed on scholastic probation, can expect termination of deferments.

About 450 Texas doctors have

been ordered to take physical examinations by draft boards as part of anticipated calls for doctors, dentists and veterinarians to active armed forces duty in January.

At the present time, those born in 1937 or later will be affected.

**Reg. Authority Vs State Law! Here's Status**

So you're trapped in the gobblegook main stream, completely baffled by the current talk about counties where wildlife is harvested under "regulatory authority" or under "State Law."

Well, don't feel lonesome, brother, because you have company to spare. Your next door neighbor might not know either.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department requires a sizeable stamp budget for mailing out information leaflets covering the subject. And it is never certain that it has succeeded in fully explaining the arrangement.

P. B. Uzzell, wildlife coordinator for the Department, says the hunters' problems are understandable. He explains "regulatory authority" this way:

Regulatory authority for the Parks and Wildlife Commission simply means that the people of a county, through their representatives in the Legislature, have turned over the responsibility of conducting scientific research on game and fish problems, setting of open seasons, bag limits, and methods of taking wildlife resources to the Commission.

**Turning Over A Leader**  
When a leader won't turn over smoothly at the end of a cast, it probably needs more body and stiffness in the upper end.

Instead of reducing the diameter uniformly, taper the upper two thirds gradually, then use shorter pieces of fine monofilament down to the tip.

**Rusted Bait Jar Lids**  
Those briny preservatives in pork rind jars have a tendency to rust the jar tops so badly that efforts to unscrew the lids often are unsuccessful. When faced with such a job, especially when the hands are wet, wrap your rubber boot strap around the lid for a good, firm grip... then twist. The lid will loosen.

**Getting More Lure Action**  
Fishermen always are interested in getting more action from their lures. This is especially true when trolling either from a canoe or slow-moving rowboat. Try holding your rod and paddle together. The paddling motion will highly activate your lure.

**Tip For A Rod Tip**  
Now that fishermen have learned that fish bite as well, if not better, at night, (especially the lunkers), a hot tip might be in order. Paint the tip of your rod with a vivid color of night paint. When the tip quivers you can see it.

**Fish Like Candy, Too**  
Take along a bag of gum drops on your next fishing trip. Not only will you enjoy snacking on them, but you might use a few as fish bait. Bass and catfish are both fond of gum drops. Simply cut one in half and use on hook as bait. If gum drops are of the small variety, use them whole for baiting.

**Keep Hooks From Rusting**  
Rust ruins hooks quickly—especially when stored for the winter. You can prevent this erosion if you will take the time to wash and dry each hook, then

dip it into rubber cement. When ready to use, merely rub off the cement coating and your hook will be bright, shiny and sharp.

**Attracting Fish**  
Whether fishing for bass or the lowly catfish, you can increase your luck by sinking several pint or quart size bottles of water, containing minnows, in the vicinity of your bait. Minnows swimming around will attract fish from far and near.

**Cleaning Rod Handles**  
To clean grips on fishing rods, use a good cleanser and a pad of soft steel wool. It does the job fast.

**Refrigerating Hoppers**  
Before taking a supply of grasshoppers fishing, try putting them in the refrigerator overnight. They'll be loggy, less likely to escape and easier to put on the hook. A few minutes of sunshine restores their bounce.

**Carry Camera In Canteen Holder**  
A U. S. Army canteen holder makes a strong, light case in which to carry your small camera. Provides good protection, keeps it handy for instant use, yet holds snugly to your belt. You can obtain one for pennies at any Army surplus store.

**Kingsize Cubes Last Longer**  
Going on a camping trip and need some long-lasting cubes for your ice chest? Freeze up a batch using your wife's muffin pans. Each cube will be king-sized and will last much longer.

**Foil Amplifies Light**  
Aluminum foil can be pinned across the back of your tent to reflect lantern light. Makes the lantern's glow much brighter.

**Solves Snelled Hook Problem**
